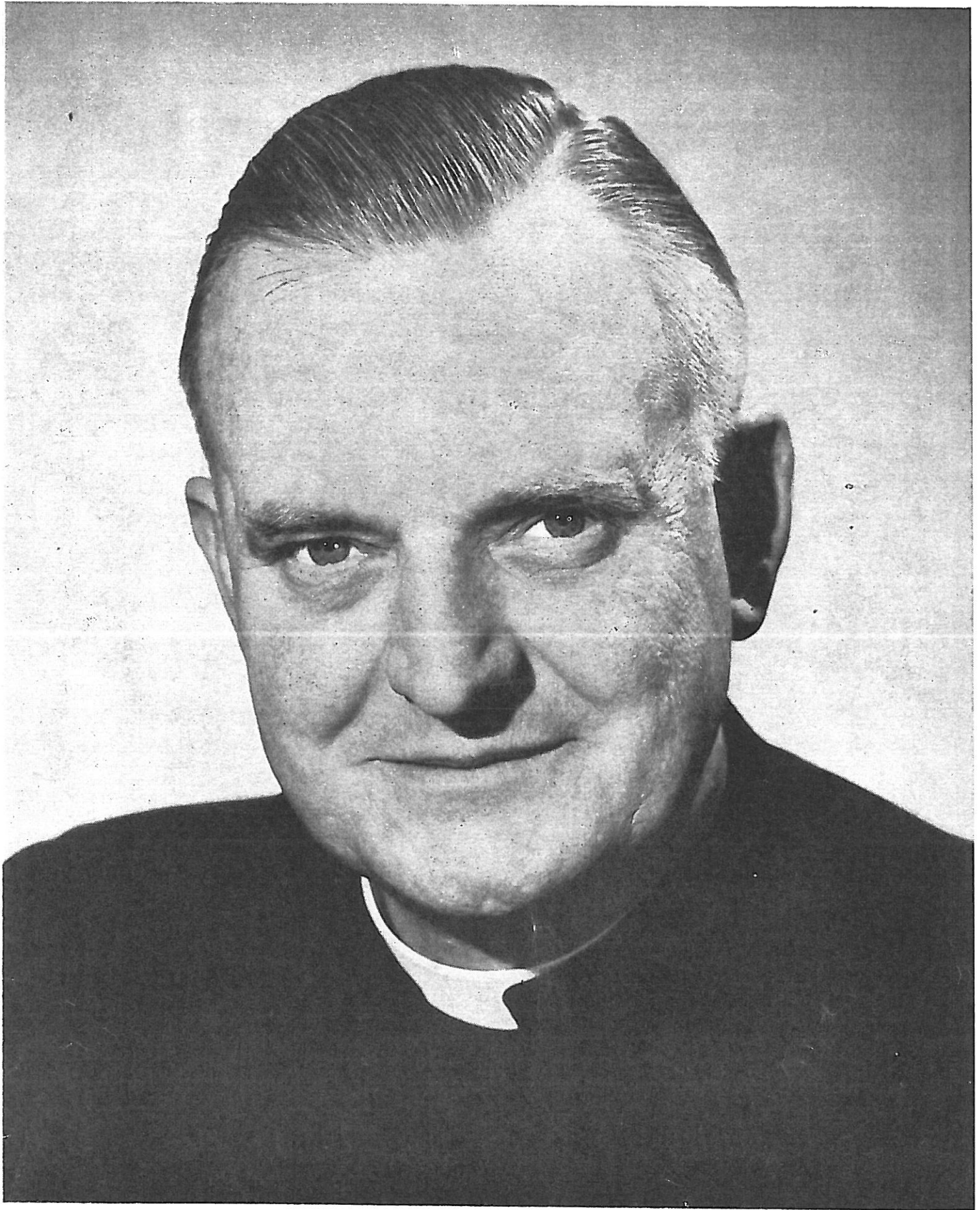

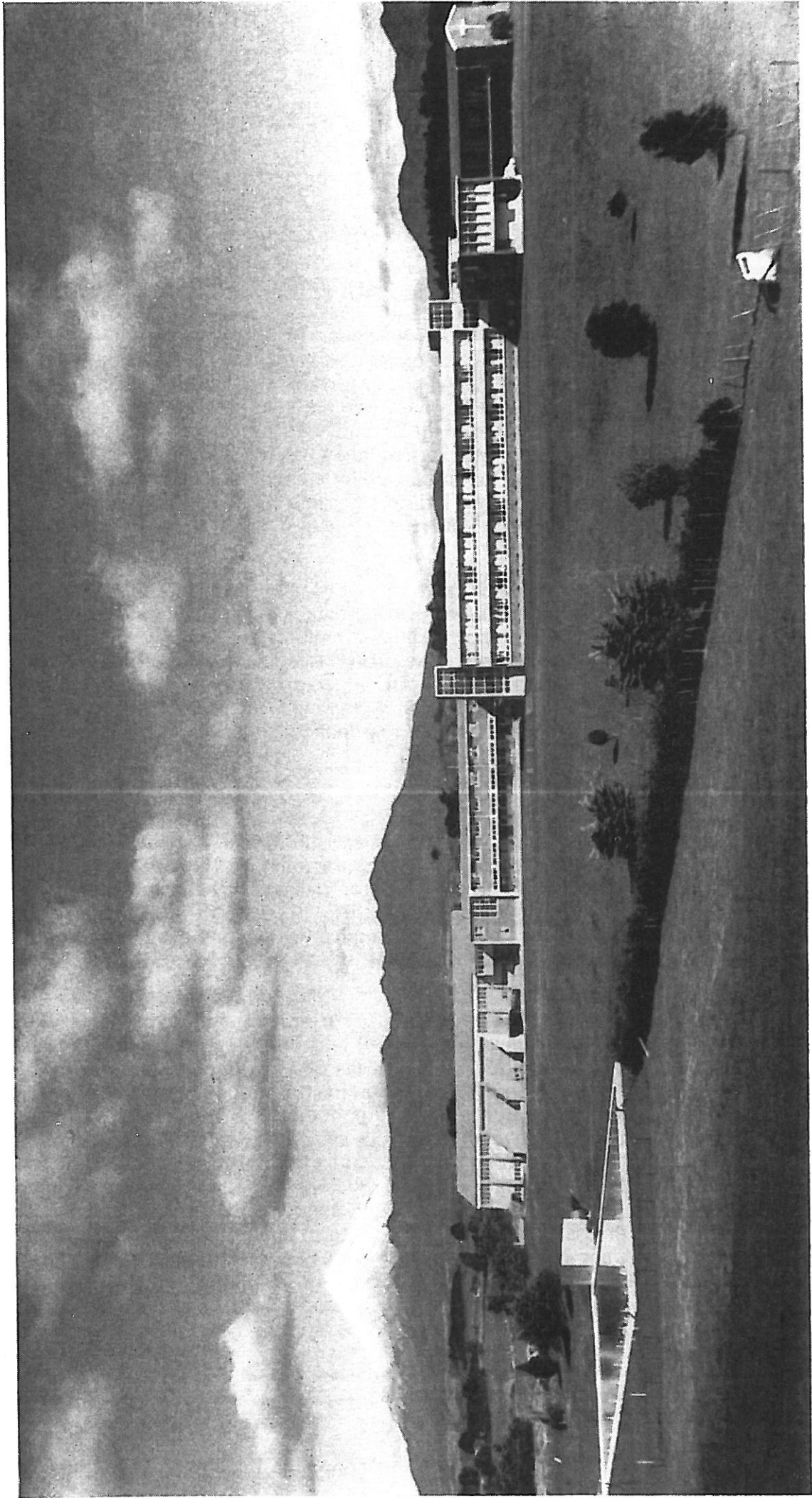
Editorial

IN THE LATTER PART OF THE FORTIES a group of men in New Plymouth conceived the idea of a college to serve the Catholic boys of Taranaki. Spurred on by the late Monsignor Minogue and encouraged and helped by Fr. G. J. Donoghue, a committee was formed to organise the fund raising. Under the leadership of Mr. Geo. Petheram it collected \$44,384.10. But after a few years momentum was lost. However the idea persisted and committees were re-organised about the middle fifties under the chairmanship of the late Chas. Monaghan. Fund raising was started anew and a beginning made on the building of the college. Some of the money collected was in the form of donations, but as the need for payments to the builders became more pressing an increasing amount was raised in the form of loans. In fact most of the money collected was loan money.

The building was completed and the College opened in 1959. The final payment to the builders was eventually made, but the loans had to be repaid. These repayments were always met by the Archdiocese. On several occasions over the last dozen years attempts were made to come to an arrangement to lift this burden from the Archdiocese, but in spite of the manifest goodwill it was beyond the resources of the college to assume the debt. Eventually the position was reached where virtually all the money collected as donations was paid out in interest.

This year a compromise agreement has been reached. The College has agreed to pay the Archdiocese \$600,000.00. Meanwhile the Archdiocese will continue to honour the loans. This fact and the additional one that \$300,000.00 is interest free, are tangible evidence of the interest of the archdiocese, and especially of Cardinal McKeefry, in the welfare of Francis Douglas College. This is an appropriate place to plainly acknowledge that without His Eminence's personal interest the College would not have been founded in the first place and without his goodwill and generosity the question of the original debt could not have been settled.

Even though payment of the debt is to be spread over twenty-five years, it is evident that it cannot be met from school and boarding fees alone. Because Francis Douglas College is to cater for the needs of all Taranaki, and it is hoped that all Catholics are benefitting directly or indirectly, a fund-raising scheme has been evolved to spread the burden as widely and thinly as possible. People who come into this scheme agree to pay each year six dollars or any multiple of six dollars for a period of ten years. The mechanics of collecting these donations is in the hands of the Canterbury Building Society who then issue the College with shares together with the ballot rights and bonuses that go with them. The initial target is two thousand shares. The response so far has been encouraging but the target is still not half way to being met. Our readers are asked to take an interest in the scheme and to interest others in it also. Further details can be obtained from the College or from Finnigan and Horton, accountants, New Plymouth.

ANNUAL REPORT

Very Reverend and Reverend Fathers, Ladies, Gentlemen and Boys.

It is my pleasant duty to welcome you all here tonight, and to present to you the thirteenth annual report of Francis Douglas Memorial College.

