





Recent publicity of a report prepared by the Post Primary Teachers Association suggests there is widespread disaffection with "Tomorrows Schools". I must confess to being puzzled by this claim, as from my own personal experience it seems that schools can be more responsive to the community's needs, and that the school community can actually help shape the school's direction. This was certainly not possible under the Education Board system, and I wonder if a comparison had been made of the old system with the new, what the outcome of the survey might have been. It is certainly true that the school's performance is subject to more scrutiny, and if this creates unease it is no less than the scrutiny being applied to all other sectors of the community, and schools cannot expect to be exempt from such scrutiny. Indeed, if the school is performing well it should welcome the opportunity to have that fact acknowledged, but if not, then it should not be able to hide behind the anonymity of a closed education system. Nobody claims "Tomorrows Schools" is perfect but it has certainly made schools more accountable and more responsive.

The challenge facing all schools as the competition for pupils "hots up" is to be a good provider of quality education, with the ability to change and be involved in innovative, creative ideas, which will provide the students with a sound springboard for their future.

Francis Douglas has taken up this challenge, and this year saw the completion of the new technology block funded by the school community. Computers across the curriculum is another thrust the school has accepted and progressed.

Brother Pat Lynch, in his new role as Executive Director of Catholic Education, has certainly challenged us to be schools of excellence, but at the same time not losing our essence as schools of "Special Character". We ignore that challenge at our peril, as more opportunities for alternative providers of education open up, and therefore it is essential that a sense of partnership exists between the Board,

teachers and parents, to ensure that the education offered is perceived to be excellent, and that Francis Douglas offers an environment to the student that permits the maximum development, both academically and personally. There is a crying need in our world for ethics, and in this regard this School should have a competitive edge, given its tradition and aspiration to the Good News of Jesus Christ.

The financial accounts disclose a deficit of \$13,848 after depreciation of \$62,022, compared with a surplus of \$1,398 after depreciation of \$39,287 in 1992. This result indicates the need for increased funding if schools are to meet the challenges leading to the millennium. The requirement for equipment replacement is highlighted by the depreciation provision, and recognises the short life of computers, both in real terms and from obsolescence. This result does not reflect the true deficit, and I must acknowledge the physical contribution of the Brothers Community in carrying out duties which would normally have to be funded from Government monies. This has enabled the school environment to be enhanced (eg carpeting of class rooms) because of their efforts, and is worthy of acknowledgment.

The Board is appreciative of the efforts of the Principal and his staff in providing an excellent standard of education to the pupils at the College. The work again produced results which should provide a sense of achievement to the teaching staff. Parents equally should feel pleased with the general standard being achieved.

I would like to thank Board Members for their support and enthusiasm in administering the School, and to thank the Bursar, office staff and ground and related staff to ensure the efficient operation of the College.

Special thanks to Father Tom Lawn for his valued input to Board meetings, and a warm welcome to Father David Bell as his replacement.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1993/94

The Catholic environment at Francis Douglas Memorial College where staff, students and parents co-operate and share the Good News and where our aim is to educate students for life is moving and growing positively among our College community. The challenges of new syllabuses (and drafts) posed to teachers and Heads of Departments is being met with enthusiasm and energy. Likewise the New Zealand Qualifications Authority Framework has increased awareness and challenge to staff, Board of Trustees and parents.

Quality Management systems and accountability to our community has given Heads of Departments and staff a renewed vigour to see what we are doing well and in what areas we can improve. Documentation of our Management System is under way. The College staff is in the process of writing Task Descriptions (Job Descriptions). The subject teacher and vertical form teacher task descriptions have been finalised. Class subjects, specialist subjects and extra curricular task descriptions are being worked on by individuals and groups concerned.

Curriculum:

Mr Richard Doherty, Dean Forms 1/2, is responsible for curriculum and management; in effect he is also Head of Department of this area. Work programmes in English, Maths, Social Studies and Science have been written so that definite content areas and skills are part of the curriculum. Extension work is available for those with ability. Our exchange with Sacred Heart College for cooking/sewing and woodwork is still very much part of the curriculum. Mr Doherty has made contact with local Intermediate Schools to share ideas and participate in cultural and sporting events. Introduction of languages in Forms 1 and 2 is being investigated.

Students in Form 3 attempt a wide range of subjects over their year. The core subjects, English, Maths, Science, Religious Education, Physical Education, Social Studies are taught for the whole year - and Workwork, Graphics, Agriculture, Horticulture, Art, Music, Business Skills, Keyboard Skills for half a year each. Languages (French/Maori) are options.

