



To Members of the Francis Douglas Memorial College Community.

It is my responsibility to present the second Annual Report of the Board of Trustees. The 1990 year has been a year of consolidation with the Board concentrating on developing policies following the finalisation and final acceptance of the College Charter. In developing these policies, the Board has been anxious to involve the full College community by consultation wherever possible. It was very necessary for the Board to have this year of consolidation to enable it to come to grips with the responsibilities associated with 'Today's Schools' and it has been disturbing that further reviews have either been taking place, or are being considered, in the light of all the change that has occurred and the uncertainty created by that change.

The Board trusts that the review of the Integration Act and the Education Act will not result in any great upheaval which would further unsettle an already unsettled environment.

The highlights of the year would come under the following headings:

- 1 Charter The final completion and acceptance of the School Charter.
- Policies The commencement of writing policies to reflect the Charter has begun and a lot of work has been put into these, both by staff and Board members and the school community.
- New Principal The Board was pleased to appoint Brother Timothy Peter as the new Principal with his term to commence in 1992. The Board did not easily make this decision in the light that a hiatus could exist pending Brother Peter's services becoming available, and Brother Tim being able to pick up the reins. However, after consultation with the Deputy Principal and other senior management in the school, the Board decided to appoint Mr Leo Walsh as Acting Principal and he was to be supported by Mr Whyte and Mr Dravitzki. It is pleasing to record that this decision to date has worked well and our thanks are extended to Leo and his team.

Despite some misgivings at the start of the 1990 year, the Board has been successful in living within its budget. It is fair to say however, that there are pressures starting to emerge in the areas of equipment and facilities which the present budget does not permit, and which will over time reduce the facilities that are available for the boys' education.

During the year the school received a visit from the Education Review Office, and although this was faced at first with some trepidation, it is pleasing to report that the review procedure went off smoothly and that the draft report presented verbally to the Board indicated that there were many things at the school which were being done well and although there were areas where improvements were suggested, the overall impression given was that the school was coping with 'Today's Schools' very well.

In conclusion I would like to thank my fellow Board members for their support and to express appreciation to the Principal and his staff for thie dedication to the school. My special thanks go to the Brothers' community for their continued development of the La Sallian spirit.

# PRINCIPAL'S COMMENTS



Leo Walsh - College Principal

I have pleasure in presenting the thirty-third Report of Francis Douglas Memorial College's activities. While my tenure of the Principal's position is relatively short I must comment that it has been a privilege to lead this College during the transition period.

Firstly, I wish to pay tribute to my predecessors who have, in the relatively short history of this institution, created and cemented a special Catholic character which has already touched the lives of thousands and surely will continue to effectively serve, flourish and grow as a faith community. Brother Peter Bray worked with gigantic energy during his lengthy service as Principal and I record with heartfelt gratitude, his total commitment to this College. He with the other past Principals, Brothers Jerome, Julian, Raphael and Osmund, set special character goals which must be maintained and lived in the future. It has been a great challenge and honour to follow these great leaders who have stamped the excellency challenge to all associated with this College over the years.

Members of the Brothers of Christian Schools De La Salle Order of Brothers, have dutifully staffed this community since the opening in 1959. I record gratitude for all who have served in the past and register appreciation in that we have been blessed this year with seven resident Brothers. On behalf of past and present parents, students and the general community, I offer thanks and pray that this vital De La Salle presence remains. Father David Monaghan adds mag-

nificent strength to this College. His devotion and dedication to our spiritual needs is always evident and his willingness to offer his expertise in many other areas is greatly appreciated and admired. The 1991 roll was slightly down on the previous year but factual indications are that there will be a considerable increase for imminent future years.

