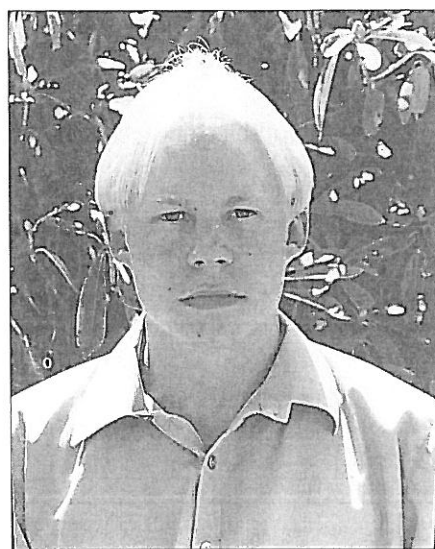

SENIOR 'A' 1998

Coming together in early February for pre season work outs the squad soon showed that this was the season - collectively and individually - for achieving. With the main goal being the N.Z. Secondary Schools National Championships in August, we set about our plan to enable our goal to eventuate.

We set out in 3 stages using tournaments plus frequent games against other secondary schools to maintain and improve our competitive standards.

Firstly the team make up was to be relatively straight forward. Having a great percentage of the 1997 team returning it made an easy adjusting to the environment for the new arrivals.

Secondly were the tournaments - How often would we attend and what time spans would suit our preparation? We decided on 3 - Pre-season (1) Western Heights - Inseason (2) Taranaki Secondary Schools and the Wanganui City Classic - 2 weeks before Nationals.

Thirdly were the Secondary School games to make up the balance of required games before Nationals.

Our plan was set and after 6 weeks of pre-season training we went to test ourselves at the Western Heights High School tournament in Rotorua. Teams in this tournament were predominantly from the Northern Zones - Auckland, Hamilton, Tauranga etc. Showing a few nerves against these bigger teams we soon settled into our game style, wearing down the opposition with speed and skill. This achieved much satisfaction as we were undefeated throughout the tournament, coming home victors.



Next up was the day trip from hell as we travelled, played two games and travelled back home in the 24 hour period. This provided the team with distractions. Hamilton was our destination to play St. Johns College and Cambridge Boys High School. We left New Plymouth at 7.00am Saturday morning, played St. Johns at 11.30am finishing at 12.30pm, feeding then onto St. Peters to play Cambridge Boys High School at 2.00pm. Victorious and tired we arrived back in New Plymouth Saturday evening with 2 wins from 2 games.

Onto our next challenge, the Taranaki Secondary Schools Championships which is used for the qualifying to the N.Z. Nationals. Fronting for the first game against our old adversary NPBHS we were confident of a win as our previous meeting was successful. Not so, they gave us a wake up call by 3 points. This was to our benefit as we then proceeded through the rest of the tournament undefeated to take out the Championship by beating NPBHS by 19 points in the final and becoming Taranaki Secondary Schools Senior Basketball Champions for 1998 plus a place in the N.Z. Secondary Schools National Championships in August.

Our games leading to the Nationals proved to be of a mixture both in styles of the other schools and results. Another inter college game was for the first time against St. Augustines (Wanganui) in our school gym. What an atmosphere was generated by the huge crowd spilling onto the court in some areas. This really lifted the team and consequently the result was great, with 100 plus points difference. Then a couple of curtain raiser games against N.P.B.H.S. and St. Johns College, Hamilton, resulting in a 1 - 1 result.

Our last set of college games was at the Wanganui City Classic tournament. Results were 3 - 2 in our favour - semi successful.

Nationals at last. Overawed and nervous summed up our approach to this awesome spectacle of N.Z. Secondary School sports. Having a real mix of styles to play against led to inconsistencies and fluctuating confidence produced a variety of results. However, we still finished a very commendable 14th placing out of the 24 teams at the tournament and still ahead of the NPBHS who were 15th and St. Johns 20th.

Our total Secondary School games after Nationals totalled 30 with our record as shown:

Played - 30 Won - 23 Lost - 7

We scored a massive 2340 points for and conceded only 1680 which gave the team a very commendable average of scoring:

78 For per game average
56 Against per game average
giving the team a **PLUS 22** points
difference per game average.

Again our Seniors led from the front with Mathew Lawn as Captain (Courageous) and Anthony Light as our ever present 'spark', providing the incentives for the others. The support crew were never far behind as shown when on occasion the leaders would go off course and they would step up into the spots needed.

Where would a team be without its Magical Manager?.

