

Many of the doubts yet to be solved and although there will be undoubted financial relief it will be only by the continued interest and support of parents that the school will be able to pass through this transistional stage without harm. One of the principal fears is that with the financial relief offered by integration parents might consider that the needs for their support is no longer required and this could be disasterous especially in the area of maintaining the "Catholic Character" of the school.

The Board would like to thank all those persons who have in any way contributed to the well-being of the school and trusts that they will continue their good work in the challenging years ahead.

PRINCIPAL'S COMMENT

It would surely be inevitable that in the year of the Montreal Olympics and the South African All Black tour that the subject of apartheid should be mentioned in a report such as this. The consciences of many New Zealanders are made uneasy by the mass of conflicting evidence reaching us from South Africa. But what is even more disturbing because close to home is the suggestion that apartheid in fact is part of our own social structure.

Recently, the Catholic Hierarchy set up a commission to enquire into the problems of minority groups in New Zealand. The commission headed by Father A. Arbuckle S.M. and Br. J. Faisandier S. M. has compiled a 400 page report entitled "The Church in a Multicultural Society." It constitutes quite an indictment of most sectors of society and the Church in relation to the treatment of such minority groups. It reveals widespread prejudice, lack of communication, and the ignorance of the Christian community as to the cultural needs of Maoris, Islanders and other such groups living in their midst. In particular, does the report stress the injustice of the pakeha assumption that must minority cultures ultimately assimilated by their own. Is not the idea abroad that the sooner such groups abandon their ignorant ways and adopt the enlightened, civilized ways of the pakeha the better for all of us? The report in fact makes a plea that respect, indeed encouragement be given to thy minority groups of our society. Far from being divisive, cultural differences if understood without prejudice can be a source of strength to and an enrichment of the quality of life and a means of harmony and mutual support.

The study asks some very relevant questions about Catholic schools. It wants to know why only about 6% of Catholic Maori, children attend our schools - less than 5% if we exclude the Catholic Maori Colleges. It wants to know the policy of our schools in relation to nonpakeha children. Is it one of uniformity, of assimilation? This raises, of-course somy very difficult problems for school administrators. Given the nature of school communities, how exactly can diverse groups be catered for? I propose to leave that question for your thoughtful consideration. What I do wish to stress is the principle that the Report stresses - there is a rickness in cultural differences, and our social structure must be sufficiently flexible to allow all groups that comprise it to flourish and, by so doing, to contribute to each other's welfare. Somewhere here there is a ground plan for school communities.


Father Arbuckle defends the concept of separate Catholic Maori Colleges. He is aware of criticism in relation to them, some bordering on the suggestion of an apartheid situation. He maintains that this is not so, that the principle of separate schools is easily defended. He uses the expression "conservational segregation" to describe the principle involved. The idea of the Maori school is that students have the opportunity to withdraw temporily from the mainstream of society to develop, absorb, experience all the riches their culture can provide. In an atmosphere preserved by the interest of their teachers, parents, and fellow students they absorb in a living tradition, a cultural inheritance, their way of life. Yet the aim of all this is not permanent segregation, the aim is to develop fellow New Zealanders who as a result of this training will have something valuable to offer our society as a whole. The same is true too of cultural groups in general. Their desire to experience fellowship, to be supported so that a richness of experience is available to society in general. By some strange law of nature - there is a unity achieved in diversity which is far more enduring than any obtained by uniformity - or worse still, conformity.

Having said that, I hasten to add that this concept doesn't even begin to solve the problems that arise. How to achieve a unity of loyalty and support in a community while encouraging the development of cultural differences cannot be even guessed at here. But as a start we all have to achieve a better attitude towards other cultural groups. Were we able to accept other cultures for their own inherent worth, then we would be far on the way to developing a respect for and an appreciation of the riches the other cultures have to offer for the mutual benefit of all. Surely this is the only Christian way.