The year has been so full that there has been hardly sufficient time to fit in the essentials of normal activities. In fact one wonders whether the time has not come to re-assess the value of some activities in the light of the primary purpose of a school. While it is evident that at the present time a school must do more than attend solely to the intellectual development of its pupils, there is a danger that other things will replace the attention that must be given to intellectual training. The problem seems to be that so many good and useful things can be done with a conveniently rather captive school population that social pressures require the doing of them. The whole thing, too, is rather haphazard: it seems that whenever a new idea comes forward some people think it is the duty of schools to take it up enthusiastically whether it be another essay competition to make Sixth Formers think about a particular topic or an additional Saturday morning collection or even a new game. No school can possibly do all the good that needs to be done. Nor should it be expected to do something because some other body, usually the family, neglects it or does it badly. Other bodies must do their part in the education process. Schools need to be left free enough to inculcate in their pupils what Newman called the "philosophical temper" of which "the attributes are freedom, equitableness, calmness, moderation and wisdom". The present level of fringe educational activities is enervating pupils and frustrating teachers. And this is occurring at a time when syllabuses are rapidly becoming wider and deeper, and require more of the pupils' time and concentration.

In "The Idea of a University" Newman argues the necessity of having a chair of theology at a university. The same arguments support having a systematic study of religion in a school. It aims at opening minds to truth and exercises a unifying effect on all other subjects taught because, to quote Newman again, "the subject matter of knowledge is intimately united in itself, as being the acts and work of the Creator". Hence at Francis Douglas College each class has at least four religious knowledge periods each week. In addition the pupils have the advantage of regular visits by Father Uhlenberg and Father Sherry. In July two-day retreats at Camp Huinga were organised for Forms, 7, 6 and 5 and a one-day one for Form 4. The

Forms 6 and 7 retreats were held in conjunction with the corresponding classes from Sacred Heart. All the retreats were very successful owing to the talks, discussions, interviews and genuine interest of Fathers Dolan, Darroch, Campbell and Orange to whom we express our sincere gratitude. Other advantages were available to the boys throughout the year: confessions at lunch time each day and personal interviews for senior students. An indication of the religious vitality of the school can be gained from the fact that this year five young men started studies for the priesthood, two following the footsteps of Father Douglas as Columbans, two as Jesuits and one as a diocesan priest. It seems quite likely that half a dozen of this year's leavers will start preparing for the priesthood or religious life early next year.

Last year's academic results were average. While there were a number of creditable passes, it is evident that many did not do as well as they should have. Some pupils subscribe, in practice at least, to the heresy that teachers are supposed not only to teach the pupils but to do their learning for them as well. Individual effort is still the key to success. Some statistics follow. Two pupils were awarded 'A' bursaries and two 'B' bursaries on the University Bursaries examination; twelve gained Higher School Certificates; thirty-one candidates qualified for University Entrance; forty-four were granted the Lower Sixth Form Certificate; forty-four qualified on the School Certificate Examination for entrance to Form Six.

Two parent-teacher evenings were held and it is pleasing to record that both were well attended. The fact that so many came along on the wintery evening in July is a testimony to the interest parents take in their sons' education, and a source of encouragement to the teachers.