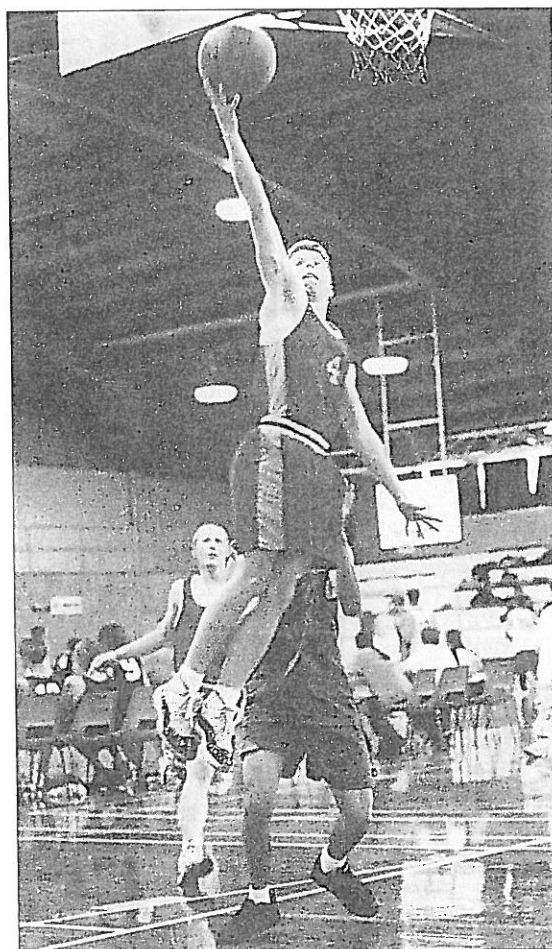

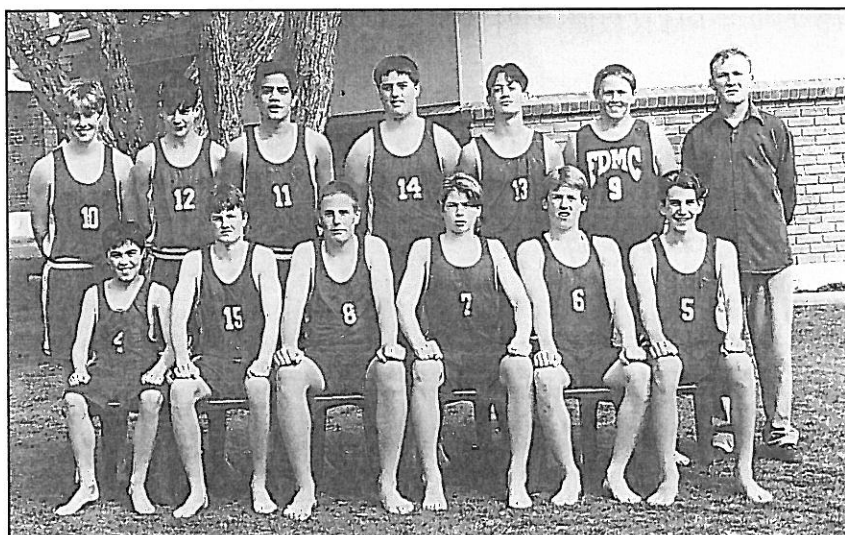
A Huge THANK YOU is extended to manager Mr P. Siffleet and the excellent support crew for the mammoth efforts given in providing stability off the court, especially

lege Basketball. In your quest for achievement remember the "3 C's": Commitment, Communication, Camaraderie.

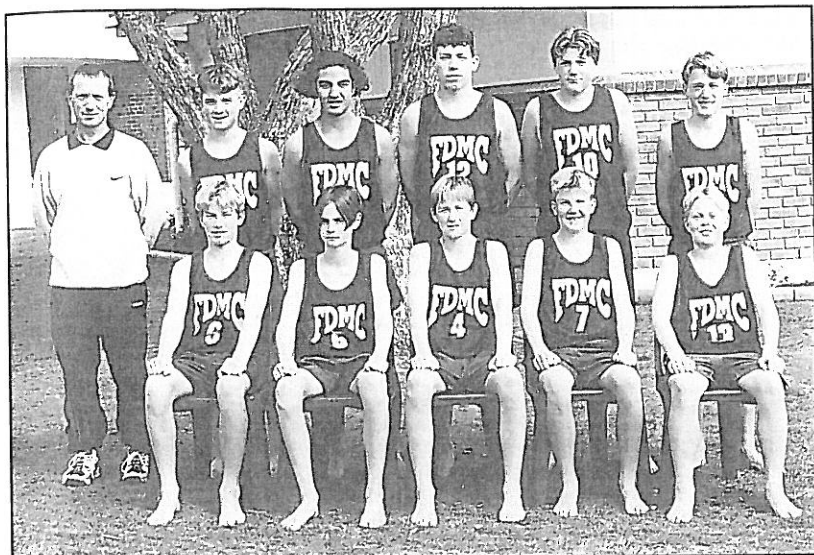

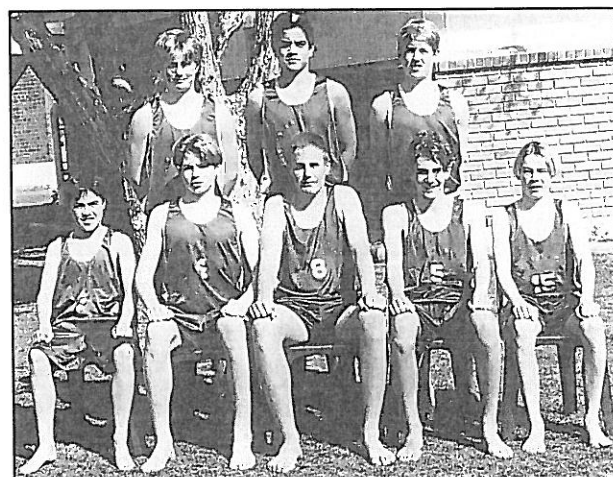
YEAR 10 (UNDER 16)