Integration restrictions on the acceptance of non preference students is becoming difficult for many to bear. Strong efforts are being undertaken to lift the five percent maximum to a more realistic figure. While it is fully realised the special Catholic Character is to be protected, many non Catholic parents have very close association with the faith in varying circumstances but are unable to enrol their son in the College of their choice. It is believed that some schools are endeavouring to entice catholic students by suggesting they offer Religious Education as an option. It may well be Christian Education but certainly not to be confused with Catholic teaching taught by trained religious staff. Our young people truly need special strengths and support as they face society weaknessess. They are encouraged to view crime, anger, lust, envy and associated evils and are offered role models who live very questionable lives. As mature Christians we are required to make judgements with love of neighbour as a definite requirement. During their College life our students are encouraged to lead and follow movement to restore respectability to our society. With so very many non preference applicants unable to join, it is quite beyond

understanding that there are still parents who are opting for other schools and institutions.

An extensive recruitment exercise was undertaken during the past year throughout Taranaki and areas of the King Country province. Boarder parent meetings were generally very well attended and visits to all Taranaki Catholic Primary schools were appreciated by future students and their parents. I offer appreciation and to all who were associated with planning and preparing the professional presentations. Members of the Hostel form a very powerful unit within the school community. I especially thank Brothers Lawrence, Geoffrey, Raymond, Declan, the Matron, Mrs Margaret Fleming and her staff for their total commitment to the care, welfare and development of the boarding students.

During the last week of Term One, seven members of the Education Review Office spent four days at the College. Since that date discussion on their report has taken place with staff, departmental heads and the Board. The report with attached amendments is now a public document. Certain recommendations suggested by the Office have and will be addressed by the College. Generally speaking it is a positive document which acclaims the special character and emphasises the academic growth availability with the individual caring and development strength available at the college.

The 1990 examination results were pleasing. We pride ourselves in outstanding records of achievement in all fields of public examinations recently and in the past years. Last years scholarship awards to Adrian Gilliland and Aaron Drysdale highlighted another very good year. College policy is such that every student, regardless of academic ability, is permitted to sit the School Certificate examination. Where schools withdraw lesser ability students from such examinations they will surely gain a higher percentage pass. Changes to next years timetable enables a greater flexibility of subject choice while at the same time allowing for concentration on the core subjects.

The present Board of Trustees complete their three year term next year. On behalf of the community I record appreciation to the Chairman, Mr Michael Finnigan, and his Board who have worked conscientiously in support of the College. The Board has faced many challenges during their term and are to be congratulated on their direct support to Brother Peter Bray

and myself. The decision not to opt for the bulk funding trial was taken by the Board. Where there are advantages in the funding ideals it is felt the trial concept left much to be desired and could not be considered to be in the best interest of the College. A special gratitude tribute is extended to Mr Finnigan for his magnificent contribution of twenty-five years service of expertise and to retiring committee member Mr Peter Bennett for his loyalty and long service support. The Board and community was again directly supported by a very powerful Parent Teacher Association and these members are to be lauded for their unrelenting and most generous effort.

Finally I offer gratitude to the total community staff who have ensured the College has operated extremely efficiently during 1991. Ground, maintenance and boarding establishment personnel are to be commended for their vital commitment. The office staff have maintained a highly motivated support approach and all teachers have responded to their many challenges with professional expertise. I thank each of the above who with parents and students have rendered such valuable service and particularly appreciate all for their loyalty and support during this transition year.

It is with some disappointment that I record that our Bursar Mrs Shirley Sceats has resigned from the Community. Shirley joined the office staff in 1976 and has rendered excellent professional services for the Board, Hostel and the total College community. On behalf of all I offer gratitude for the most valuable contribution and wish her a well deserved retirement. After twenty-five years of continual service, Brother William is to have at least one years break from the College. We know he will dearly miss the community to which he has contributed so much but we are also confident he will return with even more agricultural expertise.

Again I thank you all for the years contributions and in particular mention Messrs John Whyte and Martin Dravitzki, who as Deputy and Assistant Principal, led strong teams of Deans and Departmental Heads, all of whom rendered such valuable support and expertise. We now look confidently forward to 1992, when the progress towards excellence is assured of continuance under the astute leadership of Brother Timothy Peter.

