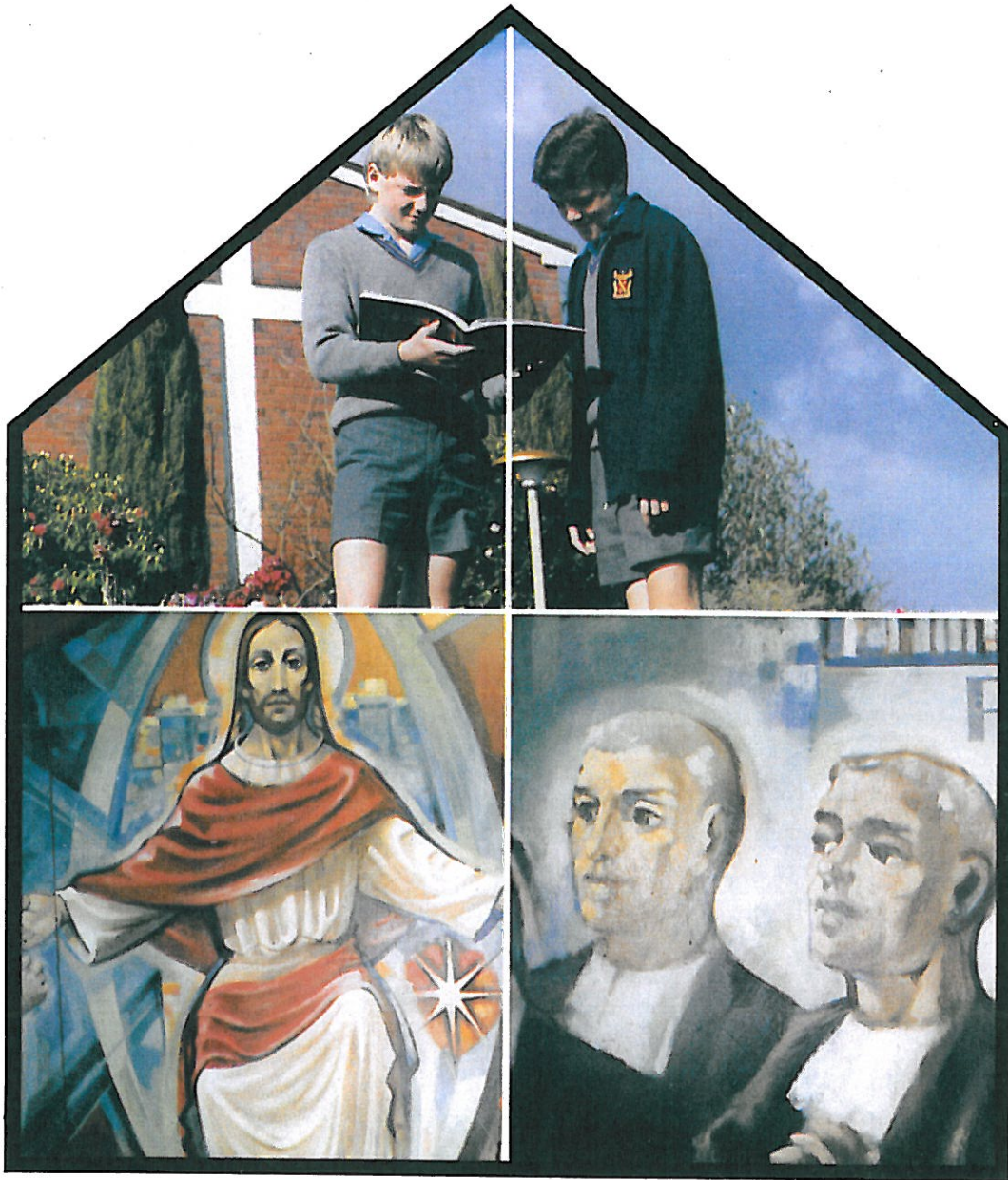

Principal's Comments

The end of 1989 will see the demise of a system of education in New Zealand that stretches back over 100 years. It was a system which grew and developed in a very haphazard way and new provisions were made as a reaction to some development. There was an unquestioned need to change and to put the students back at the centre of what the whole system should be about. I, therefore, welcome the recognition for change that was highlighted by the Picot report and the subsequent Tomorrow's Schools policies.

In any period of change there is a need to recognise that decisions to be made will not be restricted by the guidelines of the previous times. It is also important to realise that underlying these new decisions are assumptions about people and systems and so there is a need to be aware of these assumptions and the implications they will have in a broad perspective. I believe the moves to put more control of schools back with parents is a good one and will allow schools to be more responsive to the local needs. The questions I have about what has been put in place, however, arise from assumptions which I question and which I believe need to be looked at from the perspective of our Catholic community.

The model being espoused for the operation of Tomorrow's Schools derives from an economic model in which the individual is glorified at the expense of the community. The proposed ways of ensuring schools are accountable are likewise based on an economic cause and effect system. Neither of these are suitable for education and are certainly not suitable for this college. The first highlights a thrust for personal gain and the development of the consumer, which can lead to a dehumanising effect. We need to devise ways of countering the dehumanising and evil effects of this dominant individualist and consumerist philosophy.

The evaluation of schools which is being proposed is geared towards efficiency, outputs and having external accountability. This will mean that schools will be assessed in terms of how well they have achieved stated objectives and pre-defined outcomes and it will be presumed that in doing this a comprehensive and objective evaluation of schools will occur. I beg to differ. I believe this will lead to an even more rigid control being exercised by government over what is done in school without the responsibility being landed at their door. By locking schools into a system of accountability which establishes the maintenance of predetermined objectives as the key goal, the government is preventing the unpredictable, dynamic sparkle to self-renew schools. Educational growth cannot be blueprinted, but must be responsive and sensitive to the needs of young people as these evolve. There is a vital need for evaluation of what is going on, but always in terms of finding a better way of enabling young people to grow to be fully human people in light of the Gospel. This latter process recognises that educational questions which face schools are in fact practical problems, which are more often than not moral questions rather than technical ones. Hence, the solution is to find a better way of operating which will enable people to grow to wholeness and become the people God has in mind for them to be. Jesus showed us what it is to be human and what we are seeking to do in this college is to provide opportunities for young people to come to understand what that means and to move in that direction.

In all the multitude of changes with which we are confronted, we need to remember that at the very heart of our college is the Good News which is the source of our special character. The decisions we make in this college must arise from this base if we are to keep faith with the traditions of the Catholic community to which we belong. It is the hope which our faith gives us that enables us to look beyond the immediate and to dream dreams about what might be and then work to bring that about. This requires us to recognise what we are doing, what we can do and in open, honest discussion to continually ask of what we are doing: "Is there a better way?" By keeping in mind that we are seeking to develop an environment which is an experience of the Good News, this question will cause us to evaluate what is being done in terms of continually moving towards our dream. We need to be people of hope, people who believe that God is born anew each morning, creating the world at this very moment, sending his Spirit forth to bring fresh liberty and to renew joy and trust. Let us, therefore, go forth together into a future which is uncertain and laced with all sorts of possibilities with a confidence in a God who is here with us, near us, unforeseeable and loving.

Chairman of the Board of Trustees' Report

It is perhaps appropriate that 1989, an end of a decade, should usher in the advent of "Tomorrows Schools". Appropriate, because it has been a decade of change and "Tomorrows Schools" is without doubt, the biggest change to education, not for one decade, but for many decades.

Much has been written about "Tomorrow Schools" citing reasons why or why not, it should or should not, be introduced. I will not attempt to add to the debate except to state that the success or failure will depend on the community's response to the challenge handed to it. In this regard, I believe that "Integrated Schools" should handle the challenge well, because for many, many years, it was the community supporting the school that saw to it that the school not only survived, but prospered in, at times, a hostile environment. It is this background that should ensure that "Integrated Schools" should prosper and flourish given the ongoing support of the community from which it draws its pupils.