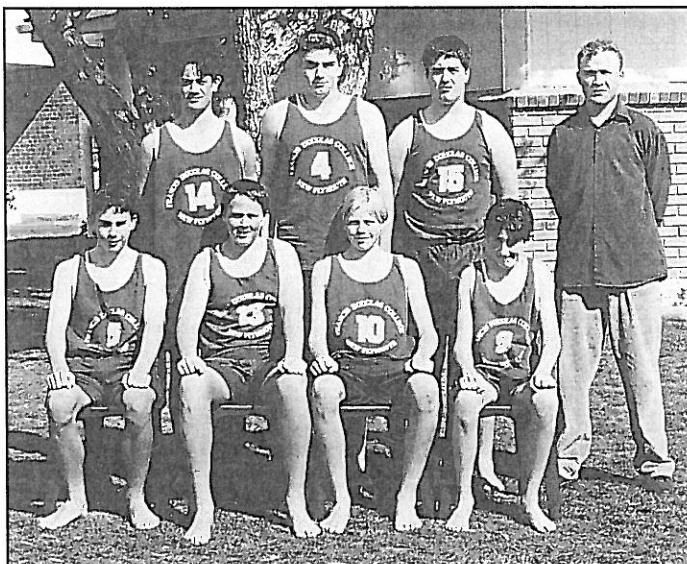

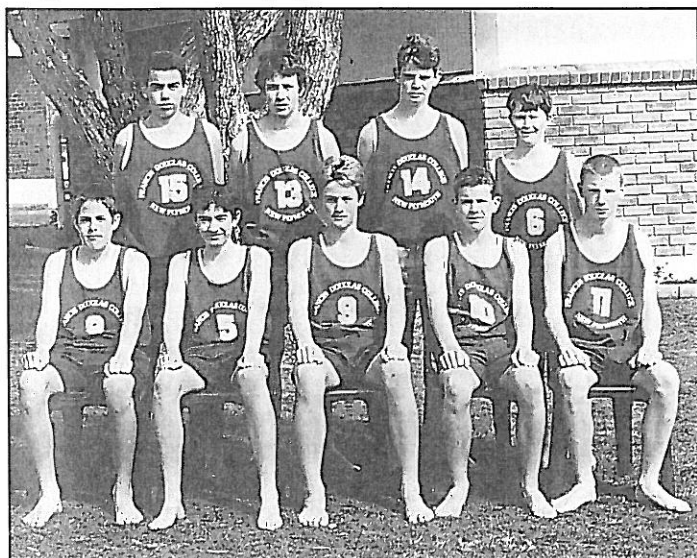

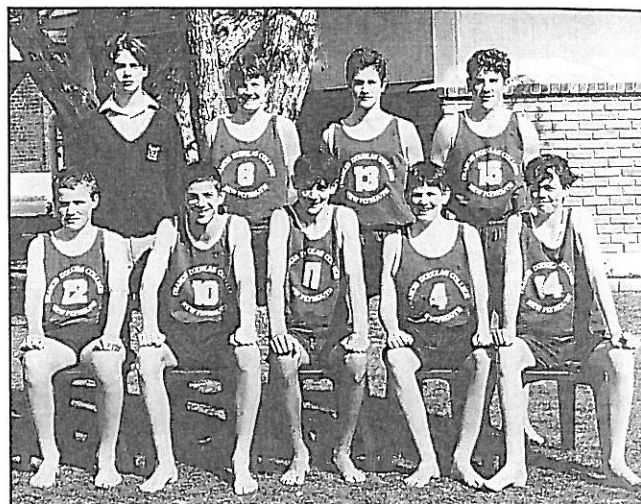

Thank you to Stars Travel for the support given to the team throughout the season. With a huge thank you to all the supporters who gave their time generously all season.

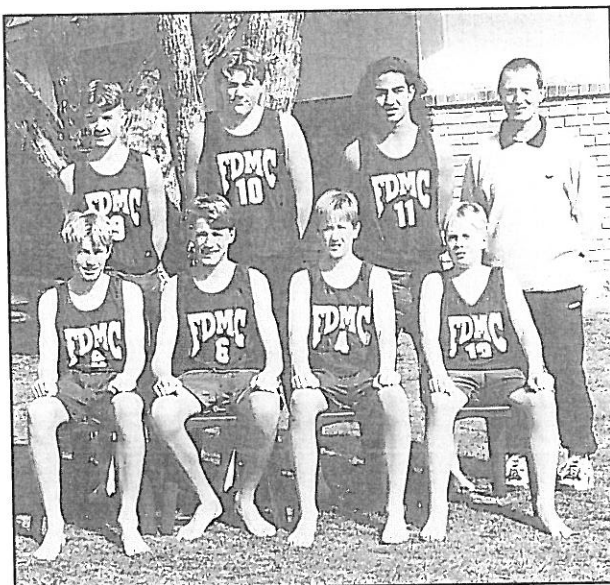

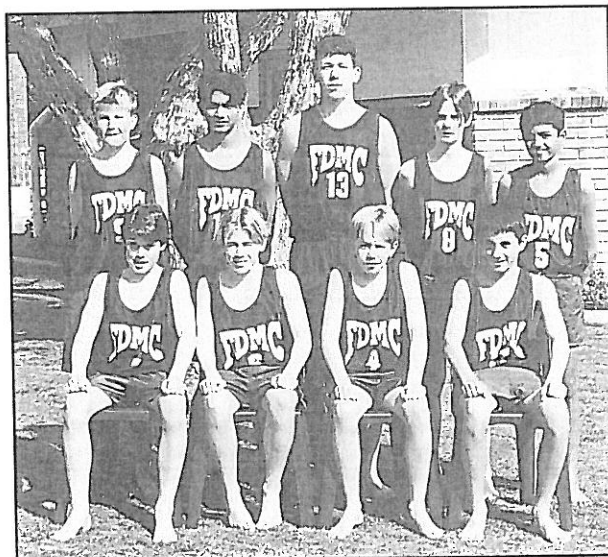
FDMC 'YARROWS' SPARROWS - (the 'B' team)

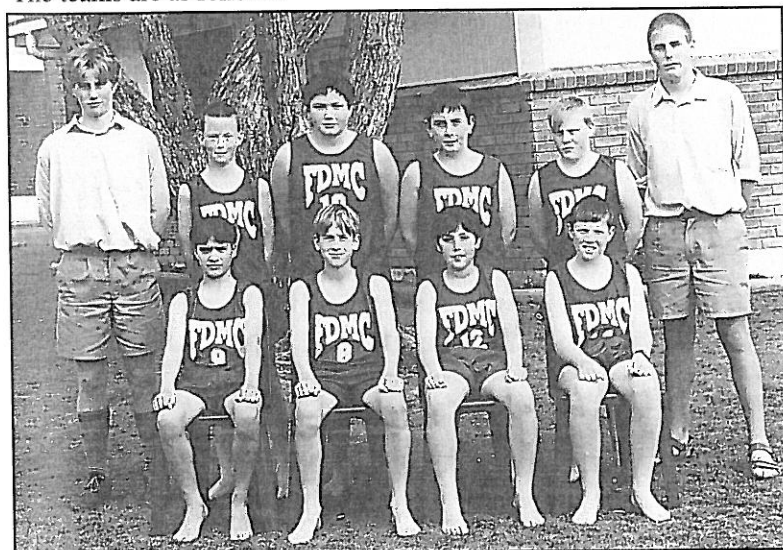
Only two teams were entered in this year competition compared to 4 in 1997.