The Ladies' Auxiliary continues to be the silent service of the college. They are always obliging, helpful and considerate, qualities that need to be emphasised in Taranaki where rugby, and especially rucking over the players as well as the ball, is held in high esteem. With twelve months experience behind them, Mrs. E. Wratislav, president, and Mrs. B. Philipson, secretary, directed their willing helpers efficiently in running Gala Day, providing refreshments on sports day, selling raffle tickets in wintery weather, arranging supper at our Annual Dance and a morning tea for Fr. John Henderson, as well as staffing the tuck shop every Monday. For all these things

and for their marvellous spirit of co-operation I am most grateful.

A special word must be said about the Annual Dance. It was an unqualified success, and the credit must go to those parents who attended the meetings and organised it. Although a small group was involved, it is right that special mention be made of Mr. and Mrs M. Reeves and Mr. Mick Powell for the actual preparation and running of the dance, and of Mrs. Campbell and Mr. Don Hooker for arranging for and supervising the dancing lessons held in preparation for it.

There were some significant changes in the way sport was organised in the College this year. Pupils were allowed a choice of cricket, tennis, athletics and basketball for summer sports, and of rugby, soccer and basketball for winter. The number of participators rose, and it seemed that a greater effort was made to learn the skills required in the various games and the laws governing them. I would like to make a comment on sport on another level, that of sports tours. When teams travel and are billeted it is becoming increasingly difficult for the school to be responsible for the conduct of its pupils. My observation is that more and more parents are permissive and some who open their homes to visiting players fail to exercise proper supervision, particularly in the matter of drink. This is not a big problem with Francis Douglas College yet but it is noticeable up and down the country and already some sports' meetings where billeting was necessary have been abandoned. Details of particular sports can be read elsewhere. Here I want to record my gratitude to Messrs. P. Riordan, G. MacDonald, O. Creighton, W. M. McNicholas and B. O'Neil who helped with the coaching and management of teams during the year.

The modified form in which government tolerates the cadet scheme does not make it easier for Capt. L. Walsh the C.O. and Lt. D. Thompson to maintain the efficiency and enthusiasm of the college unit. However with the co-operation of the Under-Officers and N.C.O.'s they did this. Mr. W. Heath W.O. 1 retires from the army this year. On behalf of the college I want to thank him for his unfailing interest in our unit over many years, and to wish him happiness and contentment in his retirement.

Early in the year Fr. Carroll was appointed parish priest of New Plymouth. I wish to say a formal word of welcome to him and to assure him of the co-operation of the College. In February Father invested the prefects, and I am grateful that he has consented to be here tonight to distribute the prizes and awards. It is fitting

at this point to express our gratitude to the other priests of New Plymouth and of the rest of Taranaki for their interest in the college and their practical assistance in the current fund-raising campaign.

Few people seem to realise the important part played by many ladies in the life of the College. Firstly I want to mention the nuns of Sacred Heart College with whom we shared some senior classes again this year. Mrs. J. Brennan did the bulk of the secretarial work this year, helped out at very busy times by Mrs A. French. Mrs. E. O'Neill continued her devoted work with those who needed special help in basic skills or sometimes just a little encouragement or prodding. Mrs. P. Gaffney kept interest in the library at a high level. Mrs. C. Ryan directed the music in Forms 1 to 4 and prepared an excellent choir for the Schools' Music Festival in May and the massed singing for the feast of St. John Baptist de La Salle. She also developed her work with the recorder group and started a special choir that met on a voluntary basis for practice at lunchtime. At the beginning of the year Mrs. M. Reeves took control of Art and Craft for Forms 1, 2 and 3. Her knowledge, skill and enthusiasm resulted in some very interesting and varied work from the boys who obviously enjoyed what they were doing. Mrs. O. B. Johnston continued her ministrations to Brothers and boarders, and the occasional day-boy, too, throughout the year. I would like to pay tribute to her devotedness and efficiency over the years she has been with us. To all these ladies we express our sincere gratitude.

I must record my appreciation of and gratitude to Doctors Barclay, Livingstone and Rae for the care and attention given to the Brothers and boarders throughout the year. Likewise I wish to place on record my appreciation of the courtesy and prompt attention we have always received from the doctors, nurses and other staff of the New Plymouth Hospital.

The Old Boys' Association has not shown any life in 1971. It is my opinion that it could do more for its members if autonomous regional groups were formed rather than depend on an executive in New Plymouth to initiate action.

College Captain for 1971 was Brian Nicholas. He carried out his duties with efficiency, thoroughness and cheerfulness. Head Day-Boy was Paul Goddard who led by example as well as precept. I commend both these young men and the other prefects who helped them for their assistance in the smooth running of the college this year.

Dux of the College this year is Adam Wratislav. Since he started in Form One, hard work, determination and co-operation have been his outstanding qualities. I congratulate him on

his thoroughly deserved distinction and wish him God's blessing and every success in his future studies.

