



DEDICATION

FRANCIS VERNON DOUGLAS

1910 - May 22nd Born, Johnsonville, Wellington.

EDUCATION: Local State school and then Marist Brothers Thorndon.

1927 - Commenced studies for the priesthood at Holy Cross, Mosgiel.

1934 29th October - Ordained to the priesthood for the Archdiocese of Wellington by Archbishop O'Shea.

1935-36 - Assistant priest, New Plymouth.

1937 - Joined the Columban Fathers, studied in Australia.

1938 - Was sent to the Phillipine Islands, studied language and customs in preparation for his new ministry among the indigenous people.

1939 - Appointed Pastor of Pililla, Phillipines.

1941 - Peral Harbour was bombed. Japanese invade the Phillipines.

1943 22nd June - Father Douglas arrested by the Japanese.

10th July - Best information suggests he died on this day after a period of detention and torture.



Fifty years ago, Kiwi Columban missionary, Fr Francis Vernon disappeared from his parish near Manila in the Philippines. All that is known for certain is that he was tortured, interrogated and then taken away by the occupying force. At the age of thirty-three this young priest was prepared to die for what he believed in and so in accepting his "Cross and Calvary", he followed Jesus to the end. Francis Douglas College honours the life of this young priest and so with pride, in the 50th year after his death, we dedicate this magazine to his memory.

Since the inception of "Tomorrows Schools" the challenge facing Boards has been the pace of change. Rather than abating, change is now very much a fact of life and is likely to gather pace rather than abate. It will be the management of this change that will dictate how successful or otherwise Francis Douglas College will be in the future.

This Board is very mindful of the challenge facing it and the need to plan effectively to ensure this College can offer an educational opportunity at least equal to other competing institutions, if not better, but at the same time ensuring that our "special character" is not prejudiced.

To this end we have, or are about to institute several initiatives to achieve this object:

1) Development of a strategic plan for the next decade.

- 2) Develop business links/partnerships with appropriate industries to make available to our students the wealth of experience available in the wider community.
- 3) Take up the challenge presented by the new qualifications proposals released by the New Zealand Qualifications Authority.

The Board would require/welcome the input of parents, teachers and the wider community in this process.

Since integration the Catholic School system has been intent on honouring its obligations contained in the integration agreements. This has precluded consideration being given to new initiatives put up by schools. During the last year the Government has clearly signalled to all schools its willingness to assist school communities willing to help themselves. In light of this development the policy of the Management Board of the Catholic Schools in Wellington and Palmerston North has been changed to permit these schools the same opportunity as has been opened up for the state owned schools. The question of Government subsidy for integrated schools on the same basis as for state schools is currently unclear.

Whatever the final decision of Government, it is clear that if our schools wish to develop new facilities, then there is going to be a requirement for self funding. This is going to be an ongoing challenge, but will need to be faced.

In this regard, I would like to place on record the appreciation of the Board for the efforts of the Parent Teachers Association in raising funds for school purposes. Over the years this group has been outstanding in providing facilities for the students at the College. Often they beaver away unnoticed and their efforts can be overlooked or taken for granted.

The Financial Accounts for 1992 disclose a cash surplus of \$1,398 after depreciation of \$39,287. compared with \$21,239 after depreciation of \$38,629 in 1991. This reflects careful budgeting, rather than satisfying the needs of teachers and students in terms of curriculum demands. There is a danger to assume that if schools are balancing the books there is no need for further funding. This Board's experience is that H.O.D. requirements are trimmed to meet the funds available and we do not consider those Departmental heads budgets to be "wish lists", but rather an assessment of the real needs to deliver the curriculum adequately. The Board is also conscious of voluntary contributions from the community which effectively masks the inadequacy of funding.

The Board is appreciative of the efforts of the Principal and his staff in providing an excellent standard of education to the pupils at the College. This good work was reflected in the excellent academic results achieved in 1992. The Board also commends the efforts to meet the suggestions contained in the E.R.O. review. I would like to thank Board Members for their support and enthusiasm in administering the School, and to thank the Bursar, office staff and ground and related staff to ensure the efficient operation of the College.

PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT TO BOARD OF TRUSTEES - 10 AUGUST 1993

Our College Mission Statement states that the College exists to educate students for life within a Catholic environment where people share the Good News of Jesus Christ. I believe the College community students, staff, parents are working positively to achieve this goal and to bear witness to our special Catholic character.