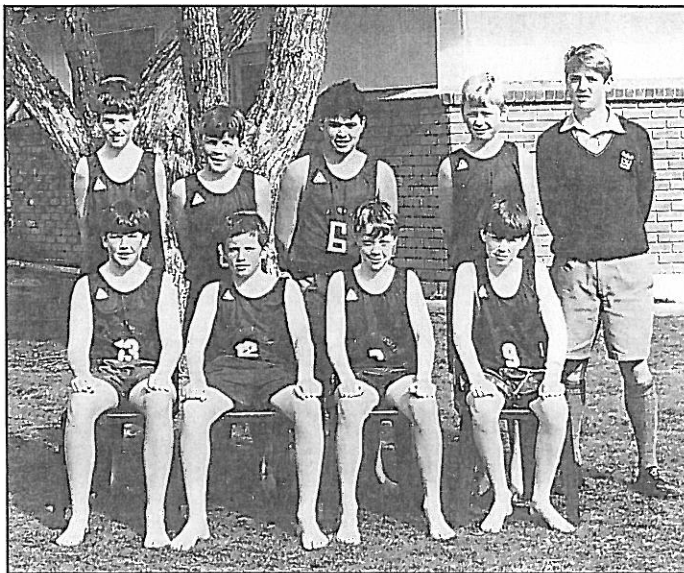

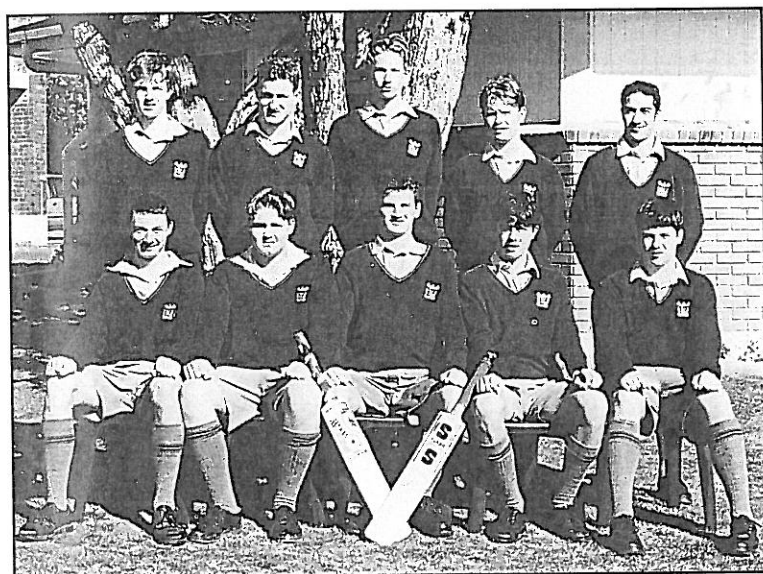
The future prospects for Francis Douglas Memorial College cricket look strong. In 1999 the new Cricket Convenor will be Andy Cowie and he will be ably supported

Presently, the College First XI is leading the Second Grade competition and is yet to lose a game.

