

It was appropriate that on the feast day of St John Baptist de la Salle we were able to celebrate a number of jubilees as we congratulated Brothers William and Michael on the diamond jubilees of taking their first vows.

Brother Michael joined the brothers as a teenager straight from school in Melbourne. Brother Will was in the same group doing training in Sydney- the first New Zealander Brother Michael had met. Of the initial group of 28, 3 celebrated their jubilee this year. His training included 2 years' novitiate, 2 years' study for a degree in special education, counselling and guidance and 2 years' teacher training.

Brother Michael chose this calling because he was impressed by what he saw in the eight brothers at his own school who so enjoyed spending time with students, involved in sport and drama. His family were supportive, although his mother predicted that he wouldn't last more than two weeks.

The highlights for Brother Michael have been the opportunities he would not otherwise have had for study and travel. He likes the title Brother and feels it is important, and is interested in the group of Brothers. For him, the time he spent at Boystown was the most rewarding, where students were given opportunities and their lives were changed because of this. The longest period in one place for Brother Michael was his seventeen years as boarding master at St Bede's, Mentone. New Zealand is his first overseas posting.

Brother Michael feels that he keeps young at heart by working in his present position. He is able to share special moments in his charges' lives that their parents miss. Twenty-four hour care is a responsibility, and Brother Michael takes one day off a week to enjoy walking with his labrador. His is a pastoral job, and he finds Taranaki boys open and not as sophisticated as city boys.

What about the future? He sees himself as working more closely with La Sallian partners, and as guide/mentor to younger teachers.

Brother Will spent 5 years on his family's farm near Kaikoura after leaving school before starting his novitiate and then teacher training at Castle Hill in Northwest Sydney.

After 2 years teaching at De La Salle, Mangere, in 1967 he came to FDMC and taught general subjects to Forms 3 to 6 before FDMC started offering agriculture in 1973, when other schools were giving it up. Within a few years he was teaching only agriculture. He feels that in his job he has the best of both worlds: involvement with the boys and keeping up his interest in farming. Brother Will believes that his family upbringing with structure and a strong Catholic ethic pre-

pared him well for the commitment which has kept him going. The life he chose has opened up a wider world and given him greater involvement in church and people than he would have

enjoyed otherwise. He estimates he has probably had contact with 3-4000 students over the years, in addition to the dealings he has had with parents, teachers and other organisations through his sport, farming and personal education. Brother Will has enjoyed the benefits of living with some great people in the Brothers' community, and he has had some wonderful opportunities for travel. In 1992 he had a sabbatical year, spending time on a renewal course and travelling mostly through Britain and Ireland before working at Boystown where the farm had 30-40 horses, before choosing to return to FDMC, where he has now spent 35 years.

Brother Will has contact with students as much as he chooses while looking after the farm. He looks after old boys who visit and organises the old boys' newsletter. He sees three things in his future- the riding school, which provides income and sustains interest, keeping contact with people who have an association with school, and maintaining the agrodome and supporting its staff.






The Board is pleased to report that Francis Douglas Memorial College is in great heart with waiting lists for both the Boarding Hostel and also the day school. That fact is due to the reputation of the college and this is due to the dedication of the staff ably led by Brother Bill. Thanks to Brother Bill's drive and enthusiasm and the generous support of the people of Taranaki and beyond, facilities at the school have been significantly enhanced.

For forty plus years, this college has enjoyed the generous support of the parent community and this has significantly assisted the board to provide an environment conducive to good learning. The board consistently struggles to balance its books with the funds provided by the government and without the support of the PTA and

the payment of activity fees by parents, would have to reduce the services offered.

The experience I received from putting my name in a hat has opened my eyes to the way an institution is run


and equipped me for future years. I encourage this challenge for any one keen to expand his comfort zone and wanting an insight into one of the top colleges in the country.

When news came through in early October that a former student of this College, John Mitchell, had been appointed coach of the All Blacks, I found myself going back to the annual magazines of

1977, when he began as a boarder in Form 3. I browsed the magazines through to 1981 when, in 7<sup>th</sup> Form, he became Boarders' Captain and School Vice-Captain. Putting aside John's remarkable achievement, two predominant thoughts struck me: the first was what an important record the annual magazines provide; and the second was how substantial has been the improvement in quality of this production in recent years.


For various reasons, not the least of which is cost, we need to limit the size of the annual magazine; yet it is still important that it provides a comprehensive overview. My report took up six pages last year. In the interests of not squeezing other articles out, I have resolved to reduce the length of my report this year. I trust that my report in the form of a more succinct synopsis will not offend by omission those whom I might otherwise have mentioned.

## Election of New Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees for the past three years finished its term in April this year. The generosity and dedication of Board members to the quality of education at this College should be acknowledged. In particular I wish to thank retiring members, Paul Butterworth, Maria Bushell and Angela Shanley for their significant contributions as well as student representative Adam Franks. We are fortunate to have a well-balanced new Board with a mixture of experienced, continuing members and new representatives. In particular I wish to thank Michael Finnigan, our Board Chairman for his wise counsel. He was the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees set up at the time of integration and still continues in that role. That is a uniquely valuable contribution to the education offered at this Catholic College.

Many other Catholic Principals whom I meet are envious of our recent development made possible by the magnificent generosity of members of the College family who have contributed through the Appeal or the development levies. Few schools enjoy our level of support by parents and friends who are determined to give their sons, their grandsons, anyone's sons, the best education based on Gospel values which could possibly be provided.