Our College has a strong tradition of sacrifice. Francis Douglas is named after Fr. Douglas who made the supreme sacrifice. The sacrifice of the people who had the foresight to envisage the concept, and the sacrifice of the people who donated the money to make it happen, and then the people who since then, have continued to support both financially and with time, to ensure that what was started was completed, are all part of that tradition.

Our thanks must go out to those people, and we must not forget their efforts. The challenge for this generation is to ensure that these sacrifices have not been in vain, that we pick up the challenge of "change", and "Tomorrows Schools" is but one of these "changes", and that we do not forget why our schools were established in the first place. They were not established to provide "competition" to the state system, but to provide an environment offering an equivalent education opportunity in an environment where the "Good News of Jesus Christ" was not only preached, but also practised.

The Board of Trustees hope that it can provide the leadership to ensure that Francis Douglas College will endure in the "Tomorrows Schools" environment, and that this leadership will be supported by the whole community from which the school derives its support.

FRANCIS DOUGLAS MEMORIAL COLLEGE P.T.A. PRESIDENTS REPORT 1989

It is with pleasure that I present the Annual Report of the Francis Douglas Memorial College Parent Teacher Association for the year ended 31 May, 1989.

The past year has been a fulfilling one for the PTA not only from a fund raising aspect but also from additional involvement. It has been felt for some time that the PTA although basically a fund raising vehicle of the College should also be capable and given the opportunity of providing input into the day to day life of the college.

The PTA was given an opportunity to extend itself early in the year when it was felt that a homework questionnaire to the parents would be of benefit to the College. A suitable questionnaire was formulated and distributed to parents and then followed up by telephone calls which provided a random sample of parents' attitudes to the question of homework. The overall results of this questionnaire is yet to be published however in general, parents did feel that homework was necessary and where it was required to be done, it was felt that for the benefit of the boys it should be marked. It is intended that the results of this questionnaire will provide a useful basis for a policy to be formulated by the incoming Board of Trustees. It is also hoped that future questionnaires of matters of concern to the College can be completed and that the PTA can provide its assistance in this area.

Fundraising during the year was somewhat curbed by the abolition of Housie which in the past has provided the College with considerable funds for various items of priority. Attempts to reorganise the Housie evenings were not successful, manpower in running the Housie was becoming scarce, numbers were dropping and profitability accordingly suffered. In the end it was felt that the economics of the Housie evenings were such that it was not worth continuing with this activity. No one school could provide sufficient manpower to run Housie itself and accordingly this particular source of funding has now disappeared. The PTA in the coming year will have to look to alternative sources of fundraising activities in an endeavour to compensate for the loss of this source of revenue.

Other activities which produced funds during the year included Mini-Put and also the Used Clothes Sale and thanks must go to Glenys Goodman and her committee for sterling efforts in this regard. Naturally enough the main source of funding for the year has come again from Gala proceeds and very sincere thanks are expressed to Sandra Johnston, her sub-committee and Peter Hill, on behalf of the College in once again organising and running a very smooth operation. Although there appeared to be less attending the gala this year the overall profit was only succeeded by 1986 returns. Although there are still some accounts to come in it would appear that the Gala netted in the vicinity of just over \$7,400.00 Without

the support of the parents of the College the gala would not be the success that it has been and sincere thanks are expressed to everybody who assisted and donated to this cause.

As a result of all the fundraising activities the PTA has been able to donate to the College an amount of \$7,000.00 which has been or will be applied in the purchase of various equipment items to assist such areas as the school considers necessary to update. As you will see from the statement below funds in hand at the end of this financial year are approximately \$6,700.00 in excess of last year. Further grants will be made to the school as requested.

The year itself has been marked by some radical changes in administration and the advent of the Picot Report and Tomorrow's Schools will provide a very challenging year for the College and the PTA. It is hoped that parents who have not previously considered joining the Committee will find time to put themselves forward for nomination at the annual general meeting.

In conclusion I would like to thank Secretary Don Blume, who is standing down although will continue hopefully to be a part of the PTA. Also thanks must go to our treasurer Peter Brown for his efforts and who it is hoped will continue in the ensuing year. Several of the present Committee will not be continuing and our thanks go to them for their efforts and the time they have put into working for the benefit of the College.

We look forward to the new year with anticipation and confidence that we will once again be able to provide, not only financial support but also other input which makes life on this Committee both worthwhile and satisfying.

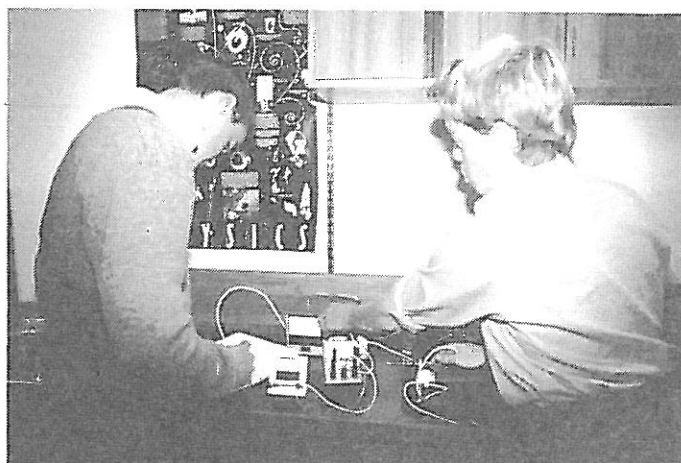

BR. LAWRENCE

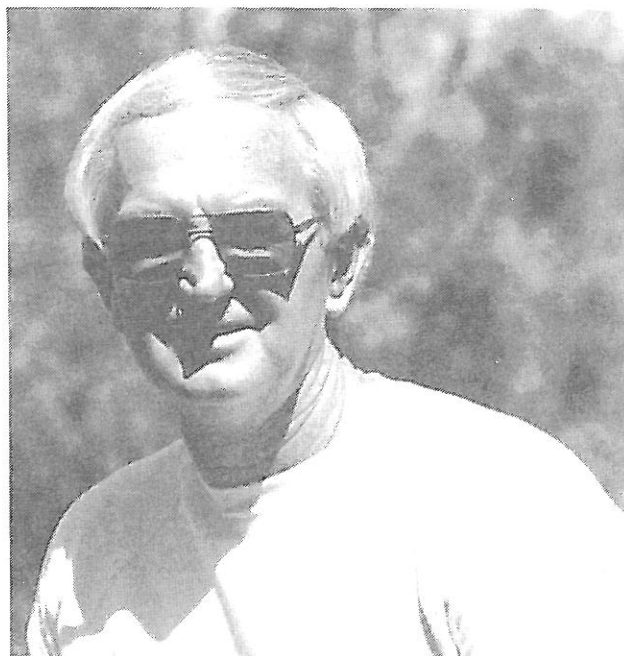
Br. Lawrence became a Noviciate in 1960 - teacher training until 1963. He taught in Victoria / NSW country and Sydney.

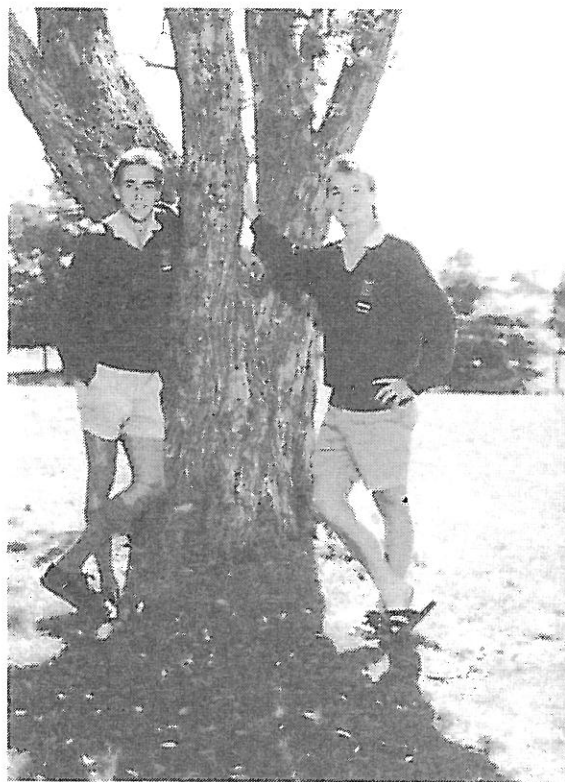

A small but good natured third form entered our community this year who I feel have gradually found their place in the hostel.

