





The senior touch team played their Taranaki Secondary Schools Tournament at Hicks Park, Hawera in March.


They began with a tough opening game against Waitara which ended in a draw, then had an easy win over Inglewood.





Richard Hurunui came 2nd in the Under 16's and Shane Petersen came 3rd in the Under 18 Body Boarding.





As the co-ordinator for Francis Douglas Memorial College Cricket I am extremely proud of the achievements that the teams and players have attained throughout the 2000 season.





Australian Schools Science Competition 2000

The Year 12 Biology class studied Ecology in Term One and went on several field trips. At Back Beach they studied the *zonation* of the rocky shore. They used transects and quadrants to determine the species in each tidal zone and to determine the densities of each species. The *stratification* of the native bush was studied at Barrett's Domain. The species making up the canopy, sub-canopy, fern layer, shrub layer and ground cover had to be identified. A third field trip was made to investigate stages of *succession* in wasteland adjoining Barrett's Domain. The weather was fine throughout and the students gathered data in the field, processed it in the laboratory and wrote reports which contributed to their assessment.

The highlight of Term Two was the Biotechnology Unit in which the students learnt to make cheese. They then had to develop luxury cheese items, which were presented and judged at a 'Cheese and Wine' presentation.

Term Three turned the students into amateur veterinary surgeons as they dissected the earthworm, fish, rat and heart in an attempt to come to grips with the structure and function of animals. Each boy also presented a seminar on the 'Support and Movement' of a chosen vertebrate in the new theatrette.

The Year 13 students researched a plant and an animal in its natural habitat during Term One. The study required two field trips. Data and specimens were gathered on each trip, the data was analysed and further investigations were carried out in the laboratory. Each student wrote a report on the investigation. The following are excerpts from students' reports:

During our shrimp study we visited the Kawaroa rock pool area to observe and investigate the shrimp in their natural environment.



In the study of the Manuka we went to Dawson Falls and the Plateau areas of Mount Egmont, Taranaki. The intent of the field trip was to gather information on the habitat of the Manuka and to collect seedlings, sprigs etc. for lab work. To do this we used transects, did stratification profiling, compass and point cover, mapping and analysed competition between Manuka plants.

We collected information from four different areas where Manuka was growing: behind the Konini lodge, in the Konini forest, at Wilkies' Pools and at the Potaemo Swamp.





WELLINGTON GEOGRAPHY TRIP

The Year 12 Geography Field Trip to Wellington was aimed at understanding the elements that make up Wellington's form and function.

We managed to catch the tail end of another kind of form when joining the crowds welcoming Wellington's victorious rugby champions including Christian, Jonah, Tara, Norm and Alama (who recognised the Amber and Black jerseys worn by several of the guys).

Visiting various parts of the city area such as Mt Victoria, the waterfront, Owhiro Bay and the Botanical Gardens, we learned about the physical structure of Wellington. A guided tour of the new stadium, exploration of the downtown core of the city and visits to Te Papa, the city council, the Parihaka exhibition also showed the human geographical side of our capital.

We stayed at Downtown Backpackers – a large and comfortable establishment on the waterfront. This was handy to transport links we studied such as the Top Cat interisland ferry, the Railway station and the wharves of Port Nicholson as the venues of an intensive urban experience Wellington take a lot of beating. It is compact scenic and interesting. Thanks very much to the students for their excellent attitude and to Tim Stuck for helping out on our field trip.

Speakers from the Rotorua Polytechnic Tourism Department and the Rotorua District Council provided valuable information and up to date analysis of why the tourism industry is so important to Rotorua and New Zealand.

Site visits were made to Te Wairoa and the Buried Village with its award winning museum. The thermal pools were an excellent evening attraction. The Polynesian Pools have been redeveloped- evidence of volcanic activity to Rotorua tourism. Whakarewarewa and the Maori Arts and Crafts Institute was the scene of the Pohutu Geyser, New Zealand's largest geyser. The Agrodome and its excellent farm show was a popular stopover for us and several bus loads of Asian tourists. The importance of marketing Rotorua was stressed by the general manager of that famous attraction.

Adventure tourism has been a major growth area in New Zealand: the Jetsprints, Swoop and Dirt thingz were a spectacle. Many of the boys tried out the Swoop and Brendon Hart was unforgettable as he demonstrated his sporting prowess in mastering the Dirt thingz (motorised cross country skateboards).



