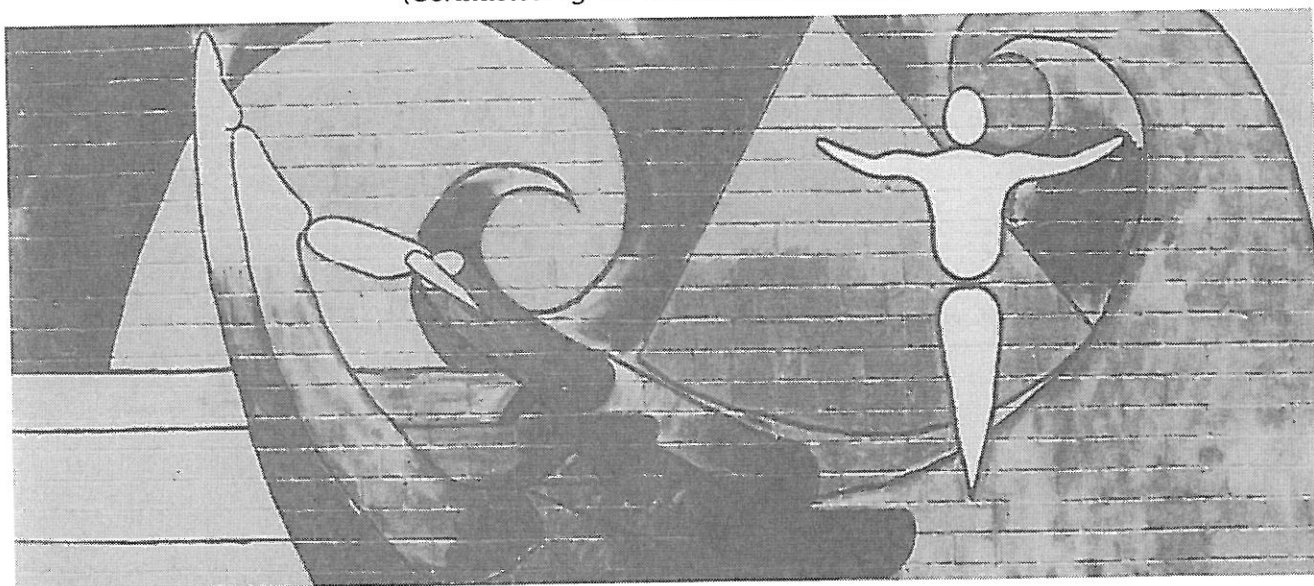

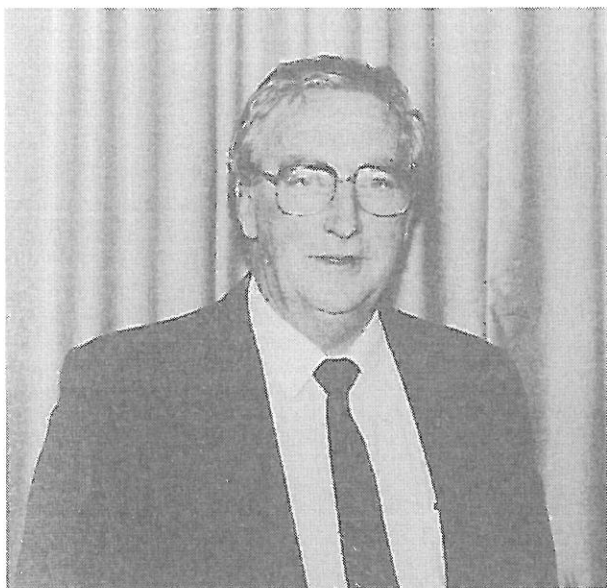

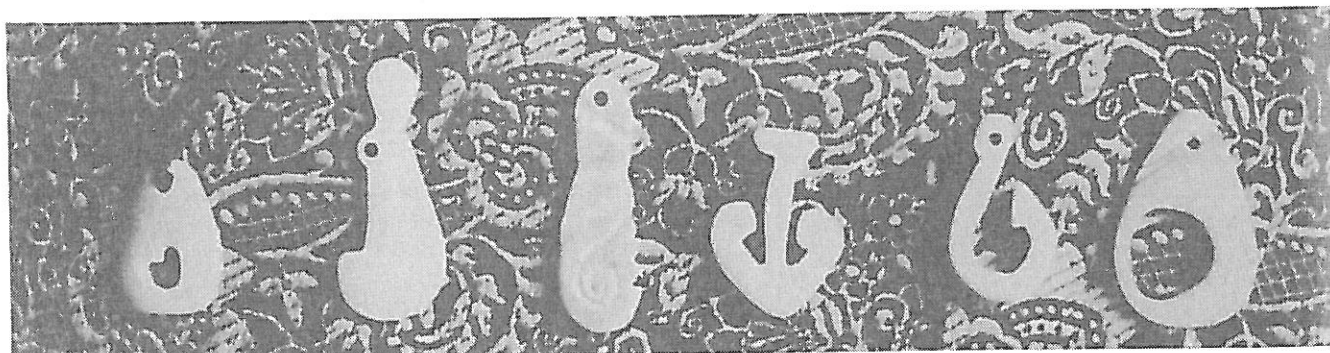

In presenting the third annual report it is appropriate to record the changes in personnel and to comment on changes being proposed for the administration of schools, and in particular bulk funding.

Br. Tim Peter joined us as Principal in early February, with Leo Walsh standing down as Principal. Our thanks to Leo for a job well done in conjunction with John Whyte and Martin Dravitzki. Br. Tim has got his feet well and truly "under the table", which required a lot of learning on his part, given the Australian model to which he is more accustomed. Br. Robert resigned as Secretary, and we must record our grateful thanks for his efforts as Secretary, but also in the area of policies and more particularly the asset register. Br. Tim has picked up this role for the Board and Kevin Murphy was elected staff representative. Brent Carey replaced Jason Fleming as student representative and both performed with credit in what could be a daunting experience. Peter Bennett resigned as a Board Member after many years and we record our gratitude for his years of service. This year we also lost the services of Shirley Sceats as School Bursar, replaced by Margaret Hobson. We also record our thanks to Shirley for a job well done over many years and during years of change.

This year also sees the end of the first term of trustees under "Tomorrows Schools", and we will be losing Margaret Wano and Mary Shepherd as well as Peter Bennett. Thanks to Margaret Wano for her special input and to Mary Shepherd for her generous input of time and enthusiasm. The new Board will be joined by Liz O'Sullivan, Ron Malin and Br. David Hawke. We thank them and all other candidates who put their name forward to serve the Francis Douglas School community.

Bulk funding has been the cause of much concern to Boards and their teaching staff. Basically it is a matter of Government policy and not an area which Boards, by choice, would wish to enter. If the move is intended to introduce a degree of accountability at grass root levels and not a cost cutting exercise, then the Boards and teachers should not fear this proposal, if the remuneration being paid is commensurate with the service being provided. If however the service being provided is not at this level, then as with other sectors of the community, the teaching community must be prepared to fact scrutiny.

This Board is appreciative of the dedication and professional skill shown by it's staff and is sure that whether salaries are paid as at present or by bulk funding, there would be little ground for conflict.

The Board must reflect the community concerns, and to this end considerable attention has been given to relieving teachers as opposed to permanent positions. Board Members have been contacted by concerned parent as to what they perceive as the Board's leniency in granting leave to permanent positions and replacing these teachers with relievers. Parents believe that their children are disadvantaged when this happens. The Board has tightened it's policy in this area, and if this is regarded as being anti teacher, then this is unfortunate, as this policy is a direct reflection of what our School community is saying that they want. Surely the very reason for "Tomorrows Schools". It is my personal belief that this Board and past Boards have been very supportive of the teaching staff and I can recall personal efforts made by Board Members on behalf of staff which would demonstrate this.

It is important that the relationship between the Board and staff is a good one, but that cannot preclude actions being taken which may not meet the approval of each or every teacher, and again Boards should not be blamed for policies not of their making.

The various Committees again functioned effectively and well. The Board was able to manage within it's budget and considerable progress was made in the area of policy. A plan for property management is more clearly emerging and many matters raised in the E.R.O. report are being effectively tabled.

I would like to thank the whole School community, but particularly the Principal and his staff, the P.T.A. and Board Members for their ongoing commitment and enthusiasm.