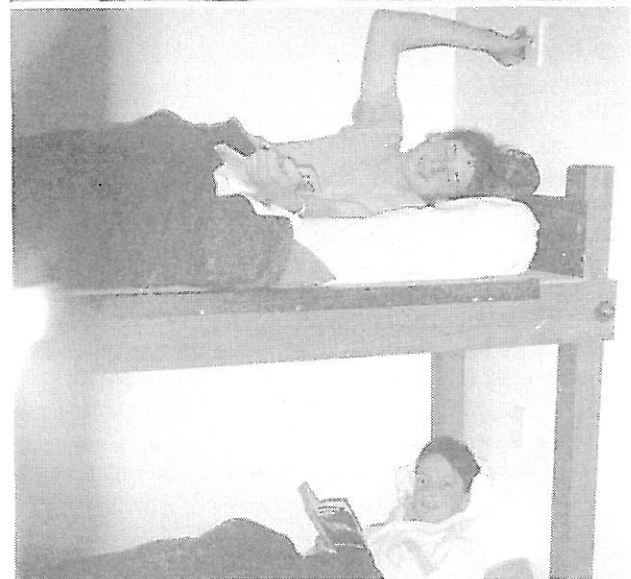
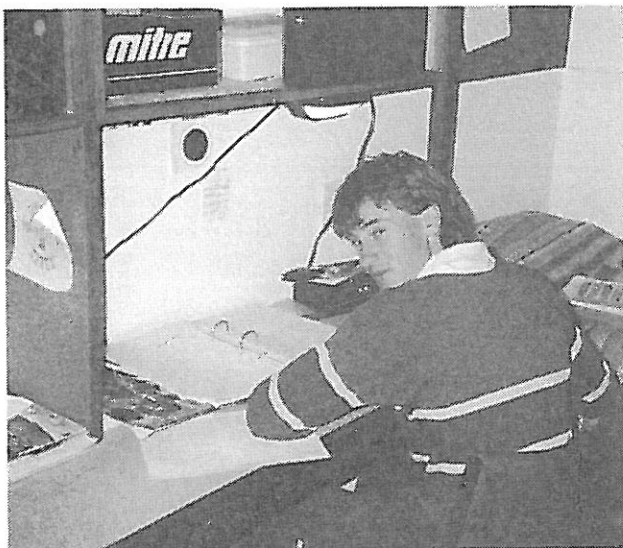

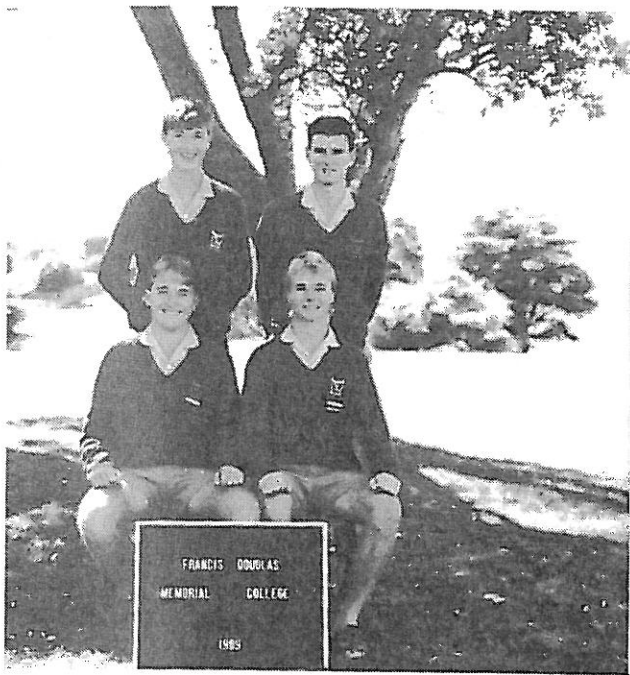
Best of luck next year's guys, keep in touch. The final year was a memorable one. Good luck for the future to those returning or leaving, do well.

Five New Plymouth High Schools and six Intermediate Schools are represented on the Junior Council and regular liaison is kept with any interested Primary Schools.

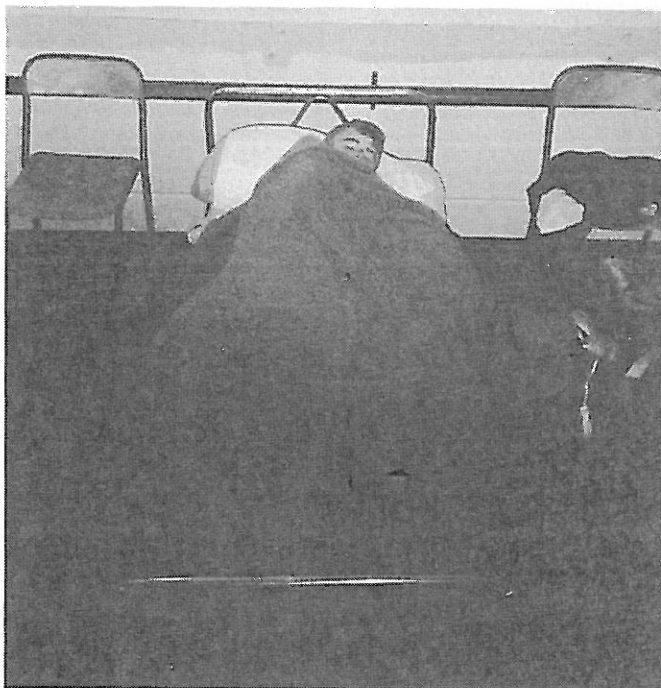
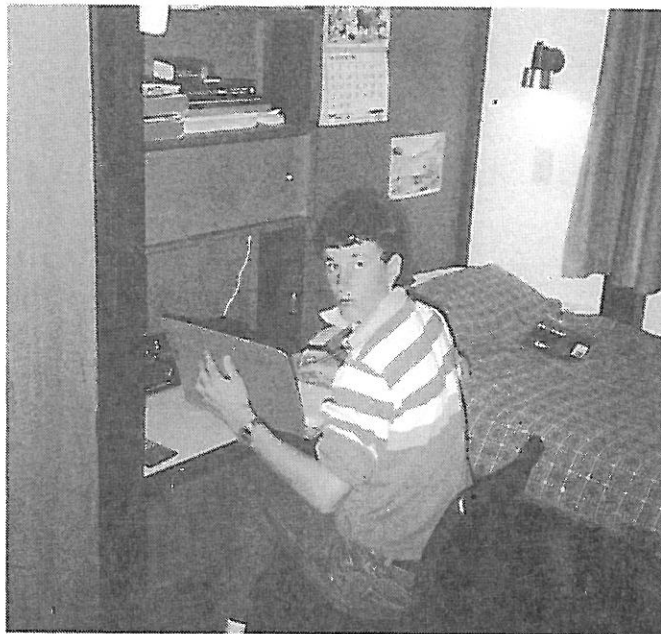
With such a large representation of the youth of New Plymouth, the Council is enthusiastic to get behind as many ideas as physically possible.

But when it came to Saturday and Friday nights we really went to the doctor. Endless parties were the feature of the year.

