PRINCIPAL'S COMMENTS FOR 1990

This year of 1990 has been the beginning of a new decade and also a new era for education in this country through the advent of "Tomorrow's Schools". While it is possible to gain some idea of what these arrangements are by reading the material available, the true impact of the changes will not really be known for quite some time. There are real dangers associated with the devolution of responsibility to the local areas, with the risk of mistakes being made which could have serious consequences for the students and the future of the college. The other side of that coin, however, is that there are also possibilities which have not yet been really explored and which have enormous potential for this college to continue to grow to become a place which is truly an experience of the Good News, a place where individuals are cared for and where their needs are addressed and met.

The challenge which lies ahead is for the possibilities inherent in the arrangements which now exist, being made into a reality. This will not happen simply because some people wish it to happen. It will only happen if there are enough people who are committed to the idea and are prepared to work to make the dream into a reality. To continue to work to make this a truly Catholic school is something which everyone involved in the college needs to face. In looking back over more than thirty years of the college's existence, it is possible to see many people who have worked very hard to make this a college which reflects the value of Jesus Christ. It is on the shoulders of those people we now stand and it is our responsibility to continue to build that spirit which enables those values to be obvious.

In the spirit of Fr Francis Douglas, after whom the college is named, and of John Baptist De La Salle, the founder of the brothers, people have worked to put in place a programme and a way of operating which is life-giving to both those who run the college and those who attend. Sometimes things have worked together so that students, parents and staff have been really blessed by being involved here. At other times, this has not been the case. The challenge is to make the first situation more frequent! Everything going on in the college needs to be examined and the question needs to be asked "Is there a better way?" Nothing should be excluded from that examination. There is a need to ask that question about what and how things are taught, how things are organised, how people are treated, the way people are kept informed and so on. It also needs to be asked about and by each individual and their involvement in the place. Each of us make decisions which are either life-giving or the opposite. We need to weigh up those decisions so that we are aware of the responsibility we have for the welfare of the other people involved in the college and the college itself. The college is different because of our presence here. The question is, it is better?

Against this background, the future of the college needs to be seen. People will make decisions which will either enhance the character of the college, or diminish it. The advent of "Tomorrow's Schools" has made it possible for the influence of local people to determine to a much greater extent what will happen in their schools. With such a positive tradition of involvement behind us in this college, I would challenge each of you to work to make this a college which can justly call itself Catholic and one where efforts are made to support one another to spread the Good News which Jesus brought. We each have our part to play and we each must take responsibility for doing or not doing our part to make this a college worthy of the name Catholic.

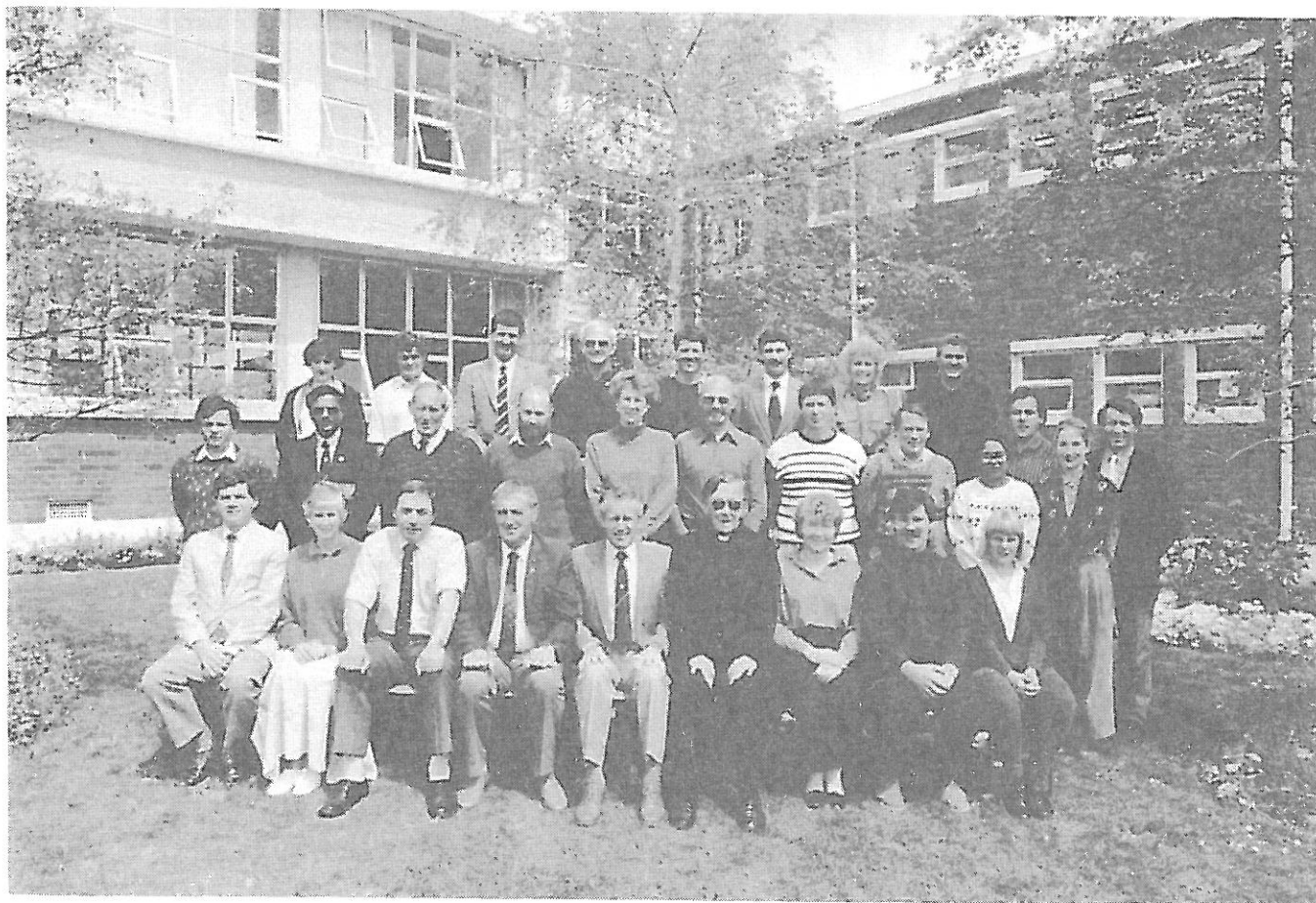

I know the future of the college is in good hands and I wish you all well as the college moves further into the 1990s and towards the end of this century. May the Lord continue to guide you all and give you the spirit of wisdom and understanding so that you may have the insights and courage to continue to work to build up a college here which is an experience of the Good News for all those involved.