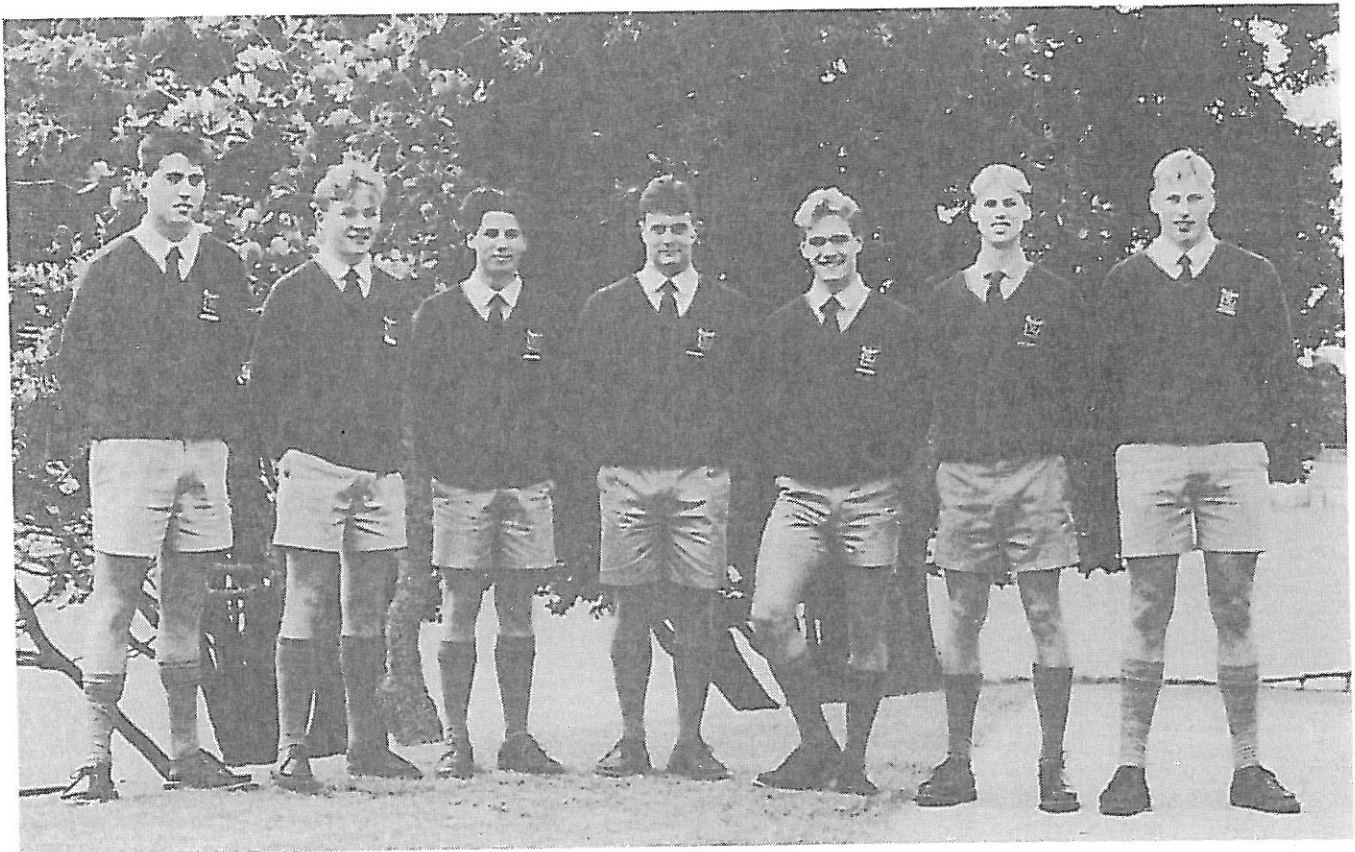
Special thanks to Brother Lawrence for his time and effort. He has really tried very hard to make the hostel a better place, although we may not always see it.

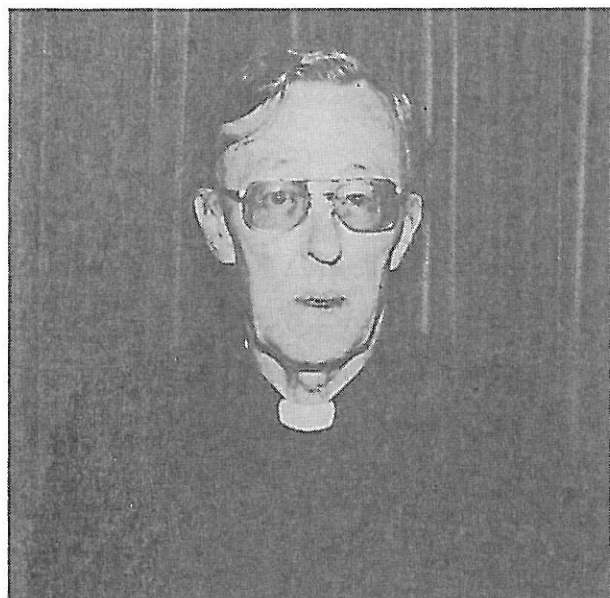

In an attempt to remember in a practical way Father Douglas's action of reaching out to others, the College community collected food for our local Foodbank, which was presented during the Offertory of the mass.

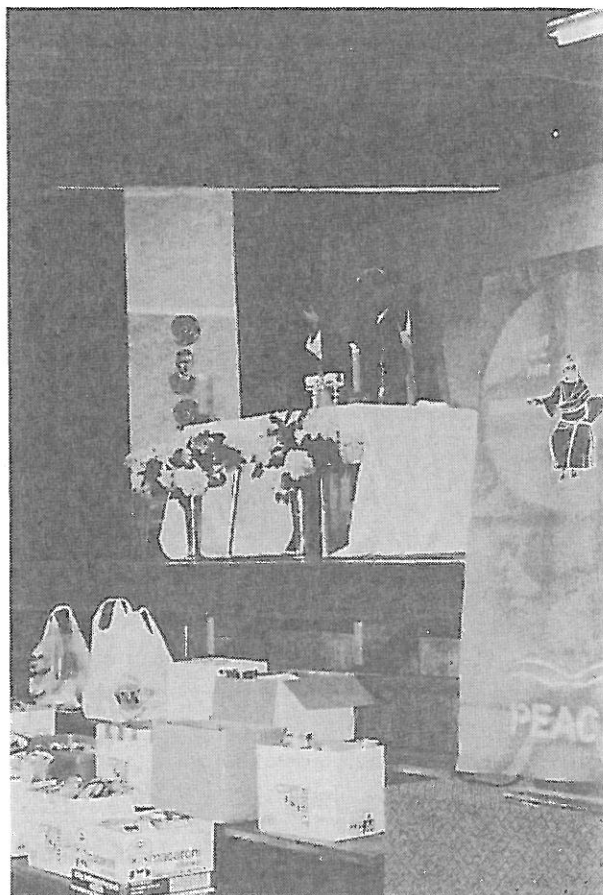

Of course celebrations do not just happen, much energy is needed to make them a reality. Thank you to staff who contribute their talents in various ways, to assist and help community members to be actively involved.

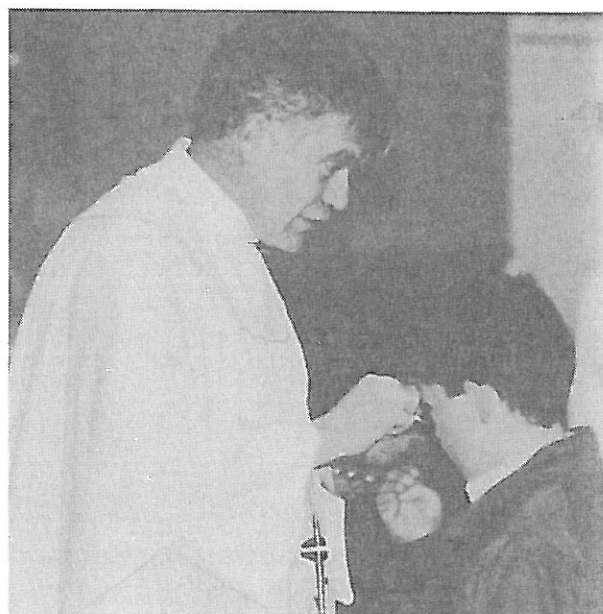

"Please stand clear of the airlock hatches, please stand clear ..." It repeated mindlessly. A1, Subcity's computer was opening the doors.