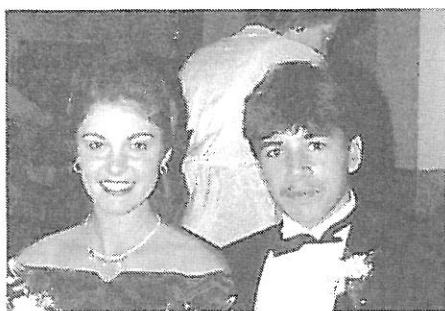
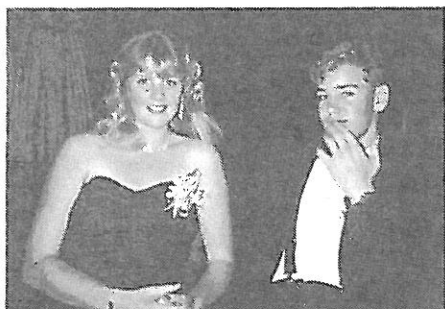
Yes one way or another our weekends were always rather full of activities.

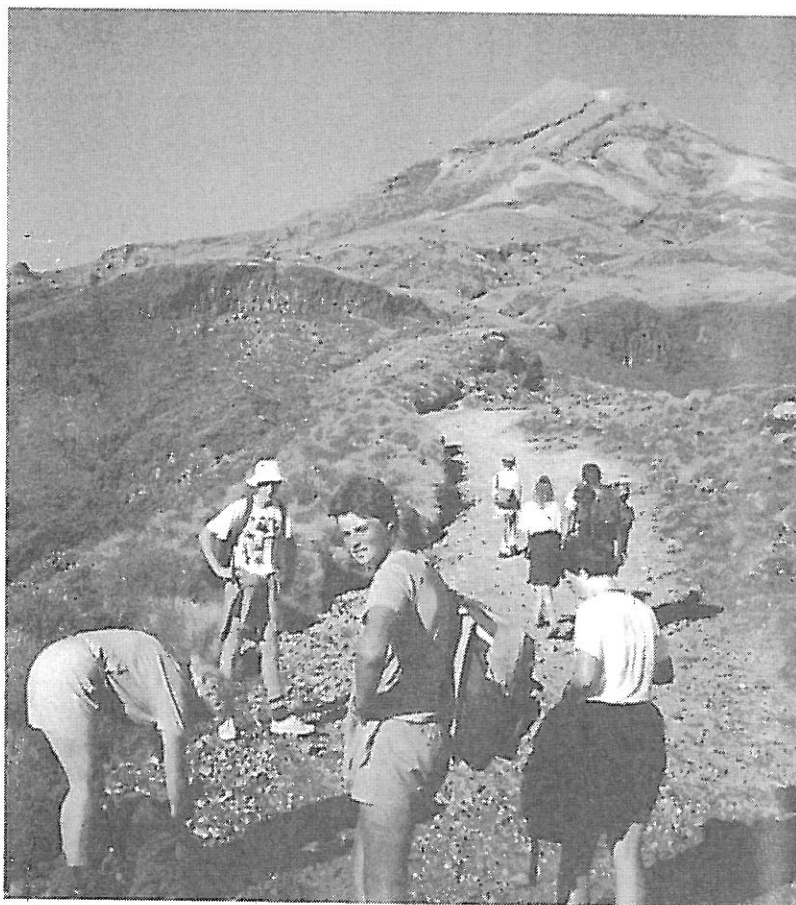
MOUNTAIN CLIMB:

On Sunday 5 March 70 students, parents and teachers set out from the North Egmont car park on a climb to the summit of Egmont. The air was cool and clear, and the initial five minutes, being downhill does not prepare a person for the long uphill climb to Tahurangi Lodge. One section is known as "the puffer" and it is aptly named.

At Tahurangi, the party was divided into six groups under the watchful eye of Taranaki Alpine Club members. For those who have not been up the mountain, the first 45 minutes are on steps up Hongi's valley, the next hour zig-zagging up through scoria (loose shingle) and the remaining hour clambering over a lava outflow known as the Lizard which finally leads to the crater. In some groups the stops became longer and more frequent as the climb progressed, and there was even some discouragement as one group descended while another still had an hour to go to reach the summit. Cloud came over the mountain and restricted any dramatic views. The crater was snow-free in parts and a contrast to other years when tobogganing on parkas, and snowball fights were common. To the dismay of some Australians there was no volcanic activity!

The descent always seems attractive, but the lizard is much harder coming down than going up. One party was delayed while a girl was attended to after a fall near the crater. The highlight for most climbers is running down the scoria, unless some bare rock replaces the shingle!

The muscles used in climbing must be different from other activities, because for most people there is quite a degree of stiffness on following days, and stairs seem even worse than a mountain. Thanks to all for their co-operation and the TAC for their help.



Mountain Climb

An Individual Commentary



On Sunday morning, 5 March, at an hour when most sensible people would still be in bed, about 70 intrepid teachers, parents and students converged on North Egmont from various parts of Taranaki and beyond. Little time was given to those who were bleary-eyed as they were pointed in the direction of the track which leads to Taurangi Lodge and given their marching orders.

The pace at first was very leisurely as the first few minutes are actually spent going downhill rather than up. However all good things come to an end and the delights of nature are subdued by hills. Emerging from the bush into an area of stunted tree growth, the slope of the track is more clearly revealed. Also revealed are the climbers who shout and wave from points further and higher on the track which means that at least someone has the energy to proceed further. Whoever named the 'Puffer' must have experienced the same thoughts and tiredness that many felt that Sunday. Taurangi Lodge and the TV transmitter were the oasis to which the increasingly spread out group struggled towards. Cheery words of welcome ("why are you looking so exhausted?") and a cuppa revived some of the flagging spirits.

The climbers were divided into six groups ranging from exceptionally fast to just fast, and Taranaki Alpine Club members in the front and rear kept the groups moving at a reasonable pace, sharing their

knowledge and love of the mountain. Some intelligent person once designed lifts and escalators to move people, but unfortunately his ideas never spread to Hongis valley where steps, steps and more steps await the unwary.

Emerging from the valley, the group began the slow zig-zag march up the scoria, looking with envy at the faster groups who had already been to hell and beyond. The climbers' packs became lighter and the bodies heavier as increasing amounts of liquid were consumed and nibbles taken from light refreshments.

The Lizard is an exposed lava flow from the summit and meant finding handgrips and stretched legs in finding the way up. For some a discouraging note was the appearance of one super-fit group from the College descending at a rapid rate having already reached the summit. As seems to inevitably happen, cumulus clouds began blocking out the view so that even the possibility of a great view was no longer an incentive. The thought of the embarrassment in not making it was now the sole preoccupation.

After five (or less for some) hours the crater finally emerged. The very mild winter had left little snow cover and one could only imagine the students of past years who had used their parkas as toboggans. With nothing to do in the crater, it was up the very loose sand and rock to the summit and a welcome lunch. The obligatory summit photo, an examination of the famous hole which had caused newspaper headlines (Egmont active?) and fighting off the insects which seemed to know a vulnerable group when they saw one, occupied the time on the summit.

The descent for one group was eventful when one girl slipped and had to be assisted down by Alpine Club members. For the rest, it was a matter of trying to find the right place to step without being frightened by what one wrong step would mean.

The scoria is a highlight for many descending because it is straight down and not zig zagging as on the ascent. The theory has it that you walk down digging your feet into the loose gravel. The earlier groups must have contributed greatly to the erosion process because the many bare rocks meant that the experience was quite unpredictable. Three, four and five point body landings were quite common, and with the number of stones in one's sneakers, it seemed at times pointless to have anything on the feet.

The steps downward remind people that there are muscles not commonly used in every day sedentary living, but another cuppa at Taurangi and farewell to the guides makes that soon forgotten. The thoughts about unused muscles soon return as the track to the carpark winds its way down the Puffer. Foot placement becomes a preoccupation and normal comfortable living still seems far away. The carpark finally emerges through the trees and tired bodies finally reach something that will carry them after anything from seven to nine hours. The thought of a warm bath and a good night's sleep beckons. The thought of a genuflection or climbing stairs to the classrooms the next day is too much to bear. Anyway, there is yet another certificate to be filed away for the sceptics!