Form 4 students have the choice of two out of six options for their studies. Again core subjects are compulsory. Some students change about Easter if their original option choices have not worked out. About two-thirds of the Form 4 group attended Topec Outdoor Education courses. Forms 3 and 4 English classes are broad banded - a type of streaming. There is a top English class and a smaller one for those students who need extra attention. The other two classes are of similar ability levels. A reading programme exists in Forms 1 to 4 with the concentration being in Form 3 and 4. Mrs Margaret Milne is in charge of the reading tutor programme. Mrs Milne organises about 60 individual programmes for students on a weekly basis. Support for the programme comes from parent volunteers, staff and Form 7 students who volunteer to be Reading Tutors. This programme is highly successful. Increased self-esteem and reading ability of students is very noticeable - a positive influence in the College.

Our Form 5 students are asked to do six subjects - most students are able to cope with this. Maori has been re-introduced this year and with a new teacher is proving to be a success. The fully internally assessed subjects, English, Mathematics and Science have shown that for Francis Douglas Memorial College it has been a good move. Overall the students are working more consistently and the School Certificate results (and averages compared with the state average) have improved. Link and Polytechnic Courses are still part of the Form 5 programme.

Form 6 Certificate students have good options to choose from. However Polytech courses and other alternative training programmes are providing challenges for teachers, Heads of Departments and Administration. We have to be seen to be competitive with our course options in the future.

This year in Form 7 we added two new subjects - Classical Studies and Health and P.E. Studies. Also added was an extra Chemistry class. These additions created a little pressure on staff allocation, however it enabled students to have more options at the Form 7 level.

This year we have 14 students following these courses -

Three Form 7 students are completing short courses with the Open Polytech in Wellington.

Technology Suite:

The construction of a new Graphics classroom and the renovation of the Woodwork area has improved our Technology facilities. The Graphics area is now computerised. The Woodwork machinery is now enclosed and a dust extracting system has been installed and this has provided a much needed resource. The new ceiling has reduced the noise problem. Thanks to the Board of Trustees for the support with this venture.

Class Sizes

The size of most classes in the College ranges from 25 - 30. This is proving to be an acceptable number. Some practical classes are big in number and ways to improve this situation are being discussed. Our Form 1 and 2 classes are in the low 20's.

Staffing

At present the College has 26 full time teachers and 9 parttime teachers on staff. There are 10 ancilliary staff, office, teacher aides, library, caretaker and handyman. There are four new staff members this year, including a former College Captain in his first year of teaching, Mr Andrew Murray.

Boarding Hostel:

The Hostel is a vital part of the College Community and has the respect of both the parents and the boys. The facilities are first class and are warm and homely. Brother Anthony Hawkins, the Boarding Master, and Mrs Margaret Fleming the Matron, have the confidence and support of the students there. Brothers, lay staff and outside supervisors are involved in the Hostel. A supportive domestic staff, the positive attitude of the students and the guidance and work of the supervisors makes the Hostel a viorant and enjoyable place. Regular meetings are held with parents on the Hostel Management Board and with parents of boarders in areas fromwhich boarding students come to the College. The present number of boarders is 95.

Brother Oliver's and Brother Gregory's contribution to the College is excellent - the beautification of the College is a result of much hard work.

Work Experience:

This year to date 100 plus students have had at least one day or more work experience around Taranaki and some beyond! Mrs Vonda Montgomery is organising this experience for Forms 5, 6 and 7 students - the experience and reports from employers is extremely positive.

Cultural Involvement

Our annual college speech contest was held in the first term and the standard was high. The College was represented in the O'Shea Speech and Drama Competition in Wellington as well.

Students are preparing for the Taranaki Speech & Drama Festival as well as participating in the recent Shakespearian Festival. October 1993 saw two evenings when the talent of the College was "on show" - individual items, groups, music, song, drama and dance - this was well supported by College parents and friends. This year it is hoped to move to a more 'up market' venue.

Music

Ms Yvonne Van Lent is encouraging boys in both choir and instrumental work. Seventy students, mostly seniors, were involved in the Taranaki Secondary Schools Music Festival. In the past 12 months Jazz, Country and Western and Pop groups have performed. The college concert band is practising regularly.

Staff

Staff are becoming more familiar with the College reporting system on the computer -confidence is growing. All staff now are doing their reports on the computer - some are now preparing lessons as well as storing information for teaching purposes

Staff Inservice

- (i) All staff have the opportunity and are encouraged to attend Professional Development courses in their subject teaching areas.
- (ii) At the beginning of the school year (1994) the staff attended a second session on philosophy and teaching styles of St John De La Salle as part of the Catholic character of the college Brother Owen Mason was the facilitator.
- (iii) At the beginning of the second term 1994 all the staff attended a seminar on Creative Learning Styles looking at their own personal learning systles and that of students they teach.
- (iv) Twelve staff members have been involved in school/ business links - these staff have worked for a day or more in a business to see how school and business may be able to help and learn from each other.
- (v) A number of staff members are completing courses extramurally.