Over Christmas, we shall be building an extension to the Year 13 Day Boys' Common Room as well as a further 6-bed hostel unit. We are installing stained glass windows in the Chapel - the place of key focus for our special character as a Catholic School. We have also applied for funding to extend the new playground provided for the Intermediate boys. Our policy is to tap into "outside" resources as extensively as possible whilst making the required input ourselves. For some projects every dollar raised becomes \$2:80 under a financial assistance scheme. Recently this scheme was used to fund improved gym access.



Later next year we shall begin construction of the next major phase of our development plan - building a technology block - financed by a government grant of \$820,000. We are continuing to invest heavily

in ICT (Information and Communication Technology) to ensure the most effective delivery of the curriculum and, particularly, of the new NCEA (National Certificate of Educational Achievement). We have prepared well for the new NCEA.

I wish to stress the extraordinary benefits flowing from those people who contribute to the Appeal or pay the Development donations. So much becomes possible when people unite to help. The big donations are essential but I am also very conscious of the cumulative effect of the smaller donations - and the generosity of people giving according to their resources. We have such widespread support that we have been able to develop a much improved school.

We have also been well served by our parish. Formerly the full-time chaplain at Sacred Heart Girls' College, Margo La Berge, has now taken on a role sharing her time between Sacred Heart, the parish of St Joseph's and here. Together with Father Craig Butler and our Religious Education Co-ordinator, Graeme Mustchin, Margo has given new impetus to youth ministry at FDMC. This shared modus operandi has established invaluable direct

All contributions have made a real difference. It is clear that our parents collectively are concerned that what we provide for the boys should be the best it can possibly be. Yes, we still have debts to repay but continuing generosity will see us through. The Board is fully briefed on our projected source and application of funds.

Special thanks to Glenda Elliott and the PTA who this year provided new curtains for the gym and new blazers for boys to wear when representing our College. The PTA also continues to provide excellent service through the uniform shop.



Our Interim Hostel Board which was set up last year with

Bernadette Bourke as elected Chairperson has nearly completed its interim phase. The constitution for a permanent Board is almost ready. The Interim Board will complete this task next year.

We were very fortunate this year to acquire the services of a new resident chaplain, Father Joe, who has settled in very easily to become a key part of the Francis Douglas community. His warm interaction with the members of the school community is a reassuring

I especially acknowledge the magnificent contribution of several key staff members who are moving on: Kevin Murphy, who will retire in March as Head of Science after making an outstanding contribution for the past fifteen years; Melanie Snook our teacher of Maori, who has been a wonderful advocate for balanced biculturalism; Sophie Parsons who has approached the teaching of Art with great enthusiasm and vitality.

Margaret Milne is the Coordinator of the Special Needs Department, as well as looking after School Leadership and the Enrichment Programmes. She deserves acknowledgement for the highly organised care and stimulating opportunities she provides in these areas.

At the top end of schooling I wish to acknowledge the extraordinary quality of the work of Carol Land in careers guidance and in utilising STAR funding to provide a diverse range of options for boys close to leaving school. She is always willing to help and encourage boys.

During this year, our local *Taranaki Daily News* ran leading articles on the high percentage of children in Taranaki schools (22.3% in 2000) leaving without a formal qualification. The FDMC percentage in 2000 was only 4.5%. In 1999 it was 2.7%. These are the official Ministry figures



- much better than the average - which indicate how well our students are provided for by Carol and other staff.

Brother Michael continues to work with an inspiring group of young Lasallian old boys. Last Christmas they conducted Camp La Salle here at the College to provide a holiday programme for some younger boys. They have also been keen participants in Lasallian youth festivals meeting up with other top quality young people from Lasallian schools

We have had two staff members - Katrina van de Water and Phil D'Ath - on leave this year to work with the De La Salle community at Balgo Hills in a remote part of the Western Australian desert, teaching the Aboriginal people. Their inspiring work is supported by our Mission Action Day to raise money for Balgo and the Brothers' missions in PNG. Thank you to Br Peter for his careful organisation and to all who supported this important initiative to reach out to help others.

I especially acknowledge Katrina's invaluable work in religious education and tutoring the

boarders. Although offered a further period of leave by the Board, she has decided to resign in order to pursue her valuable contribution in the remote regions of Western Australia.

Special thanks to Richard & Ruth Marris and to Graeme Mustchin, for the production of this annual magazine as an extra on top of their key work in other areas.







Under the guidance of **Mel Snook** Maori culture has become an integral part of the life at FDMC. As prominent a presence



years Francis Douglas Memorial College and all that is associated with it has been my whole life and living without it seems hard to imagine.






## LEON BUTLER - CIVICS CAPTAIN


The Benildus athletics campaign was resilient in its efforts. Participation and team spirit were paramount but the opposition proved too much, squashing all hopes of an upset.

2001 will go down as the greatest year for Loreto in modern history. For the first time since 1982, before I was even born, we were crowned over-all house champions!



There was a new vibe around school, a blue vibe. Finally the pride that had been lost by past performances, the pride that Mr Kibby had tried to instil in us, had returned.


The next of the running competitions was soon


ling, turning opportunities into tries. The litigious Loreto squad had once again triumphed against the odds.



strong but we thought our winning ways would pull us through. Unfortunately we struck Benildus in the first game. We battled hard but could not compete against a side stacked with 1st XV players.





captain and vice-captain of the 1<sup>st</sup> XI cricket and other sports captains.





who supported us and made this opportunity a reality.






Dear Diary

## MUSIC 2001






A very pleasant trio of classical guitar players showed off their considerable talent playing Minuet and Trio by Leonard del Cal.

some of our better Year10 players who immediately stepped into the firing line with guns blazing.