Students are encouraged to strengthen attitudes and values learnt in the home, to come to terms with the challenges our world gives them and to work towards having an informed conscience through the Catholic Church beliefs and values. I take this opportunity to formally thank the administration team Mr Leo Walsh and Mr John Whyte for their support and advice; Mr Martin Dravitzki as Curriculum Co-ordinator and the Head of Department, the Deans of all Form Levels and all teachers on staff for their professionalism and dedication.

I praise the work of Mrs Margaret Hobson as business manager/bursar within the College. Margaret's commitment, efficiency and resource-fulness are great assets to the College. I thank the office staff and ancillary staff for their sense of responsibility and understanding. Curriculum: In the Form 1/2 area the Dean, Mr Richard Doherty, now coordinates the main curriculum areas, this has meant greater efficiency in work covered. Prior to this year Heads of Department were responsible for Forms 1 and 2. Forms 1 and 2 students are travelling to Sacred Heart College for sewing and cooking. In Form 3 we introduced Horticulture as a com-

The Form 1 to 4 classes have a reading programme established. There is one to one help with reading provided by Mrs Margaret Milne, Mrs Freda Dowd, Brother Gregory, four of our parents and volunteers from Form 7. This programme is very successful and has received many favourable comments from both students and parents.

pulsory subject providing options in French,

Maori and Extra English.

Students who chose to do Maori this year have been on a number of excursions for cultural experiences. One day a week (whole day) we have a teacher coming in to familiarise our Maori students with marae experience, custom, prayer, Maori instruments and traditional music theory and practice and familiarisation with the Taiala (ceremonial staff).

In Form 5 French was re-introduced as a subject and is going well. Link classes are again being followed at Polytech so too the Physics (Form 7) classes are completing courses there.

There are a large number of students (22) doing correspondence courses this year - Form 5 Maori; German Form 5/6; Life Skills Form 6/7; Accounting Form 7; French Form 7; Horticulture Form 6; Music Form 6 (?).

Staffing: There are 26 full time teachers and 10 part-time teachers currently on our staff. There are 10 ancilliary administration staff including the college office, library, teacher-aides, personnel, caretaker and handyman. Brother William returned to the College farm and is 'shaping' it again. Lindsay McMorran also returned from study leave.

Boarding Hostel: Mrs Liz O'Sullivan has organised visits to all Taranaki Parish Masses on weekends during June, July and August. Liz asked parents to speak at the different parishes. My thanks goes to Liz for her interest, support and encouragement in the promotion work. The parents who spoke from their personal experiences were all a tremendous witness to the College, very loyal, supportive and honest. Roll: Our College roll at present is 482 and the number has remained reasonably constant all year. Visits to "feeder" schools have proved to be of benefit. The Open Day for new students in June was well attended by students and parents. De La Salle Brothers: At present there are seven Brothers in the community. Brother Oliver and Brother Gregory are to be congratulated for their commitment and dedication to the beautification of the College. Brother Robert's untiring work on computers is to be commended. Brother Robert has initiated many staff in the computer world and has been of significant value in computer awareness among students. Brother Robert's professionalism, interest and care for all at Francis Douglas College will be sorely missed after this year. Brothers Geoffrey, William and Lawrence are to be thanked for the strong community support and witness they are to the College.

Innovation! With Brother Robert leaving us at the end of 1993 a decision had to be made re the reporting system for students - up to the end of 1992 Brother Robert held this responsibility. This year it was decided that all teachers be asked to learn to do their own reports on the computer. All teachers attempted this new procedure and I am very pleased to report that despite some minor hassles the staff have found this a rewarding professional development exercise. This procedure is not complete as year and there are still some teething problems to work out however it is proving a very worthwhile exercise.


Sports Activities: I am pleased to say that our representation of students in the various sports teams within the College is extremely high, positive and there have been many fine performances both individual and team. Thanks to the many staff and parents for their involvement, interest and support of the students. Mrs Elyne Plumb (Basketball), Mr John George (Sportsmaster) and Mr Graeme Mustchin (Soccer) need a special word of thanks.

Cultural Involvement: This past year the College was involved in the Shakespearian Secondary Schools Content at Stratford, the Taranaki Speech and Drama Competition which also included a Maori segment and the O'Shea Shield competition.

There has been a renewed interest in the band, choir and music in general. Ms Yvonne Van Lent is encouraging the boys and with some new equipment added enthusiasm has been engendered.