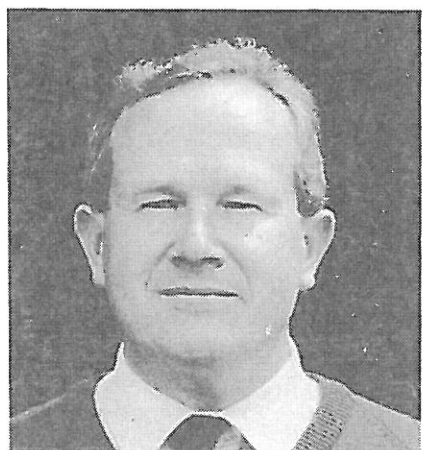

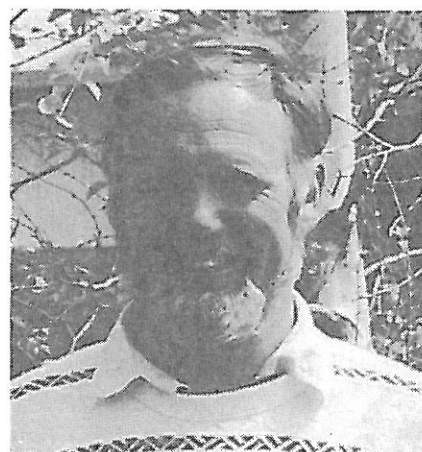

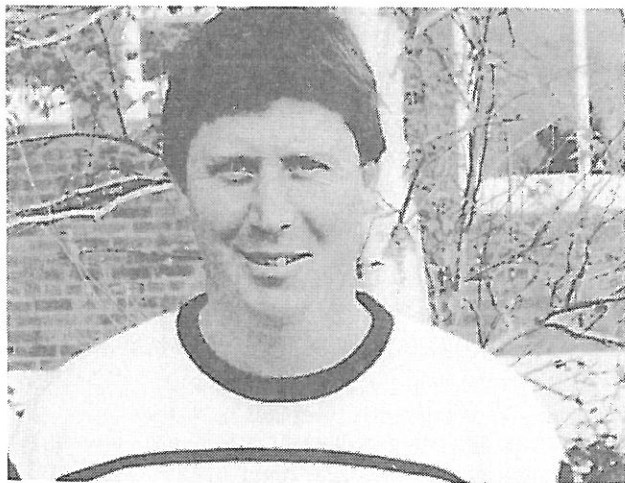


BR OLIVER O'LEARY

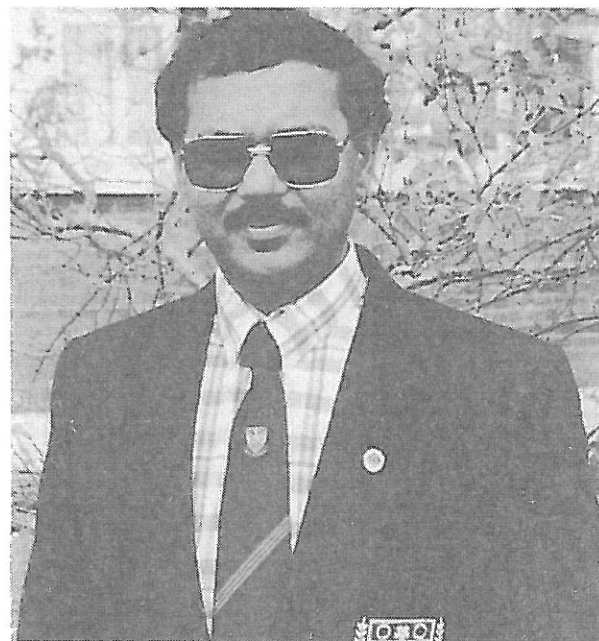
RICHARD DOHERTY

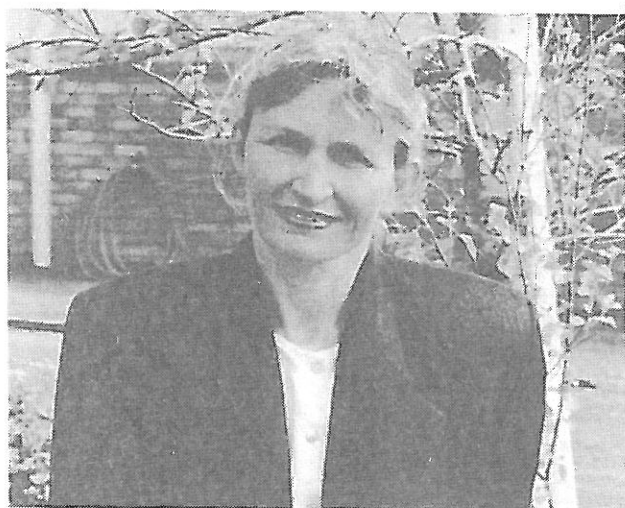


POOBALAN MAISTRY

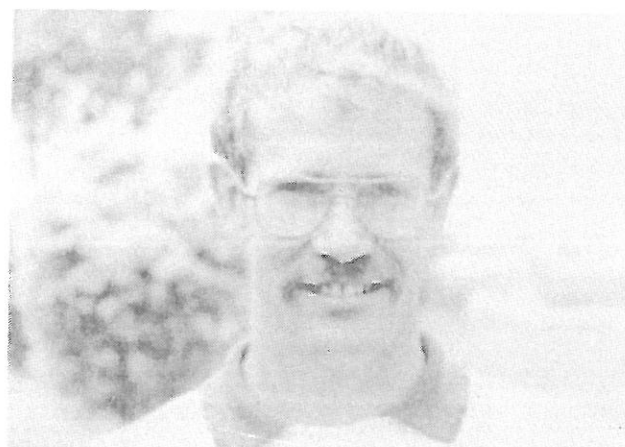
MARGARET MILNE

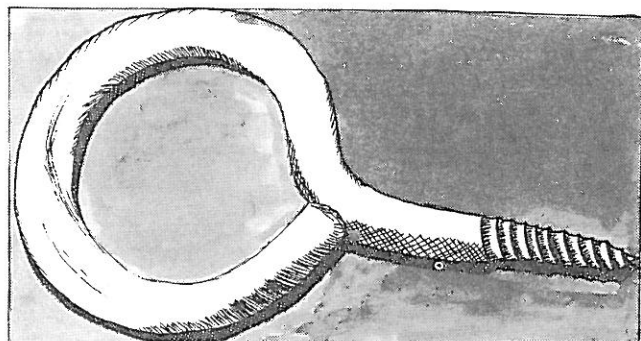
ALAN COLDICOTT

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

REPORT FROM CHAIRMAN BOARD OF TRUSTEES

This year, 1990, was the year that "Tomorrow's Schools" became "Today's Schools" and Boards of Trustees across the country took up the challenge of handling the majority of schools' expenditures.

The Francis Douglas College Board has taken up this challenge and despite the insufficiency of funding, has handled the task with skill and dedication.

This year saw another significant change for the school with the resignation of Brother Peter after twelve years as Principal. This was the first time the Board has handled a major appointment under "Today's Schools" and because of the importance of their decision, the Board was deliberate in setting its criteria for the person it wished to appoint.

The Board is delighted to have gained the services of Brother Timothy Peter as the new Principal and, although we have to wait a year, we believe the wait was worthwhile to gain a Principal of Brother Tim's calibre and experience.

It would be inappropriate if we did not, in the context of this report, acknowledge the contribution Brother Peter has made to this school, firstly as a teacher and then as Principal for twelve years. During his period at the College, there have been many changes such as the new Hostel block, the new woodwork, art and music block, the new Chapel, the revamped old chapel and the revamped old dormitories. He has also coped with integration, the Form 1-7 issue, "Tomorrow's Schools" Today's Schools". He also found the time to be Chairman of the Integrated Schools, Principals' Association, and was the driving force behind the push for training for teachers to preserve the 'Catholic Character' of our schools.