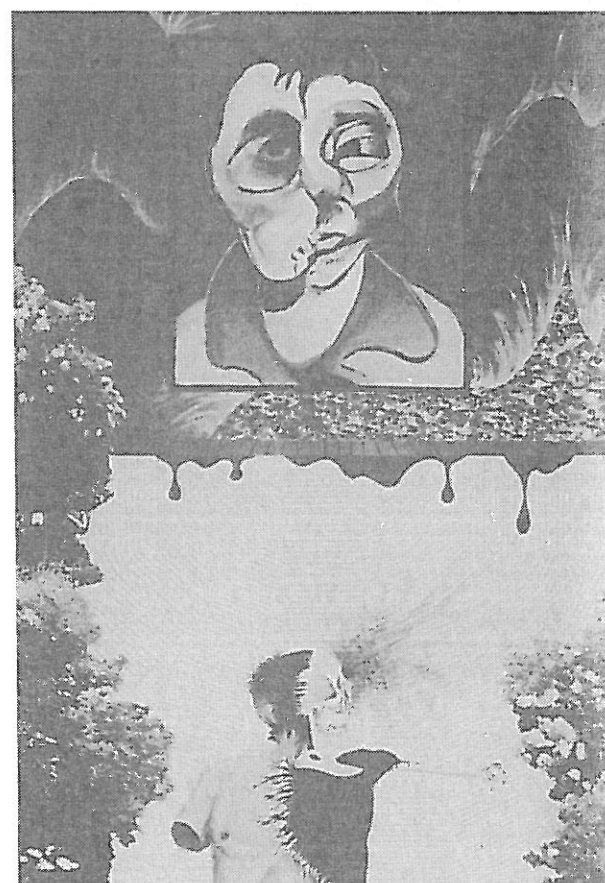
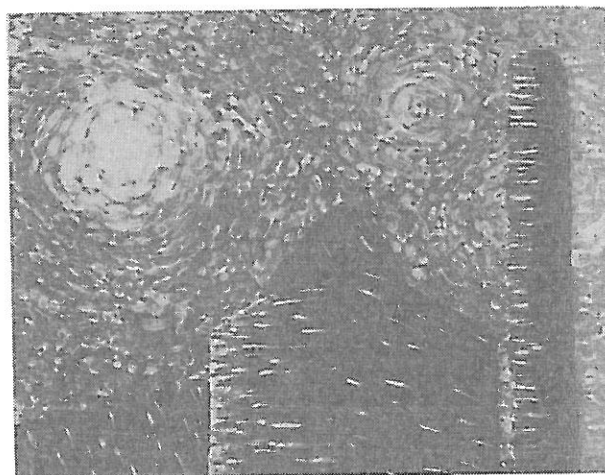
There was a loud click and a metallic groan as the huge hatch swung outward on seldom used hinges. Everyone rushed outside screaming joyously then stopped.

skyward higher and higher towards the sun.

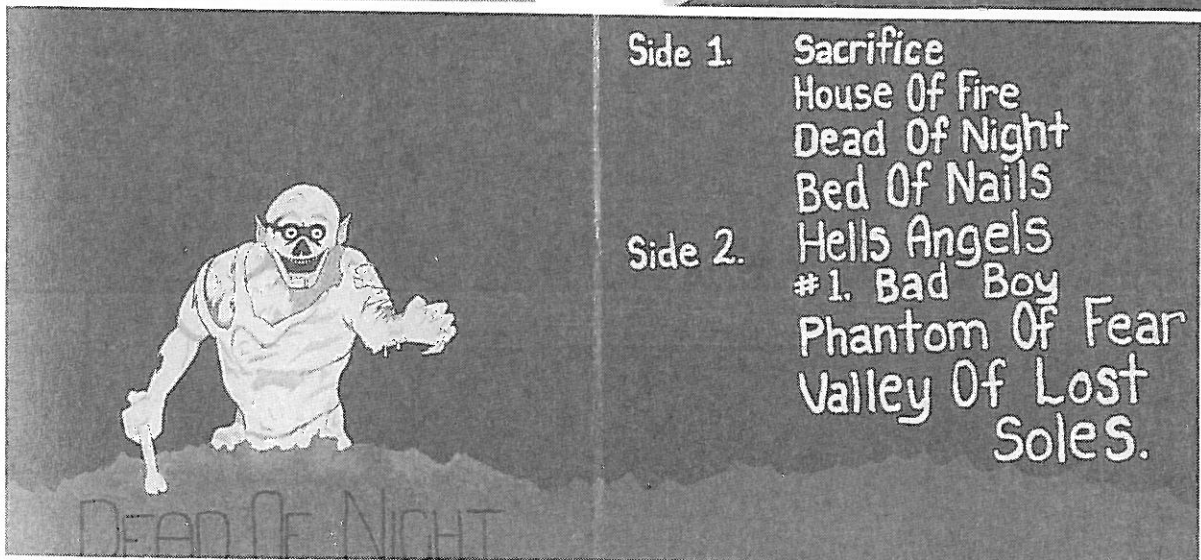
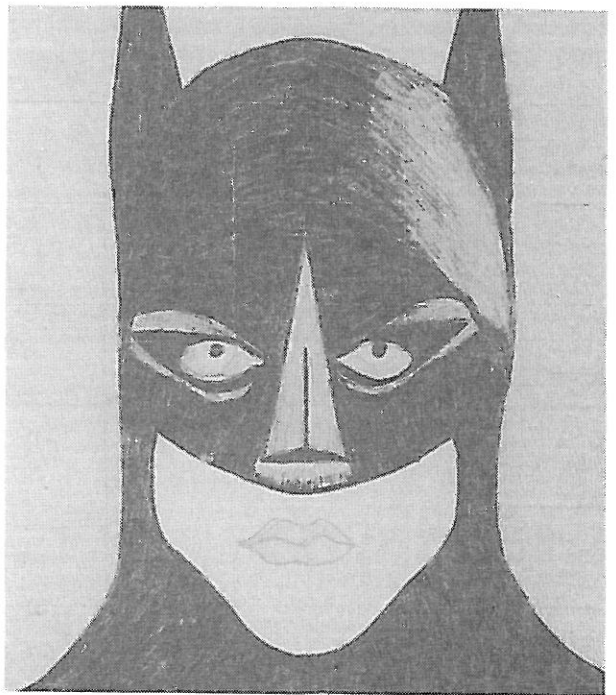
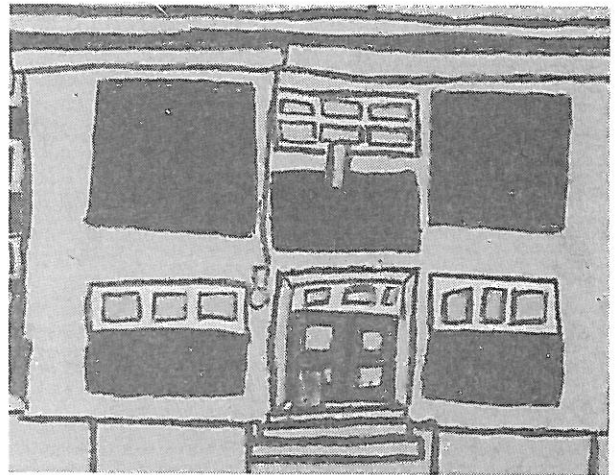
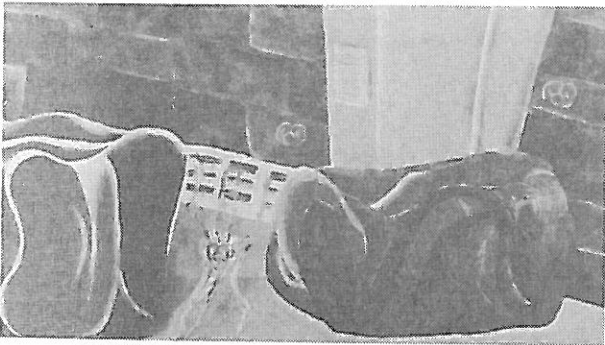

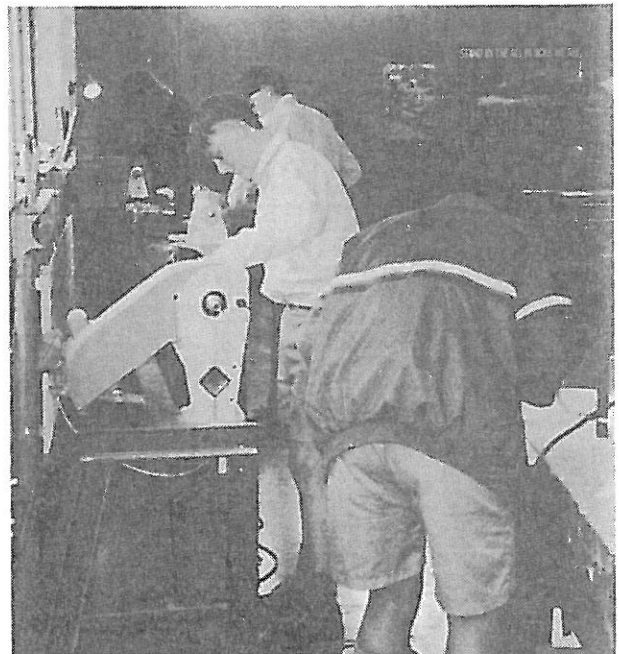
Suddenly all the smaller cousins burst in the front door from playing outside and pushed in among the uncles, aunties and grandparents.