Results

The 1993 School Certificate results were very pleasing with 67 percent of all individual subjects sat receiving a mark of more than 50 percent. Most impressive was the fact that the means for Science and Mathematics exceeded 60 percent, more than 7 percentage points above the national mean. The 1993 Bursary candidates produced 7 'A' and 10 'B' bursary passes which meant 60 percent of candidates gained bursary passes. Eighty-four percent of the bursary candidates gained University Entrance Qualification. Students of the College have always acquitted themselves well in tertiary study and this trend has continued with Massey University reporting 83 percent pass rate in subjects sat in 1993 for our past students.

Promotion of Hostel and College:

In 1994 the College has held an Open Day for present and prospective parents - two more afternoons are being planned for new students as well. The College and Administration personnel are open for visits from parents at any time - there is no particular enrolment month or date. Local media items promote the good things which are happening within the College.

Hostel - Again this year visits to local Taranaki Parishes and schools are being organised by Mrs Liz O'Sullivan. Parents and the Principal speak at Masses and meet with interested parents after Mass. Parent involvement in promotion has had a tremendous effect and has been very positive.

Roll: The College roll at present is 480. Staff are involved in visiting feeder schools and are becoming more aware of the importance of maintaining and improving standards.

De La Salle Brothers. The community of Brothers numbers six at present. Brother Anthony Hawkins joined the staff as Boarding Master and part-time teacher. Brother Anthony has made an impact on the students and staff in a very positive way. Brother Geoffrey, as Director of the Community is to be thanked for his strong support, witness and encouragement. So too Brother William whose management of the farm is an asset to the College.

Sports Activities

Eighty percent of College students play in some sports team - a result of positive encouragement from staff and having competent teachers and parents involved - thanks to all staff and parents involved especially Mr John George (Sportsmaster), Mrs Elyne Plumb(Basketball) and Mr Graeme Mustchin (Soccer). Many individual and team performances have been highlighted in newsletters and the college magazine.

Strategic Plan

The Board of Trustees are looking at developing a Strategic Plan for the College. This is now in process with an intial organisation meeting called by Mr Colin Comber from the Board of Trustees. Two members from the Board of Trustees, Staff, P.T.A. and students have been asked to be part of the group which looks at developing a Strategic Plan.

Parent/Teacher Association

Thanks to the association for the continued support, loyalty and encouragement. Margaret Bowling, Janis Little and Jill Watson and the executive are to be congratulated for the time and energy and enthusiasm of the P.T.A. The Gala Day was a great success for the new group. The financial support the P.T.A. gives the College is much appreciated and adds good facilities to the College - improvements to the gym is the next on the agenda.

Acknowledgements

Thanks to the staff for their contribution to Francis Douglas Memorial College. The professionalism, sensitivity and extras that is evident makes the College a very good place to be part of. The students respond positively and participate and contribute when invited and this is good news.

Parental support is there when needed and the College is seen to be fulfilling our community's needs. Many thanks for the support and loyalty of our boarding hostel parents.

A special thanks to the Board of Trustees for their support and encouragement of me personally. The College is growing and improving in a positive way. I believe we are very much living out our Mission Statement. The challenges that face us in the next twelve months with Management Systems, Strategic Planning and the Qualifications Framework will be faced with confidence, professionalism and energy.















ACHIEVEMENTS



Brother Peter Bray

Br Peter Bray was a first day pupil at the College and then taught here for five years in the early 1970's. He returned as principal in 1979 and remained in that position until the end of 1990. After a year in Australia in 1991 he was accepted into the doctoral program at the University of San Diego in California in January 1992. During 1992 and 1993 he followed fourteen different courses. All of these related to leadership in an attempt to gain a better understanding of what things influenced people doing leadership. After completing comprehensive exams in August 1993, Br Peter devoted his attention full time to writing his dissertation. He had begun working on it earlier when he started doing research in a school in northern California. The title of his dissertation was Leadership in a Quality School in which he examined the leadership processes that occurred in a school as it underwent significant changes. He completed his dissertation early in March and publicly defended it on 25 March 1994. As a result of his work in the courses he followed and the quality of his dissertation, Br Peter received the outstanding student award from the University.


SIDS YOUNG ENTERPRISE COMPANY

FOURTH GRADE BENAUD



IN MEMORIAM

Stephen Anderson

A POWERFUL TESTIMONY OF FAITH IN BATTLE AGAINST CANCER

In April this year a young man was buried in the small Bay of Plenty town of Waihi. He lives on in the memories of many people, and also in the powerful testimony of faith that he wrote during his eight month battle with cancer.

