

ANNUAL

Probably the most moving school liturgy for me this year was the celebration in the school gymnasium of a Mass of remembrance for Brother Jerome Foley who died recently in Australia. It was during this Mass that several of the points of this report began to crystallize in my mind. Here we were - the whole school, students, staff, parents and friends gathered together in Christ's name to pray for and remember a man who had been the first headmaster of Francis Douglas College.

Those who knew Br. Jerome during his four or five years in Taranaki could not fail to remember him both with affection and respect, and to those of us who lived closer to him and knew him better, the reasons for this universal regard of him were more obvious. There was in his character and personality a fine balance between two factors which at first appear incompatible if not contradictory. On the one hand there was a toughness about him. There was a toughness in his own life which was one of unrelenting personal asceticism and fidelity to the smallest detail of his religious life. There was, too, a toughness in his approach to the apostolate. As a teacher he was strong, persistent, disciplined, and as an administrator he pursued a line of personal conviction with courage and consistency. Yet with all this he was open and lovable. His mind was open and he constantly applied himself to improvement, examined new ideas, stayed abreast of world events or current educational theory. He was open to the new, as society changed during his long life-span. He never appeared at a loss or nostalgic about the past - the good old days, but he made the present his, too, and lived his life in this context. In short, he was able to keep in close contact with reality while operating from a framework of strong personal discipline and conviction.

REPORT

Now it seems to me that the kind of school Brother Jerome pioneered, as indeed any Christian school, should bear just the same characteristics that were evident in his life. Such a school has to operate from a strong basic framework of ideas and practice. It needs definite structures consistent with its stated philosophy and structures which support class organization, subject choice, teacher deployment - in short all facets of school activity. In terms of the people involved in a school, structures should support the pupils, the staff and the parents. And the day to day use of these structures by all concerned in the school demands a strong respect for disciplined procedures. This implies a strong personal respect for the rights of others' - a disciplined unselfishness apparent in the staff and parents and worked towards on the part of students. Far from being inhibiting, I would maintain that such structures in fact offer security. That whatever students' professed reactions may be to them - the basic structures do in fact offer the possibility of a sense of security - to students, certainly to staff and usually to parents. And quite apart from the security angle we could justify such an insistance on structures from the point of view of preserving the accumulated wisdom of our heritage, for preserving the moral values of society and above all for strengthening the foundations on which we trust, the Christian faith is being built. On these grounds I would justify the structural features of College life; the period allocations, the subject choices, the insistence on a punctuality, on obedience towards, people and observance of regulations, on attendance at classes, on a spirit of work in class-rooms. All of these and many other structures lend to develop within the Christian school, a certain basic strength, a unity and solidarity, a sense of purpose, a point of reference from which to judge responses to the effect of continual change and instant news in our global village. This approach seems on the surface to be a hard line to take and there are some who would be very critical of it - and rightly so, if it existed, or were insisted on, in isolation and as an end in itself. Hopefully this is not so.

A school must be open to change! It must keep as close as it possibly can to reality. School is not an end in itself - a closed off little world of its own. Many factors are at work in society which prevent the school from being what it was only a generation ago. Social mobility, affluence, the vast areas of knowledge now available and increasing at an enormous rate, the likelihood of people having to retrain several times during their working life - these, and many other considerations, alter the function of the school from being a means of preparing people for a specific vocation in life to one of training students to make best use of the resources available for the particular situation they find themselves in at various stages in life. Such an approach demands of the people involved in a school a certain ease in the face of current trends in society - ease in the sense of being able to deal confidently with such trends. In other words the school itself must be able to operate in the very same mode that it expects its students will need to master. It must earnestly enquire after truth, it must be critical of itself and of society, it must make decisions based on the evidence currently available. I speak here, in rather idealistic terms. In practice this is much more groping affair, but it implies a teaching staff that is open to new ideas, that seeks to keep up with and be critical of new knowledge, new methods, new media and so on. It implies an administration which is supporting of this, not just tolerant or critical. Above all it requires close co-operation and understanding between parents, staff and students so that aims are kept clear and methods understood.