During this same period, society has changed significantly with the demand for different forms of discipline, leading recently to the forbidding of corporal punishment at schools. Brother Peter has been a leading exponent of pupils being responsible for their actions, a concept which has not won universal acceptance, but when one hears reports of F.D.C. boys performing with distinction at tertiary institutions because they are better equipped to handle the options open to them because of this insistence of their being responsible for their actions, then one must regard the concept as successful.

This innovation is at the leading edge of change and at times, can be a lonely experience, especially if perceptions in the wider community do not appreciate what is trying to be achieved. It will be interesting to see how other schools will grapple with the abolition of corporal punishment, and in this regard, Francis Douglas College is well placed, having been using an alternative system for some five years.

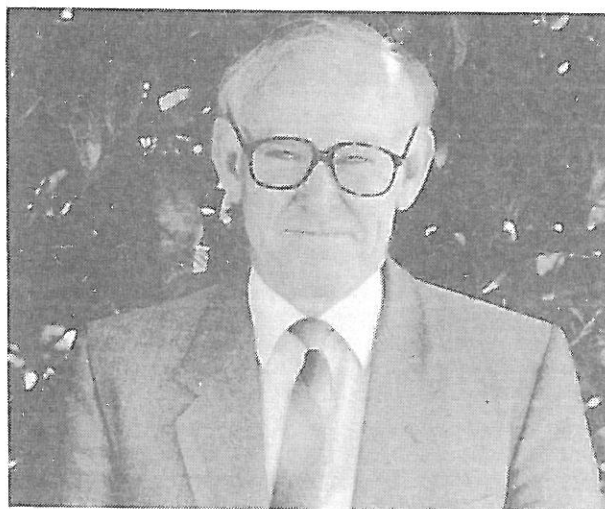
The fiercest critics are usually fellow professionals and when recently, this Board received a letter from a former Principal of a Taranaki Secondary School, in which he said, amongst other things "That N.Z. was losing an outstanding educator", then that is praise indeed.

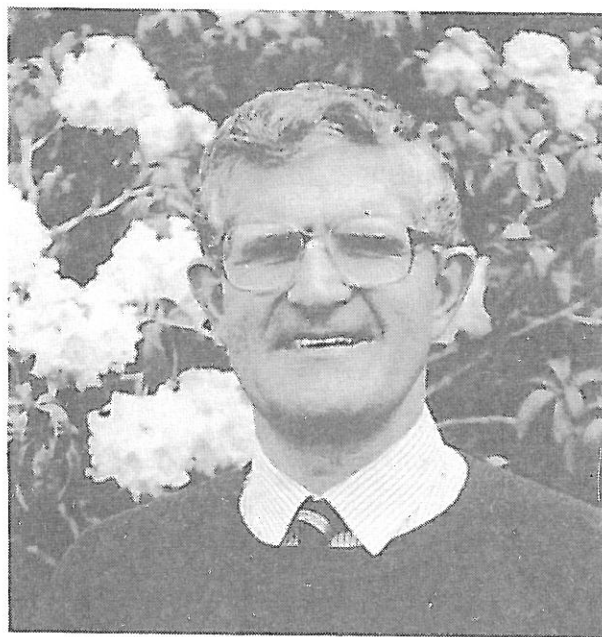

Firstly I would like to thank the board for their commitment and dedication. Their work is evident in and around the school, though they deserve a lot more support and interest from the school community.

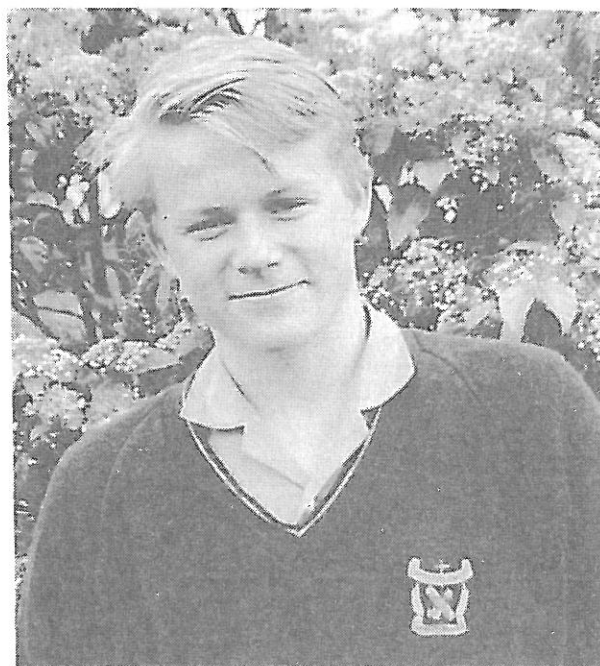
As Student Representative on the board, I've had the opportunity to learn many procedures about how a organisation is run and I have come to understand more about people's ideas and attitudes. To any person looking in future years to be a representative on the board, you need to be a confident and listening person who can think of the final outcome to every decision. You will learn a lot about people and about the systems we have created for ourselves. I have really enjoyed having the privilege to represent the students on the board, and I wish the Board every success in the decisions they will have to make in the future.

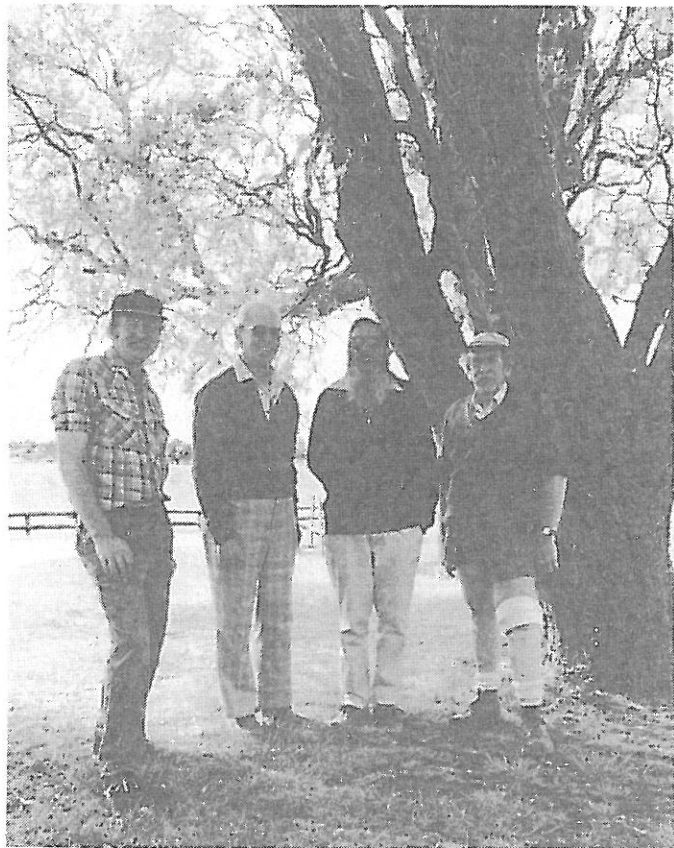
OFFICE and ANCILLARY STAFF

P.T.A. PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1990

I have much pleasure again in presenting the annual report of the Francis Douglas Memorial College Parent Teacher Association for the year ended 31 May 1990.