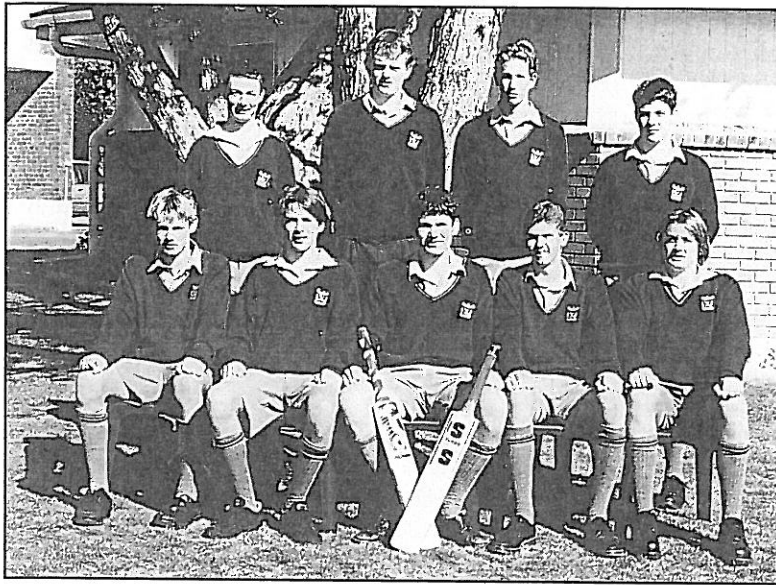

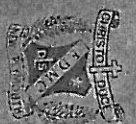
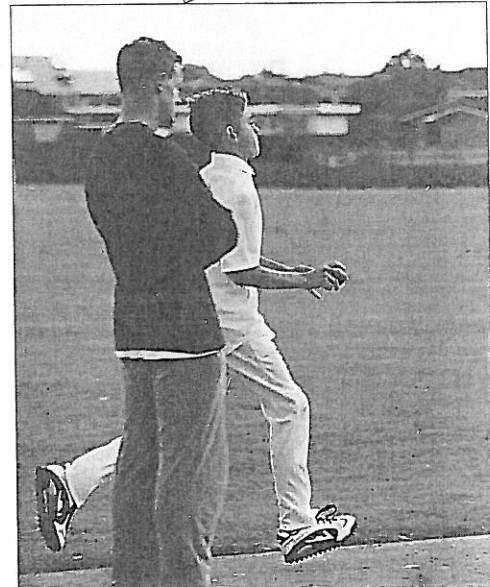
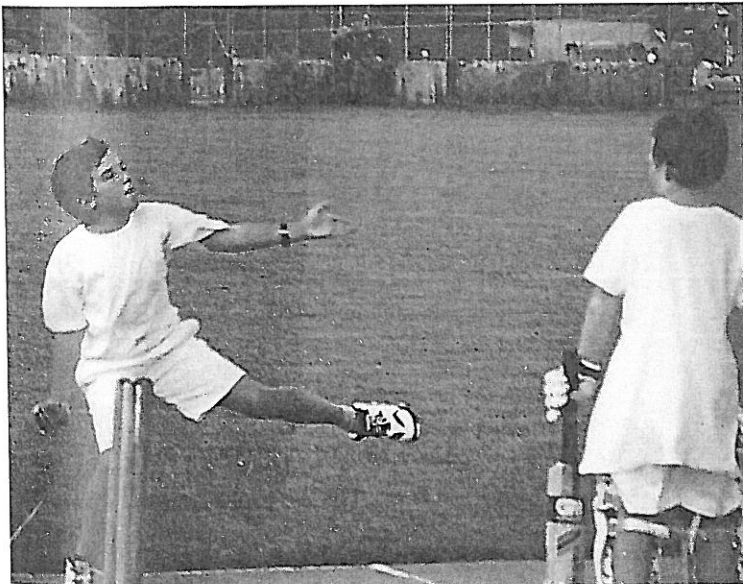
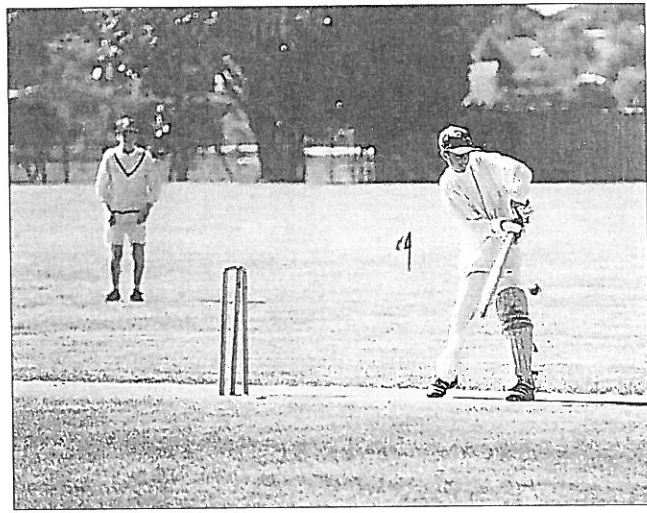
Our team selection was based upon interest and ability shown when we had a try out day at school, but we were unfortunately unable to field relay teams because of a clash with a social event in the evening.

None of our other competitors got into the medals but all contributed to the excellent atmosphere of the event and hopefully we will be able to contest the relays next time around.

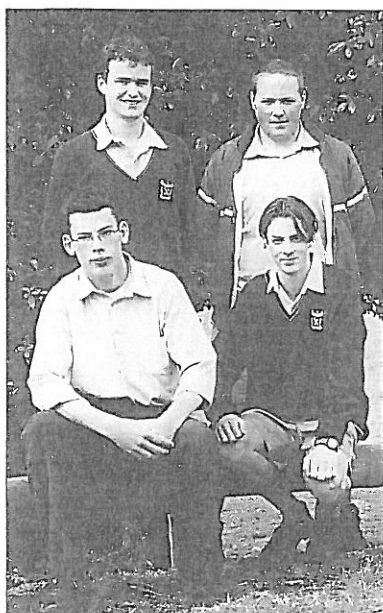

the rest of the team made sure of a convincing victory to place the team third.