Parent/Teacher Association: The Parent/ Teacher Association decision last year to work towards computerising the library (\$25,000 plus) became a reality in May this year. The continuous support and work of the parents is very much appreciated. The work of Shona Manton, John Glass, Joan Gower and Ian Cull over many years is very much appreciated by the parents of the College. Our PTA executive and committee is to be thanked for their giving up of time and energy. Our FDMC parents/caregivers are to be thanked for their continued loyal support. I thank the Board of Trustee members for their continued support and encouragement of me personally. I see the challenges presented as opportunities, I believe that as a College we are moving in the right direction. I believe confidence is building among students and the staff are facing the changes proposed in education with interest.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE REPORT


Being Student Representative this year has been an exciting challenge. It brought me into a completely new situation which I previously had no experience of.





PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1993:

I have much pleasure in presenting the report of the Francis Douglas Memorial College Parent Teacher Association for the year ended May 1993. As every parent will be aware there is an ever increasing demand for money to be raised and it is often unfortunate that we constantly call on the generosity of the same people each year to assist the college in maintaining the required level of its equipment in different facts of school life. The committee is very aware of the demands being made of the parents financially and we wish to thank you all sincerely for your constant generosity in this regard.

The committee had the job of organising two gala days, the success of these reflects the hard work done by the entire committee of the P.T.A. together with the college staff, especially the untiring work by Peter Hill, and the volunteers who assisted on the day and the many parents who gave either of their time or by donation to make these days successful. The support from Br Tim, John Whyte and staff have always kept the P.T.A. informed of school activities and have been keen to help when needed.








Aaron Hill Junior "Kata" Champion New Zealand


Form 1 and 2 make a presentation to Miss Patsy Wright-Warren

The enthusiasm of the boys is incredible. The latter part of the year we support our own local food bank and the Children's Cancer Appeal.











We had a couple of test runs in the last weeks of the 1st term, just to work out the bugs and we almost had a riot on our first broadcast because of "technical difficulties". We started late.

Since then, we have had a fairly good year, with an article run on us in the Midweeker on the 2nd June and with the introduction of the "Gary and Barry Show" (Gareth Collings and Craig Barraclough), on Wednesdays part way through the 3rd term.

Shortly after we worked with Mr Mustchin on advertising around the school for the Variety Review, in return for the chance to make a bit of money by selling drinks, chips and moro bars. The event was very successful with a great response from staff, students and their families.


But without everyone mentioned, especially 'The Entertainers', we would never have got Radio Estudiante off the ground and flying with the birds.



ACHIEVEMENTS

18 SEPTEMBER 1993

Professor Michael J Kelly FRS

It was announced in London on 11 March that Michael Kelly, a former pupil of St Pius and St. Joseph's schools and of Francis Douglas College, was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society. This is the most long-standing and distinguished scientific academy in the world, founded in 1660. Each year 40 new Fellows from the UK and Commonwealth are elected across the sciences, engineering and mathematics. Only about 15 New Zealanders worldwide share this distinction.

Michael Kelly, son of the late Mr and Mrs.S.Kelly of New Plymouth, entered Francis Douglas College in 1960 and was Dux of the College in 1966. Brother Tony Gaul taught him Mathematics, Chemistry and Physics and in Michael's own words "set me up for what followed". He gained fifth highest marks in the university entrance scholarship examinations, the top scorer from a Catholic school. Michael played a full and responsible role in the life of the school. He was a prefect and vice-captain of Solomon House, secretary of the Young Christian Students Society and captain of the Debating Team in his final year. The principal at that time, Brother Julian Bernard, described Michael as a methodical and conscientious student who would go far in the future.

Michael completed a BSc degree in Mathematics and Physics at Victoria University in 1969. He was awarded the Sir George Grey senior science scholarship and the Sir Robert Stout scholarship for the best student completing a pass degree. He returned to Victoria and completed an MSc in Mathematics in 1971. He won a Unilever scholarship in order to study for a Doctorate of Philosophy in theoretical physics at Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge University, England. He investigated the electronic structure of solid surfaces at Cavendish Laboratory. After gaining his PhD he was awarded a British Science Research Council advanced fellowship to enable him to continue with his research for a further period of five years.

From 1974 to 1981 Dr Michael Kelly continued with a wide range of researches in Cambridge. During that time he was first a Research Fellow and then a Teaching Fellow, at Trinity Hall. Within that time he also spent one year at the University of California, Berkley, and six months at the Max Planck Institute for Solid State Physics in Stuttgart.