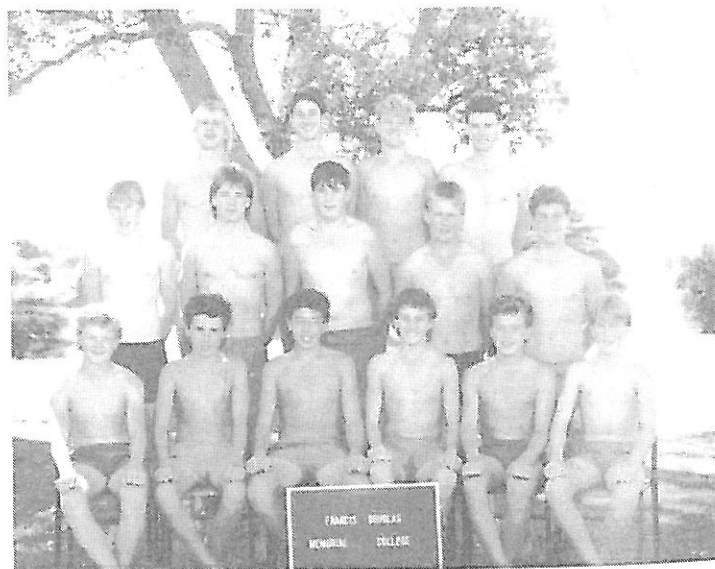
BULLY

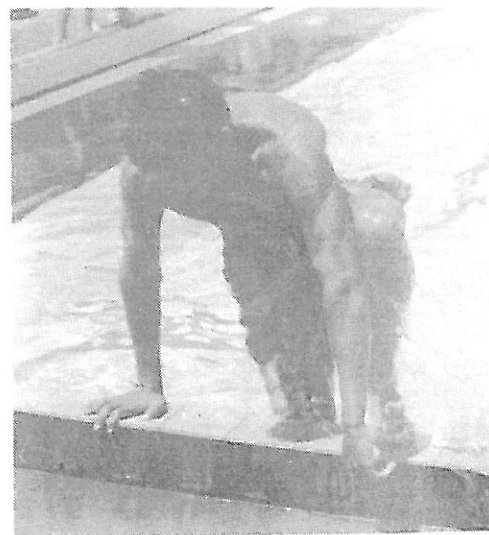

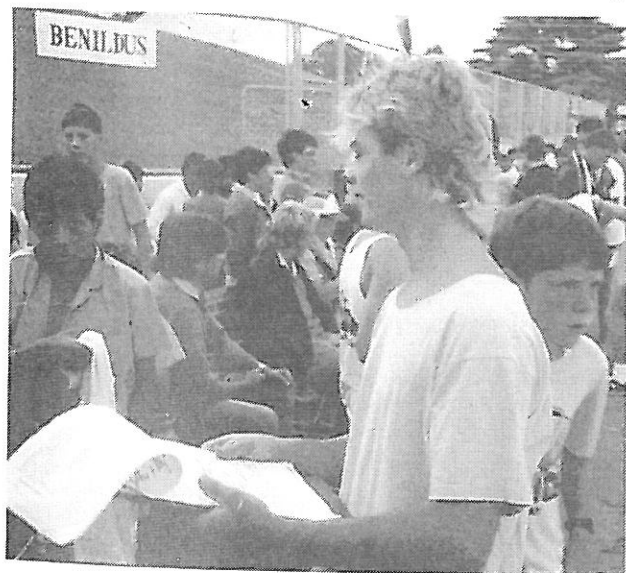
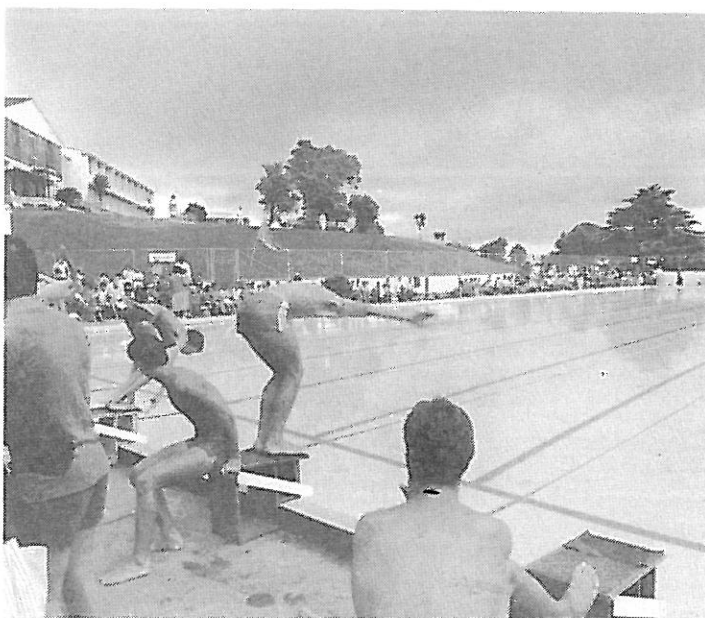

Low point of the day - getting beaten in the relay by a team which had a girl in it.

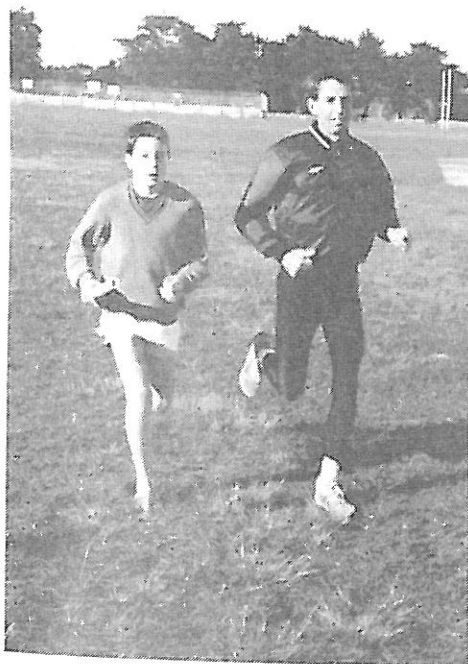

BASKETBALL - 1989

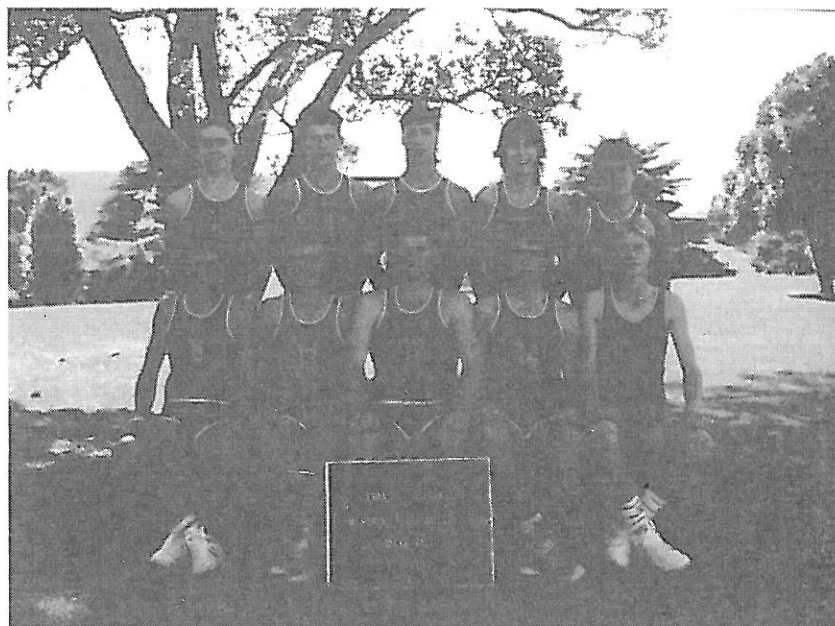

Under 16 tournament team and **Dion** and **Blair Brookes** were selected in the Wanganui Invitation tournament team, in which David Clarke was named Most Valuable Player. **Clinton Elvy** was a member of the Taranaki Secondary Schools team, and **Matthew Myers**

was in the New Plymouth team which won the Central New Zealand Under 14 tournament.