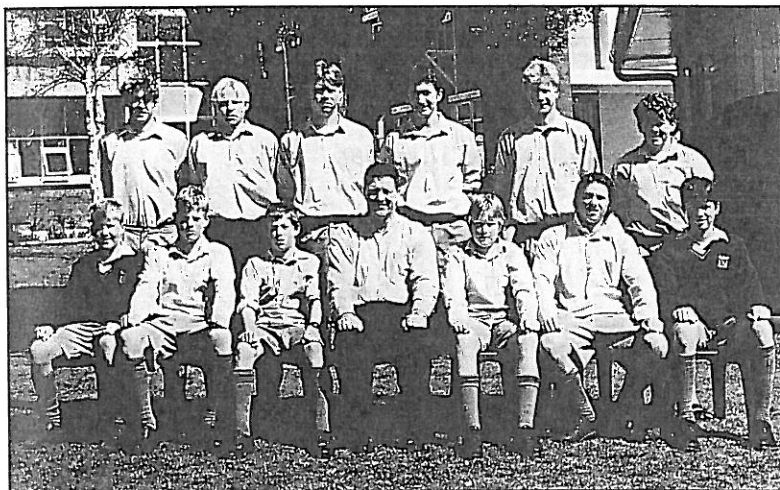

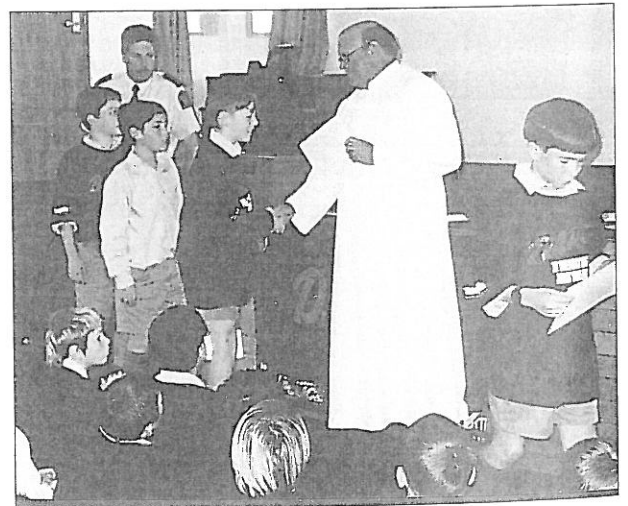
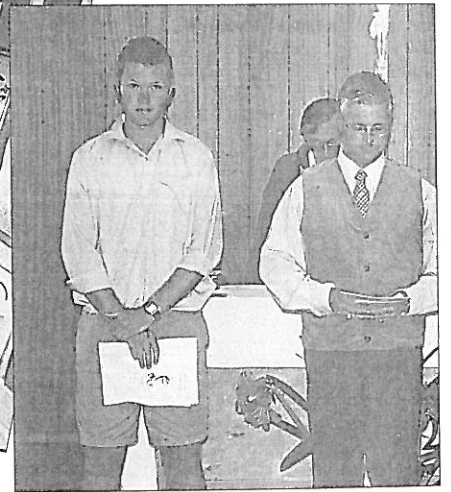
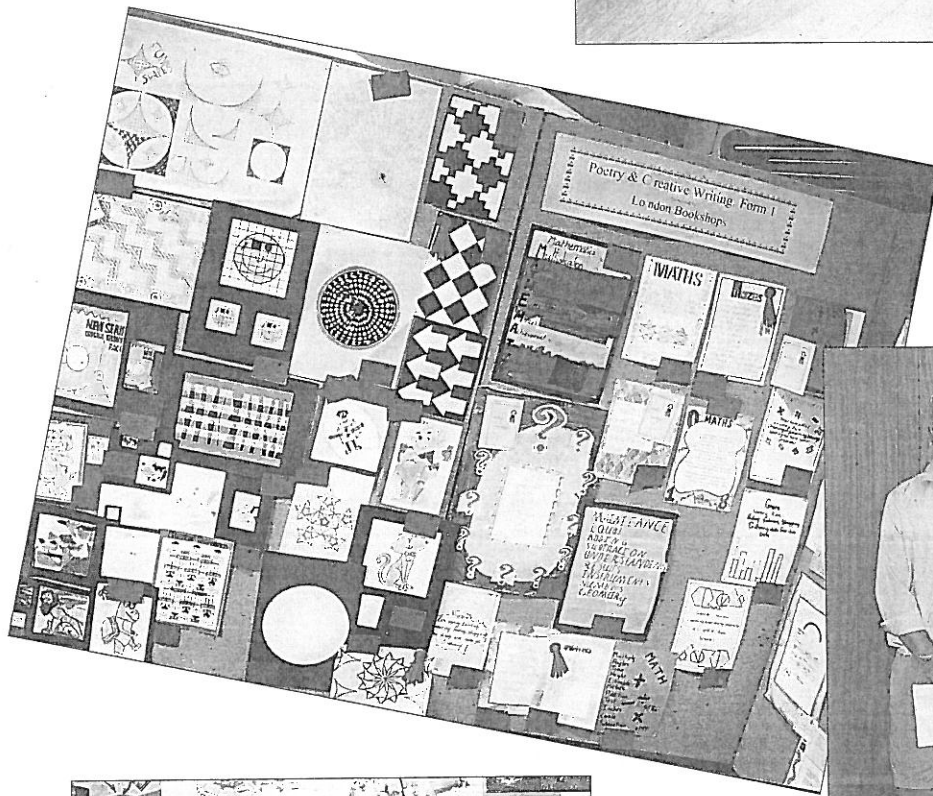
Rugby remains the most popular sport at the college with 321 players. Other popular sports are Cricket 167, Basketball 158 and Soccer 62.

Congratulations and thanks to all who attended and thanks to the parents and families who helped support our teams. Well done.

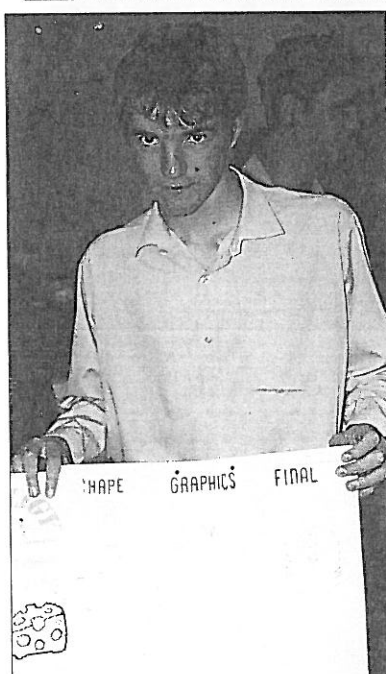
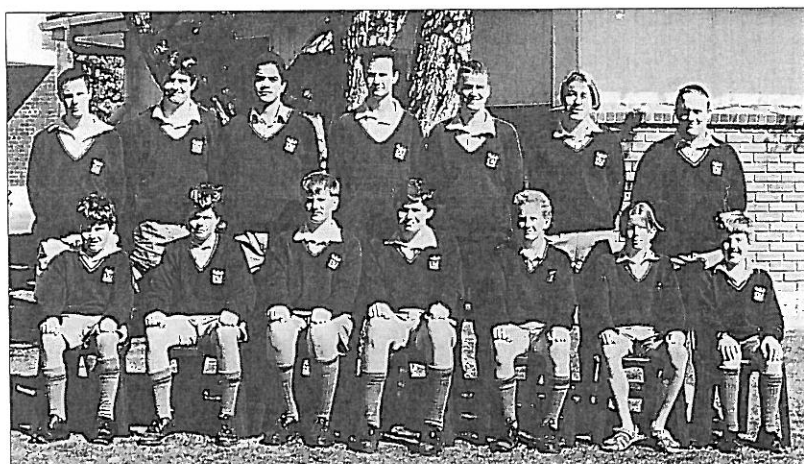
Australian Science Competition - 1998