The year has been a very fulfilling one for the Committee not only from the point of view of fundraising activities successfully held but also from the Committee's involvement in some of the aspects of Tomorrow's Schools. There is no doubt in my mind that a school committee that is able to cut its teeth on some of the administrative functions is one which has a greater feeling of selfworth than a committee put together purely and simply as a fundraising vehicle. We have in this financial year attempted both avenues and as a result of this your Committee has worked as a team extremely well and related to each other in a very positive manner. All this of course can only be of benefit to the College.

As was explained last year the disappearance of Housie as a fundraising activity was going to mean that the amount of funds available for donation to the College would be reduced significantly. As a result of this your Committee came up with the idea of tax deductible donations which has been successful in other schools as a relatively painless extraction of funds and yet at the same time providing tax deductibility which is more and more becoming a creature of the past. As a result of the Committee's drive in this direction \$4,674 was donated to the College and this has gone some considerable way to alleviate the loss of Housie. Your Committee was very cognisant of the fact that too much of a demand on parent requests could be disruptive as far as the Gala was concerned however as is stated later, this thankfully was not to be.

The involvement of the PTA in Tomorrow's Schools was evidenced early in the year with the Charter formation and we were pleased to be able to assist in this direction and in the refinement of goal settings by way of a telephone questionnaire. This method of extracting opinions continues to be of great benefit to the College and something in which the PTA is only too pleased to be able to assist. Also two of our Committee - Shona Manton and Bernie Sullivan were appointed to a committee to resolve a policy on recommendations of a code for school uniforms and my thanks to them for their participation in this direction.

Throughout the year apart from the tax deductible donations other fundraising activities were held which included a quiz evening which John Glass our Secretary ran most competently producing an excellent profit and a very enjoyable evening. It is planned to have another of such quiz evenings this year. Secondhand uniforms saw a change in the venue from Sacred Heart College back to Francis Douglas College and this proved successful. Under the guidance of Joan Brookes, Sue Walton and Sandra Kiss the secondhand uniform area has been very competently handled and streamlined to a point where everybody now knows exactly what is happening.

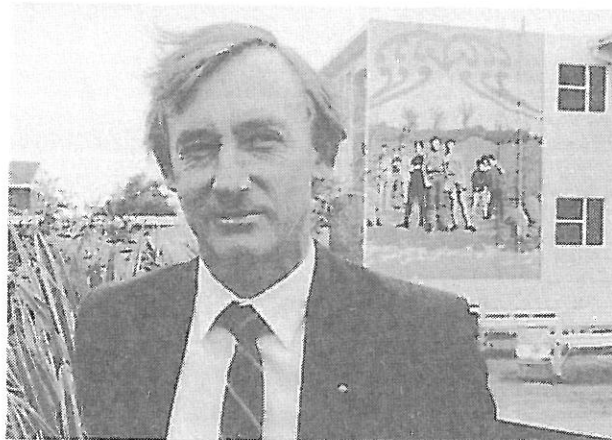
My personal thanks must go to Sandra Johnston who again convened the sub-committee to run the Gala in April of this year, she being ably assisted from the College by Peter Hill. Without their capabilities the Gala would certainly not have been the success that it was. This is evidenced by virtue of the profit (approximately \$8,300) which is a record profit for at least the last five years. The success of this event reflects the work done by the entire Committee of the PTA together with College staff and all the volunteers who assisted on the day and the many parents who gave either of their time or by way of donations to make this what many believe to be the best Gala the College has run.

As a result of all fundraising activities throughout the year the PTA has been able to donate to the College the sum of \$12,700 which represents an increase of \$5,700 on the previous year. Funds raised this year represent an increase of approximately \$1,700 on the previous year's fundraising and this without the benefit of House. Further donations are to be made to the College during the coming year and it is always encouraging to the PTA to know that the funds that are raised through their labours and those of parents are put to such good use by the College administration.

In conclusion I would like to thank my secretary John Glass who again has proved to be a very able and efficient Secretary and to my Treasurer Peter Brown whose efforts save us all a tremendous amount of time and concern. To the Committee at large congratulations on an excellent year and I trust that most if not all of you will be back to serve a further term.

It is with deep regret that we learned recently of Brother Peter's resignation as Principal of the College. The PTA recognises his substantial contribution to the College and to the PTA. He has always been ready to attend meetings, provide full reports and applaud the work done by the Committee. We wish him well in his future chosen path.

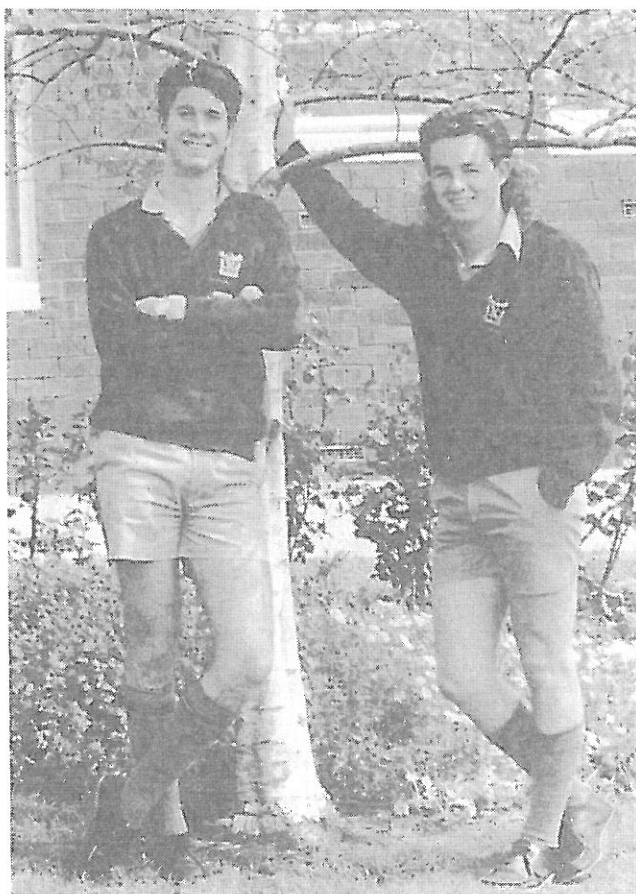

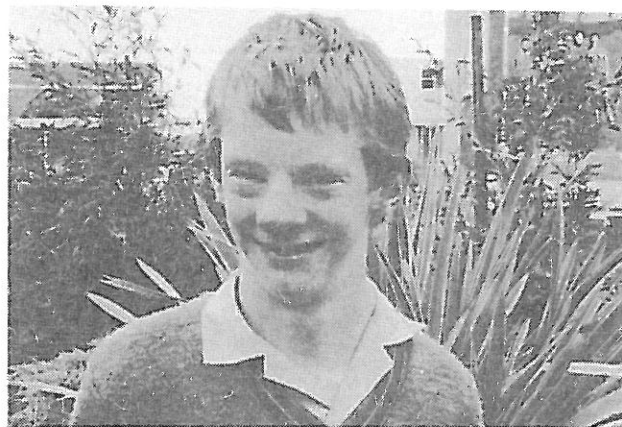
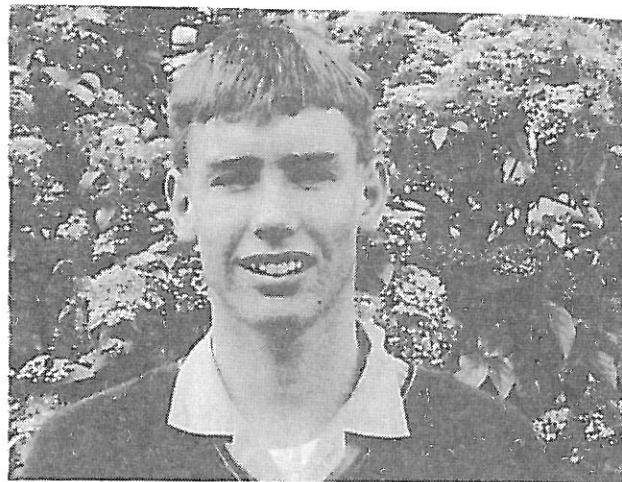
PTA FUND RAISING CHOCOLATE SALES