The boys left New Plymouth amongst a high profile in the media. New Plymouth airport was filled with photographers and cheer leaders farewelling the local heroes.

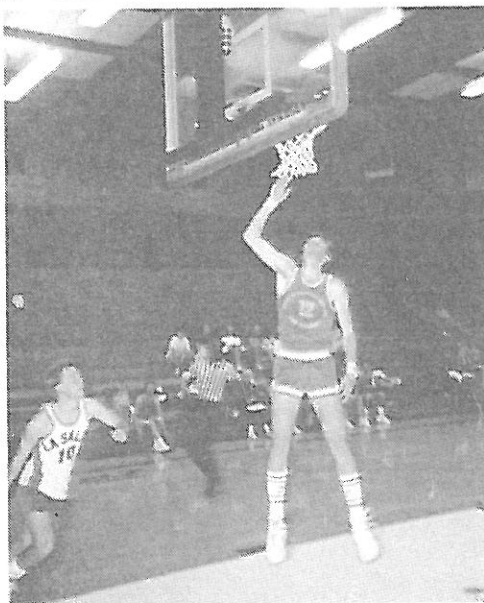

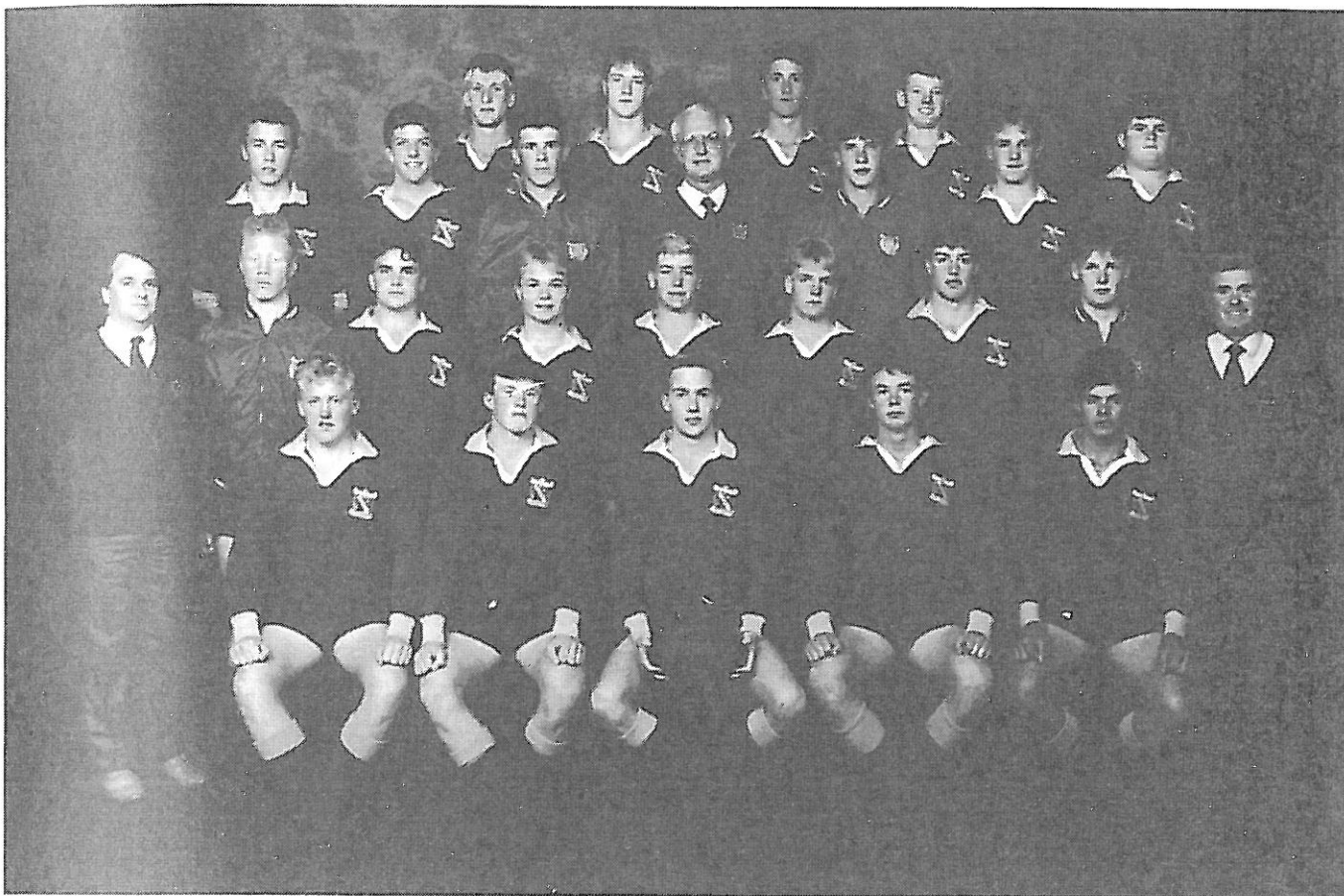

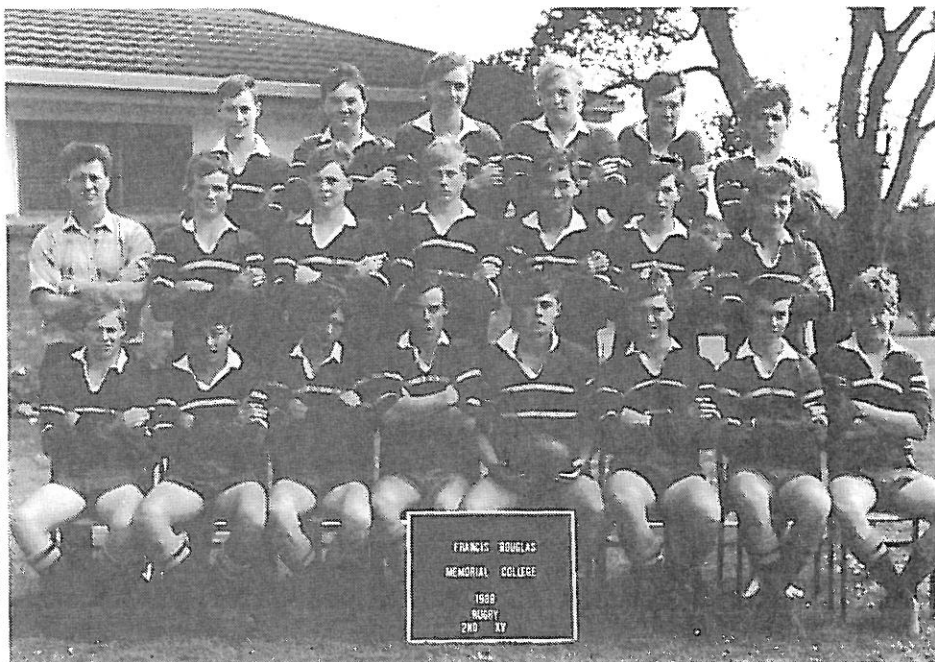

As the try scoring indicated all the backs enjoyed their season.