### COMPUTING

Computing as a subject has been taught at the College for five years now. In 1985 the decision was made to buy a class set of ten BBC computers and to set up a computing classroom. In 1986 the College taught two 6th Form certificate classes. The 6th form certificate course was, and still is, a very good introduction to the use of computers. It includes practical work on word processing, database and spreadsheet programs, and an introduction to the basic concepts of computer programming. Others aspects of the course cover topics like computer hardware and software, the way computers can be used for communication, robotics and computer aided design, the manner in which various companies use computers (from supermarkets, banks, and doctors to the police and ministry of transport), the effect of the introduction of computers to the workplace (with issues such as unemployment, retraining, union reaction and privacy), and the development of computing devices from the abacus to the latest developments in computer technology.



In 1987 a computing awareness course of 25 hours was introduced as a compulsory subject for all fourth formers. This course continued through until 1990 when it was dropped. In 1988 computing was introduced as an adjunct to the Form 1 and 2 Integrated Studies course. This was mainly using interactive fiction type material to extend the learning situations in subjects like English, Mathematics and Social Studies. This course was also dropped at the end of 1990.



Computing across the Curriculum became the main thrust of the computing department in 1991. A policy was drawn up and approved by the Board. The ERO review team were very impressed with the policy and urged that it be implemented. Gradually during 1991 the policy came into effect. All form 3 classes have used the computer room for mathematics and form 4 for Social Studies. Some form 3 English classes have used it occasionally for word processing, as have the 7th form Media Studies class for the production of their bulletin. On other occasions individual pupils have used it for doing research assignments and producing graphs and other display material for assignment work. The core course at 6th form level has continued and this year saw three classes with a total of 45 students taking the subject. We started a 7th form course last year and it has continued this year with 7 students. It is run in conjunction with the Taranaki Polytechnic and provides a qualification in Information Technology which is useful particularly for First Year Business Studies students.

The ERO review of computing in the College was very complimentary and they suggested that we may look to updating our equipment which was then five years old. The Board approved the expenditure and plans are well under way to set up a network of Apple Macintoshes for the 1992 school year. We have already purchased most of the hardware and are linking it together so that students have access to the modem, scanner and laserprinter. For software we are using Microsoft Word as our word processing program and Microsoft Works for work on Spreadsheets, Databases and Communication. We are introducing students to Aldus PageMaker for desktop publishing. We have also bought a selection of Hyper-Card programs on topics like School Certificate Maths, Hypernomics etc to provide material for teachers in various curriculum areas. A CD ROM player which contains 21 volumes of on-line encyclopedia information is already in use and is proving popular as a source of information for students doing project and research

Technology is developing very quickly and we believe that we need to keep up with these developments if we are to provide the sort of education which our students are going to need for their future.






After a while she walked out. All I could do was to watch the chance of a lifetime walk out the back door. No-one had ever had a sample of a witch before.


I ran out trying to catch her but she had already gone. I fell on my knees and cried.


I looked at the wire suspended figure of clothes that had hung from the branch and had to admit it was a pretty good trick.



### Corporal Punishment


Dear Editor,

In response to your article regarding corporal punishment, Thursday 4 July, I think even the mere mention of reinstating this brutal and barbaric form of punishment is distressing.

Corporal punishment gives impressionable children bad role models and encourages violence. Whether teachers like it or not, they are very much role models and as such must act accordingly, which does not include hitting children in anger, no matter how hard. Hitting a child is straight away saying 'to solve my problem, I lash out and act violently'. Children constantly learn that problems can be solved by hitting out, so reinforce this theory in everyday life. Thus a violent community is created.

Giving teachers the power to hit children at will in their own classrooms encourages abuse of that power. A 'hit first, ask questions later' attitude could be accepted by the teachers. This is quick and easy for them as they do not have to get involved. But there is the problem, teachers not getting involved with the children. A smack is impersonal and does not address problems the child may be experiencing. If a child is sat down and talked to, problems may be solved or at least recognised by the teacher who may be able to make allowances. Even if the problem is not immediately solved the result is more beneficial to both parties.