THIRD FORM CAMP 1992

He forced us (with dirty language and physical abuse) to take a hike up the nearest peak so he and his group could get out of the hut before we got there.

When we finally got back to the hut, dying from exhaustion, it was time for lunch. For lunch there was a choice of leftover spaghetti or amazingly exciting... bread. No wonder most of us stuck to our own snacks. After lunch most of us were looking forward to a little rest. But just as we were settling in, Mr. Poehler informed us we were going on a two hour hike to Bells Falls in 10 minutes. Those of us who were still alive after this major shock got ready to again face the torture of a hike. We went up to a clearing and had photos taken, before we set off down to Holly Hut. It was a relatively easy walk because it was mostly downhill. When we got to Holly hut, everyone had a drink of the dirty stagnant drain water. Most didn't care if they got poisoned because they were so thirsty. While the stragglers were catching up, the rest of us had a well deserved sleep. Once we were all there, we started the walk to Bells Falls which took half an hour. The water in the falls was freezing, but most had a swim anyway. Mr. Poehler and a few other people swam out under the waterfall and tried to drown themselves, but to no avail. The walk back to Pouakai Hut took longer than getting there had, because it was all up hill. Tim Rush who got back to base first said he had done the two and a half hour trip in 28 minutes, which most of us found quite hard to believe. He obviously needed a new watch.

For tea the adults prepared potatoes and steak. The steak looked golden brown on the outside and most of us were looking forward to sinking our teeth into the delicious, juicy meat. But, as we bit in, blood came out. It was still raw. Some said their's was so uncooked you could still hear it mooing. Most, again, just stuck to our own snacks. Most of the steak went out the back window. After tea it was time to sort out the bedding arrangements. On each bunk there was 5 mattresses, and we had to fit 10 people to a bunk. 2 to every mattress, except in the elite room - the teachers room. They comfortably slept 6 to a bunk. After this was sorted out, Mr. Poehler told us we were going on another walk. AAAAAAGH!!!!!! As if we hadn't done enough walking to reach America and back already. This walk was at night and was to the mountain lakes. Once we got there, some discovered that the water was warm in the lakes, and went for a swim. That night no one got any sleep until about 1:30 am because they were so cramped for space and everyone was yelling at about 180 decibels. Next morning, most people were up about 7:30 which was quite an achievement considering the time we got to sleep. We packed our bags which was hard because our stuff didn't seem to fit anymore and in our packs there was little bulges everywhere where gear had been jammed in. Once we were all up it was time for breakfast. Mr. Poehler had finally got his ideas about cooking up to scratch. He made beef patties, and they weren't burnt or undercooked either! After breakfast some of us had a game where Jared and Bevan went and hid somewhere between the hut and the lakes, and we had to find them. They weren't supposed to move around, but when we gave up, we found out they had moved to different places to avoid us. When this game finished it was time to do the agonising, dreaded tramp back to Mangorei Rd where we would once again meet the old shabby smelly

bus that would take us to Tapuwai Stream in Oakura. The tramp through dense green bush was easier than coming up because it was mainly downhill. On the way we passed a spring, full of fresh, clear mountain water. We stopped for a drink which was refreshing and delicious. Once we got down we had to wait for 20 minutes before that smelly, dingy bus arrived. On the bus there was an ugly rumour going around that we had to walk from school to the stream. Most of us were quite relieved when the bus dropped us off at the gate to the stream which left about a 600m walk to the camping ground.

Once there it was like heaven. There were canoes, a river, a flying fox into a lake, the sea just around the corner and volleyball nets. It seemed that we wouldn't be pushed into long walks or bad meals here. We had to wait for 5 minutes before the last group left for the mountain and then we were free to swim, canoe or do anything we wanted.

The river had a good swimming hole just by the camp and it was quite deep. People were jumping in from the 6 foot high bank or swinging in off the rope or jumping out of the trees. Some were canoeing in the rapids, which was hard and others were at the lake on the flying fox. The flying fox was about 2 metres above the water at its lowest and started from a 5 metre high bank. It wasn't very fast but if you jolted it around trying to gain speed you would end up flying in head first as Ryan did. The nearby beach was really rocky and full of crabs, another thing about it was that some people tended to sunbathe naked there, so Mr. Hill didn't encourage us to go.

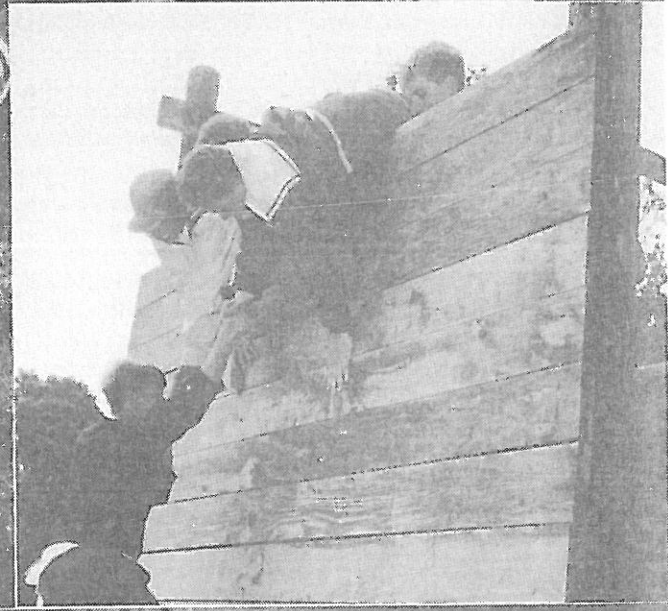
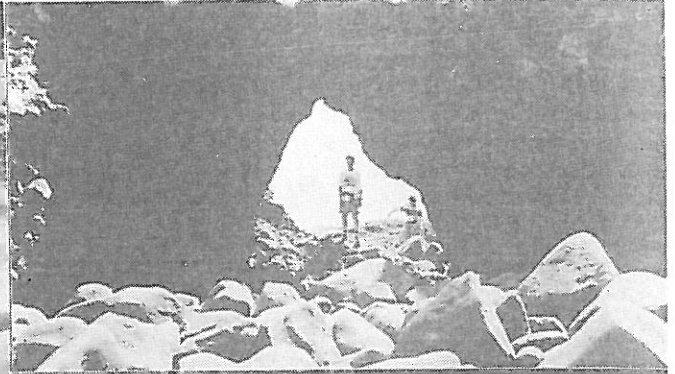
All the meals were cooked on a bonfire with a grill over it. The problem with using it was that the wind blew the smoke out, and the chef usually got a faceful of the stuff. For lunch that day we had sausages and salad. Most of us liked it though I feel sorry for poor Michael who didn't get a sausage while some people managed 4!

After lunch we had a competition to see who could jump the farthest into the river from the bank. Jared won not surprisingly as he is the tallest boy in our class. One or two people managed to hit the bottom when they jumped in as they couldn't get a long enough jump, therefore, a booby prize was awarded. The booby prize was fought for fiercely and Clem narrowly won. The afternoon consisted of swimming, swimming and more swimming. After a nice tea of spaghetti bolognese prepared by Mrs. Ryan and Mrs. Leusink, Father Monaghan came to celebrate mass with us. It was neat sitting on the hill in the fading light having a mass.

That night we played a game called spot - light. In this game the teachers had torches and they walked to the top of a hill. Here they put two flags in the ground. We had to scale stealthily up the sheer sides of the hill and get the flags, the first people to do this were the winners. But there was a catch to Ian Smith off Chris Cairns in the 5th over to dismiss Allan Border. Oh, sorry that was the cricket. The catch was that if the teachers saw you with the torches then you went up, the hill, put down your name and were out the game. We played this game twice and the winners were Jay Litt and Jared Omelvena. Some other people got close, and others got out under strange circumstances.