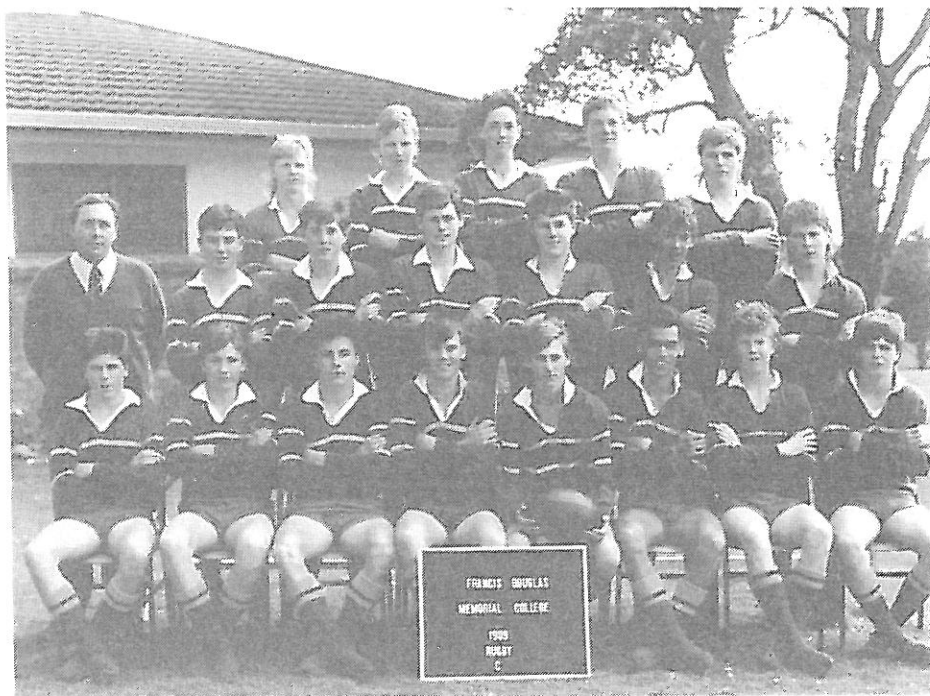

To the lads leaving school at the end of this year we wish you well and hope you will continue playing soccer.

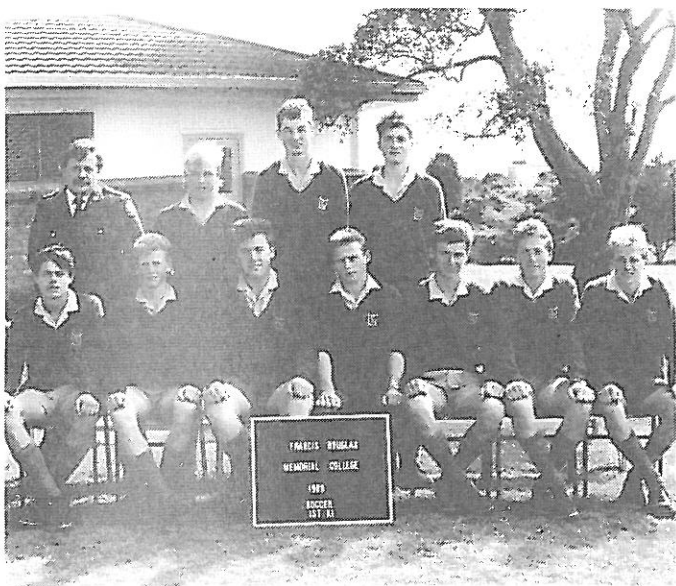

FOUR LEAF CLOVER APPEAL

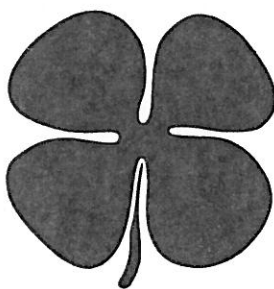

One of the best individual efforts in the competition was 'Sam Richardson's' for winning of the Junior prepared speech. This was only the second time the school has achieved distinction.

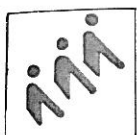
The Religious Questions team gained five points out of a possible 5 points as did the Drama team.

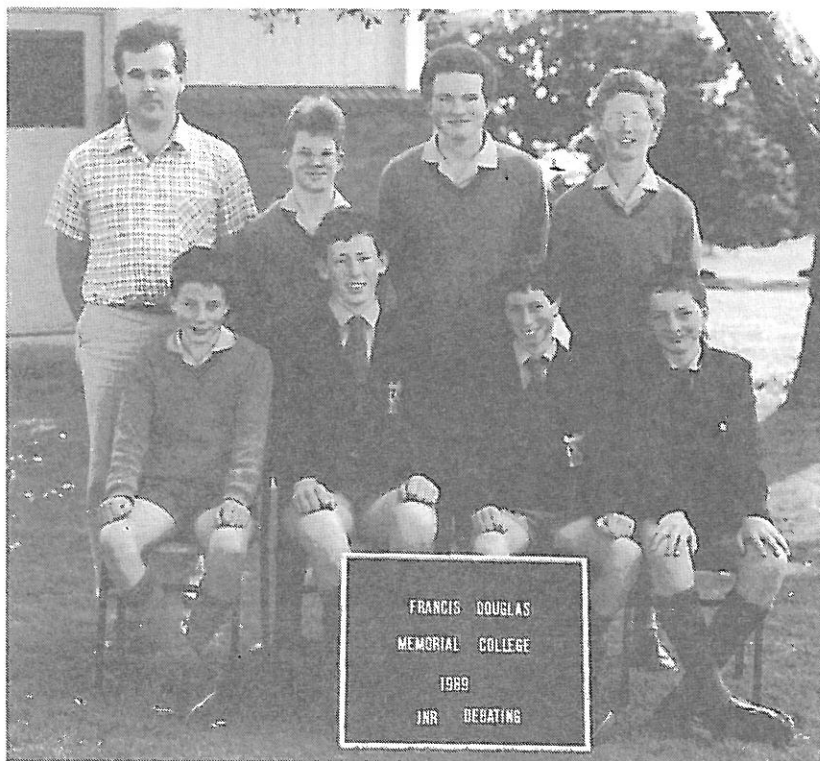

O'SHEA SPEECH - SAM RICHARDSON

There was no gun salute.
No ringing of the bells.
Not even a notice in the local paper when this baby was born. In 1870.

Researching his life I found we had three things in common:

First we were both born in Taranaki.

Second we both suffer a communication disability, his a speech defect and mine a hearing problem.

Third we are small people, commonly known as weeds - but his birth was to touch in some small way all of us who are gathered here together this weekend. He was taken by his parents in horse and cart to the Catholic Church in Hawera and baptised Thomas. Life in the rural area was busy for him, chores at home, mountain to climb, but all too soon those carefree days are left behind and Thomas finds himself a foundation pupil of St. Patricks College, Wellington, where he proved himself an excellent student and a talented sports person. We know he enjoyed his days at school. There seemed little doubt in his mind that his vocation in life would be the priesthood, something he had given careful consideration to for many years. For seven years, he trained at the seminary in Rome as there was, at that time, no seminary in New Zealand. After being ordained he returned, and was sent to assist Archbishop Redwood in Wellington. It was not long before Thomas was called to higher things and in 1913 he became an Archbishop.

You may feel that life went quite smoothly for Thomas but no. In his position as the Hierarchy of the Church, he was expected to mingle with important people, and address meetings. This, because of his speech impediment he found very, very difficult. One of the words he found hard to get his tongue around was the very word "Catholic". Each time he was asked to address a gathering he was very nervous and as his hands sweated, and his heart pounded, he wondered just how can I help young people to overcome what he was suffering. How can I get them at a young age, give them the opportunity that was not available to him to speak in public.

In 1946 Thomas got his chance. A meeting was called for to finalise the recession, through lack of interest, of the Wellington Debating Club. It was suggested that a speech contest for the catholic colleges of Wellington take the place of the now defunct Wellington Debating Club. Instantly pint size Thomas made his point. He said "Our Lord went to the highways and the byways," I put forward that we ask all the Catholic colleges of the Wellington Archdiocesan. We invite Feilding, Greenmeadows, Hastings, Masterton, Napier, Porirua, Wanganui and his own Province Taranaki for a weekend of speech, Drama and companionship and for 43 years we have done so. Thomas lived to see his dream fulfilled and was even able a few times to present the prizes.

