An excellent season produced high achievements for all players with Ben Siffleet being selected in the New Plymouth U' 14 representative team.

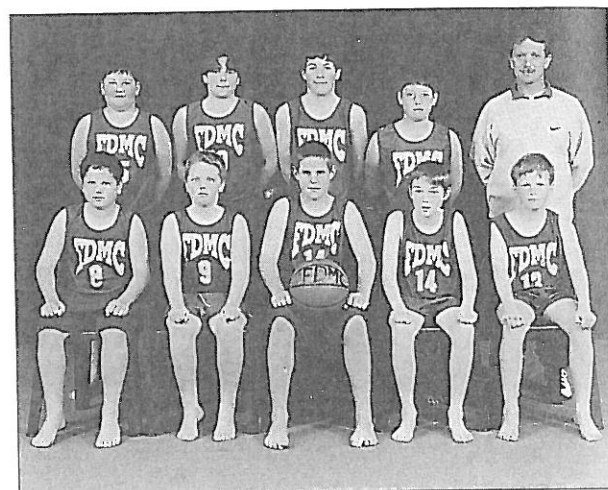

Soccer 1999

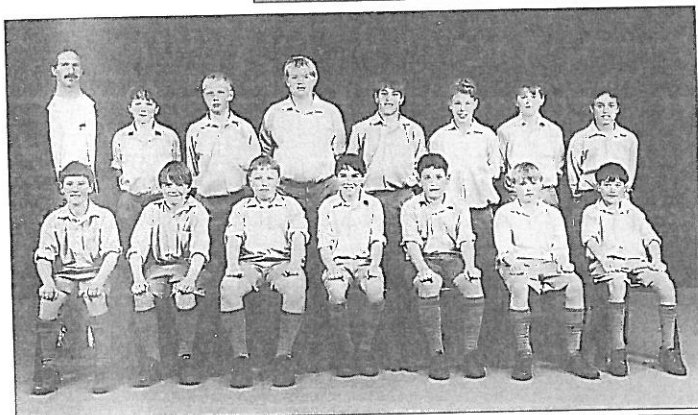

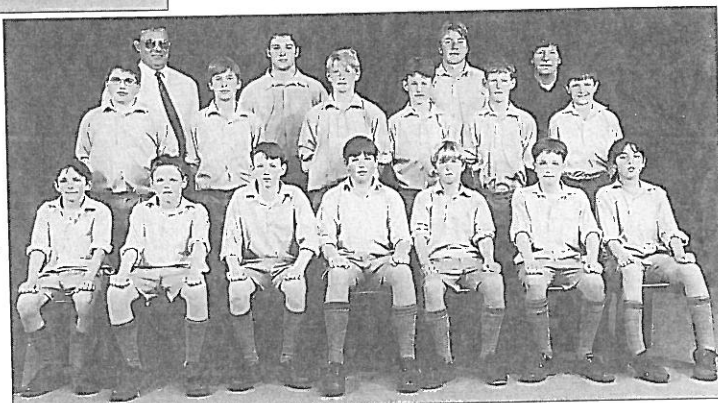

Cycling

Hayden Silby was a sole representative in the North Island Secondary School cycling championships which were held in Ngaruawahia, June 27. The under 15 grade was raced on a 2.5 km circuit, over 20 km. Hayden was with the leading bunch as they approached the home straight and had it not been for being run off the road, coming into the straight, he was looking likely for a top five placing at least.

Hayden is a promising and dedicated young cyclist and we expect to see some very good results from him in the future.

Sunday, 25 July saw us enter a four-person team in the Taranaki Secondary Schools Time Trial championships. The team event was raced over a distance of 16 km. Our team of Tom Mace, Scott McGregor, Jason Chandler and Hayden Silby caused an upset in winning the event for the first time. They beat their main rivals NPBHS by approximately two minutes.

Francis Douglas Memorial College have been very fortunate to be represented in the run/cycle/swim and/or kayak events over the past few years by such talented athletes as Tom, Scott and Jason. We wish them well for the future.

Nathan Cleaver competed in the 8 km Individual time trial race and despite his being relatively new to cycling, he rode in a very determined manner to achieve second place. Well done.

Mountain Biking

A small but dedicated group of mountain bikers exists within the College and they have been very busy competing in various events throughout the year, both locally and throughout the North Island.

In particular congratulations must go to Scott Logan, Glenn Johnson and Andre Stanway for their victory in the Taranaki Secondary Schools Championships which were held at Lake Mangamahoe on Sunday, 22 August. This event is raced as a continuous relay for 2 hours over a 2.5 km circuit, with each team member taking every third lap. Against much more senior opposition they convincingly won the event by several minutes, lapping all but one team in the process. A great result!

Other Results were gained from the New Zealand Secondary Schools Mountain Bike Championships. These were held in Levin, 10 and 11 April

Mountain Biking General

New Zealand Secondary Schools Mountain Biking Championships were held at Levin on the 10th and 11th April. There were three events, each divided into senior (under 19), intermediate (under 16) and junior (under 14), and then into boys and girls. No juniors from FDMC competed. The three events were cross country, uphill and downhill. Championship points were awarded to students who competed in all three events.

The cross country course, 35 km for the seniors and 28 km for the intermediates, was through undulating pine forest with a sand base, with no downhill sections to rest on. This was a tough course taking about 1.5 hours for the best. The uphill was 2.5 km of steep metal track that has to be seen to be believed, the quickest completing it in just over 11 minutes (almost a minute quicker than the next fastest time). The downhill was 2 km down a forestry track with jumps, chicanes, drop-offs, off camber corners and speed straights. Some competitors claimed to reach up to 70 km per hour. The intermediates blitzed the field, taking the top four fastest times of the day and almost breaking 3 minutes.

Our Boys

Nine students from FDMC competed and all worked hard with a podium finish for Tom Mace. The results are great when you consider that the competitors at this event are the top junior mountain bikers from all over New Zealand. Any top ten finish is a great achievement with many placings being decided by split seconds.

1999 Mountain Biking by: Matt King and Mike Reader

At 9:30 on Saturday morning the first races of the New Zealand Secondary Schools Champs of 1999 started. The track was at Waitare Beach just north of Levin. The terrain was pine forest with a very sandy base which became deeper and deeper as the race went on.

With a field of 85 competitors in the senior class our most respectable placings were Tom Mace 5th place and Matt King 11th place. In the intermediate class there was a field of 145 competitors with Andre Stanway placed 25th and the next two closest being Heath Kemp 47th and Scott Logan 50th. Each lap was approximately 7 km in distance with the seniors completing 5 laps and the intermediate boys doing 4 laps.

The next morning after successfully eating 3 kg of raspberry licorice and devouring many cans of creamed rice we had the uphill event. This consisted of a gut wrenching 2 km uphill slog on a metal road. In the senior class only Tom Mace and Matt King competed, with Tom gaining an impressive sixth place and Matt putting an extremely good effort of 16th out of 53 competitors. Our best result in the intermediate uphill was from Scott Logan who was placed 33rd out of a pack of 82 riders.

Next came the down hill which was approximately 2.3

km of open fast track which was quite pedally the whole way down. The seniors went first with Mike Reader 9th, Nick Shepherd 10th, Matt King 20th, Tom Mace 30th and Matt Sarten 66th out of 86 riders. For the intermediate boys it was their first big downhill and they all raced very well with Andre Stanway placed 13th, Scott Logan 18th, Heath Kemp 43rd and Ben Sarten 104th out of 141 riders.

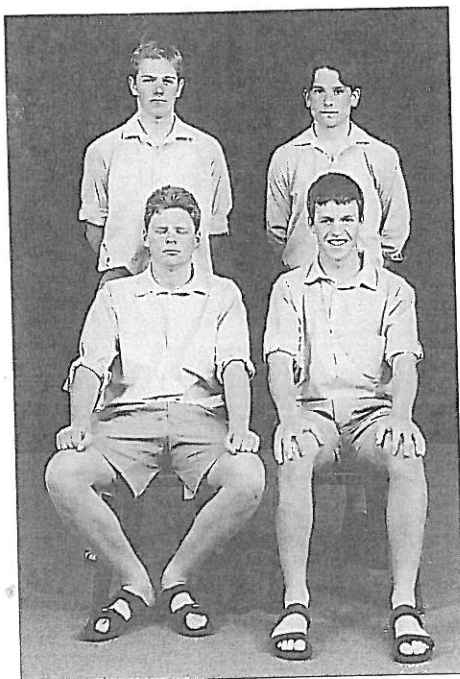
At the end of the weekends events the overall points were added up and Tom Mace competed extremely well to earn himself a fourth overall placing. Matt King pulled out a good effort with his 7th overall placing in the senior division. In the intermediate standings Andre Stanway placed 22nd, Scott Logan 27th and Tamatoa Rima 53rd.