The next morning, we woke up, knowing we had to leave today. It was pouring with rain, and Mr. Hill told us that we were going to walk along the beach back to New Plymouth, then to school. We miserably packed all the gear up. Some lucky people got a ride home in the van, but the majority of us started off down the beach. It was pouring with rain, the wind was blowing a gale and everyone was slipping on the jagged rocks. It was a horrible walk. By the time we reached New Plymouth all spirits were down. There was still the walk back to school as well. Once back we were just about dead. Some people came in carrying those who had died on the way. It was a sad and lonely time for those of us who lost our friends that day. 15th February 1992. A dark day in New Zealand history. Mr. Hill was later taken up against a jury charged with first degree murder. The camp was over.

SPIRIT OF NEW ZEALAND REPORT

The S.T.S. Spirit of Adventure, and her sister ship S.T.S. Spirit of New Zealand, both owned by the Spirit of Adventure Trust are now legendary in New Zealand waters. Both of these ships do 10 day voyages which are crewed by 40 fifteen to nineteen year olds to have been game enough to put their names forward.

I was lucky enough to be allocated a berth on board the S.T.S. Spirit of New Zealand, leaving soon after my 15th birthday. The voyage was to leave Marsden Wharf, Tuesday 29th September 1992 and end up at Overseas Wharf Gisborne, on Friday 9th October 1992. I paid the \$675 fee for the voyage (the trust pays an additional \$600 plus the travel to and from the boat) so with only a few days before the ship sailed, hastily gathered up the essentials for the trip.

The sheer reality hit me and brought me back down to earth when boarding the ship that Tuesday afternoon. All 36 trainees - this trip was smaller than usual - were split up into 4 groups, each consisting of 9 trainees and it was these groups we worked in for the rest of the trip. We set sail at 16:40 for Waiheke Island and it would be 7 days before we set foot on land again. Our 4 groups, each with a watch leader (W.O.) and a selected group leader alternated around the ship each day, manning different sails - 14 in all - and having various cleaning duties.

Day 2 saw us set sail in the afternoon and we practiced Man Overboard; Firefighting and Abandon Ship duties. That evening we anchored on the other side of Waiheke Island.

The morning of day 3 saw the repeated ritual of the officers: -waking everybody up at 0600, hauling them out on deck dressed in togs, then expecting them to swim from the front of the ship to the back. This ritual is repeated every morning, every voyage, every year on both ships!!! Breakfast is at 0700 then colours (the raising of the New Zealand ensign and ringing of 8 bells) at 0800. We lifted anchor in the morning and headed up the coast, anchoring at Martins Bay - opposite Kawau Island - early that evening.

The next day (Day 4) saw us heading towards Cape Colville, but a fault in the generator forced us to turn and make for Great Barrier Island in heavy seas; anchoring in Smokehouse Bay at Port Fitzroy.

A pleasant course to the Mercury Islands and Day 5 sped past quickly. That evening, a dragging anchor made us move from the Great Mercury Island, and anchor in shelter off Kauwauru Point, Coromandel.

Rowing races were the highlight of the 6th day before we lifted anchor and motored around to Cooks Beach, Whitianga.

An early morning sail-off saw Day 7 get away to a grumpy, sleepy start; the mood however improved when after lunch, we stopped for a three hour stroll on Mayor Island. Quite a scenic place.

We sailed on through the night and ended up at Hicks Bay, at the end of Day 8.

'NO SWIM' was the verdict of the 1st mate as he surveyed the rough seas which rocked us awake for the start of Day 9. The trainee crew on this day, as usual on a voyage, was given the opportunity to sit a 'Safe Boating' exam. I was one of six who sat and passed the exam. We ended up sailing into and anchoring in Poverty Bay in the early hours of day 10.

This was the day on which us, the trainees, were to elect a captain, 1st mate, W.O.'s, cooks, and an engineer from the trainee crew. These were to run the ship while the

left over trainees manned the ship. This was a very productive exercise with the ship spinning around in the same place for about 1 hour. Fortunately, I wasn't the captain, I was down in the keel unpacking cases, ropes, and fresh supplies out of the storage hold, one job that was fun - but dirty.

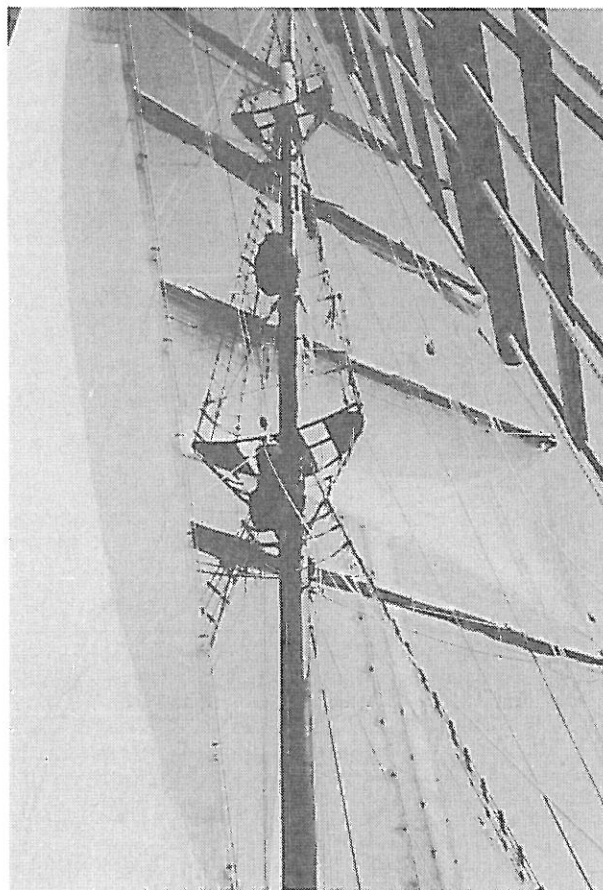
Day 11, the last, final day of the voyage. We motored off the anchor at 0630 and pulled into the wharf at 0700. Hailed as another success of the Spirit of Adventure Trust, the voyage was finally over.

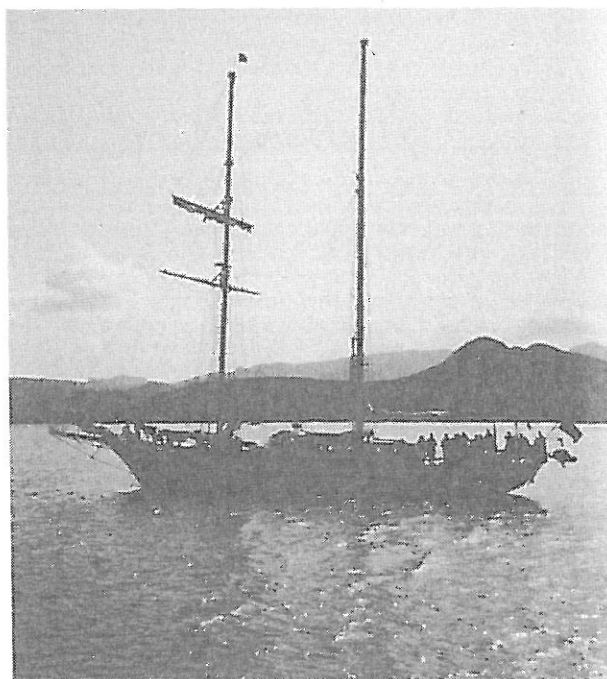
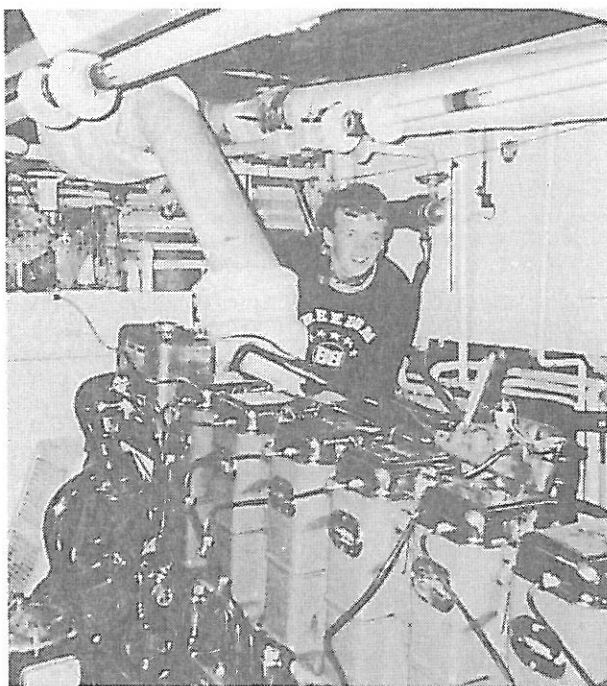

THE SPIRIT OF ADVENTURE

My adventure trip on the Spirit of New Zealand began at the Inter City bus terminal at New Plymouth. There I met three other people who were going to go on the Spirit of Adventure. Stepping on to the 40 metre sailing ship at 3.30pm was the start of my journey. I was the last trainee to arrive and did not have my group photo taken which was disappointing.