I admire Archbishop Thomas who through his disability has given confidence and challenge to myself and so many before me. I say to you all this weekend let your applause be for the competitors.

But let your accolades be for this baby born in Taranaki, who as a man turned his disability to our advantage.

Let us acclaim

Archbishop Thomas O'Shea

Instigator of the O'Shea Shield.

FDMC PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

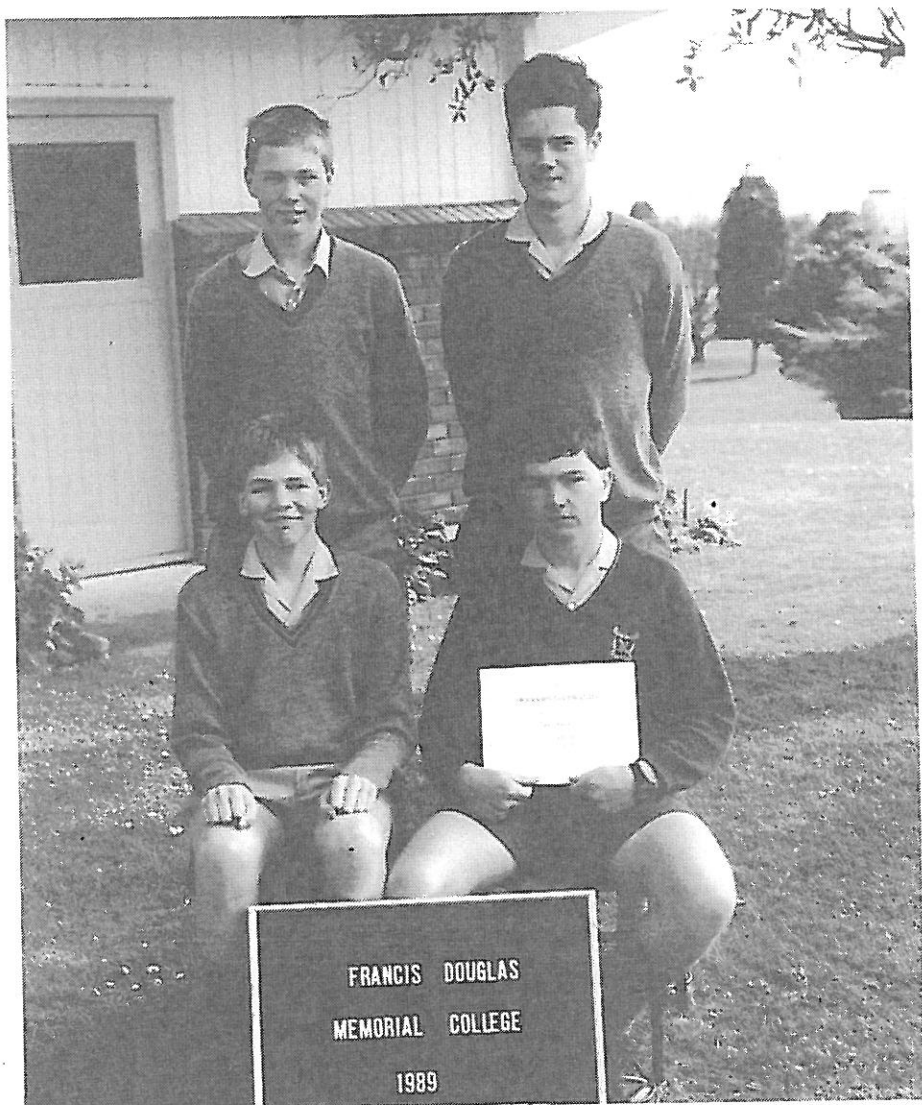
This year the FDMC Photographic Club hit full swing, with many boys taking photography as their Thursday afternoon option.

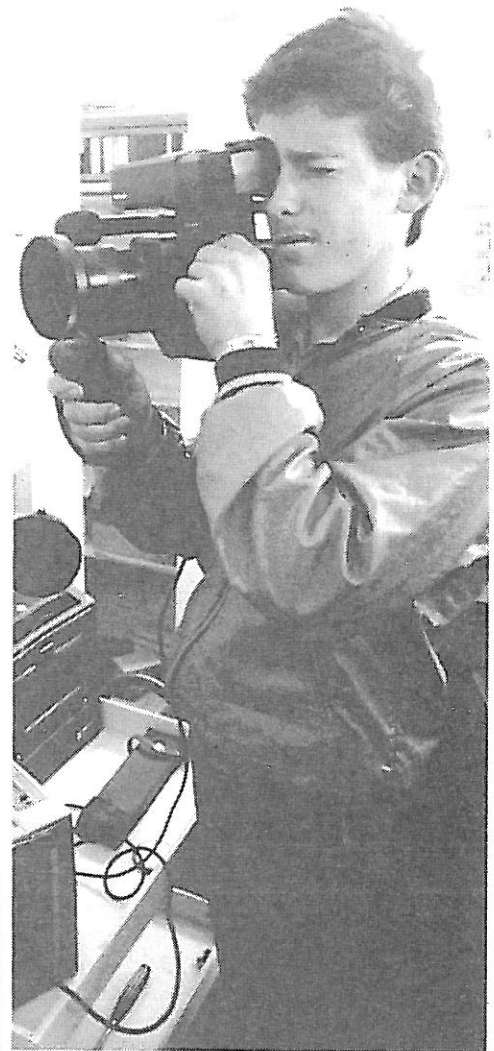

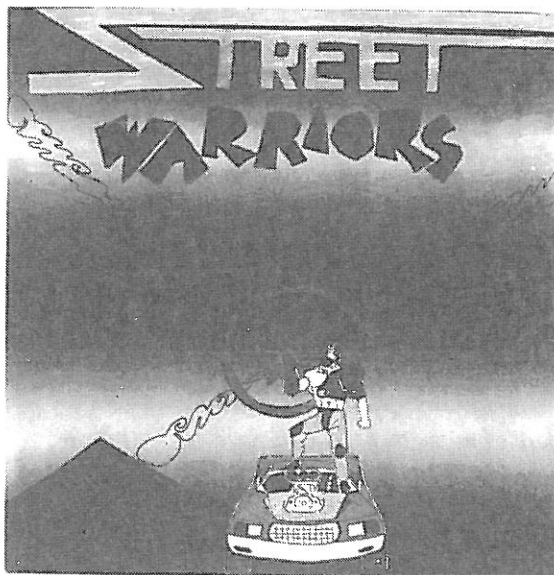

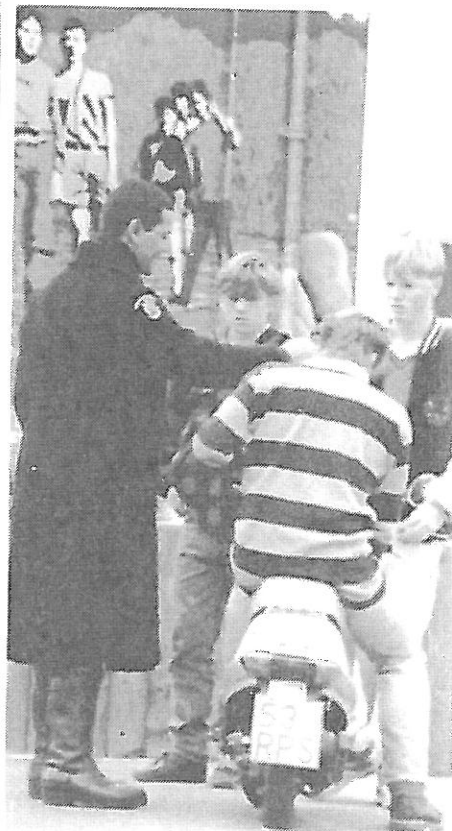

MOTORCYCLE ELECTIVE