Some people on the trip missed out on championship points because of not competing in all three events, which is what was required for series points. Thanks to Brian Reader and Fred King for the transport and organisation which got the boys to the events.

Later in the year, in October, Mike Reader competed in the North Island Secondary Schools Mountain Bike Champs. The race was held in Wanganui at Lismore forest. Transport to the top was very slow and delayed so only three practice runs were possible. The track was approximately 2.5 km long consisting of fast open terrain and tight technical tracks through forestry. At the end of the day Mike pulled out a 2nd place in the senior division.

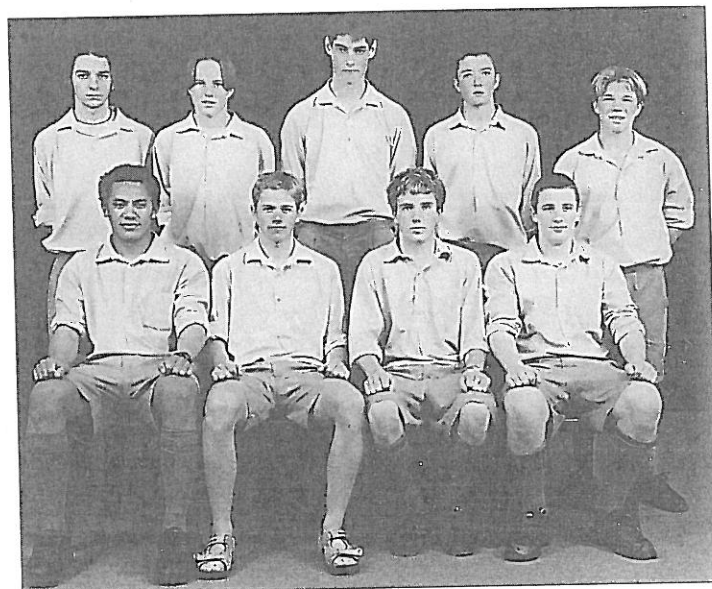

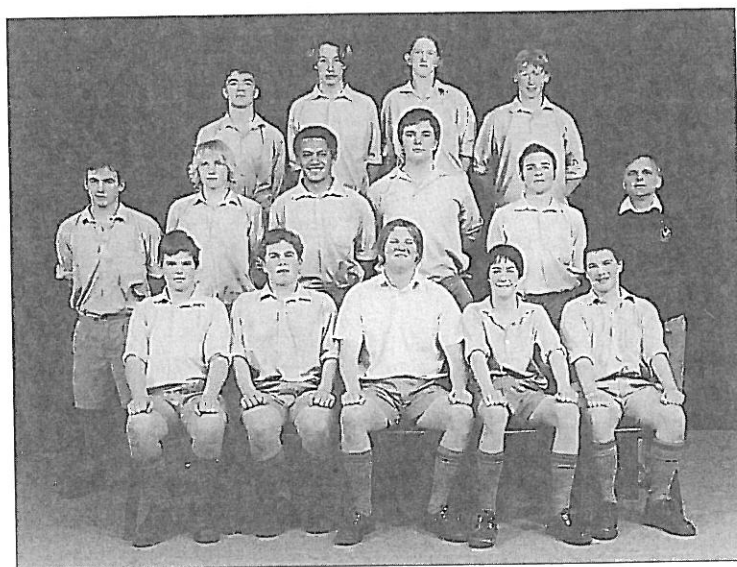

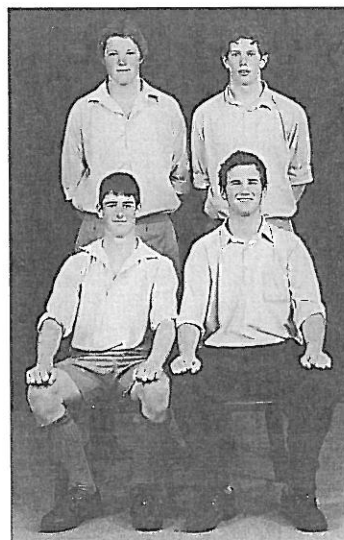
Within the College, junior and senior champions have just recently been found. In the junior section James McSeveny outplayed Kieran Bourke for a 9 - 2 victory while Patrick

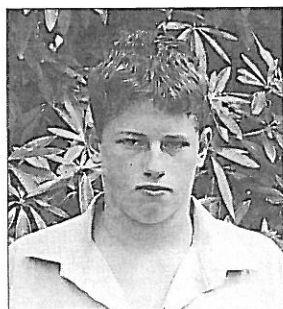

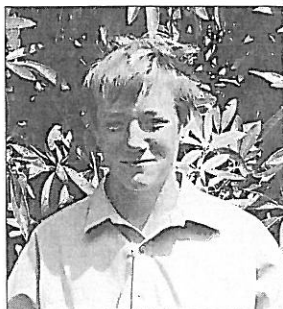
Year 9 & 10 Taranaki Secondary School Tennis Doubles Championships

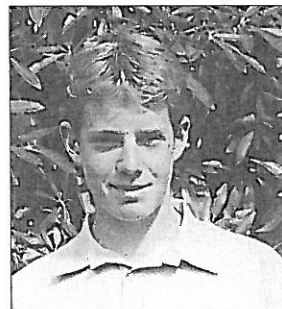

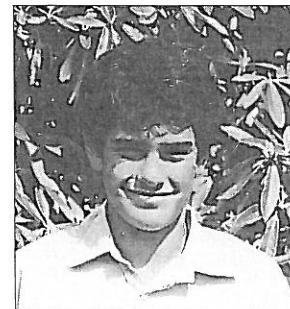

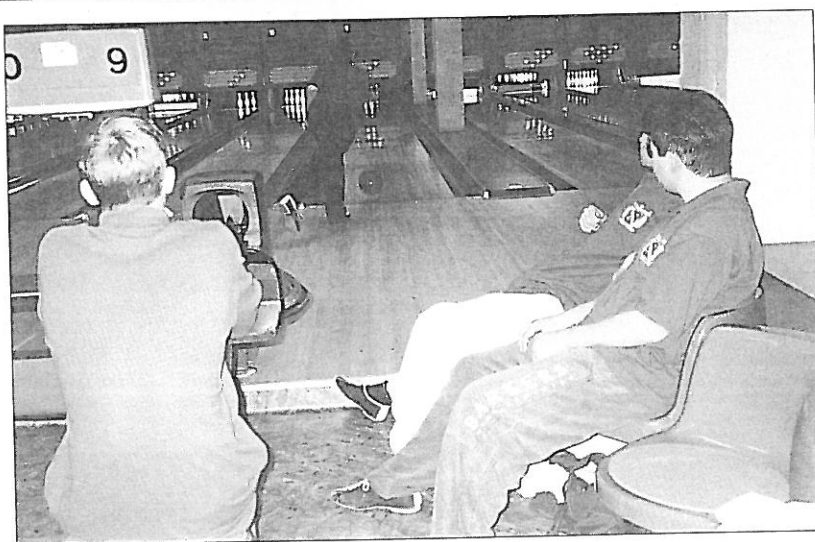
Ten Pin Report

After dabbling in kayaking in 1998 to keep my paddling fitness up for the surf season, I decided to put all my efforts into it in 1999.