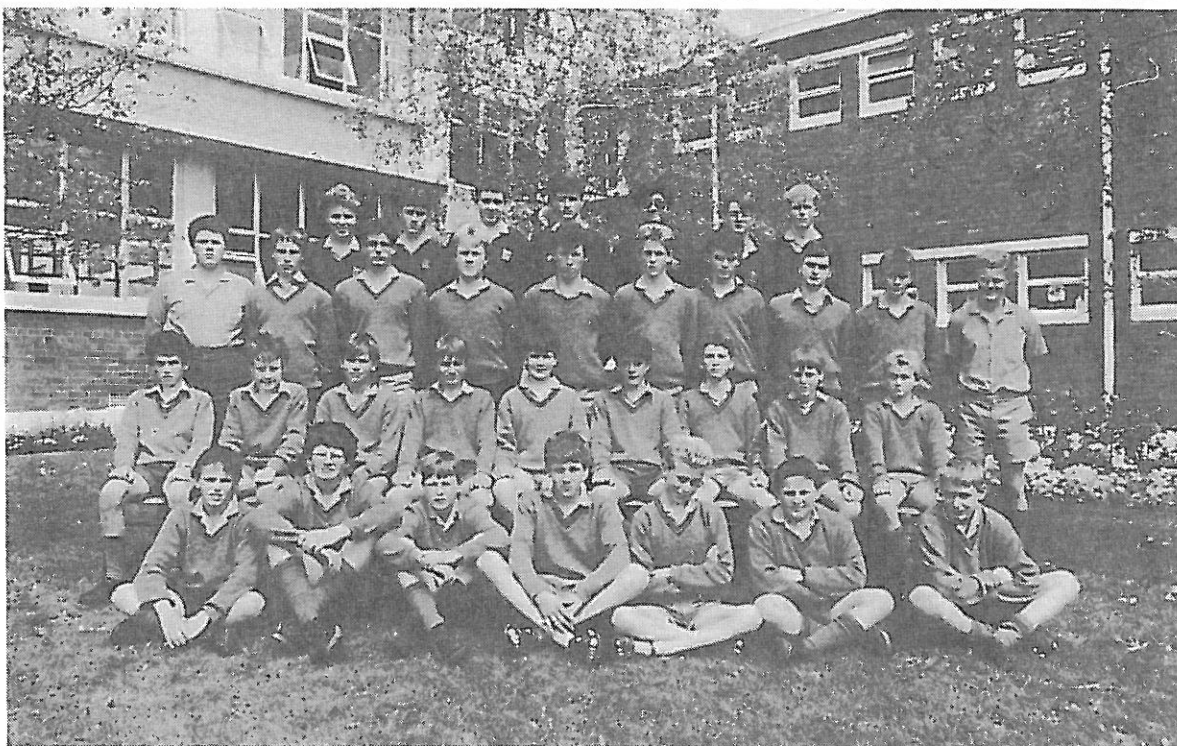

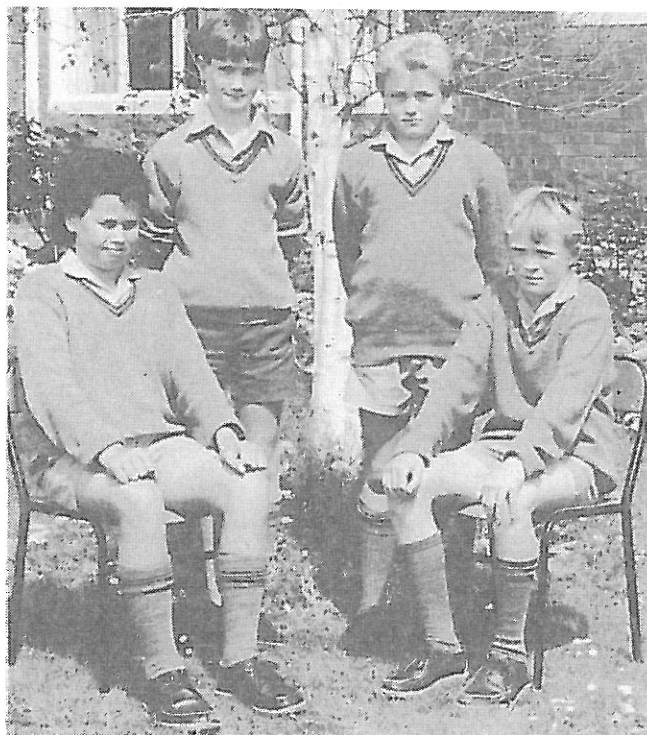

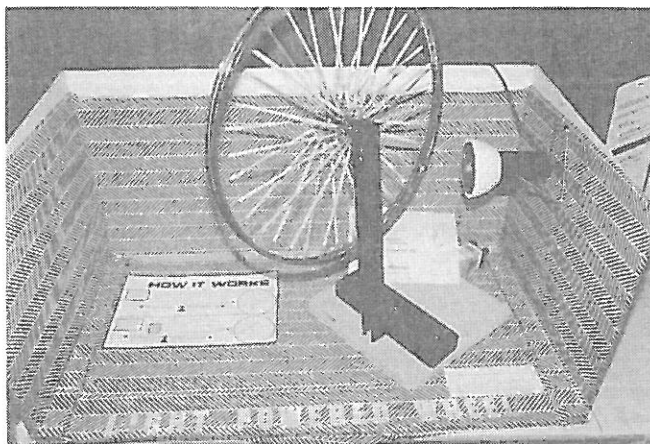
TARANAKI SCIENCE FAIR

I was completely overawed by the Japanese peoples generosity, energy and intensity. Although wealthy, they don't hoard their possessions and are very unselfish. The energy they directed towards whatever they attempted was always an eye-opener, it appeared that I had found a nation filled entirely with perfectionists. It was their intensity that I eventually failed to handle, I continually felt that my "space" was being invaded while they, who were used to being crowded, couldn't tell that anything was wrong.

At the end of my stay, even though I had fallen for the people and places of Japan I was ready to go home. As once said by the Dreaded Pirate Roberts: Not a bad place to visit, but I wouldn't build a summer home there.