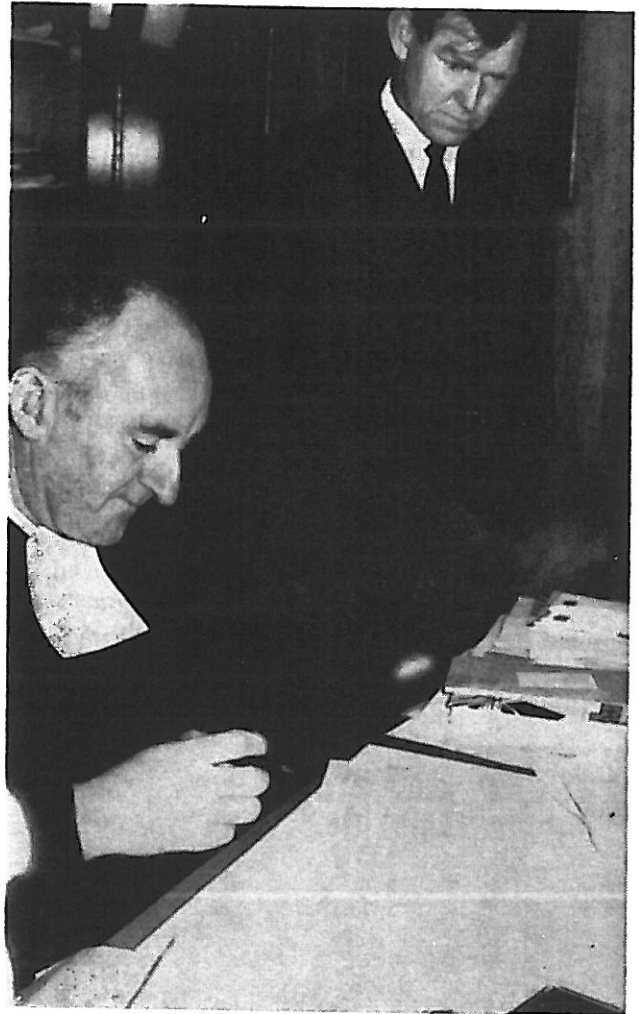

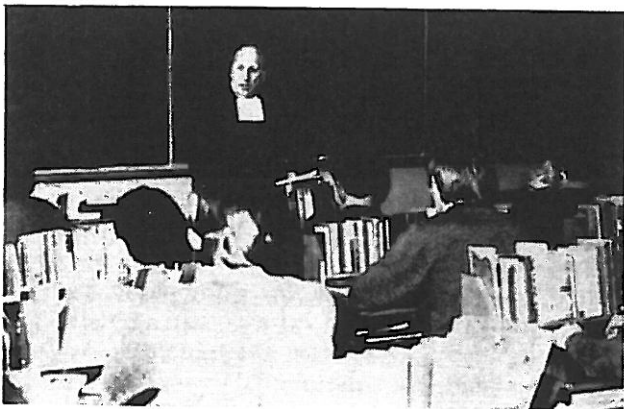

While here he visited the senior classes and spoke on the scope of his work, thereby broadening the minds of his listeners.

Usually Brother Richard comes during the Christmas vacation but this is the second time he has managed to see the pupils as well as the Brothers. We appreciated the effort he made to see us and the friendliness he displayed in meeting us. We look forward to his next visit.

Society of St. Columban for Foreign Missions

While I was at Francis Douglas Memorial College for seven years I did not pay much attention to the name that it was given. I knew a little about Francis Douglas: that he had been a curate in the local parish in my father's time, that he had gone overseas and that he had been martyred by the Japanese in the Philippines, but knew nothing about the society that Francis Douglas joined to do his missionary work, the Society of St. Columban for Foreign Missions. I am now a member of that society at its seminary in Turramurra, New South Wales, and I have very willingly accepted the invitation to tell you something about it.

The Society is dedicated to foreign missionary work, its work is among the unevangelized or pagan peoples of foreign countries. Its priests are similar to those in your own parish, secular priests, but work within a society in order to be more effective.

The society was originally called the "Maynooth Mission to China" because the late Bishop Edward J. Galvin, together with a fellow-Irishman, Father John Blowick, founded it in Ireland and gained their first recruits from their old seminary at Maynooth. Father Galvin, after feeling the call to China, had left his parish in Brooklyn, U.S.A., and worked in the vicariate of Chekiang from 1912 to 1916 (he was consecrated a bishop in 1927). The missionary task there was immense and the number of priests too few. At the suggestion of other priests he had returned home to form a new society and establish a Mission to China.

With the blessing of Pope Benedict XV,

Fathers Galvin and Blowick spent 1917 in planning and laying foundations. On June 29th, 1918, the Society was formally approved and was named after a sixth century Irish monk, St. Coumban, who left his native land to preach the gospel in Europe.

China

In 1920 the first group of 16 Columban Fathers arrived in Hanyang, China. In spite of bandits, battles between the Nationalist and Communist Armies and a great flood in 1931, they made progress. By developing a system of group-instruction they were able to cope with the large numbers of interested pagans, some of whom had been attracted by the concern the priests showed them during their great flood. Nancheng, the Society's second mission in China, established in 1927, was making progress but also suffered much and gave the Columbans their first martyrs.

But another period of crisis was at hand. China had been engaged in a life-and-death struggle with Japan since 1937. By 1941 the Japanese had overrun both Columban Mission territories. Hanyang suffered so intensely from bombing that a magazine described Bishop Galvin as "the most bombed bishop in the world". World War II came and went, but peace did not come to China. In 1945 there were 150 Columban missionaries (priests and Sisters) working in China . . . by 1954 not one of them was left. All had been expelled.

Philippines

By this time the Society had already enlarged the horizons of its missionary fields. In answer to urgent appeals for priests from Manila's Archbishop O'Doherty three Columbans had arrived in the Philippines in 1929. Many areas of the Philippines had had no priests for years and the people had grown up ignorant of the Faith that the Spanish had brought them. This was the beginning of the Society's largest mission undertaking.

As more priests became available Columban missionaries were able to staff other priestless areas in the Philippines until today they serve in eight different dioceses with over 230 missionaries working in 100 parishes stretching from Lingayen in the north to Zamboanga in the south. But shortage of priests still remains the major problem. Despite a great increase in local vocations and the number of missionaries who have come from overseas, the ratio of priest to people is still very unsatisfactory. The solution

of this problem has been made difficult by the rapid population growth.

One of the early decisions that may prove to have been the most significant they made was to provide for the effective instruction of the children. The number involved was very large and there were few parish schools so here began a great struggle to build schools, raise finance and get teachers. Parallel to this effort at the primary and secondary level went the mission to the universities, where Student Catholic Action was established and continues to have an important effect.

Unfortunately there were tragedies here, just as in China. The years of World War II exacted a heavy toll in property and lives. Many churches were destroyed and six Columban priests, among them our own Father Francis Vernon Douglas, were killed by the Japanese.

Korea

In 1933, the province of Cholla Nam Do in the south-west of what is now South Korea was designated as Columban territory. Where there were 3,000 Catholics in 1934, there are now 75,000. And this despite World War II when the missionaries were repatriated or imprisoned and despite the Korean War of 1950-53 when the Columbans lost seven priests, several seminarians, at least 2,000 Catholics and much Church property was destroyed. Columban priests also serve in the dioceses of Chunchon and Wonju in the northern province of Kang Won, part of which was claimed by the 38th parallel and the Iron Curtain after the War.

In the whole of Korea today 142 Columban missionaries — in Chunchon, Wonju, Seoul and Kwanju — care for a combined Catholic population of 140,000. The Church in Korea has made giant strides, the Columbans assisting with Co-operatives, Credit Unions, the Isidore Development Association on Cheju Island, new churches, presbyteries, schools, hostels, hospitals and clinics.

Burma

In northern Burma in the foothills of the Himalayas lies the Columban diocese of Myit-kyina. Columban missionaries work in this lush jungle area amongst two unsophisticated peoples, the Kachins and Chans. They came in November 1936 and in the face of many difficulties — of climate, of terrain, of language and unfamiliar customs, have now a Catholic population in their area of 50,000. Yet since its independence in 1948, Burma for most of the time since then has been in a state of turmoil and upheaval. No new missionaries are permitted to enter the country because of Government policy, and our priests there (less than a score) will not be allowed re-entry if they leave. As yet there are

only a few native born priests and much will depend upon the efforts the missionaries are making to train others.