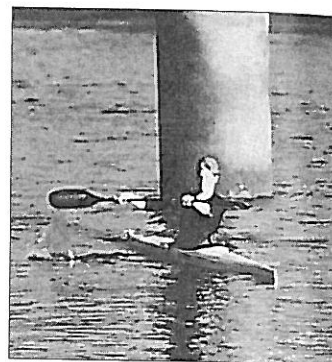

Ski and Snowboarding Report

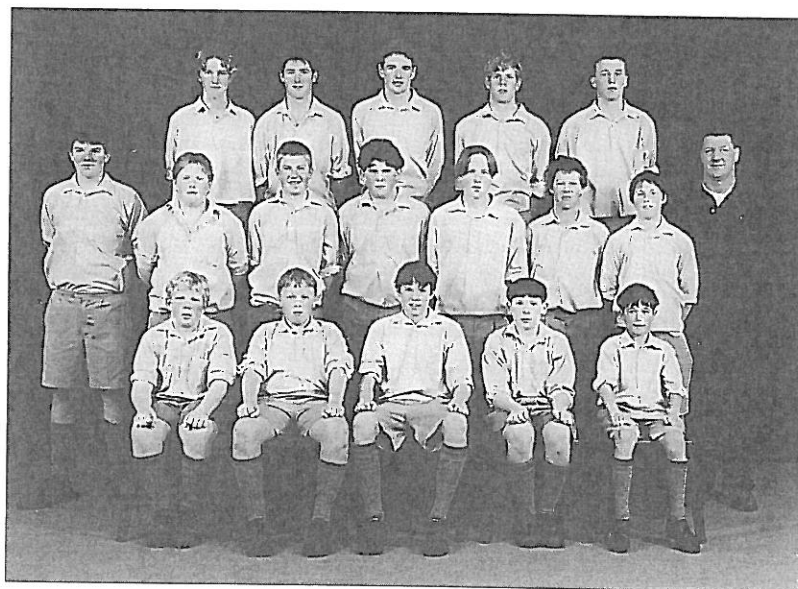

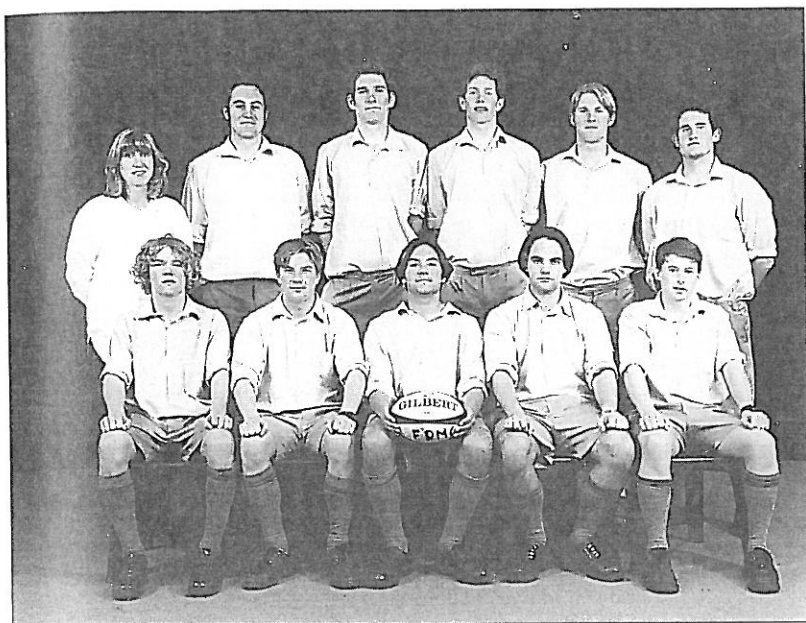
Indoor Bowls Report by: David Gollan

His caring and compassionate nature makes him an asset to any cast. Another regular on the series is St Joseph's parish priest Father Craig, who together with Sacred Heart's Youth Chaplain Margo LaBerge, bring energy and their own valuable perspective to each scene.

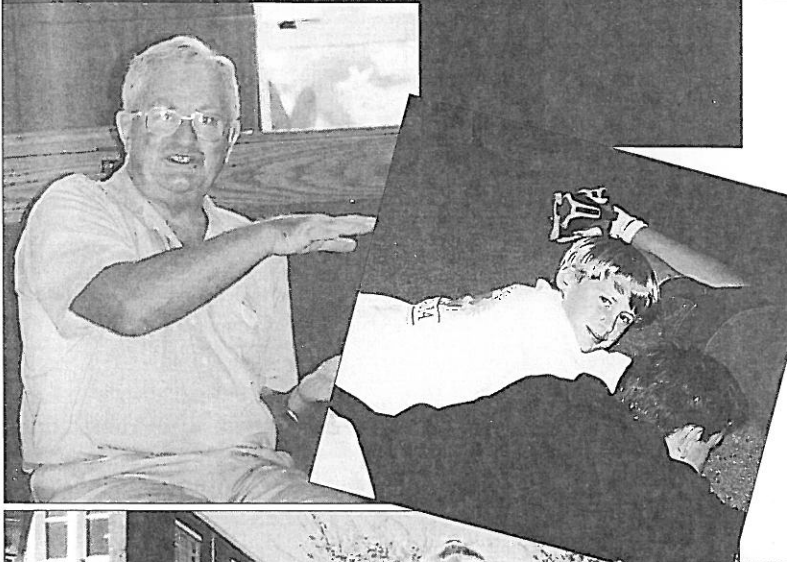
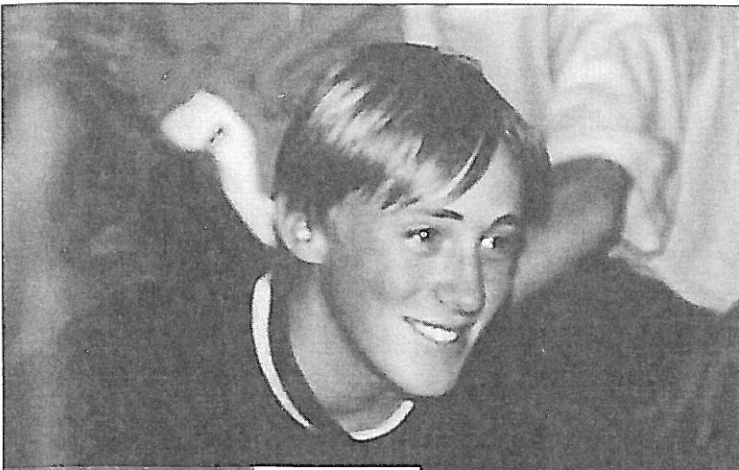

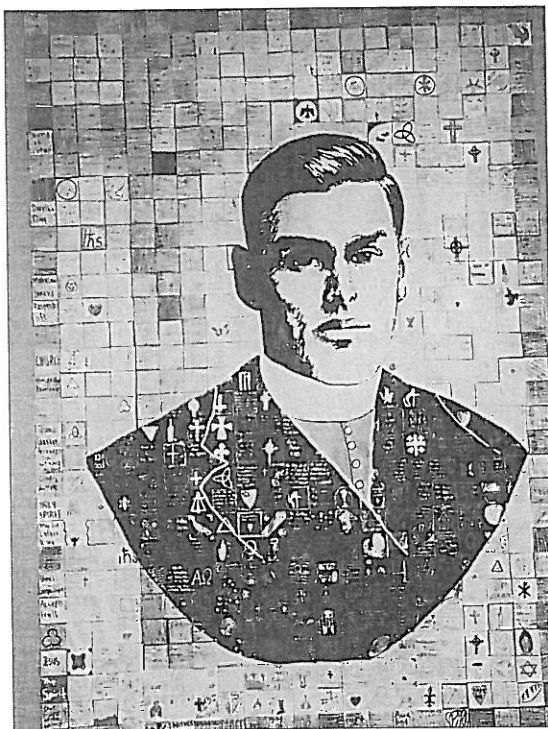




Religious Education Report

While writing this I asked some boys about other things they enjoyed. The replies went a little like this:

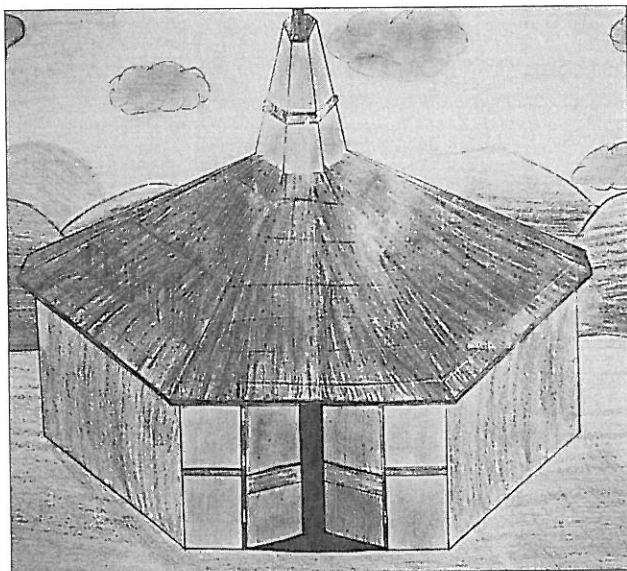

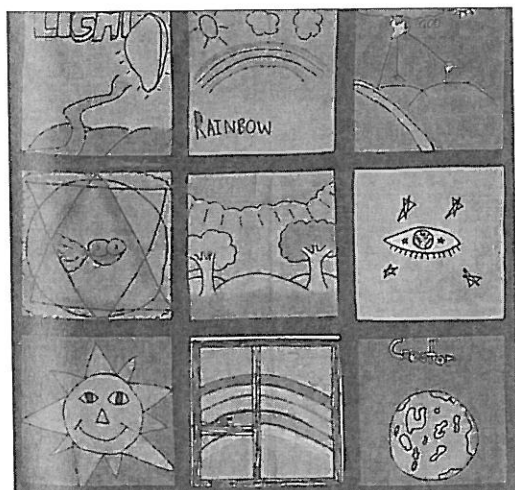
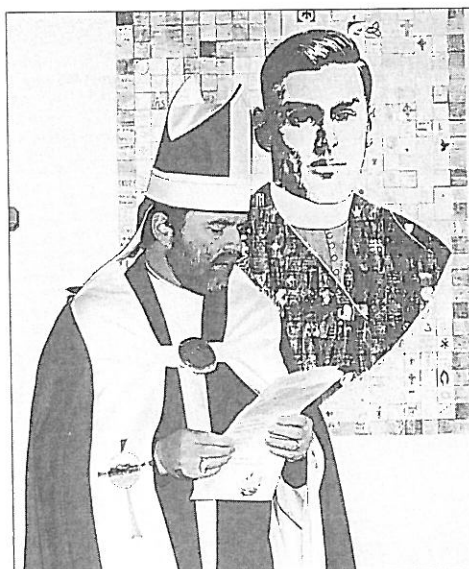
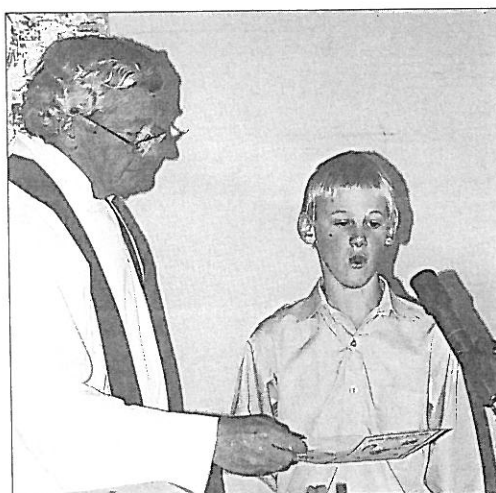
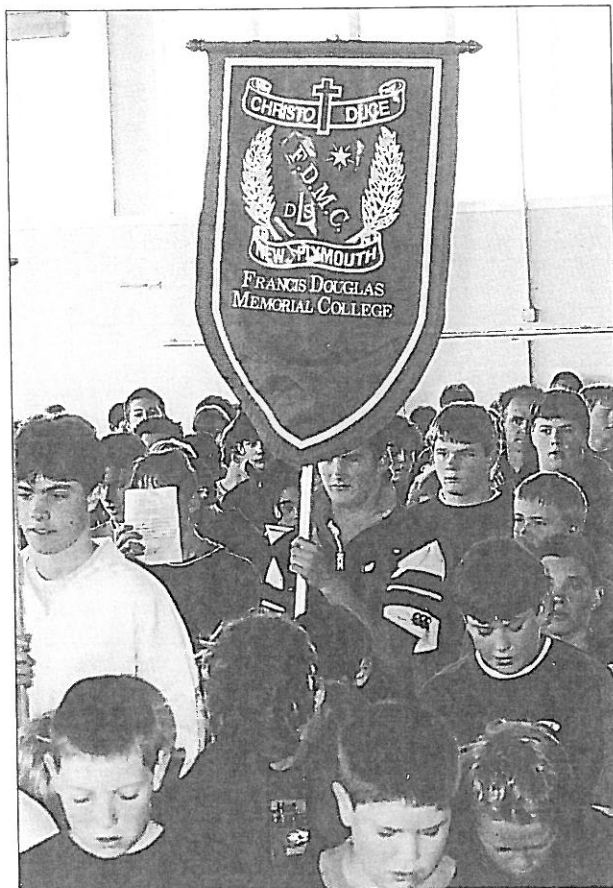
Religious Education Report

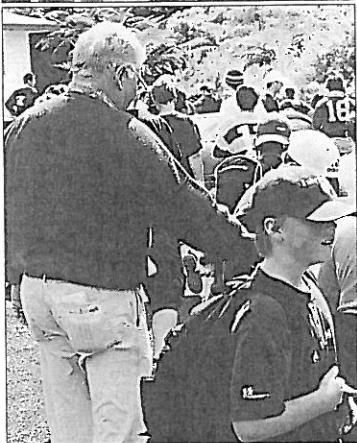
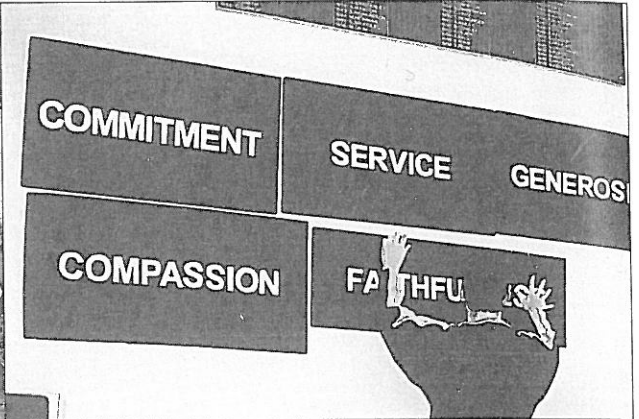

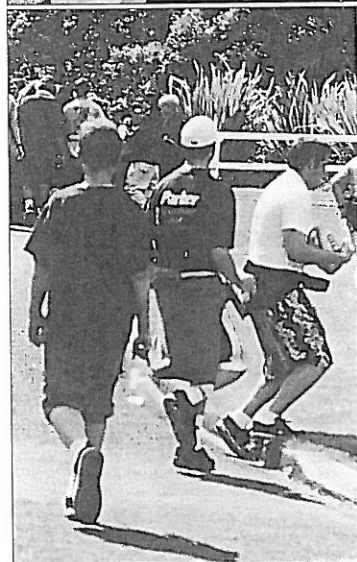


MISSION ACTION DAY

STAR:

Secondary Tertiary Alignment Resource has been used effectively in a range of curriculum areas offering students a number of non-conventional programmes while still at school. Students can be gaining credits towards National Qualifications while still at school.

This year STAR funding has enabled students to experience a wide range of exciting opportunities. Year 10 students along with Year 12 students have had a chance to experience Taranaki Polytechnic courses in welding, carpentry, automotive, architectural drafting, programmable logic controllers, chainsaw skills, forestry, horticulture and panel beating. These courses give students a "Taster". Year 10 students also had a chance to undertake scuba diving and snorkelling with Taranaki Underwater. Agricultural courses have been purchased from Taranaki and

Agricultural Conservation in conjunction with a school programme offered by Michael Parsons.

Exciting opportunities were made available for a group of budding photographers in a photographic and darkroom course ran by Kevin Capon.

Other courses run from STAR funding have included First Aid, hospitality and catering, welding, horticulture, computing and Open Polytech courses in Travel and Tourism, engineering and workplace skills.

Work exploration programmes have also been funded from this resource. Many students get great opportunities and benefits from STAR. Our aim is to make real experiences available to students while at school.

Careers:

The Career Centre has been a busy little hub of the College this year. The students at FDMC have taken full advantage of this facility and the resources available to them recognising that gaining knowledge about future careers and training is to their advantage. Tertiary training is expensive these days and wrong decisions can be costly.

Ms Land encourages all students, even junior students, to begin to explore ideas, their interests, values, skills and strengths. Students should follow their dreams, prepare themselves and do reality checks while they are at school. Achievement at school may be crucial in terms of gaining entry to your career choice, and its the learning that happens right through your years at FDMC that puts students where they want to be and lines them up for where they want to go.

The Careers Centre has several computer programmes that can assist students with the exploration process. Help

and support is readily available in all areas from specific course information, work skills, mentoring, CV's and organisation of work exploration.

Mrs Wackrow has organised many students in meaningful work exploration opportunities this year. Students find this 'work shadowing' experience a chance to find out about particular careers, sometimes they even find out that it is a job they would hate to do - so learning is alive.

We have visited many universities and polytechs as well as having a range of speakers from the workplace and training programmes. Senior students are urged next year to go along on as many opportunities as possible and find out what is out there. Think outside the square!

Both Year 10 and Year 12 students have had work exploration opportunities and programmes have operated at levels 10 to 13 informing students about careers.