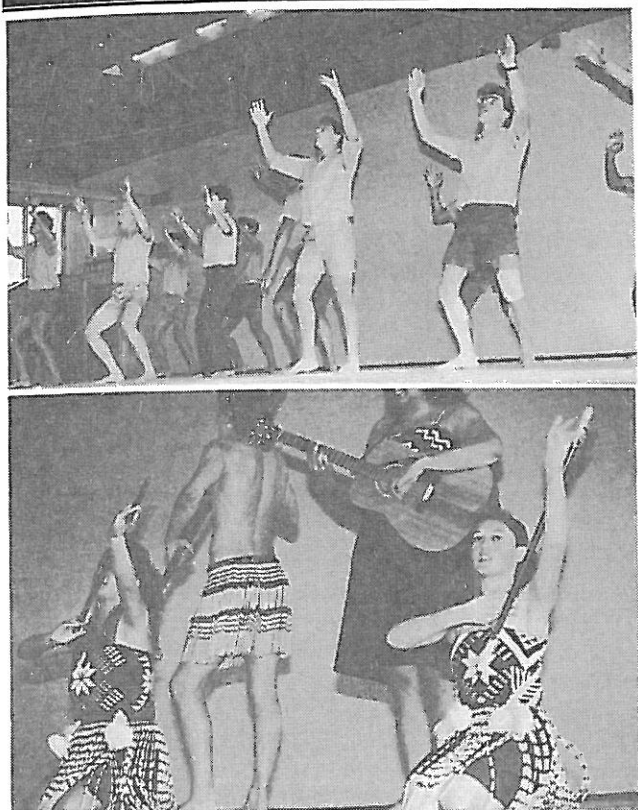

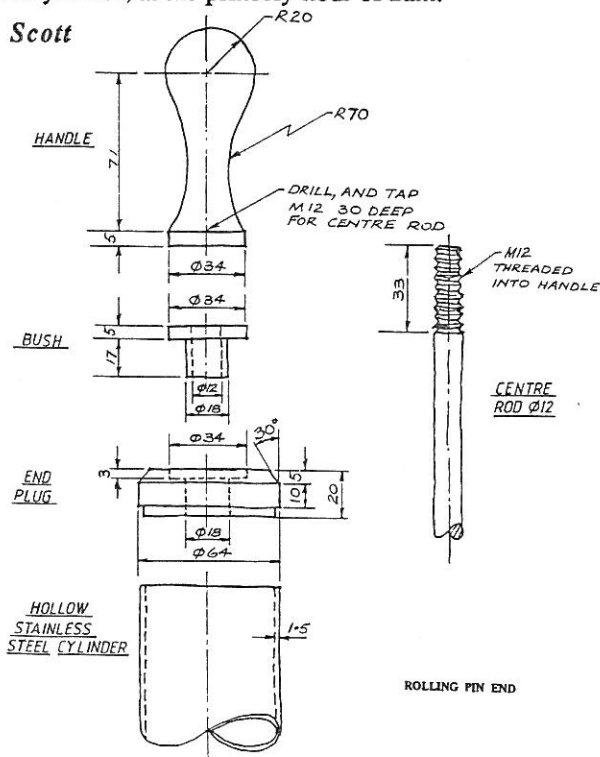

TARANAKI SYMPHONIC YOUTH BAND

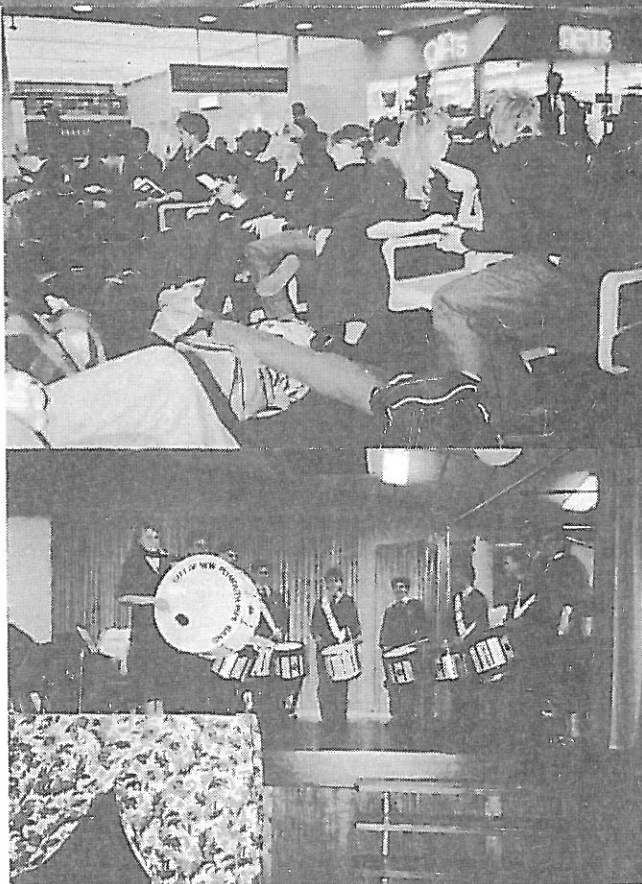

Played 13, won 10, drew 1, lost 2, runners-up in Taranaki E Grade competition.

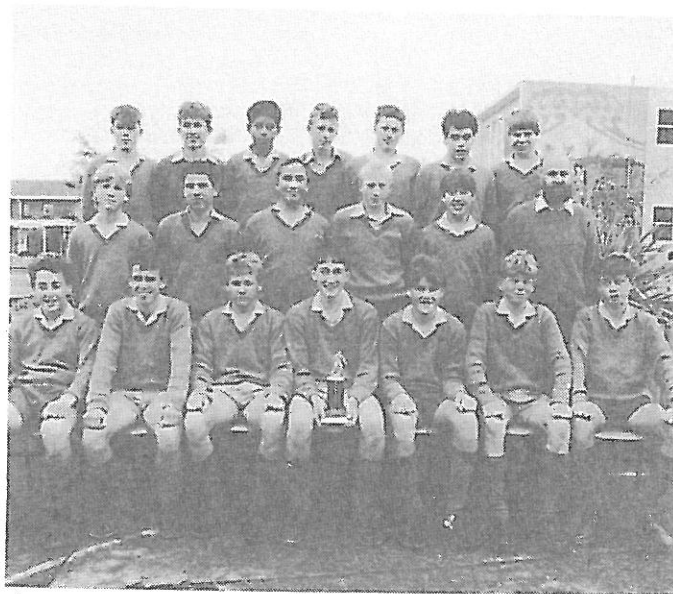

FLOODING STRANDS PUPILS ON EGMONT

Sat. March 10, 1990

Flooding trapped 70 school students on Mt Egmont last night.

Senior Sergeant Paul Brennan of the New Plymouth Police said a party of teenagers from Francis Douglas Memorial College and another from Waitara High School were forced to spend the night in Holly Hut after heavy rain led to flooding and blocked the route out.

"But there is no danger, they are quite safe," he said.

Two people, believed to be a seventh-form pupil and an adult, walked out to warn people of the group's predicament earlier in the day but could not make their way back.

Mr Brennan said the police decided not to send a search and rescue team to Holly Hut with radio equipment last night. "We looked at the situation and decided it would be too dangerous," he said.

The police will consult with their advisers at 8am today and decide whether to send a team in.

There were adults with the pupils at the hut and he believed they had a radio. Messages had been released by Radio Taranaki to say the two who walked out were safe.