In 1981, Michael joined the research staff of the General Electric Company at its Hirst Research Centre in Wembley. He was a founding member of a new Long Range Research Laboratory, dedicated to finding and solving science and engineering problems that could bring long-term benefit to the GEC. Starting in 1984, he built up a research team that established new semiconductor physics principles that have led to a new generation of high performance electronic devices for microwave radar and communication systems. Some of these devices are now in production and sale with GEC Plessey Semiconductors. Between 1988 and 1992, he returned to spend 80% of his research time at the Cavendish Laboratory, and at Trinity Hall, examining a new set of physics ideas for their eventual device application. It is this range of research work that has been recognised by the electors.

Since October 1992, Michael has been Professor of Physics and Electronics at the University of Surrey. His brief is to undertake research and teaching across the disciplines of physics, electronic engineering and materials science. He is a Fellow of two professional bodies in the UK, the Institute of Physics and the Institution of Electrical Engineers.

The Royal Society citation says he is distinguished for his work on semiconductors and their electronic properties. "He has made particular advances in understanding the properties and potential of the new area of superlattices and low dimensional structures, which he is seeking to exploit in the terms of novel electronic devices," the citation said.

Michael Kelly has, for the past five years, funded an award for the best student of Science and Mathematics in the seventh form of Francis Douglas College.


1ST X1 CRICKET REPORT

Thanks to Mr Edwards, Mr Kale and Mr Smith for their help in coaching.








FOURTH GRADE GREEN

The following is a brief report on 1993.


TARANAKI MATHEMATICS ASSOCIATION TEAMS COMPETITION

like "Rowena Budget Lodge".



Young Fin Discovers New Zealands Coastal Life Thomas Friis, Francis Douglas's exchange student from Finland says his experiences of surfing and life saving is a major highlight of his trip. The 19 year old young man from the little island of Houtskar in the south-west of Finland has experienced many changes with his exchange to New Zealand. Thomas lives with his mother and father on Houskar which has a population of 750 and a town consisting of five shops.

Thomas has an older brother who is currently serving military training in the Finnish Navy. Unlike New Zealand, Finland has compulsory military training for all males over the age of 18. "Once you turn 18 in Finland you are called up for military training, but you have until you are 26 until you have to enrol."

School is also a major difference Tom had to come across on his stay in New Zealand. Finnish schools have many more options and the students have a wider range of subjects. In Finland students complete 15 subjects, which are divided throughout the year and in these 15 subjects three subjects of Finnish, Swedish and English are compulsory.

"The education system in Finland is totally free and all students receive a free lunch every day." Thomas describes New Zealand as a beautiful place with a variety of natural nature and good beaches. He especially enjoyed his beach life in New Zealand of surfing and life saving and puts it down as one of his highlights. The young Fin is usually used to lakes with no waves where he lives, so surfing was a great adventure for him. In Finland Thomas is accustomed to skiing, playing volleyball and hunting ducks. He says there is a greater demand on playing sport in New Zealand and generally New Zealander's play a lot of sport especially in school.

"In my school in Finland they don't have one school sports team, if you want to play sport you have to join a club."

Tom has coped well with his endeavours and although he misses Finland he was in no hurry to go home. He has learnt that New Zealand is more than sheep, Kiwifruit and Steinlager, he has experienced New Zealand from skiing it's highest mountains to surfing the largest waves and learning New Zealand's unique culture.

ANDREW GRAY - COMPOS, BRAZIL Seems only yesterday that Andrew was saying to us, 12 weeks until I leave! Now we, his family are saying, he will be home in 12 weeks! March "This is my first day in Brazil, and I think I will love it.

Auckland to Buenos Aires flight was very tiring and boring, even with all the good company and food. Arrived Buenos Aires, temp was thirty nine degrees. Waited in transit for an hour then a 3hr flight to Sao Paulo. By this time it was misery;

we were so tired we laughed!

Reception at Sao Paulo was amazing. About 1000 AFS people there to meet us. All trying their English on us, certainly made us feel a lot better. Spent the night in Sao Paulo in a posh hotel, where we were treated to all the food and drink we could eat! Sao Paulo to Rio more waiting and then late in the afternoon finally onto Campos to be met by my family, the Nasicmento's. I was so tired all I could do was

smile and hug everyone. My house is pretty good; has a swimming pool, but the property is surrounded by a 7ft steel fence with locked gates

and bars on the windows.

2nd Letter Carnaval - is over, it's kind of a shame, and kind of a relief. Carnaval is amazing; it would take pages to describe, more or less a nation wide party which fills the streets with people, dancing, singing, playing instruments, drinking, eating, selling their wares, playing the fool, etc. etc.