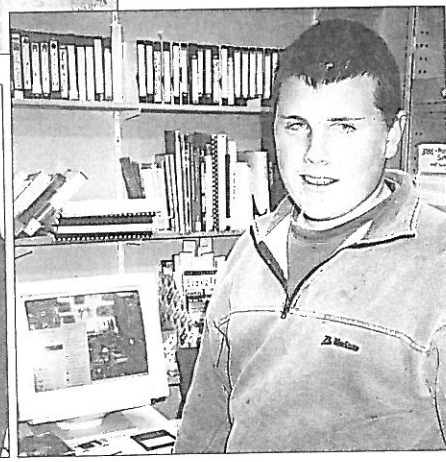
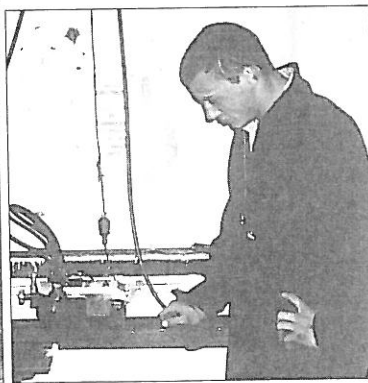
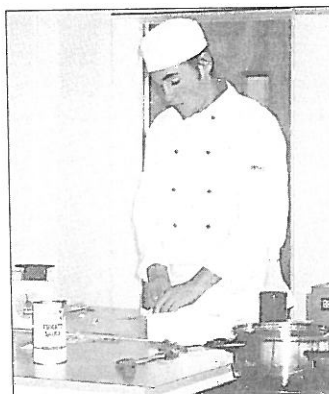
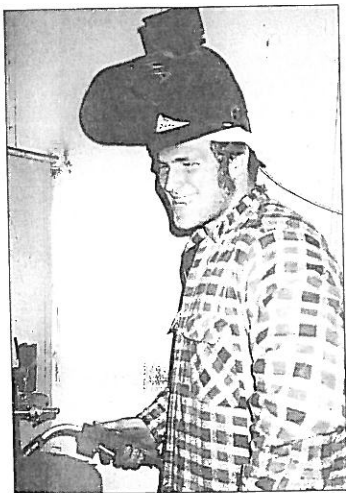
Career Pathways Programme has had a successful first year. This programme caters for Year 12 and 13 students who want an alternative pathway to the academic to get to their next step in either training or work.

The year began with 16 students once a week going to Sport Taranaki for adventure based learning such as kayaking, tramping, abseiling, basically co-operative and team building skills. All students went to Practical Education Training Centre and under took cooking as a lifeskill. Some chose to take this on to a higher level of cheffing and restaurant service skills throughout the year. Other students chose their own pathways in welding/engineering skills with Alpha Training, horticulture with ILP and computers at Practical Education. All providers are NZQA accredited. In some instances this has also been combined with Open Polytech distance learning to complement their particular area. There has also been an extensive work exploration component.

The vast majority of students grasped this opportunity with

both hands, seeing it as a fantastic chance to gain skills, credits towards National Certificates, experience and workplace knowledge. This programme has provided them with a launching pad into future careers. Along the way some students have found their forte. One student acquired a greenkeepers apprenticeship, others have gone onto training in welding and computing and some students have found paid employment. The students who have stayed on throughout the year are focussed on training programmes in Taranaki, Wellington, Christchurch and Auckland.

Career Pathways Programme 2000 (CP2) will be looking to individualise programmes as far as practical and possible for individual students equipping them for the workplace, further training and life in general. Already plans are under way to include automotive, agriculture and possibly Maori language - Te Reo for students who are interested. Students need to be enthusiastic, committed to school and reliable as these are essential if they are to achieve their potential in the programme.

The Teacher Only Day for professional development in Kaupapa Maori was held at Oakura Marae on Thursday 12th and Friday 13th August.

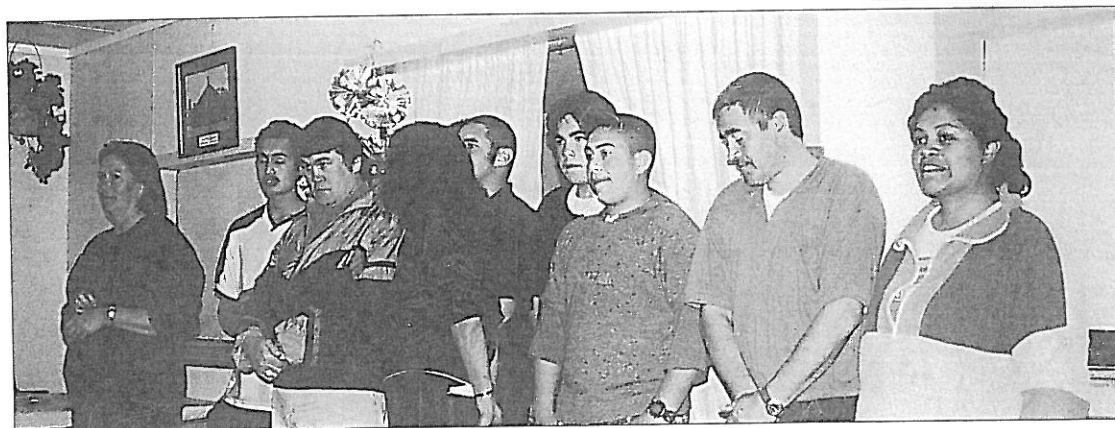
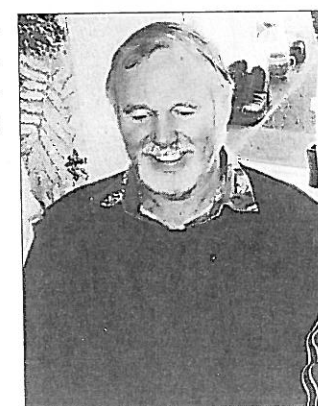
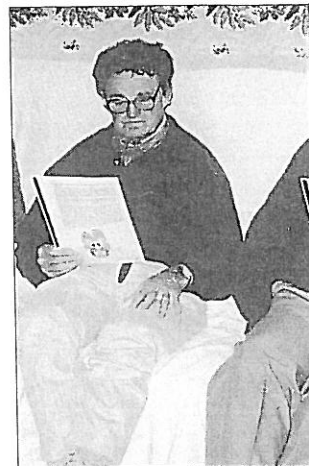

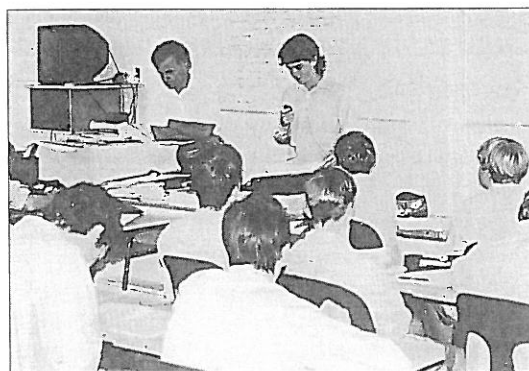
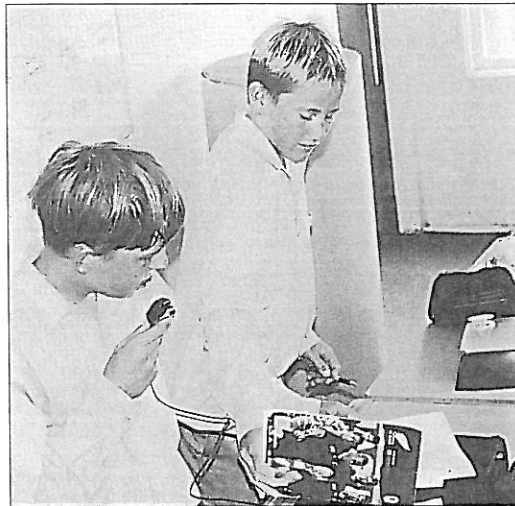
The Big Business Corporation included the following businesses:

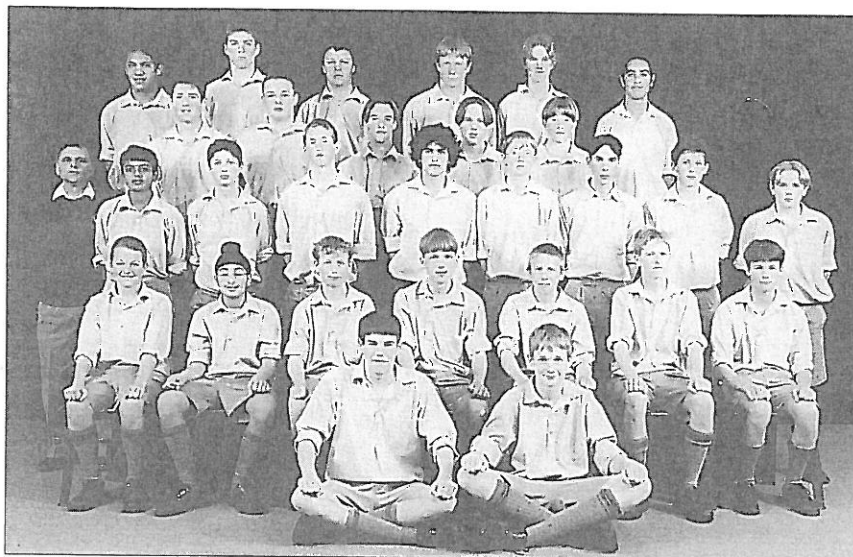
The C4U Corporation included the following businesses:

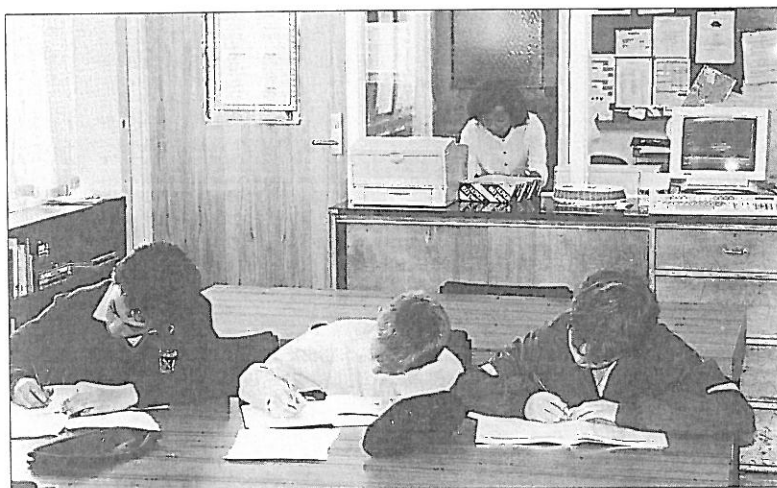

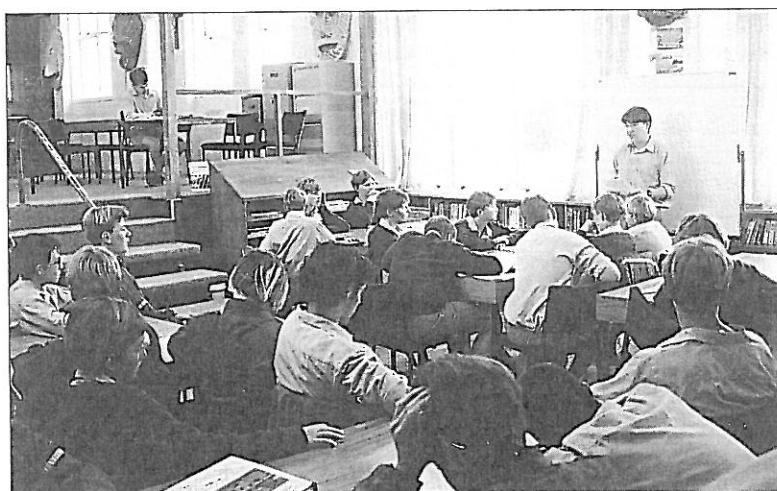

In its first full year of operation the student council spent much of its time deciding on its actual roles and responsibilities within the college.

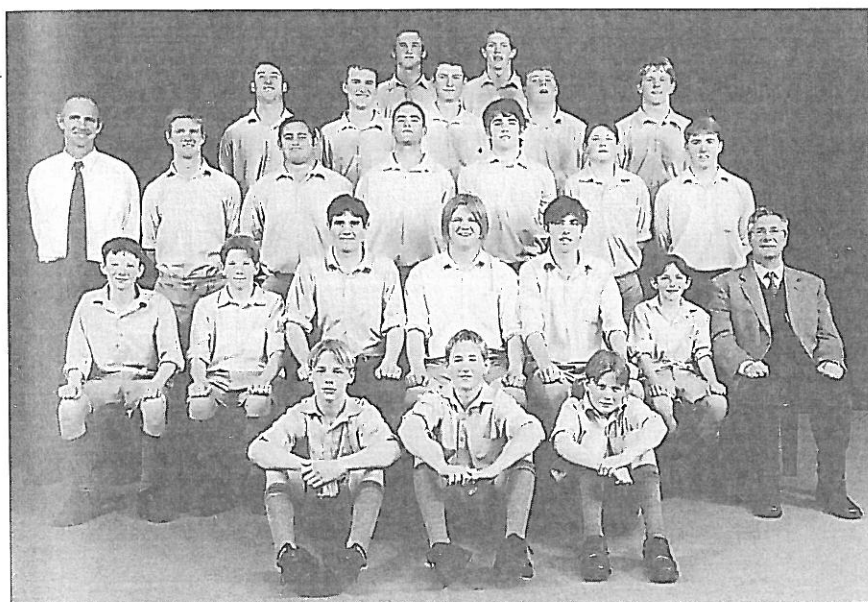

When approaching New Zealanders proceed with extreme caution. They are a strange people and are easily excitable. Here are a few pointers to help you survive your encounter with them.

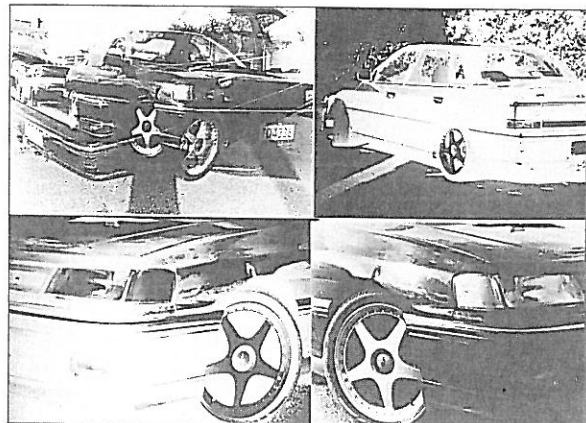

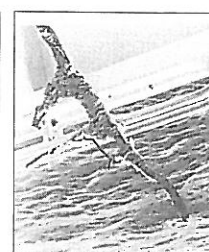
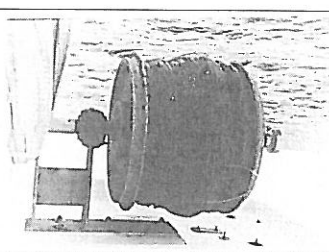
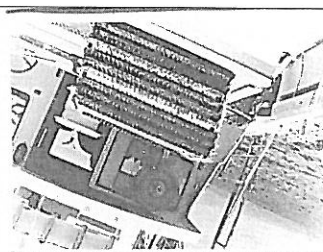
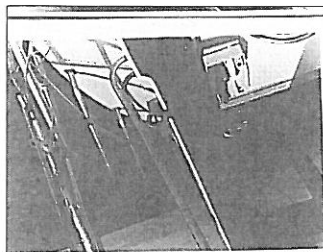
Our tiny, crowded downstairs room had once

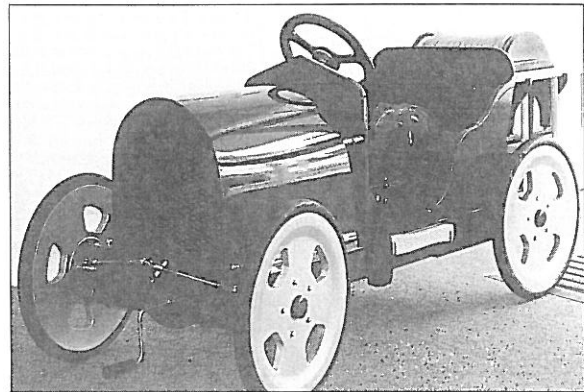
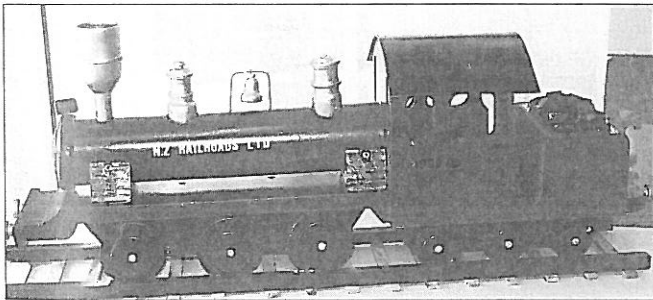

During term 3 many boys took part in various Taranaki - wide events which included the Maths Quiz, Linkhorn Cup, Debating and Newspapers in Education General