The 26-bunk hut is on North Egmont

The real problem was that we didn't have enough food. That night we got about a quarter of a sausage, a tablespoon of rice and a little bit of mince but we could all get second helpings.

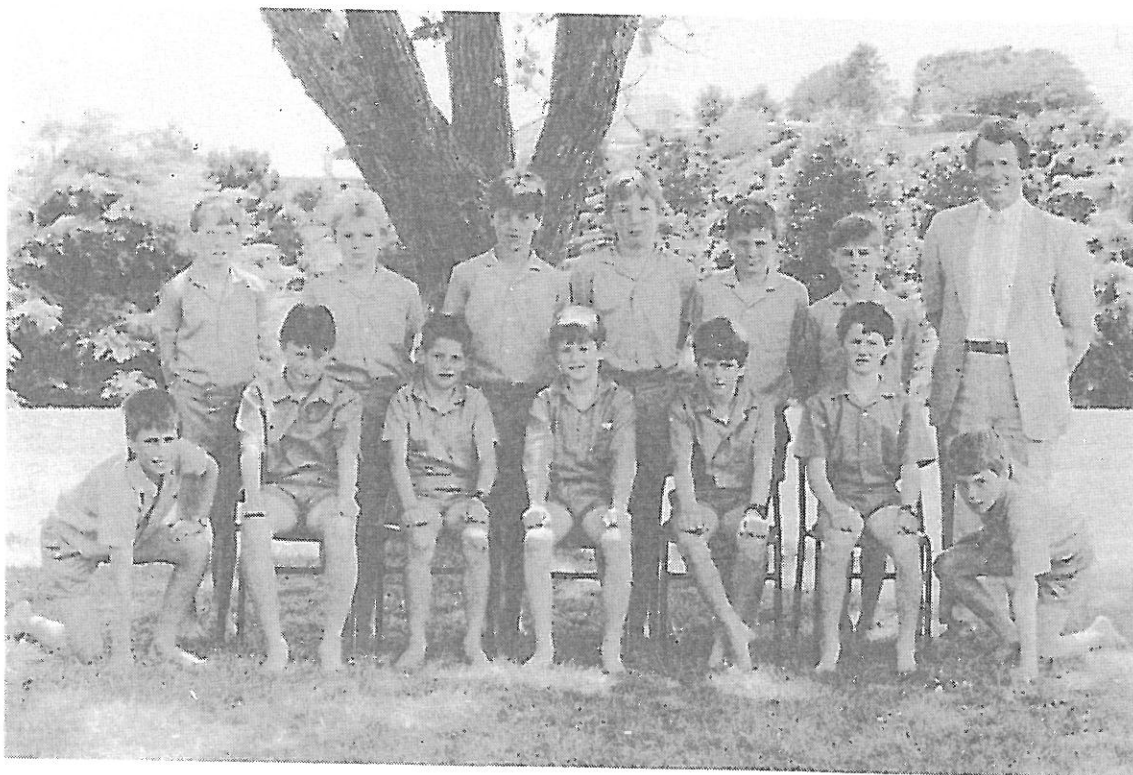

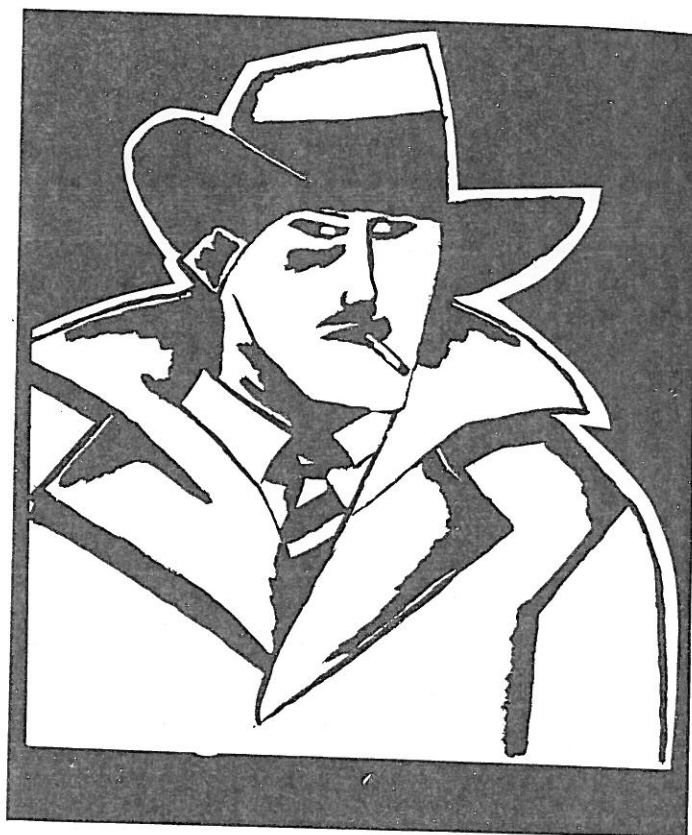


BUGSY McDOG

with a watery whoosh.