# Corporal Punishment: to be or not to be?

Corporal punishment is described as the infliction of some form of physical discipline upon an offender. But what is the aim of discipline in education and in homes? What alternative forms of discipline are available to parents and teachers? Which of these is the most effective for different offences at different levels?

The aim of discipline whether it be corporal punishment, detentions, suspensions or otherwise, must always be to correct and deter the offender from committing the offence again. It is vital in younger years that the offender knows exactly what they have done wrong, and how they can correct it in future.

Undoubtedly good discipline must start and continue in the homes. There and only there the foundations are laid for a sound and respectable member of the community. If a child enters the education system with a lack of moral values and respect, it is virtually impossible for a teacher to correct it in the six-seven hours, five days a week available.

Corporal punishment has its advantages. It is immediate in that a student is punished on the spot with a minimum of time spent by either teacher or school. It is quick and an arguable effective way of dealing with minor classroom misdemeanours.

I believe that neither the cane nor detention act as a deterrent for bad behaviour. It is not a problem of punishment but of teacher/pupil relations. And more specifically the lack of respect that many students show

teachers. Teachers should be seen as an available resource by which students can acquire information and knowledge. Instead by many they are seen as a challenge. Teaching nowadays is 80% acting, and some teachers are better actors than others. Their ability to teach relates directly to their ability to communicate to the class, which affects control.

If and when discipline is required, I would recommend a system which enforces greater parent-teacher-student communication. I believe if more parents were made aware of the offences their son is committing in schools they too would be able to take action. It is simply based on the fact that students have a far greater respect for their parents than teachers. This I believe is a breakdown in society which cannot be cured overnight.

Rightly or wrongly teaching and thinking on education has moved over the past decade. Responsibility for behaviour now rests more on the student than the teacher. The only way however that this system will work is for those students who lack maturity and self-discipline to be excluded from class. If these students are allowed to impede the performance of others, everyone's education will fail.


Students must realise that their full future depends on their education, which is directly involved with their attitude. When everyone can see that, we will all benefit. There will be no need for discipline and the whole country will improve.





### Link Programs

The extra funding that was expected for Link in 1991 was not forthcoming because of the change of Government policy and cutback in education.

The money raised by the form one and form two students is collected and sent to the Ryder Cheshire Centre.


The mission appeals are run for the whole year and group leaders are chosen every term. Their aim is to raise money for the Orphanage Hospital.

## Taekwondo

During the course of the year two new electives have been introduced to our school. One of the electives is Taekwondo an Olympic sport and Korean martial art. Steven Drummond, a 7th form student, successfully set up both courses that ran during the year and arranged for a qualified instructor from the New Zealand Taekwondo Federation to come in and teach.

"The course was run mainly for the juniors, but mostly seniors turned up." said Steven who went on to comment, "I was getting sick of other electives, I found them boring and I think most other seniors students felt the same way. Taekwondo offered a new and exciting elective, while it also taught self defence as well as the sporting aspects. Taekwondo can improve you mentally as well as physically."

Taekwondo is one of the oldest and most popular martial arts in the world today.

About 80% is kicking, unlike Karate which is 50%, but it also has many throws and knife defence makes a very important part. It isn't for the person who wants to be Bruce Lee or Jean Claude Van Damme in a matter of weeks. It takes three to five years to reach black belt depending on the individual.

Grading examinations happens once every four months and students are expected to perform patterns, self defence techniques and power and accuracy tests. The senior Taekwondo students are also expected to show their breaking techniques, knife defence techniques and two onto one free sparring.

Most of the greatest martial artists are Taekwondo masters. Such names include Eric Ray Junior and Senior, Chuck Norris, Pat Johnson and John Lee. Movies such as the Best of the Best, Bloodsport, and the Karate Kid saga have increased the popularity of Taekwondo.

There are two clubs in New Plymouth as well as the access youth theatre who include it in their course.

New Plymouth clubs sport at least ten Taekwondo champions at different levels. There are also clubs at Waitara, Inglewood, Stratford, Eltham, Hawera, Opunake, and Okato/Oakura.