Japan

The first Columbans arrived in Japan in 1948 and found a shattered country. Tokyo was 80 percent in ruins. The new arrivals not only had a difficult task in learning the language but had to rebuild the churches, convents, rectories and schools. Yet conversions come slowly in Japan. The average Japanese is bound by tradition to the demands of family life and his occupation but modern Japan's materialism is a big stumbling block. The 70 Columbans in four areas over the country: the Tokyo-Chiba district, Wakayama, Kanagawa and Kumamoto, are fulfilling their chief task — to preach the gospel. Although results do not rest with the priests, nevertheless the small number of converts does cause a constant soul-searching and agonising re-appraisal of methods and values. The Japanese Church is as yet in its infant stage.

Fiji

For nearly twenty years now there have been Columban priests in this island paradise working with the Marists. As Fiji advanced closer to political and economic independence the Church has laid the foundations of her spiritual and economic independence through a policy of fostering Catholic education. Its solid progress is evident in the bricks and mortar development of schools and churches as well as assisting practically in the improvement of the Fijian and Indian people's standard of living. The responsible participation by the gradually increasing numbers of the laity, both Fijian and Indian, seems to point to a bright and exciting future for the Church.

South America

In many ways this is probably the most difficult mission that the Columbans have undertaken. They came to the outskirts of Lima in Peru in 1952, and to Santiago, Chile the following year. The two countries are different of course but their problems are similar. Our priests first attempt to assist the people with their basic problems of lack of clothing, housing, water, sewers, etc., but they have had considerable success in the organization of Church groups, Credit Co-operatives, and Clubs.

In spite of the fact that many people are poorly instructed and some have no instruction of any kind, they still manage to hold on to a belief in God and maintain a deep respect and devotion to the Blessed Mother. Behind a background of seeming indifference there is a genuine basis for hope.

The task of any missionary in South America is not an easy one. Church problems are many, parishes are often poor, there are long distances to travel between one Mass station and another, but the heart of the problem is the great shortage

of priests. We have fifty Columban missionaries working with thirty priest volunteers from Australia, New Zealand, England and Ireland in the parishes we have undertaken, which are of course too few.

In this short sketch of the places in which the Society works I have hoped to show the joys and problems of each country and what kind of man the missionary priest has to be. He has obviously to be a man of strong Faith, and of deep prayer. He needs a spirit of self-sacrifice, a genuine love for his people, and often a charitable patience with them.

At the moment four ex-students from Francis Douglas College, John Henderson, Brian Vale, Justin D'Ath and Martin Garcia, are training at the Society's nearest seminary in North Turramurra, Sydney. Rev. John Henderson will be ordained this year and thus become the college's second old-boy priest. John becomes a missionary priest in a young society (53 years old!) which has nearly 1000 priests and areas which have a population of about 17 millions.

College Regulations

1. Punctuality and daily attendance at school are required. In case of absence a note of explanation signed by the parent is to be handed to the teacher.
2. Assiduity in studies is expected from all. Pupils are given homework each night. The co-operation of parents in both study and homework is important.
3. Parents should, if possible, interview teachers outside school hours and by appointment.
4. The wearing of the correct college uniform is one means of building up a sense of college community. Neatness in dress and general appearance will be insisted on.
5. During school or recess periods, pupils may not leave the college grounds without the permission of the teacher.
6. Good behaviour and gentlemanly conduct are required from the boys at all times, but particularly while travelling to and from school.
7. Pupils of this college are forbidden to smoke while in school uniform, while travelling to and from school, and while at any function organised by the school or which they are attending as a member of the school.
8. Pupils who ride motor bikes or drive cars to school may not give rides to others without the consent of their own parents and also the consent of the parents of the passenger. In the case of boarders the consent of the college Principal is necessary.

Final Profession of Bro. John Iremonger

Early in January, Brother John made his final profession as a de la Salle Brother in the college chapel. He pronounced his vows in the presence of his family and friends, and they were received in the name of the Church by Brother Stanislaus, A-V.

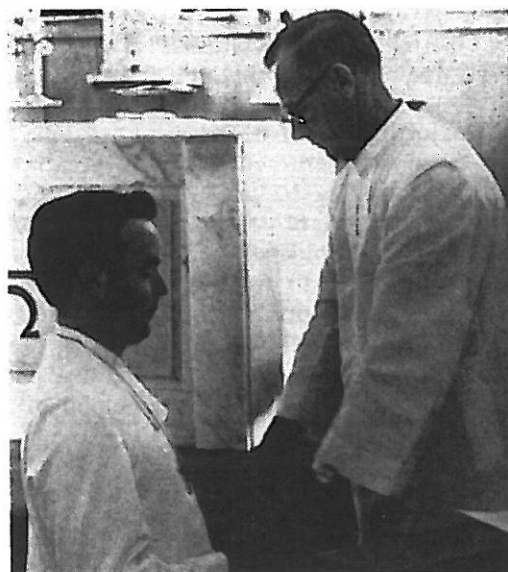

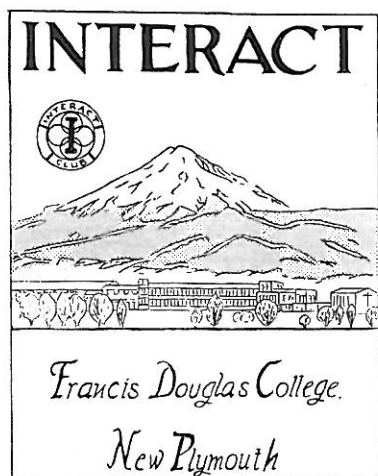
The reinstitution of the school dance was received with great pleasure by many of the parents. The Auxiliary entered with great care into the organisation of this event in order to

In conclusion I would like to thank the Brothers for their assistance in word and deed throughout the year. Our appreciation is also extended to the matron of the College, Mrs Johnston who always helped us out most willingly in our last minute difficulties.



The year 1971 has been another very successful one for the Francis Douglas Interact Club. Although in numbers the Club was smaller than in previous years, its members have been active in many school, community and international projects.

Many and varied projects were undertaken by our members during the year—some more successful than others, with members showing great enthusiasm and goodwill in the service of others.

The Club meetings were held in the library on Wednesdays during the lunch break and at these meetings our projects were planned for the year. Guest speakers often attended the meetings and the personalities whom we managed to obtain ranged from the Labour Member of Parliament Mr. R. Barclay to Kevin Doherty, an old boy who has been with the poet James K. Baxter in Jerusalem. When guest speakers were present at meetings, non-members were invited to attend also, and the interest generated by the guests was demonstrated during question time.

The Club participated in a number of community projects this year in conjunction with other service organisations. Members took part in several collections including the Corso Appeal and the selling of National Health Stamps.

In reply to a request for help for the City's elderly people by the Mayor Mr. D .V. Suther-

land, we contacted the New Plymouth Old Folks Association and were given the names and addresses of senior citizens who needed gardening done and sections tidied. These jobs were tackled by Club members, armed with shovels and gardening implements, on two consecutive weekends. It helped to demonstrate that, while fund-raising is one of the aims of our Interact Club, we are essentially a service club.