So there we have the two poles. On the one hand there is the need for structures for discipline, for a firm base of reference. On the other there is the need for openness, for adaption, for continual renewal of what the school is doing. And as always the best response to this situation would seem to be somewhere in between these two poles. Insistence on structures for their own sake is quite wrong. The school is for the student and not the other way round. Sometimes, too, we cling to structures as a protection from the fearful things that seem to threaten us as teachers or parents or students. Structures can easily limit our breadth of thought or prevent us from coming to conclusions just demanded by situations that arise. On the other hand the school can be so open that it easily slips into a lassiez-faire position with everyone doing his own thing. A situation of fairly complete indiscipline arises which under the pretext of progress or freedom of expression, inevitably erodes the accumulated value that can be available to the school community. This situation leads it to operate at only a superficial level of achievement without really addressing itself to the more basic areas of student need. And sometimes the very aim of the educational process - to



lead students to maturity - is assumed to have happened. The fact that students need direction and guidance and correction is neglected because of the false assumption that mere freedom of enquiry will most surely lead to excellence of conduct and decision.

As I have suggested earlier, Br. Jerome was able during his lifetime to achieve a strong synthesis of these two opposites, and in finding this he was provided with a tension in his life which became a mainspring of action for him. So, too, the school will never achieve a complete harmony between these two factors. It will always experience a tension, between them. Yet it is this very tension that on the one hand makes the school continually re-examine what it does, what it holds valuable or useful, and on the other hand what it should be doing, what it can do. At times it will tend to be too harsh, too demanding, too involved in unimportant structures. At others it will tend to go too far, too fast without being adequately prepared for the steps it is taking.

The situation I have laboured through so painfully this far is well illustrated by the problems we face in the integration question. This is exactly the dilemma that arises. On the one hand we all agree that integration with the state system each school must be able to preserve its own special character. I take this to mean that independent schools see their structures, their character, as being essential to their whole reason for existing. It is their character which gives them the opportunity to make a unique contribution to society. On the other hand, one of the most compelling reasons for going into integration must surely be the opportunity thus provided to have a more direct influence on thought and opinion in our pluralistic society. It is not just a question of accepting greater amounts of public finance and retiring to spend it on our own little private schemes. Rather there is the challenge to step out into the mainstream of society and challenge it with our Christian ideals. To find means of doing this we need to appraoch the whole situation with an open mind and with a courage and conviction based on the firm foundations of the special character. While our whole concern to this point has been to preserve the special character of our schools, I feel that we must now give increasing attention to the posibilities opening to make a more positive contribution to society.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

The first three year term of the Board has now almost expired and elections will be required early in 1976 to elect a new Board for a further three year term.

The first term of office of any Board is challenging because of the lack of precedent and the ability to shape the path of Boards of the future. The present Board has accepted this challenge willingly and has firmly established itself as a vital force in the life of the School.

Of vital importance is the relationship between the Board and the teaching staff and the Parent Teachers Association. Relationships in this sphere have been extremely harmonious with obvious benefits to the school. The diligence of the Teaching Staff in all spheres of the school activity has helped to establish a fine reputation for the school and the efforts of the Parent Teachers Association to provide additional facilities for the benefit of pupils and teachers has been exceptional.

The prime function of the Board is to assist the Brother Director with the efficient running of the school and I am sure that both Brother Raphel and Brother Osmund would confirm that the feeling of shared responsibility has been of tremendous assistance to them.

During this first term of office the Board has overseen:

- 1) The provision of five new class rooms.
- 2) The provision of two new playing fields.
- The completion of new quarters for the Brothers community.
- 4) The upgrading of the Library facilities.