"My feet have travelled many thousands of miles already," wrote 21-year-old Stephen Anderson, thinking of his years working on the land, and his love for tramping in the bush. "Please God, may they have many more thousands of miles left in them yet." Stephen wrote these words earlier this year while confined to bed in Waikato Hospital, stricken with an acute and deadly form of hormonal cancer. Stephen was indeed to travel far, though not on foot, before his death in April: around the world on a pilgrimage to Lourdes, and deep into his own spirit on a journey towards God, who for Stephen was "No. 1".

When Stephen set out on his own for Lourdes, his illness was already diagnosed as terminal, chemotherapy and a bone marrow transplant having failed to halt the rapid advance of the cancer. Of course he hoped for the miracle that didn't happen, but more than that, he wanted to place his complete trust in God, accepting that "God will have the last say".

Perhaps the most extraordinary thing about Stephen was his ordinariness. He grew up in Waihi, the eldest child of a large, very close and loving family, whom he was to appreciate more and more as his illness advanced. Other loves included the land, his rugby and his mates. He was a talented artist, and expressed through his drawings some of the experiences of serious illness that had suddenly turned his life upside down. He also discovered a gift for writing, and left a remarkable record of his faith, hope and love written in hospital, lying on his side, often too weak to hold the pen steady.

His wide grin, and love of people young and old won him many friends and some exciting experiences, such as the time when, at the instigation of Matthew Cooper, the Ranfurly Shield-winning Waikato team took "the log" up to Ward 26 and left it in Stephen's care for a day while he was undergoing treatment. Members of the Waikato team, including several All Blacks, travelled to Waihi to support one of the many benefit events organised by the community to help cover the costs incurred by Stephen's illness, a sign of gratitude for the many hours he had spent on youth work and coaching junior rugby.

Stephen's writings reveal a courageous young man coming to terms with the meaning of life and death. "Fighting cancer has made me wonder what to do with my life; I'd like to get a good job farming, have a family, travel, help people, play sport." He considered the possibility of becoming a priest.

While outwardly he faced the consequences of his illness with humour and courage, in his writing his anguish found expression: "My life has a lot to offer this world yet, please God. I am young, and there's a whole world out there I'd like to - want to - see, discover and help."

Even as Stephen longed for life, his confidence that God had a plan for him enabled him to accept the possibility of dying. Over and over again he wrote of God's love for him, and of the gifts God gave him. The cancer, he said, was a way for him to know and love God more deeply. He realised that suffering, and there was plenty, could be a form of "training", so that he could fulfil the special purpose for which God had given him life. "God has committed some work to me which he has not committed to another." Used to the discipline of sporting codes, he wrote: "I need to keep checking myself in various situations. I say to God: 'Am I doing OK?"

The inner journey of Stephen Anderson was every bit as difficult as the outer struggle against the ravages of cancer. "Having faith is hard at times. You don't get a reply as such. My illness seems to rule my life at present; it can make me a bit selfish and lazy, and I have to fight to remain positive."

A significant memory for Stephen was a visit to Samoa with a group of young Catholics in 1993 to help with the building of a school. Deeply impressed with the simplicity and faith of the people there, he wrote: "There are lights flickering everywhere." On his return to New Zealand he found "lights are harder to light here". He was saddened that in his beloved homeland he might be laughed at if he openly proclaimed his Christian faith.

For a young man who loved nothing better than to wander off into the bush, often with other family members, the days in hospital were hard to bear. He found the environment alienating, and was distressed when inevitably his hair fell out following chemotherapy. But even then he could say: "When I look out, I see people with far more difficult crosses to bear, but we have to bear the cross positively, even happily." The heavier the load, said Stephen, the more we can call on God's help. And always there was the note of gratitude for God's goodness, rather than anger at what had happened to him. "So much good is happening around me. This cancer is make me open my eyes to see how fortunate I am."

Rugby was never far from Stephen's mind, as much a part of his faith as of his life. Sport, he said, is a great way to practise Christian values. "A win at all costs is a sad and negative aspect of competitive sport. I try to play fairly as if God was our coach."


By March this year Stephen knew there was not much more time, but he was determined to live every last moment to the full. On 2 April he set off alone across the world to Lourdes, visiting his sisters Michelle and Fiona in Australia on the way, and meeting up with his sister Cushla in London. He hoped to be away for three months. In fact he barely made it to Lourdes, where his illness suddenly took a turn for the worse. He and Cushla returned to London, where he died in hospital several days later. His mother Irene had just time to fly from New Zealand to spend the last hours with him. He was able to say goodbye to his father John and other members of his family by telephone.

Stephen wasn't cured, but his hundreds of relatives, friends and acquaintances testify that he left many, many lights, and an extraordinary legacy of courage and faith.