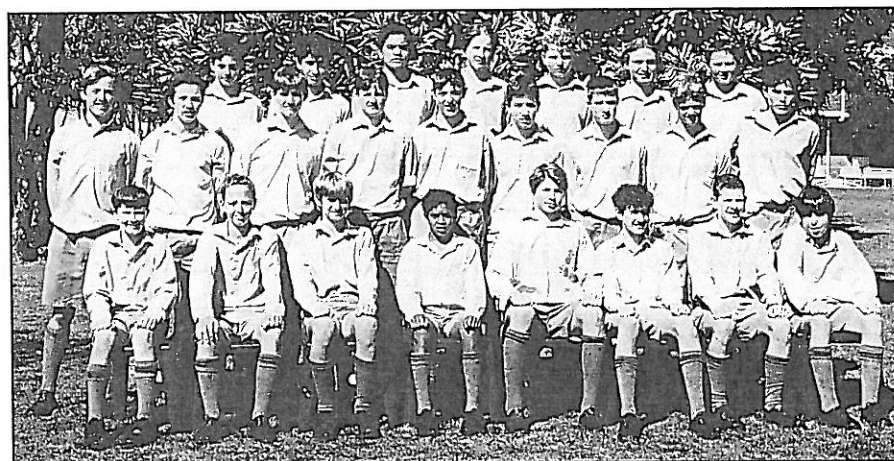

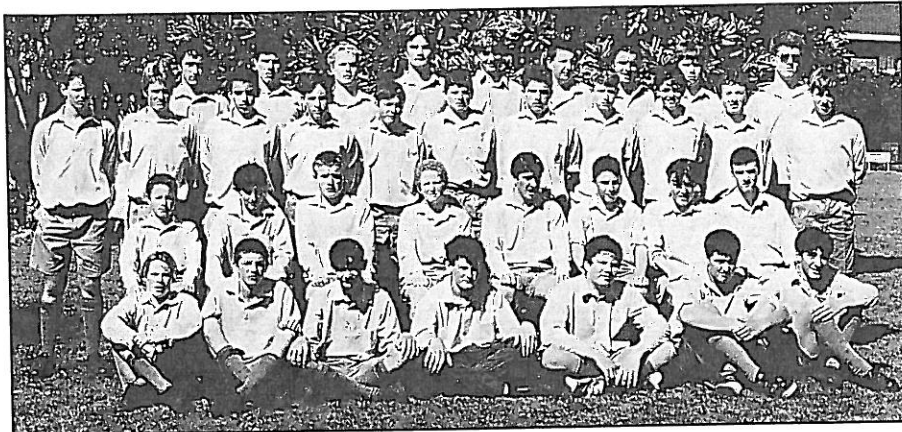

HALPIN SCHOLARSHIP

Thirty years ago the estate of Mr & Mrs Halpin from Eltham left a sum of money to assist in the education of Catholic young men. This trust was set up in memory of their son, Jimmy Halpin, who was killed in World War 2. He had been a promising scholar and a great personality.

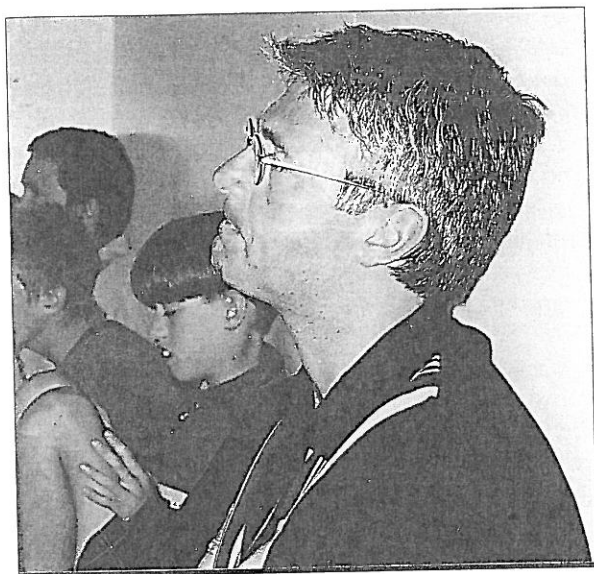

Br Joe comments: "I am well pleased with all that Youth Ministry has undertaken in 1998."

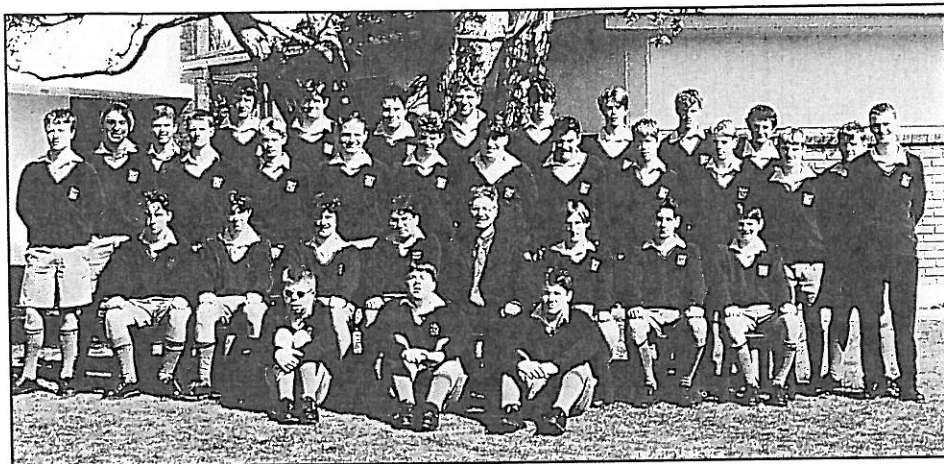

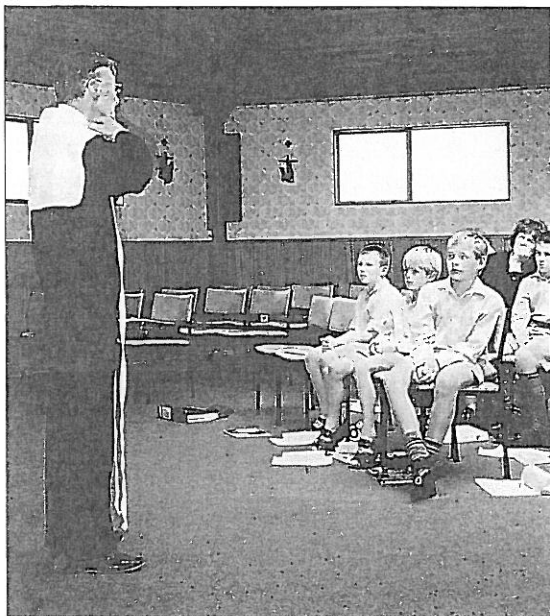
The day began with a performance from Waitara ISCF group who led us in praise and worship leading to the beginning prayer, and ending in a large mosh pit started by ours truly.