All of the above involved heavy expenditure and the Board acknowledges that it is only because it felt it had the support of parents especially and the Catholic Community as a whole that it felt confident to undertake this work. The continued support of those groups is essential to ensure the financial viability of the school and in particular the Board would recommend the continuing fund raising campaign. Further details may be obtained from the College Office or the Secretary P.O. Box 325 New Plymouth. The Board would particularly acknowledge bequests left to the School by deceased benefactors.

Among the many problems faced by the Board, there is no doubt that the question of State Aid and Integration have loomed large and a decision will have to be made in the very near future on whether to integrate or not. There is no doubt that from a financial point of view there are undoubted benefits to be gained from integration but the Board will have to weigh up very carefully disadvantages that could result, not the least being the possibility of a drop in parent interest caused by reduced commitment.

The present commitment faced by Parents is considerable and the Board is aware of the sacrifice being made by Parents to send their pupils to the College. During the past three years, it has been necessary to increase fees to meet increased costs but the Board has always endeavoured to keep these increases to a minimum. In this context is it disappointing to record that although the present Government promised to increase State Aid to a level to 50% of State Teachers salaries that it was only this year that they were increased to 37½% albeit backdated to the 1st January 1974. If the promised aid had been granted, then it is likely that fees could have been reduced.

In conclusion, the Board would like to thank all those persons who in any way contributed to the well being of the school and acknowledge that it is because of this support that the Boards task is made less onerous and certainly rewarding.





Despite the work and time involved the four draftees thoroughly enjoyed the experience and were convinced that it was all worthwhile.

It is hoped that this will stimulate further interest in Drama.





THE PASSING OF OUR COLLEGE FOUNDER


It has been said that our college displays a maturity well beyond its years and achievements already demonstrated in the academic, sporting and religious spheres would indicate this. No doubt it was its founding father, Br Jerome, who implanted and cultivated this spirit in those first six years when he was Director of the College.



So it is with sincere gratitude and deep sadness that we mark the death of Br Jerome a man of wisdom, self discipline and above all faith. Of the seventy-two years that Brother spent as a religious six of his later years were given to our College. Since these were his last years as a religious leader and administrator teachers, parents and pupils alike shared the great wealth of his experience.

Br Jerome was born in Ireland 1886. A short time after completing his teachers' certificate at Waterford Br volunteered for work in Australia where he was to spend the greater part of his religious life. For the twleve years prior to coming to New Plymouth he was Provincial of the Australian Province of the De La Salle Brothers and was responsible for all the foundations in New Zealand.

At the age of seventy-two when most professional men have long retired Br Jerome started out on another venture. This was the founding of Francis Douglas College. For six years he worked tirelessly directing the yound school, teaching maths and science, land-scaping the grounds and above all being spiritual leader of the Brothers. No doubt, boys, who attended the college in those early years, still treasure today the inspiration they received from this great man of God and leader among men.

The trip was indeed a fitting end to the season.




NEW ZEALAND SECONDARY SCHOOLS CROSS COUNTRY TEAM




Francis Douglas College's own cross country was held in fine weather and a large number of entries in all grades capped off a good day.

Throughout the season the forwards ball winning abilities improved considerably, enabling the team to fully exploit their outstanding back line play. A great deal of local pressure was applied to stage a match with the New Plymouth Boy's High School First Fifteen.

This match was arranged and it was a great pity that the weather deteriorated, thus upsetting the First's pattern of free running attacking rugby. As it was, the team played grand rugby and were most unfortunate to draw. Playing into a howling gale and driving rain in the second half, the Firsts launched positive attacks with both forwards and backs with three in particular deserving of tries. The 7 - 4 lead, was held until the final minute when the Boys High kicker landed a beautiful penalty from the sideline.

Almost every player in the side gained representative honours. This was highlighted by the selection of Murray Gibbins and Paul Fife to the North Island Under 18 team. Murray scored a magnificient try in this match. 