We left around 4.30pm with a Captain, 1st Mate, 2nd Mate, Cook from the Navy, an Engineer, four Watch Leaders and two Leading Hands.

This procedure carried on for another eight days until day 10 when we had to take responsibility and crew the ship for the whole day until 12.00 midnight, when the professional crew took over.

Day 11 was the final day. We covered around 40 nautical miles in 7 hours before we anchored at 5.30pm. A group of us were talking at the stern of the deck on the final night when the topic of going home came up. There was a sudden silence. To think of going home, never to see this group of people again was sad. We never went to bed until 2am, so had little sleep before our 5.30am start. When we were ready to go, people started to cry, even the strongest among us broke down in sadness. People started to leave around 7.45am to catch trains and buses and at that point I wished it could go on forever. It was time to catch that bus for the 8 hour ride home.

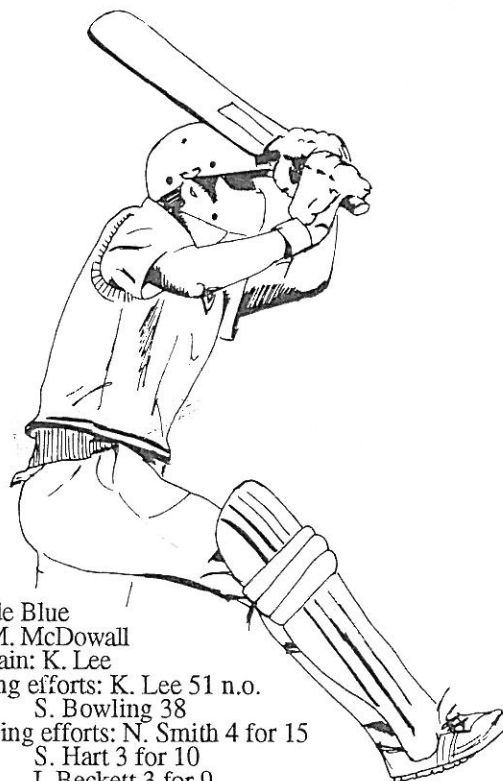

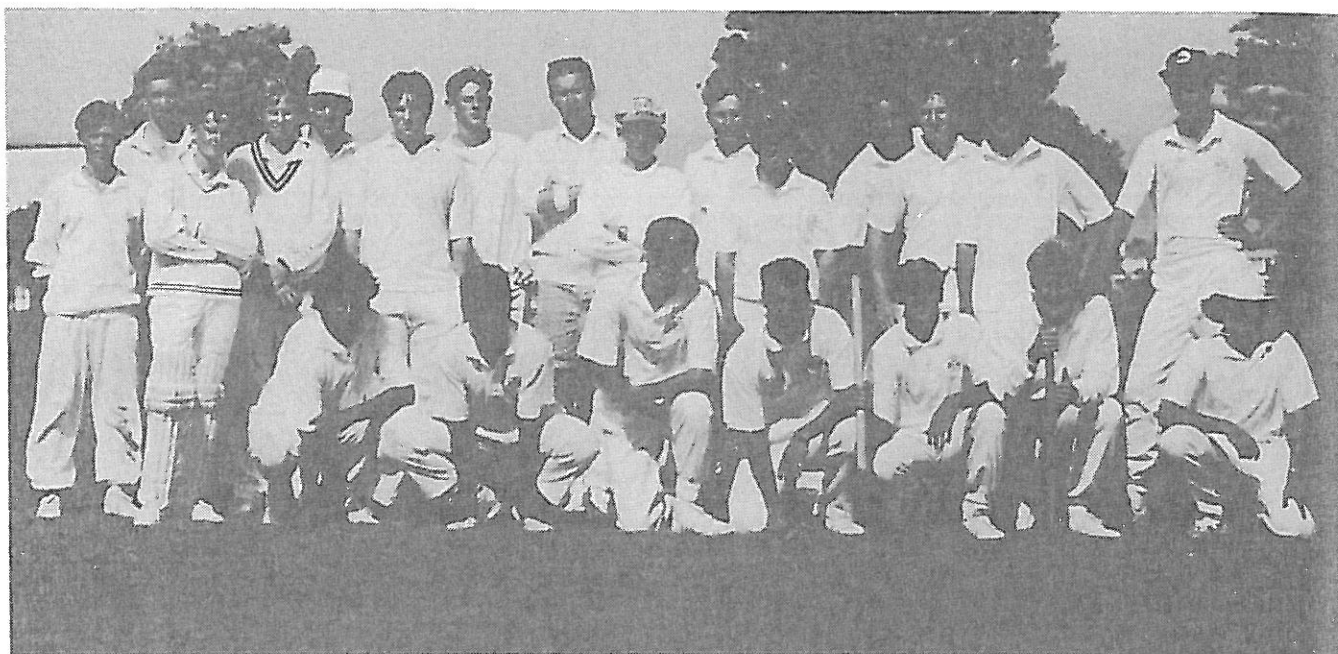

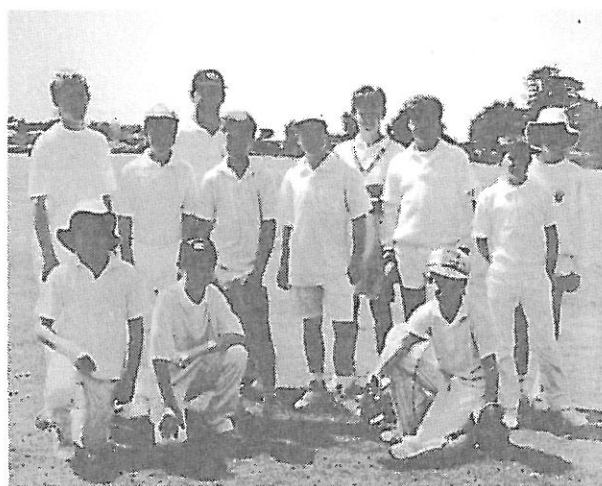


Gillette Cup match against Otorohanga

Midday was time to go to St Mary's church for the Mass and that's where the strength of this weekend shows its true spirit in prayer and singing, a packed church and the evident school spirit.

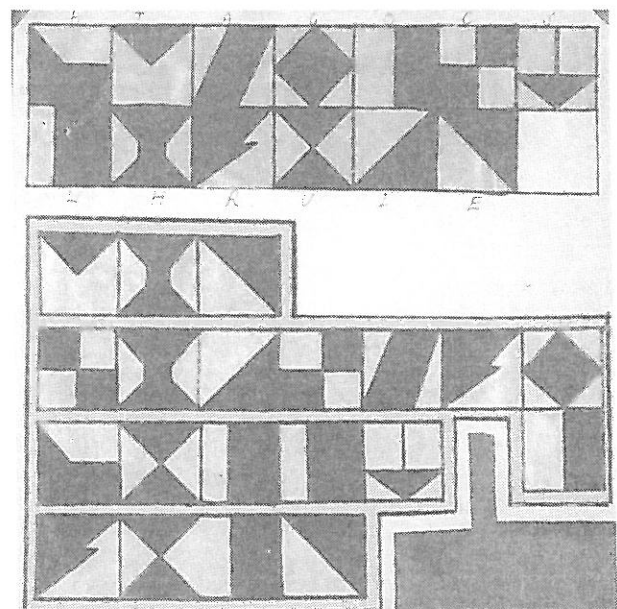
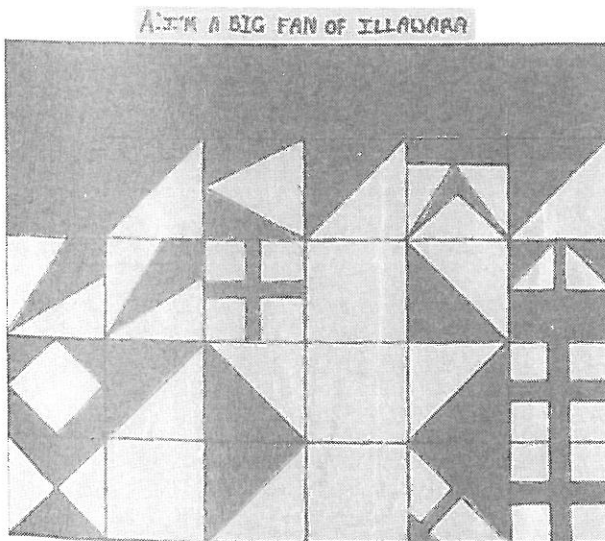
Luncheon was served in the hall where we first met and the wonderful weather enabled this to be eaten outside and bid farewell to friends met over the weekend.