We have undertaken all the usual visits to Polytechnics and Universities and had a wide range of speakers.

Work exploration/shadowing had also become a popular option. All Year 10 and Year 12 have had opportunities during 2000 and we have had excellent feedback regarding FDMC students in the workplace which is a credit to our boys. Some students have gained employment from this opportunity. All students are encouraged to gain some work experience, particularly in the holidays.

We are always keen to hear of vacancies from employers, so if parents are able to help, please let us know.

We wish all students leaving the very best in their future careers and we look forward to hearing about your courses and achievements. Don't forget to keep in touch. Your experiences are what we learn from.

STAR funding has once again provided many exciting nonconventional experiences and subject choices for our students.

Year 10 and Year 12 students have had a chance to experience a wide range of Taster courses at the Taranaki Polytechnic in all the trade areas e.g. automotive, electrotechnology, carpentry, engineering, hospitality etc. As well we were able to offer hands on courses in architectural draughting, movie making, bio-diversity, chemistry, physics and journalism.


A group of Year 11 students were able to undertake a weekly programme in engineering at Alpha Training, which proved to be a valuable experience for them. They have gained a number of credits towards the National Certificate in Engineering while still at school. Other subject options have been available to students under spe-
















cific circumstances: these are horticulture, tourism and higher level learning in programming computers and computer concepts.

A group of senior students attended a week long course in Film and Television at South Seas Film and Television in Auckland and had an awesome experience, one student noting that "it was the best learning experience he had had in his life".

STAR opportunities are derived out of a genuine interest in a vocational area. The funding has also enabled us to address individual needs of students under special circumstances in order to encourage students to remain at school in a supportive situation.

Career Pathways Programme

Career Pathways Programme (CPP) had its second successful year. The programme is designed for students who want to remain at school for a variety of reasons. It provides an alternative to the "traditional programme" and is aimed at giving students the opportunity to experience a wide range of knowledge and skills about future pathways in employment and training. Where possible, practical and individual circumstances are addressed. CPP has proved successful in that it gives the students a chance to experience first hand where they want to go; the outcomes have been very positive.

Students are required to have a positive attitude to school and work, a commitment to gain the most that they can and a sense of trust and responsibility as the programme operates largely outside the confines of the school grounds (although Ms Land always knows where everyone is and keeps a keen eye on rolls that are faxed in regularly).

Students have sampled great opportunities this year. All courses are delivered by NZQA approved providers and enables students to gain a number of credits towards "real life" qualifications in the form of National Certificates. Credits are registered with NZQA and become a part of the individual lifelong "record of learning".

All of the students have done Religious Education, Mathematics, Physical Education and Self Management and a course in Adventure Based Learning (sea kayaking, orienteering, abseiling, etc) with Sport Taranaki, that began the year with a week long tramp around the mountain. This was reported as a "great experience". Students have undertaken "lifeskills" cooking, hospitality, tourism, automotive, engineering, computing, fishing, carpentry, diving, with one student undertaking an Introduction to Turf Management (green keeping) through the Open Polytechnic.

All of the boys have decided where they want to go in the immediate future which is heartening.

A number of boys have registered interest in CPP for 2001 which will endeavour to meet individual needs where

possible. A student will take out what he is prepared to put in.

then visited the farm of Mr and Mrs McIntyre on Everett Road. Here again we saw more examples of land man-








agement sustainability using trees. The field trip was planned by Mr Graeme Philips from the Taranaki Regional Council.




We set up our stall on the new carpark in Devon Street, and although none sold, we learnt a lot about the business world through our experience.





SPIRIT OF NZ








fect weather for a water fight. After being told to assemble on deck in shorts and a shirt we were expecting the bombardment of water we received as we came up on deck.

Jonathan: "We learnt lots on the day he came and we all really enjoyed it."



It had served its purpose.




Age has wearied him and the power of youth is coursing through my blood.

It Was The Best Day ...


It's a blistering cold day in Edinburgh, Scotland. My father, brother and I are in a huge cold castle. The castle is amazing: there are cannons and guards with guns.



countless outstanding sportsmen who throughout the year have brought honour to the College in their selected sports.




Shield were Scott Peacock and Luke Herlihy. They were both members of the school drama team.

We also had participants competing at the O'Shea Shield in Wellington and the Taranaki Speech and Drama Festival held in Opunake recently.