The three of us were lucky recipients of invitations to attend the Gathering. We all decided it was an excellent opportunity not to be missed, meeting up with 80 other young La Sallians of around our age from all over Australia, Papua New Guinea and New Zealand. And we were right!

With Br. Joe Bufalo on board as well, we flew into Brisbane late in the afternoon and were greeted by Br. Dave Fände, who then drove us to Boystown. Br. Joe had a role in the Gathering so we all arrived a bit earlier than everyone else. After we put our gear into respective cottages, we quickly went about familiarising ourselves with our home for the next seven days.

The next day we were fortunate enough to travel to Movie World on the Gold Coast for some fun. When we arrived back we set about enjoying the facilities of Boystown. The 30 degree heat made the pool even more enticing, and often proved to be a very enjoyable place over the following days and nights.

The following day was spent relaxing until mid afternoon, when the majority of participants arrived. Getting to know each other almost came naturally as all these people were so friendly. The first night with everyone together was amazing. The local Aboriginal tribe welcomed us to the land by performing for us some dances and a 'smoking ceremony' to cleanse our spirits. For so many people, this was the first time they had been speechless in a long while. "Unbelievable" does not describe the feeling of anticipation that now hung over the entire group after watching the opening ceremony.

The following days were real "eye openers", to say the least, for us. We all learnt many things such as the true meaning of the La Sallian Family and Traditions - and what they, well actually us, do all over the world. The La Sallian Family is not a collection of schools across the

world with De La Salle Brothers spread few and far between; the 'Family' is not just the Brothers. It is people like ourselves 'Sharing the Mission' with other less privileged youth. We learnt about the 'Family' in PNG, where



we could assist building villages; in outback Australia working alongside Aboriginal people; in the services like Kids Help Line - a national phone service for kids in need of help.

One of the major reasons for this Gathering was to reflect on and celebrate the Resurrection of Christ. And what better time to do this than over Easter. Throughout the Gathering there were many situations for this to occur. The major highlight was the 5 am start on Easter Sunday when we, in bus loads, pulled up to a magical setting - "McCabe Party" at the edge of Lake Steel, just down the road from Boystown. It was ironic that the day before it had been raining, but this day we saw a magnificent sight as the sun rose glowing, turning the sky a tickled pink.

This all happened while we were sitting on hay bales, candles in hand, watching an enormous bonfire sizzle before our chorus of song. It was one of those moments that no-one can ever take away.

We will never forget any of the participants at the Gathering. A special place for all of them will be held in our hearts. It is hard to explain, but just imagine meeting all these strangers and, within a few short days,

STAR Funding - Secondary Tertiary Alignment Resource.

During 1999 we will be exposing students in Year 11, 12 and 13 to courses that are deemed non-conventional (courses that do not fit into the mainstream curriculum) This is made possible through STAR Funding which enables us to provide students with the opportunity to undertake courses of study and/or workplace experience that lead to skills and qualifications which may promote their transition from secondary school to either employment or further education.

STAR Funding is an add on funded by the Ministry that is designed to give assistance and increased flexibility to secondary schools. There are specific guidelines for courses, set out by the ministry.

During 1998 students have undertaken courses in comprehensive first aid, catering and hospitality, aviation, welding, panel beating and diving (PADI).

Next year funds are available for Year 10 and 11 students to experience "Vocational Taster" Courses. This will give them a chance to sample, to some degree, opportunities in training and work experience

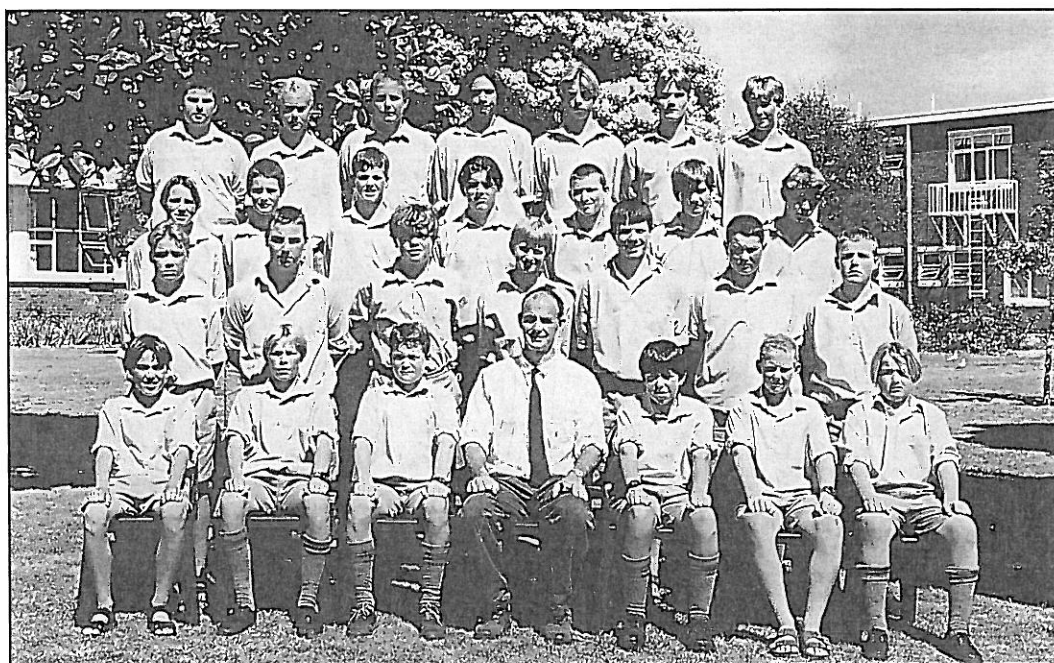
I will be saddened to lose these gentlemen next year. I look forward to seeing them grow and develop in all aspects as senior students during their future life at the College.