At the International level, we received many letters and cards from overseas Interact Clubs wishing to further goodwill between various countries and peoples. The International section of our Club was responsible for replying to these clubs, telling them of our activities, and writing to other clubs in New Zealand and overseas.

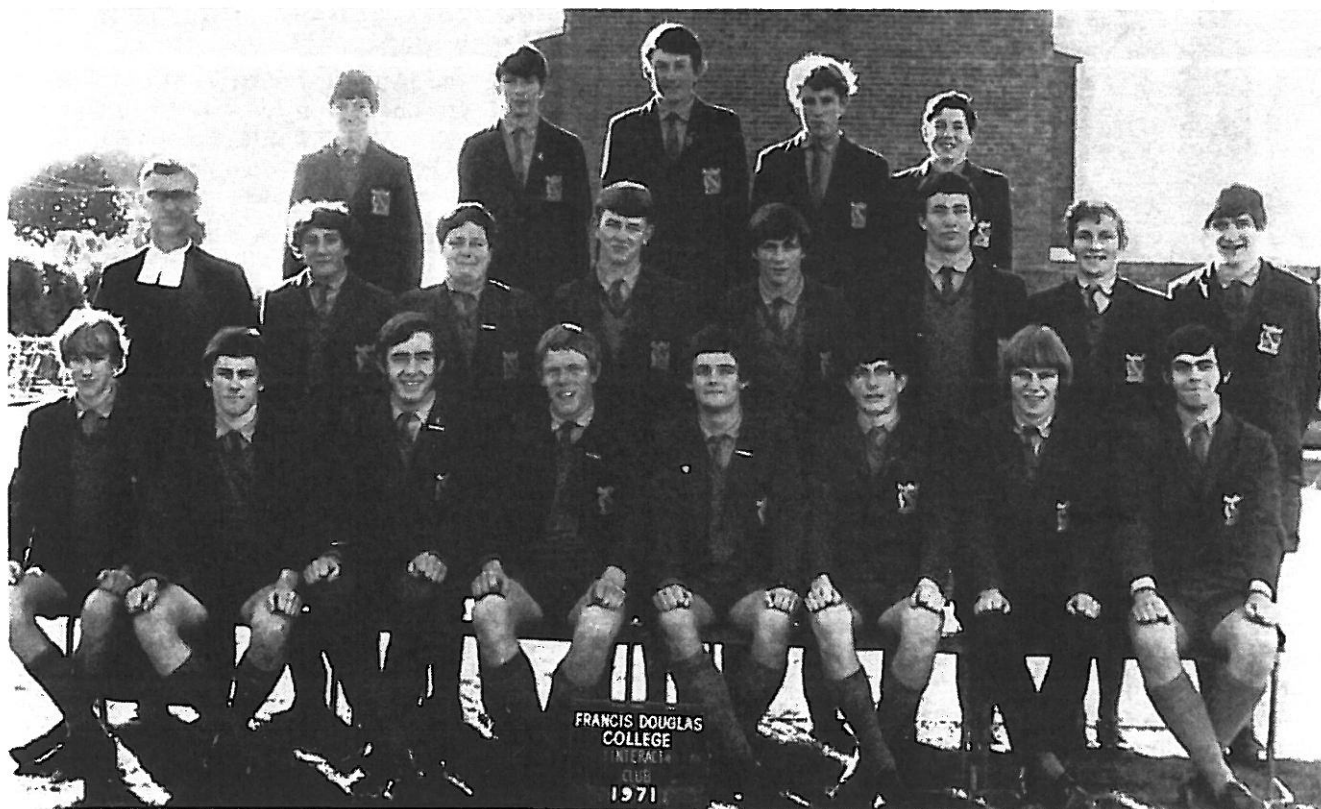
On the school scene, many fund-raising schemes were undertaken this year. One of the more novel efforts was the selling of "Lucky" envelopes during the lunch break. These envelopes appealed greatly to those stricken with the gambling disease. Another project was the publication and distribution of our Interact paper called "Tract" which combined items of general interest with those of some literary value. "Tract" sold at the moderate price of 5 cents and copies were sold at the College by members while our brother-club Spotswood sold an additional

80 copies. Here I must thank Mr. Bob Mills, Past-President of the New Plymouth Rotary Club for his great help in setting and printing the paper. The publication of a paper on a permanent basis is an avenue of action which could be profitably pursued in the coming years by future Interact Clubs of the College. Copies of "Tract" were sent to the other Interact Clubs around New Zealand as an example of what we were doing.

In the second term we managed to procure a film, through the Union Steamship Company of the Apollo 12 moon mission and Cape Kennedy. This film was shown during the lunch break, the audience being charged admission, and proved to be a worthwhile experiment.

Yet another project was the cleaning of windows in the school block and here we were helped by non-members during the two weekends on which the task was completed. As I write my report, the Interact Club is in the process of soliciting talent for the Annual Talent Quest which should prove as popular as ever.

In conclusion I would like to personally thank those people concerned with the Club for their help and advice during the year. In particular our two Rotary advisers Mr. P. Phelan and Brother Declan deserve special thanks for their interest and guidance throughout the year.