SYNFUEL MATHEMATICS SPECTACULAR 1992

'BIG NUMBERS'

In reading the following project summary, please remember, in dealing with large numbers Scientists and Mathematicians use the notation of ten raised to various powers (Scientific notation), to eliminate the profusion of noughts. For example, the number 1,000,000,000,000 would be written as 10^{12} , and the number 123,456,000,000,000,000,000 would appear as 1.23456×10^{20} .

My lifelong fascination with big numbers inspired a lengthy investigation into several facets of this infinite subject. With time, my research revealed many amazing facts such as the existence of two very different large numeral systems in the world, leading on to why it is easier to attain Billionaire status in the United States than in Britain.

The last mentioned, a Decillion, in American numerology is 10^{33} or 1,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000; and in British numerology, 10^{60} or 1,000! Phew, what a mouth-full!! But why the need for these extreme numbers anyway? As examples, distances to and around certain phenomena in the known universe, or the number of atoms in the human body are both accountable and applicable to scientific notation.

As an interesting mathematical exercise, I devised the "Deal of a lifetime", whereby a fictional United States job offers a first day payment of one dollar, which doubles every consecutive working day, until the one hundred and eleventh day of employment is completed. Would you accept this offer? If so, would it be just to make a couple of bucks on the side, or would you be planning your future as a millionaire? By calculating the pay for each of the 111 days, a chart such as follows is produced:

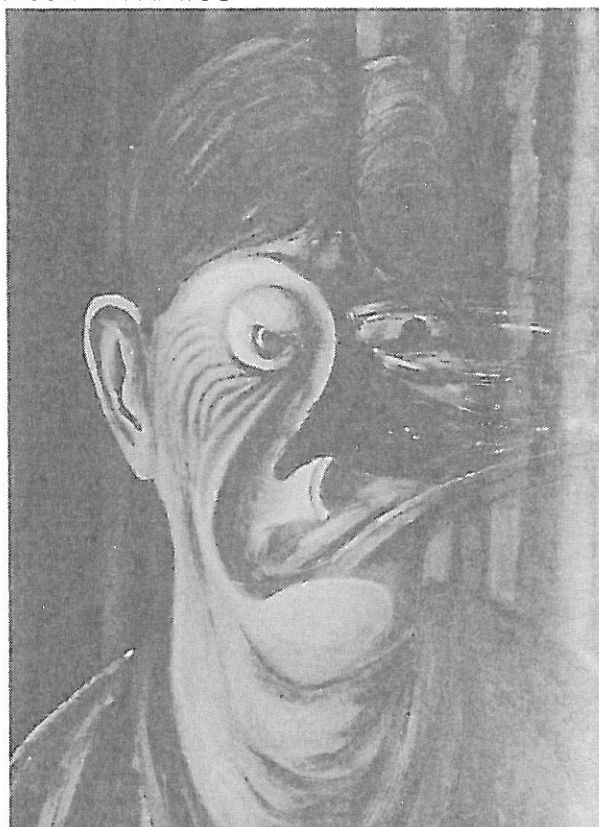
I gathered my information from various places such as the town library, school library and my family's home encyclopedias.