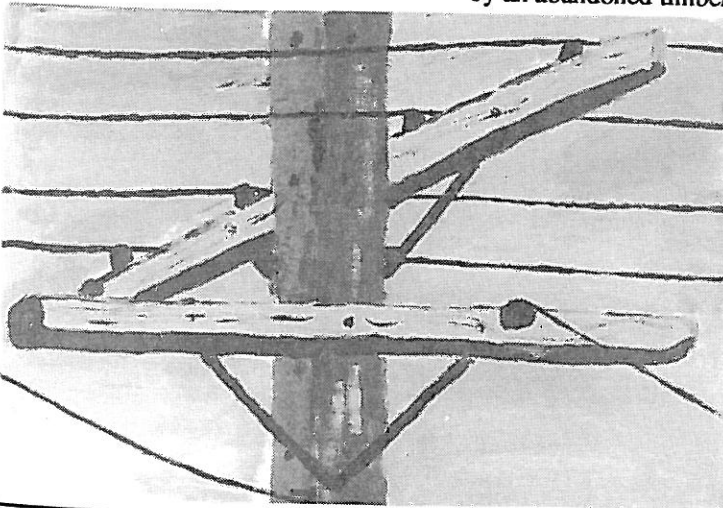

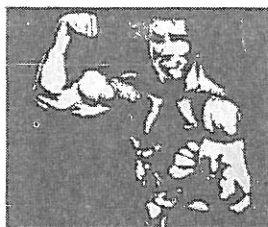
A CLOSE ENCOUNTER OF THE DANGEROUS KIND

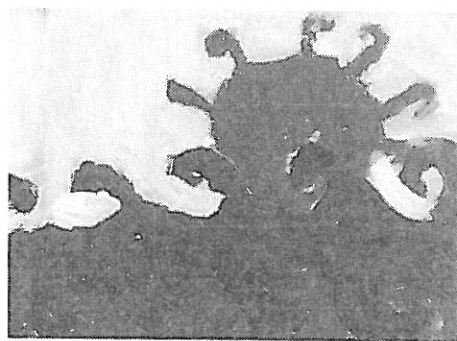

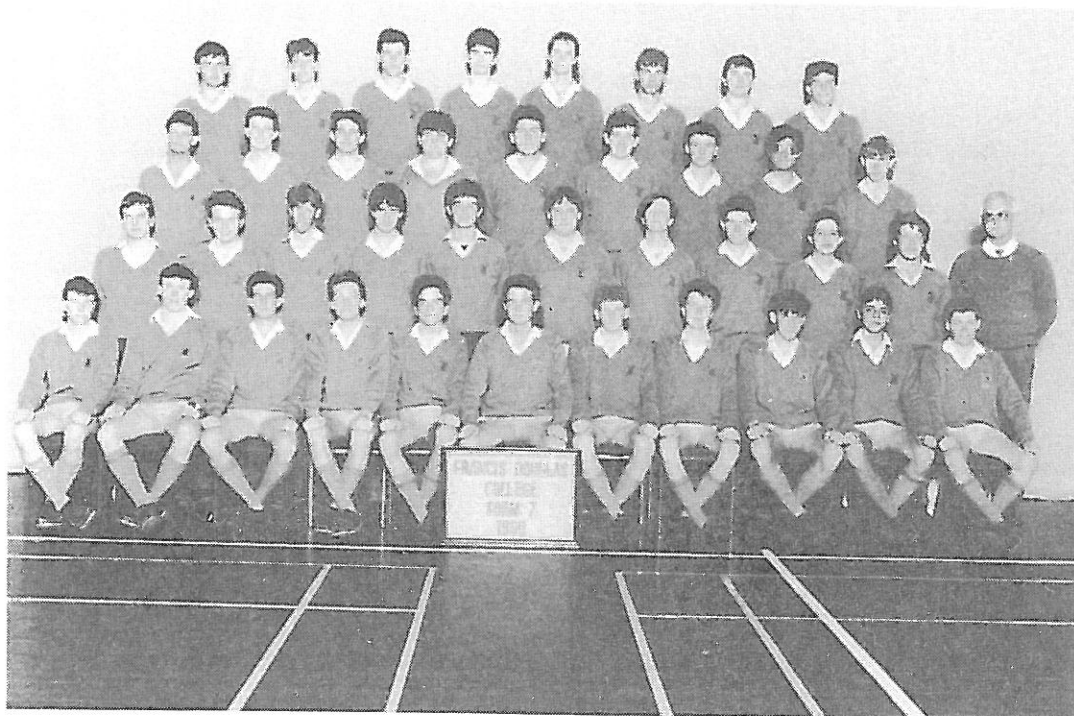
TARANAKI

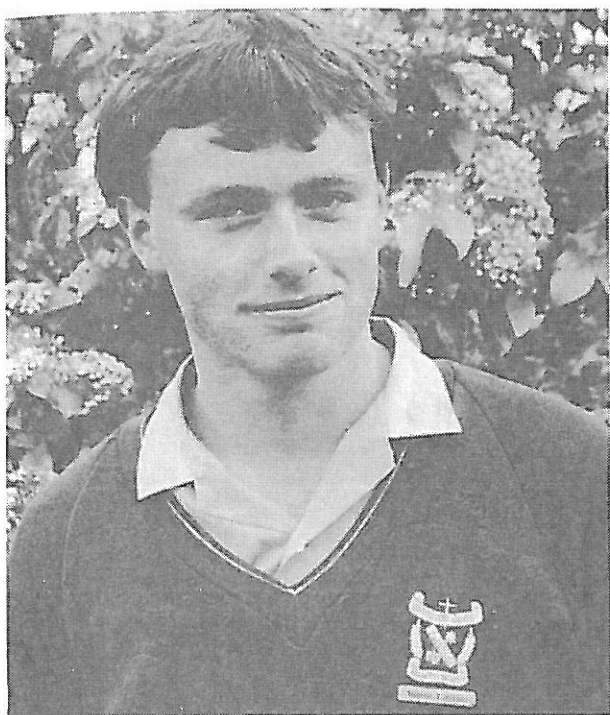

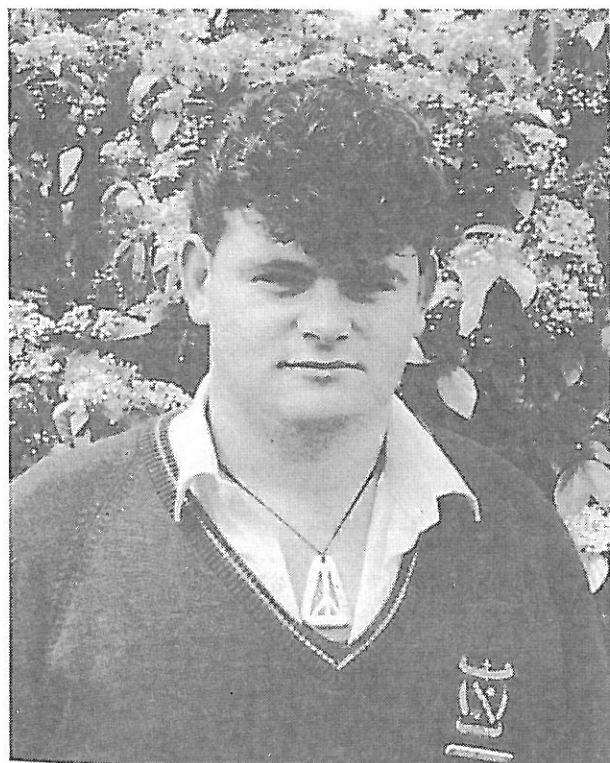
We did not have a great start this year with the swimming sports, but morale was high and we were going to take the Athletics Sports from the first starting gun.

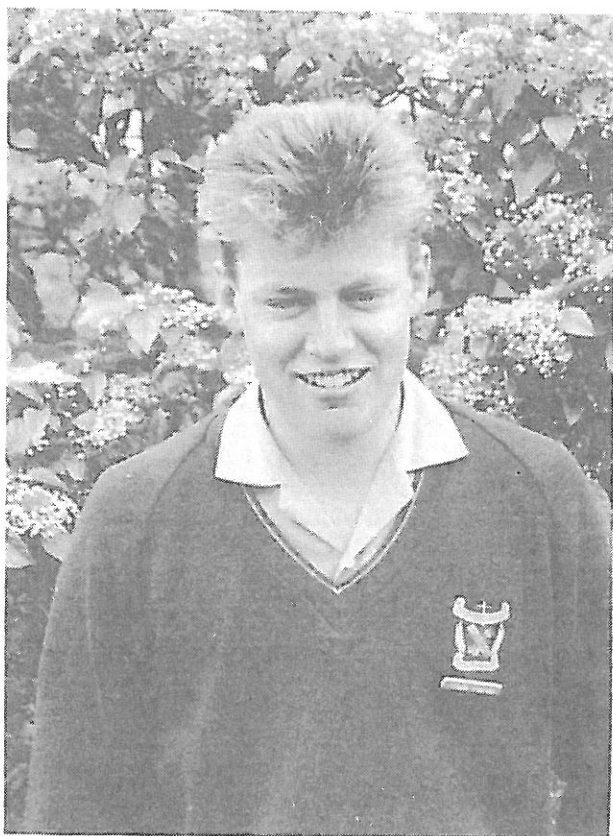
The Athletic sports was another impressive effort with everyone giving their best in trying to take out the double. A very commendable effort saw Benildus come 3rd.