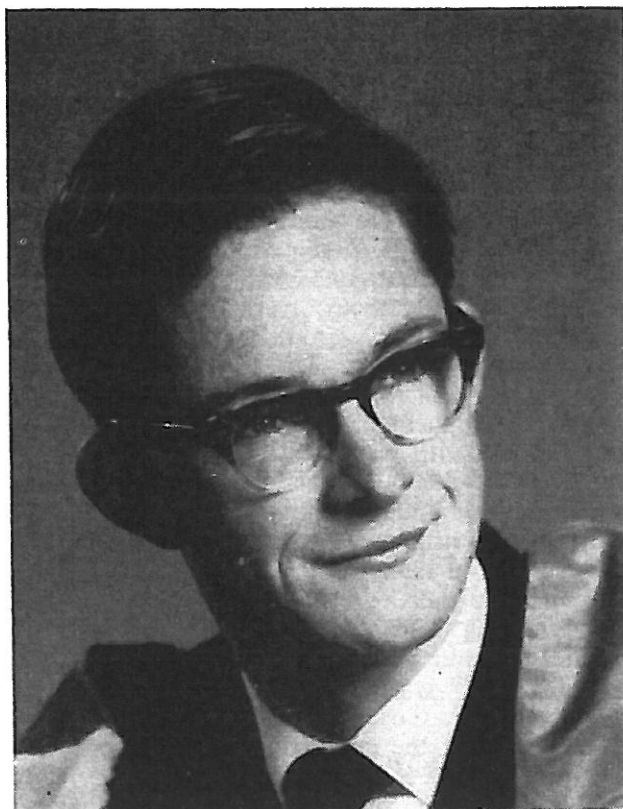

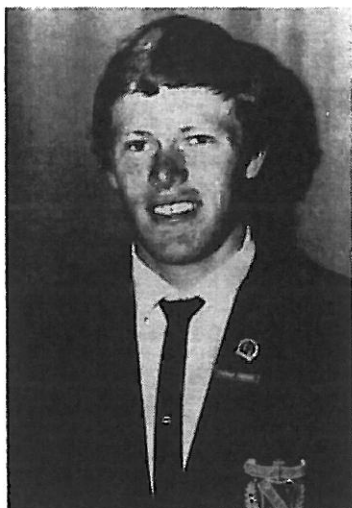

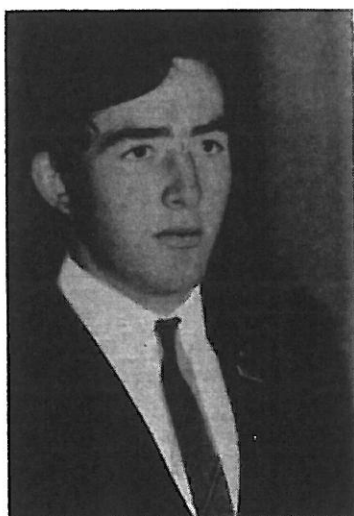

Next year he intends to go on to higher studies and he does so with the good wishes and gratitude of all at Francis Douglas.



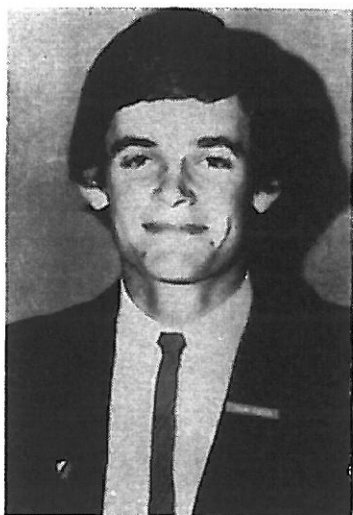
A. WRATISLAV

Far below, way below, the villagers silently watched and prayed for him, urging him on, wondering if he could make it.

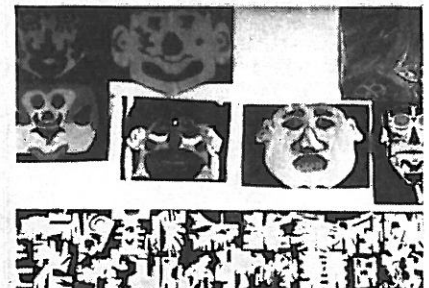

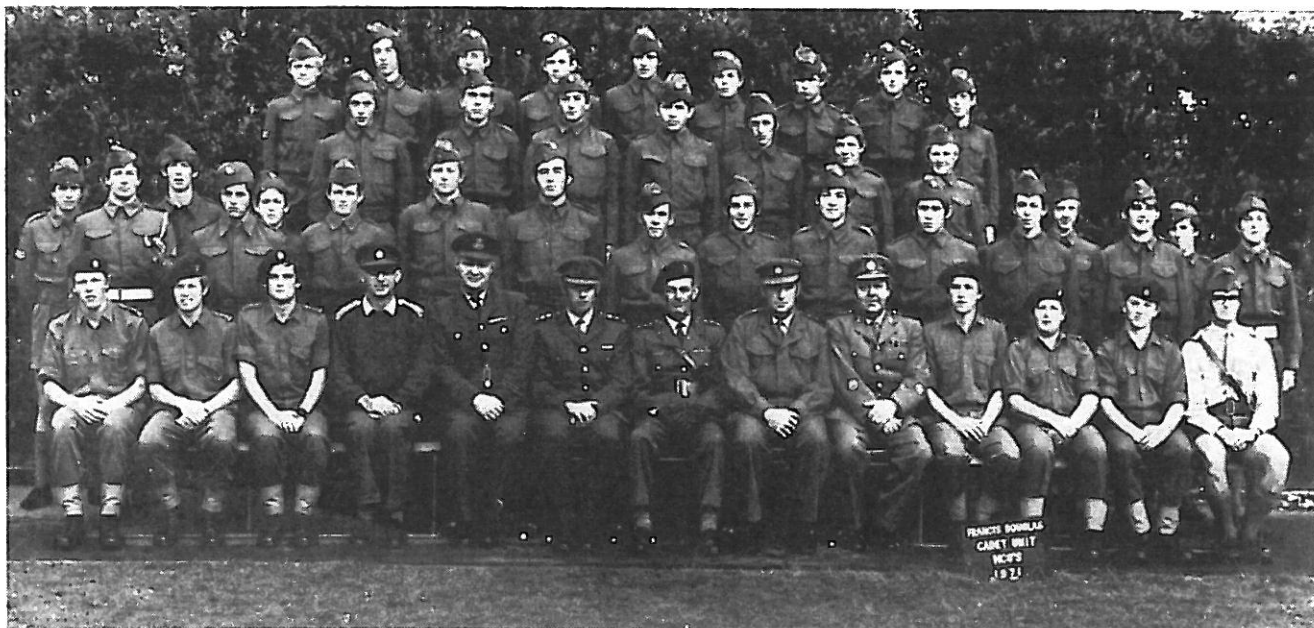
The avalanche swept down the face of the mountain growing bigger with the rock and ice meeting and surging down in a destructive torrent.

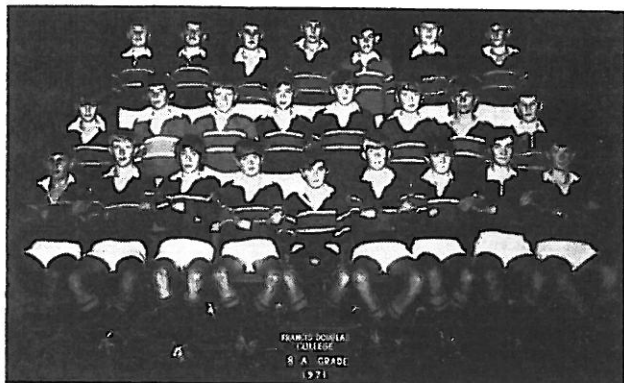

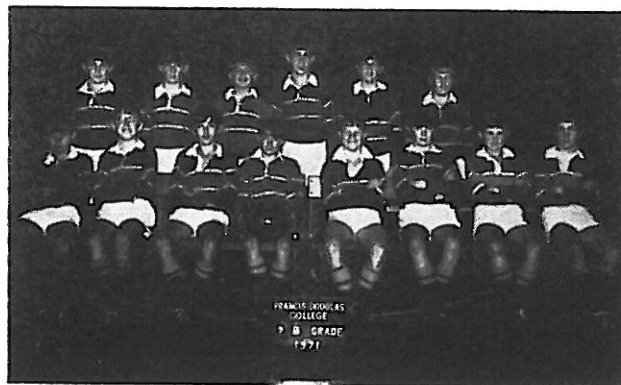

THIS FARMING INDUSTRY

Farmers are rich! They get too much Government aid!