3rd Letter Not much to say at the present, except that being over here and seeing the poor has already made me realise that I am a very lucky and well off person. Proud to be a Kiwi and very grateful for my family I have in NZ.

4th Letter Went to school today to sort out my course. 14 subjects wow! The school is fairly new, but yet again surrounded by security fencing and armed guards on the gates - often searching school bags. They have put me in with the 14 & 15 year olds which makes me a bit unhappy (don't worry). Also the physic teacher wasn't happy with me because I didn't do some exercise that I didn't understand in Portuguese and I wouldn't understand in English anyway. Week later have been put into 2Y today, with students more my age. So it starts all over again making friends!

Gaining trust with my family - they are all good to me and my Portuguese is getting better, but

still a long way to go.

When I was in Rio, I was talking to a girl in a Music shop, she knew I wasn't a Carioca (person from Rio) but she didn't think I was a foreigner, she thought I was from Sao Paulo - so you can see I don't feel so out of place any more and I am really happy and living here is really easy now."

5th Letter It's so hard to describe what is happening around me and it's all so different. Please tell students going away it's something they must realise that nothing, nothing is familiar. The people and language are different, food, smells, ways of doing things, you don't know your way around the city. Realise nothing is familiar.

6th Letter Brazil juniors won their World Cup in Soccer. I felt so happy it was unbelievable. Claudia (sister) nearly knocked back with joy. It was like watching the All Blacks winning the World Cup. Also today Marcelo's wife is in labour and my family said "You are going to be an uncle"! My family are so good and helpful and my Ma (Mother) is interested in the things I am doing here and what is happening with you at home.

7th Letter I have been here 4 months, more than 1/3 of my time, hard to believe really. Today is the start of the 1st normal day of school in nearly a month. For the last 4 weeks there have been strikes, disruptions and holidays. The reasons I am not 100% sure but I know I don't mind. Have been spending my time surfing, writing letters, reading, listening to music, relax-

ing and eating.

8th Letter About 8 o'clock in the morning and I am in my Physic class, ugh! Hence the letter writing. It's officially winter now, but the sun is shining and it's about twenty degrees Centigrade. I am working on a winter suntan and go surfing in shorts and T shirt (no wet suits in Brazil). Brazil is an amazing country, the people are so friendly and laid back, but also there is a great hunger for the USA dollars and working conditions aren't easy. I feel the rich get richer and the poor just dig a hole to get poorer; the slums are something I could never have imagined. (Sorry Marcos)

Brazillian night life starts well after the sun has gone down and even formal school functions start at 11pm and go on until day break. It's not the typical NZ booze party; the Brazillian just love to socialise. How will I adapt to NZ hours? No wonder you think NZ is black at night, Esteban.

Latest Letter...Sept. I have been very lucky and have done a lot of travelling. Our AFS President is young and a returnee, so is keen for us to see and do as much as possible.

I hope to become involved in AFS when I return to NZ and give back to AFS a little of what has

been given to me.

I'm one of the minority that hasn't changed families - my brother Rogerio - is a brother, friend and father to me and will go beyond the point of duty for me. I am so lucky. My Portuguese is pretty good now and I can more or less read a newspaper, watch a video and last week I started reading a book. Have no problem holding a conservation with a small group of people, but still get lost in big crowds!

HOLA A TODOS!!!

Hello everybody!!! My name is Esteban Bravo and I come from a small city in the North West of Argentina. Its name is San Miguel de Tucuman and it is known as "The Garden of Argentina" because it has a splendid spring full of flowers. At that time of the year, you can find days over 30 C or 40 C and the streets are full of orange trees with flowers.

My school, in September, organises the "Student's week" with many types of competitions

between different schools.

My school starts at 7.00am and I have 11 compulsory subjects. Usually it finishes by 1:15pm and in the afternoon I go to a club to do sport. I used to do my homework at my friend's house and we studied all together. In the weekend I used to go to a disco with my friends and go back home in the morning.

I'm spending this year in New Zealand to help broaden my own life because day by day I'm doing a reflection of what I'm doing here and

what I did in my own country.

Not everything is perfect. I'm not happy everyday, but most of the time I am learning new experiences.

JOHN MITCHELL - FDC 1ST ALL BLACK





The New Zealand Pony Club Association takes part in a bi-annual Inter-Pacific Competition where teams from New Zealand, Japan, Hong Kong, Australia, America and Canada compete. To be selected for the Inter-Pacific team is one of the major goals of New Zealand Pony Clubers.