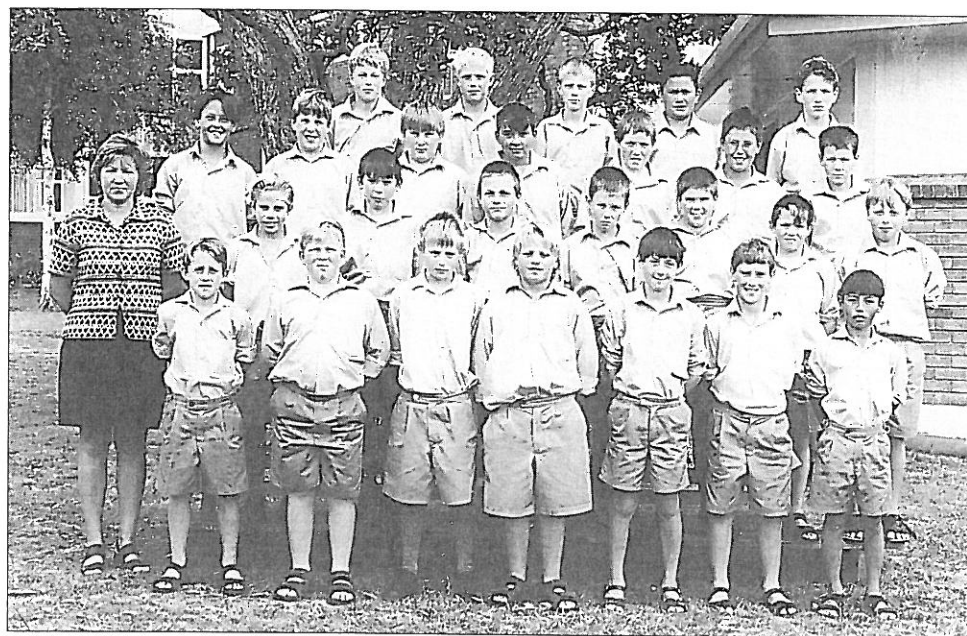
Knowledge Quiz. We competed very successfully in all of these activities, winning both the Debating and the NIE competitions. A tremendous feat.

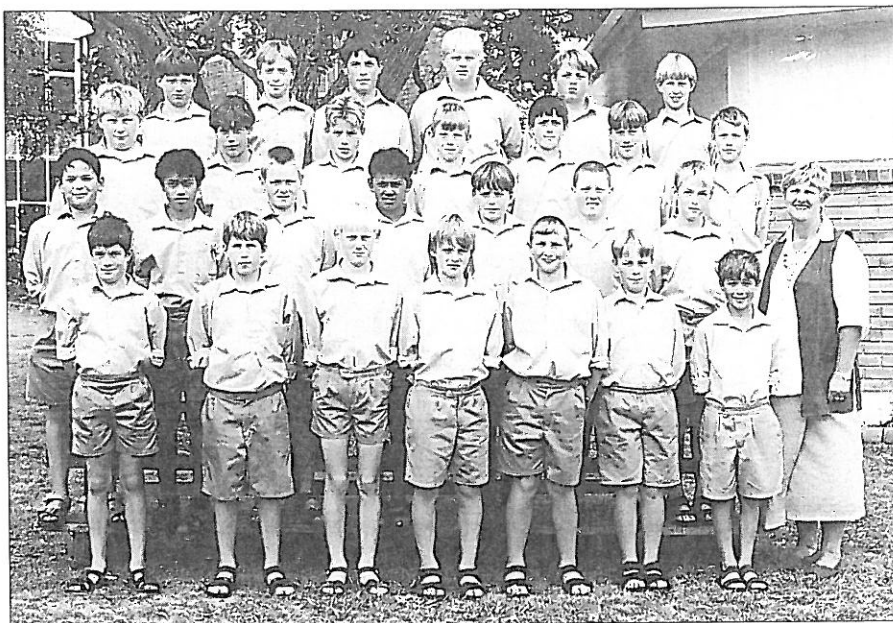

The year 2000 opens a new millennium and the Intermediate Department looks forward to continuing, and adding to, its fine academic, cultural and sporting record.



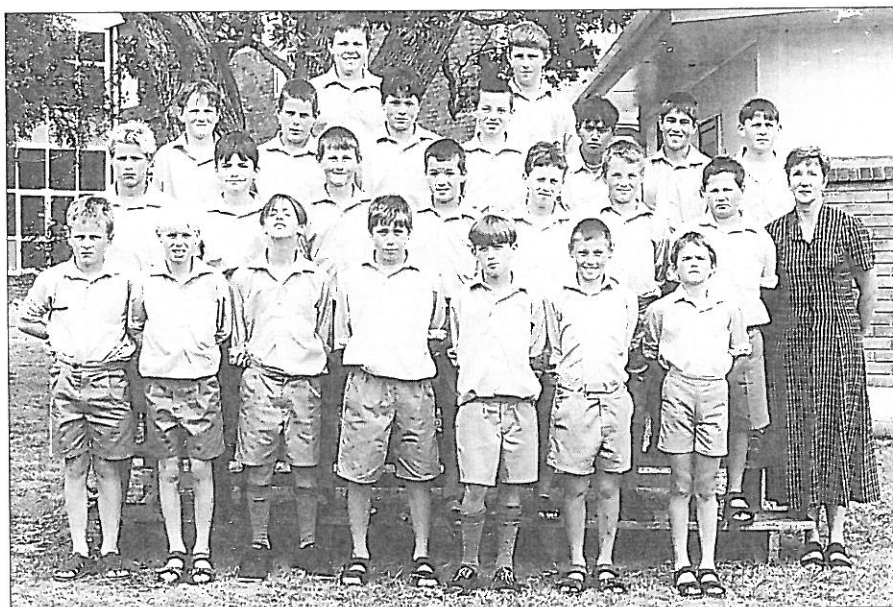

Sacred Heart College by being involved with many Year 9 and 10 socials this year. Although a little loud for the adult supervisors the boys seemed to really enjoy themselves.

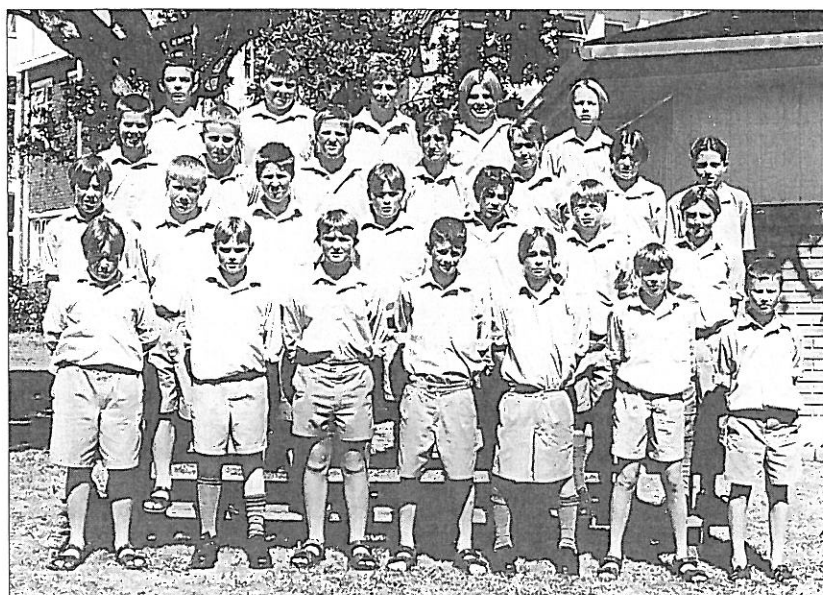

In Term 3 Mr Thomas and I organised a snow trip at the Stratford Ski Field for those interested in skiing and snow boarding. This was a unique experience for those who had never touched or lived on a ski field before.

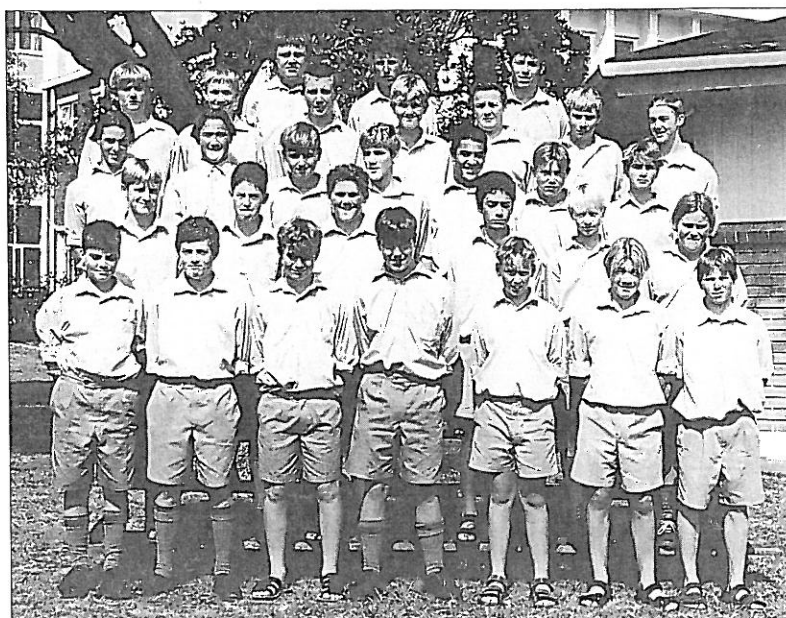
As part of a development programme for the growth of the boys in a Christian environment Brother Joe conducted Reflection Days on Self-Determination" for each class.