It is about time that myths like these were erased from the minds of the general public. Since the last budget much criticism has been directed at the industry along those lines.

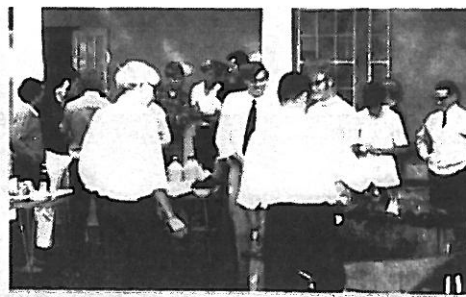
Today the industry has found itself in financial trouble. The subsidies and loans alone are not signs of a healthy industry. The industry however is by no means dead as it earned New Zealand over \$1000 million last year in overseas funds compared to \$116 million from secondary industry. But it needs more help than subsidies and loans which are quite good as far as they go (though by no stretch of the imagination do they compare with those of secondary industry) but they only treat the symptoms and not the cause of the present problems.

There is local competition from foreign foodstuffs such as Danish cheese and artificial Japanese meat. Standardized farm equipment suffers from excessive differences in prices even by firms established with the farmer in mind.

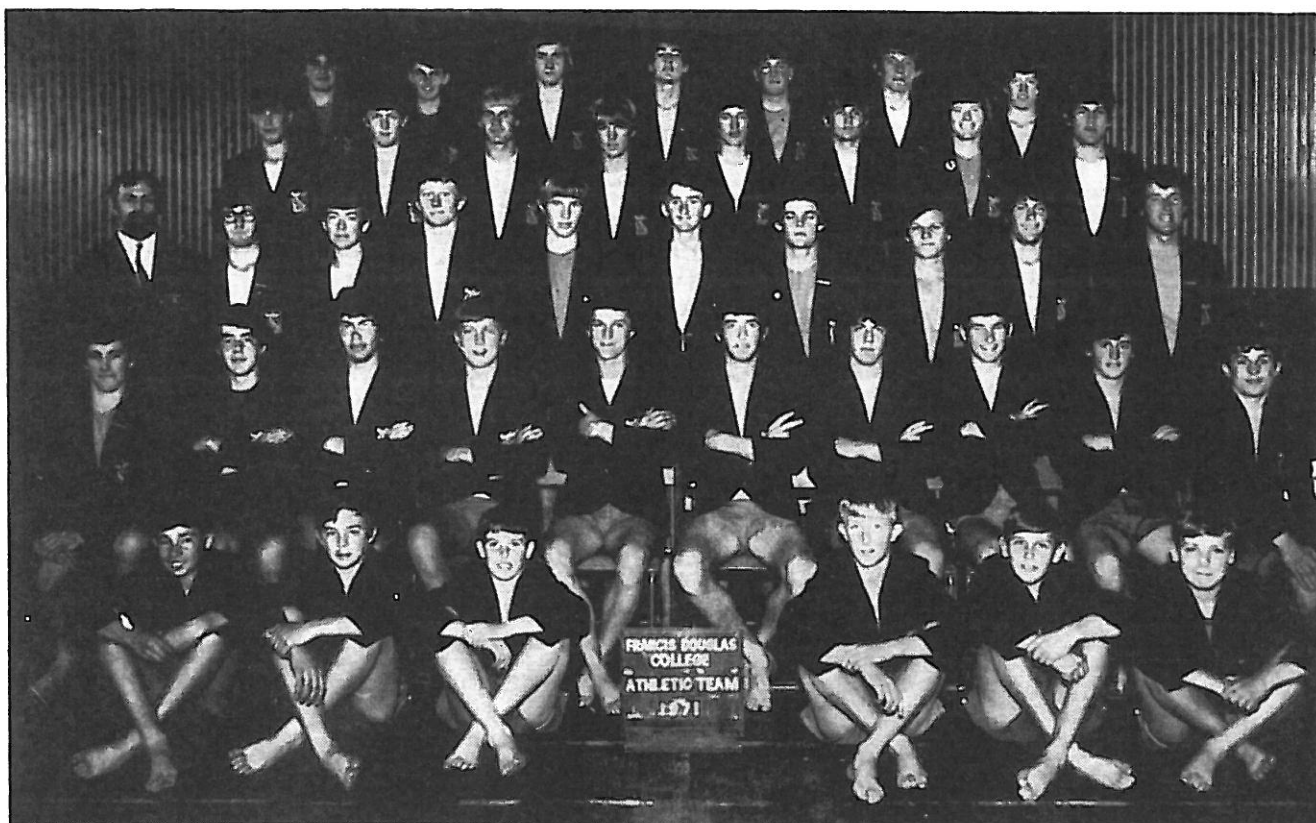
The farmer is faced with price increases from almost every quarter, from freezing works to transport companies, and he cannot pass these costs on as most businesses can. Also the farmer is faced with dropping prices of most primary produce to offset increased handling and other costs. There have been increased shipping charges up as much as 35% in the last 3 years. These detract from our terms of trade because they make our products more expensive on the foreign market. These are some of the present problems that are weakening the industry.

What is needed is a realistic approach to the farming industry so that the causes of the present problems can be combated and controlled. This is not aid to the farmers but an investment in the future of the nation. New Zealand needs more money for its balance of payments and it cannot conceivably derive all or most of it from secondary industry, so it must come from our farming industry which has great quantities of primary produce. Hence, if it is to benefit the nation as a whole the farming industry cannot get too much aid. With aid it cannot fail to do so.

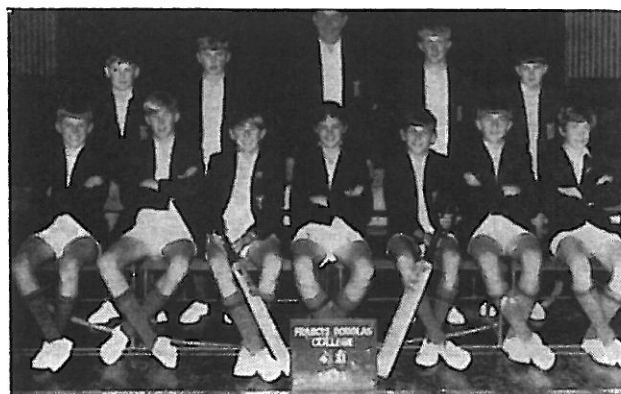