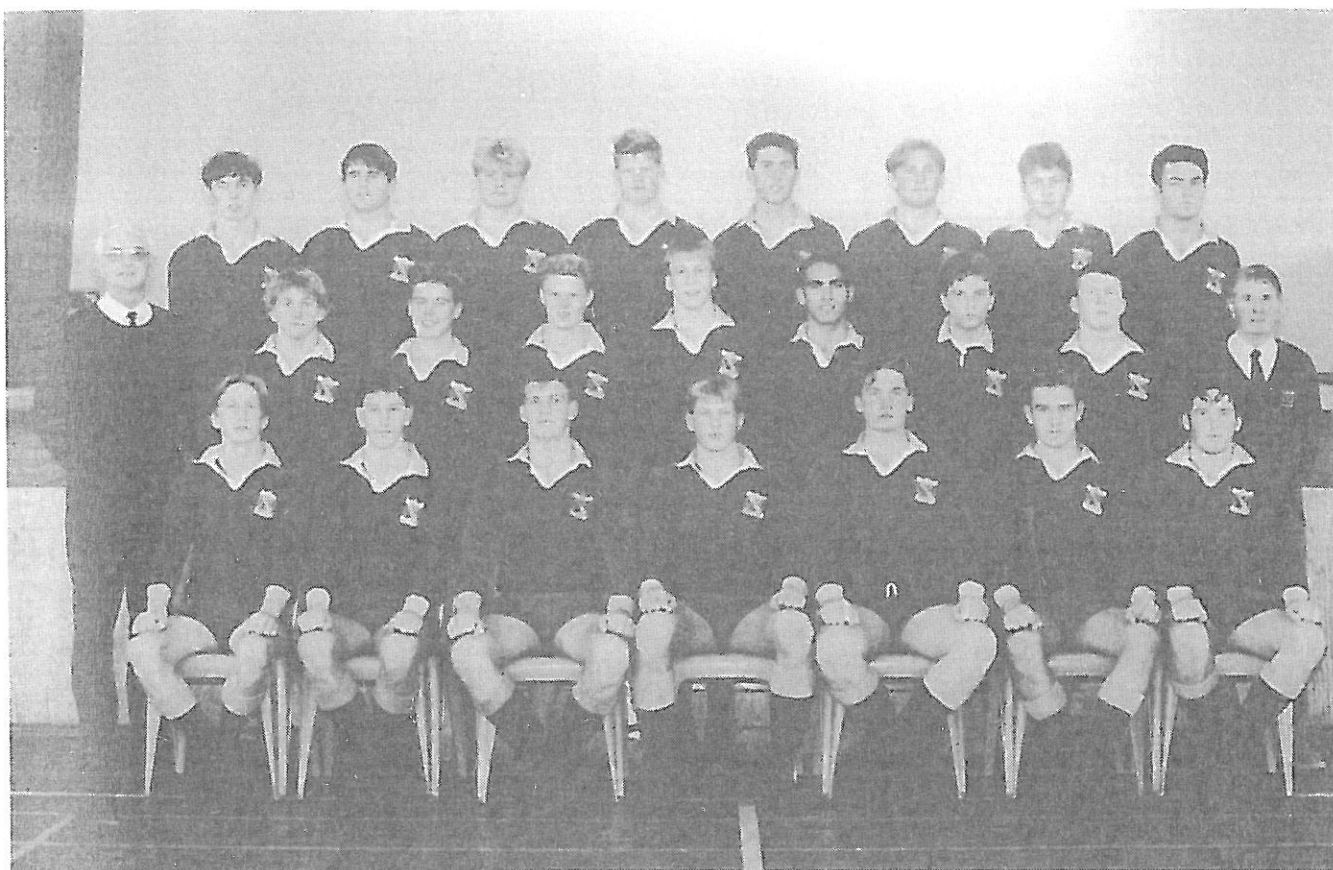

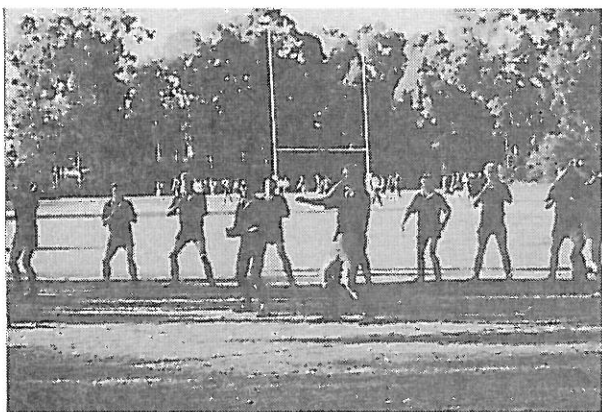
1ST XV TRIP TO AUSTRALIA

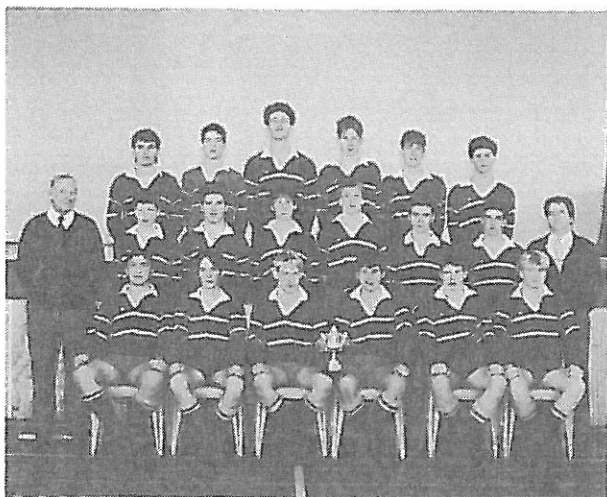

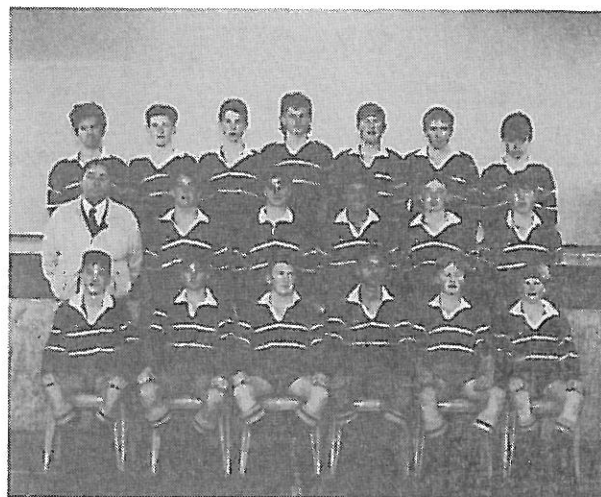

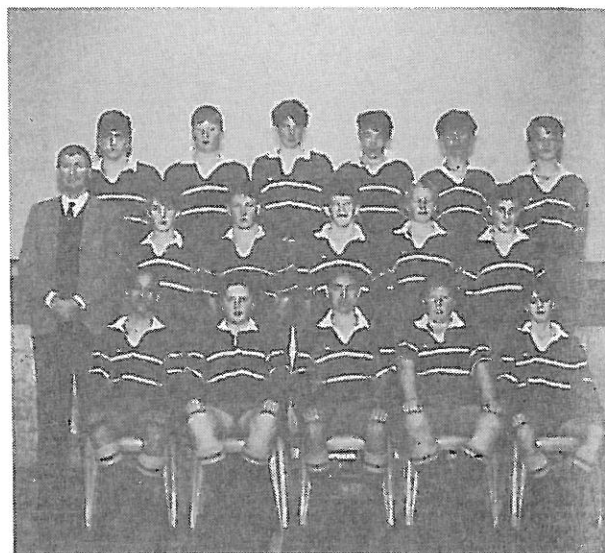

The team developed very quickly into a solid unit at the start of the season and all team members provided very valuable input that lead to our many victories.

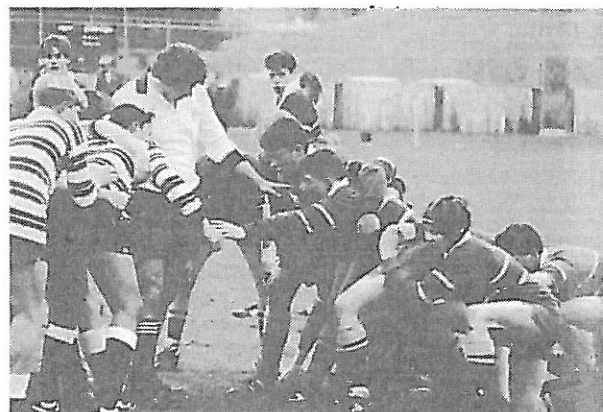

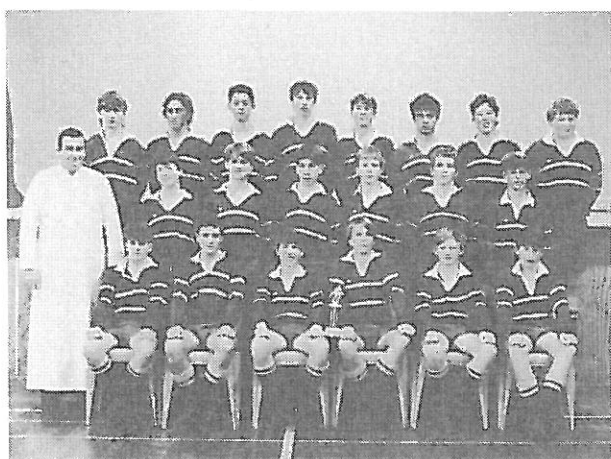

From the ice cold conditions to the gully at Boys High the team played attractive open rugby in all sorts of weather. Overall 1992 was a very successful season.



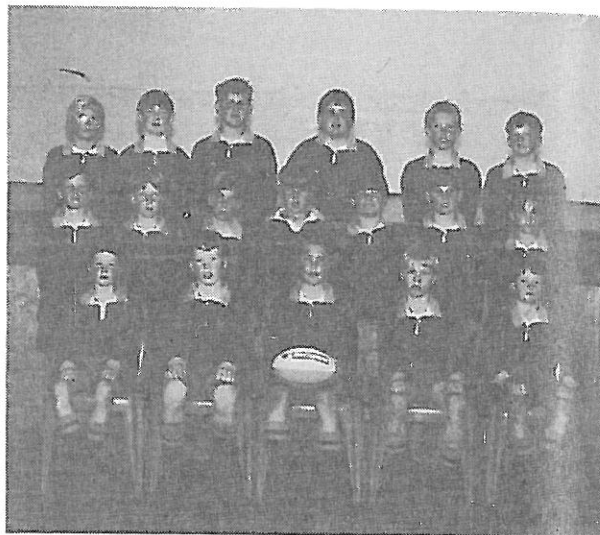

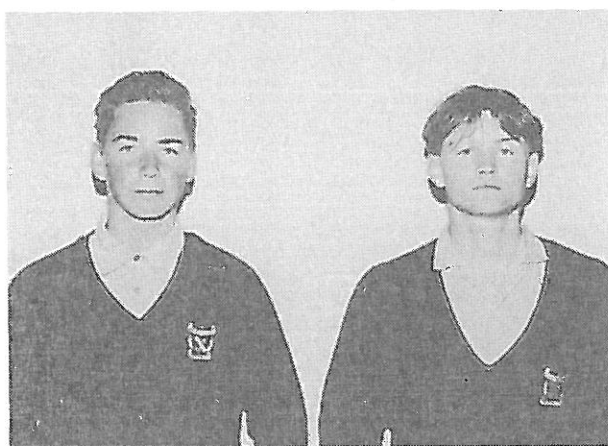
OLYMPIC WRESTLING 1992

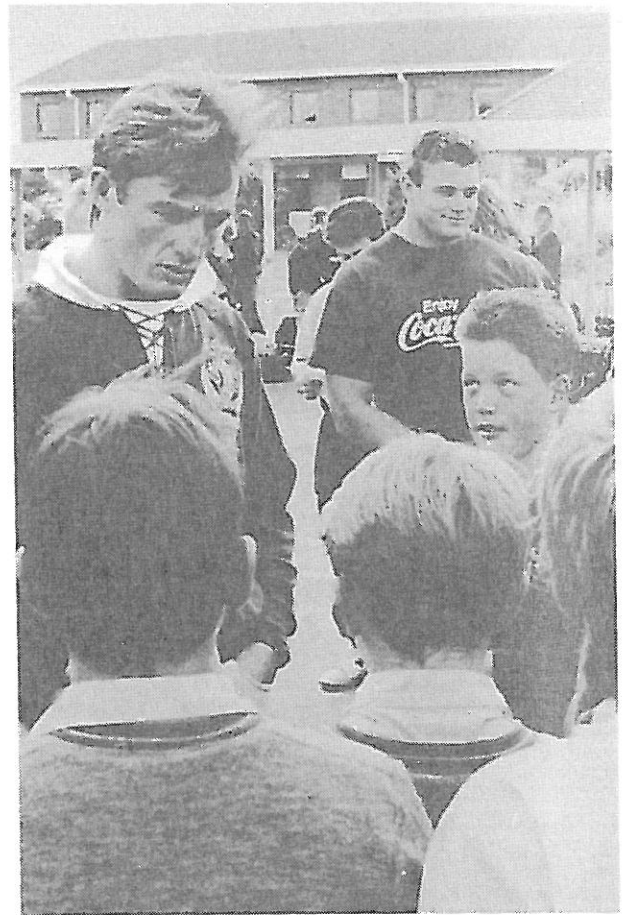