We have all learnt some valuable lessons this year and some unimportant ones too.

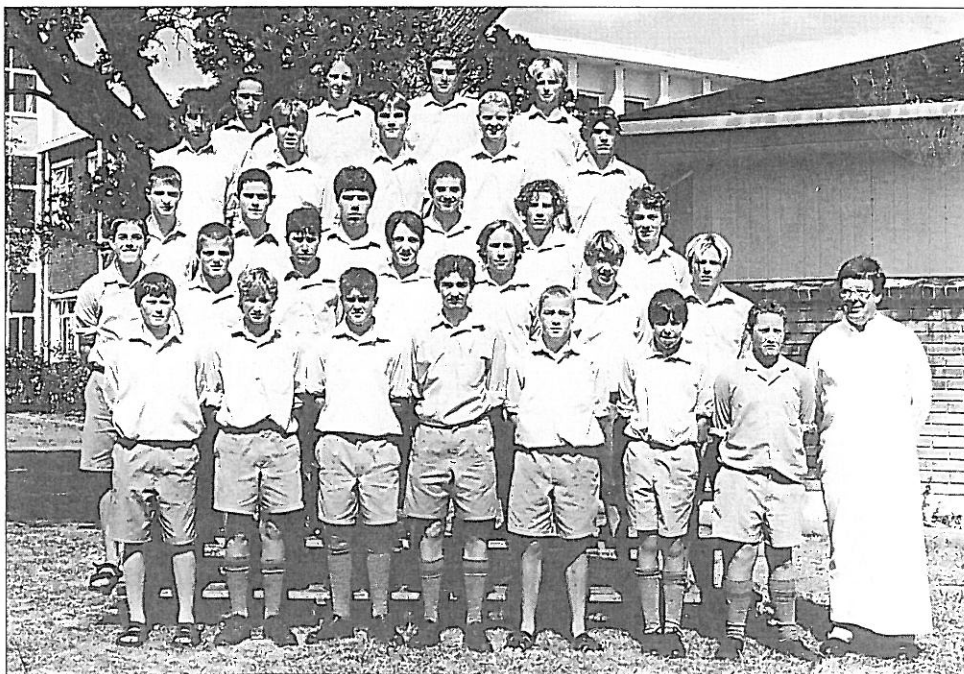

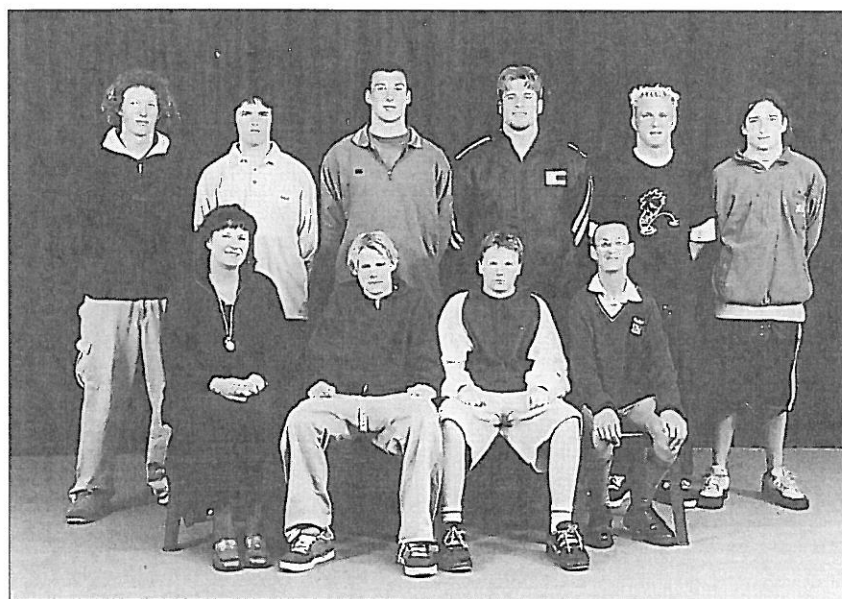
Academic excellence, which is emphasised to all students, was shown by Year 12 students as there were some very commendable results in the challenging Australian Maths, English and Science competitions.

Thank you to all the teachers who have been actively involved in the Year 12 programme this year and for making it a successful and productive year.

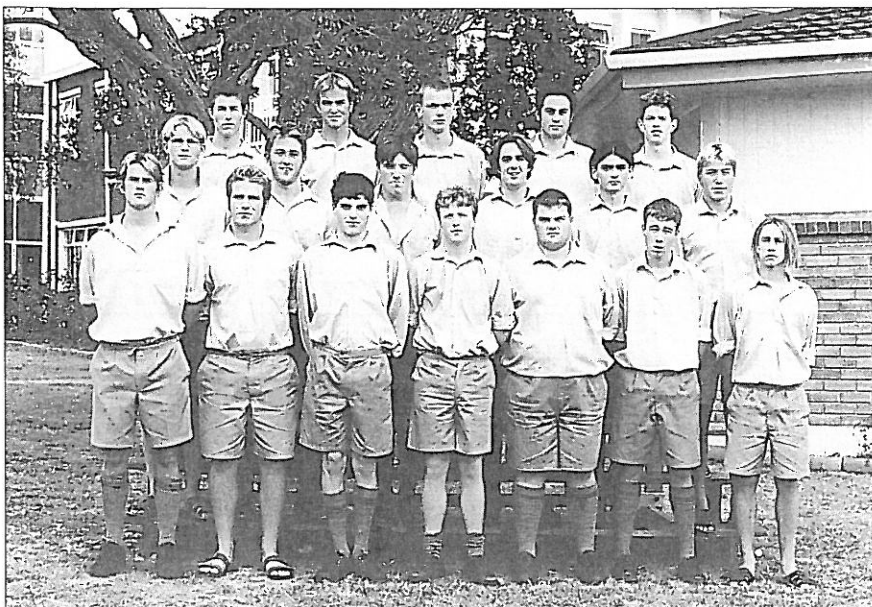

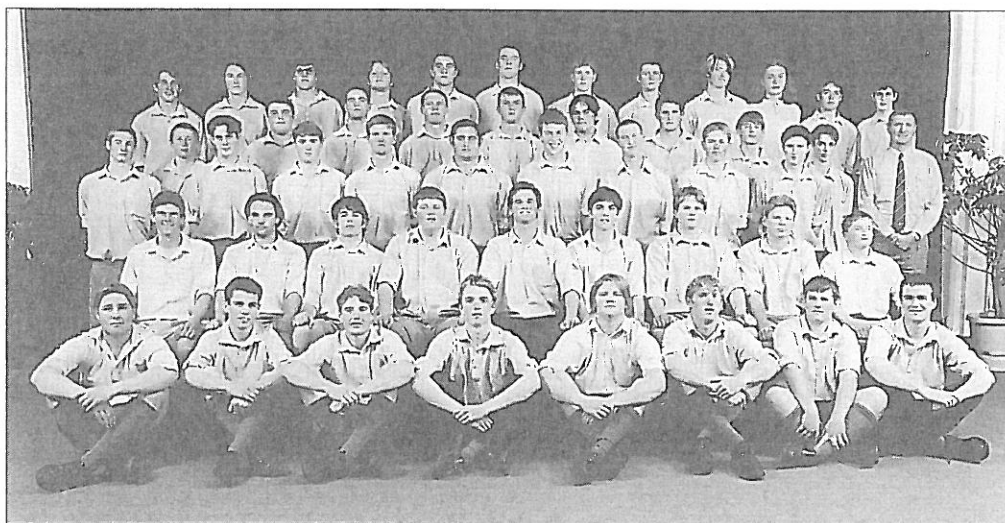
by all except Tubbys drivers and hotel/motel owners (thanks Autolodge, evicted at 1 am).