This brings me to a similar problem which has always concerned us, but which in New Zealand is coming to a head because of the projected conditional integration of Catholic Schools into the state system. I believe Father Arbuckle's phrase "conservational segregation" applies equally well here as a defense of the Catholic school system. Catholic schools are there to enable the faith to develop in Catholic children and by association their parents, and teaching staff. They are not there merely to

separate nor to be necessarily critical of other school systems. But they are there to offer Catholic families the opportunity to have a different type of education. And I would argue the rights of this just as I have done for those different cultural groups who are part of our nation. And just as I have argued that cultural groups can contribute to the quality of life of our society, so I would expect that Catholic people, matured in their faith by the Catholic school would therefore be able to make such a contribution too. Indeed his fellow citizen has the right to expect this - especially to the extent that the Catholic school is financed by public funds. And my fear is not that the system may survive but that it may not preserve what is unique to it. There is a very real danger of assimilation by the larger system in spite of legislation which is generous in this regard. To survive we will need to renew our schools both as to their internal organization and to their external relationship with the nation at large. Let us look further at these two aspects of the Catholic school.

I am now more convinced than ever that a Catholic school should be unmistakably Catholic. Its internal purpose is to mature the faith of its students, to set them in a Christian Community which is supporting, guiding, encouraging, while at the same time exposing them to the words and example of Christ in the gospel and in his followers down through the centuries. It must bring them into contact with committed Christians. The school, while addressing itself to the task of handling the accumulated wisdom of the ages must always keep a Christian perspective in its mode of operation. It must resit various pressures to be expedient, to be simply pragmatic in its approach to organization, to syllabus development and so on. It must resist the temptation to become merely an efficient school with a light structural veneer of Christianity. It must place its Christian belief first. It can only be viable if its staff is composed of committed Christians, supported by a parent community dedicated to living the faith and wanting above all that their children grow up in a thoroughly Christian way. And there is room to do these things within the terms of the Integration Act! We must study the freedoms it allows us so that while observing the basic demands of the Act, we may learn how to be special, how to show initiative, how to be Christian.



At the same time we have to come to grips with the possibilities that the Catholic school has for making a contribution to the quality of New Zealand life. Such a school is there, not for itself but for the good of society. And I think it easy enough to understand that a school organized along Christian lines could produce citizens who would be well-qualified to take their place in the wider community and to enrich it by the very differences of their upbringing. If they have tolerance, respect, genuine intrest in their fellow citizens, together with a firm faith in Christ and the Christian message - then there is everything going for them in life. But what is difficult, especially for staff and parents is to develop a mentality the reverse of that which historically has been ours. We have known the school as a place of shelter from a paga world, the Catholic school system as a challenge to and a definace of the State system. But now we must accept the challenge of Vatican 11 and be interested in bringing Christ to the whole world. And in this the school must play its part by developing in its students, and in the Catholic community, a concern for others, a readiness in its students, and to seek Christ with them. On the practical level we must develop Catholic people who identify with the concerns of the State, who are prepared to be involved in decision making and the formulation of policy - educational o otherwise. In other words we have to break away from our old stance of seeing government as "them".

I believe the Conditional Integration Act offers us this opportunity. Either we seise the situation to renew our schools making them strong Christian communities with a tremendous impact on the quality of New Zealand life, or we drift into the State system and quietly fade away.




THE YEAR THAT WAS JANUARY

 in our prayers for the last few years.


SWIMMING:



MOUNTAIN CLIMB:


The majority of three, four and some fifth form boarders rose at 5.15 a.m. ready for the trip up the mountain.


Mrs Yvonne Saunders must be congratulated for this, without her many hours of dedicated work, we couldn't have reached this standard.





Special thanks must go to Mrs Ellmers, Gundersen and Young for the work they did behind the scenes satisfying the inner man.




2nd FIFTEEN:

The success of this team lay in its fine spirit towards the game. They put everything into their game and results showed in the end with some fine scores.






V NEW PLYMOUTH BOYS HIGH SCHOOL
