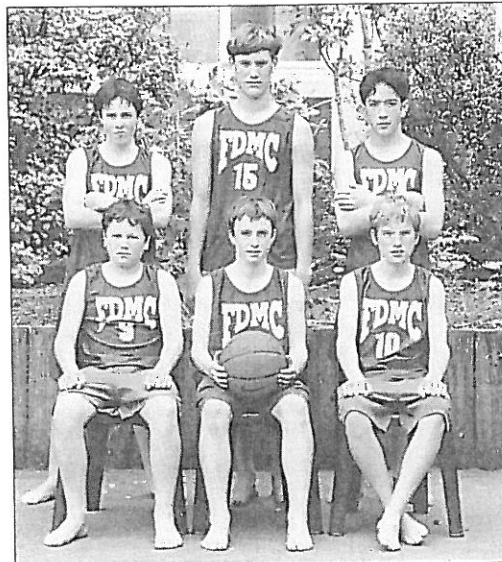

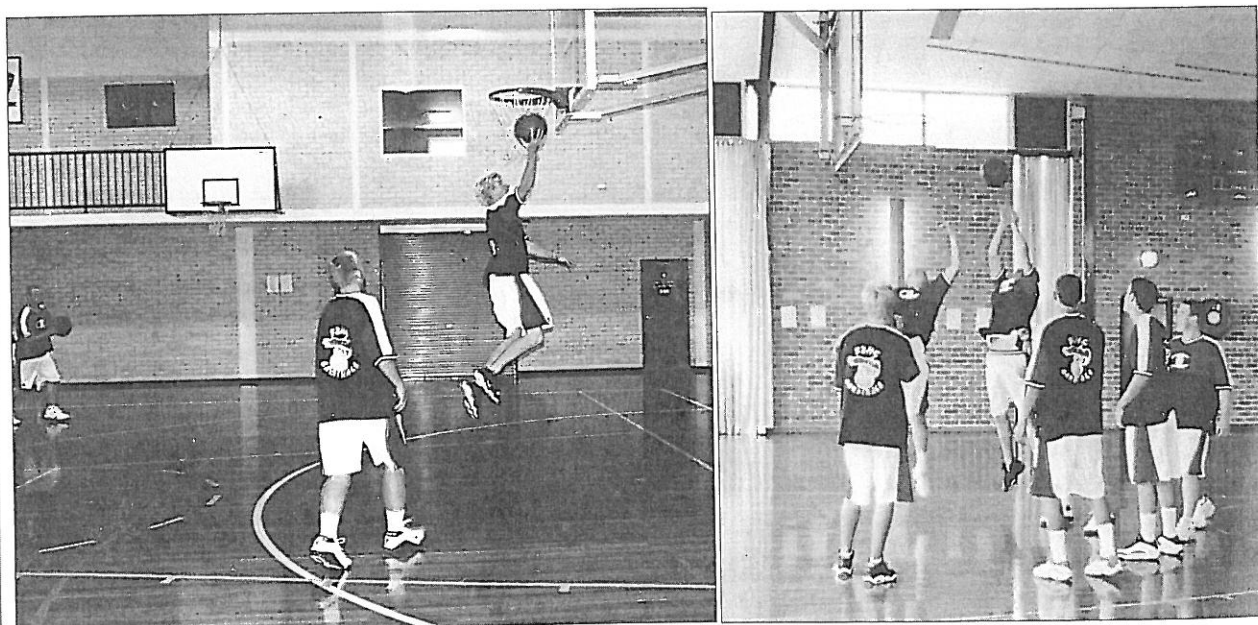

The senior Ramteins played very hard and ended the term second after a close game with Spotswood College in the final.

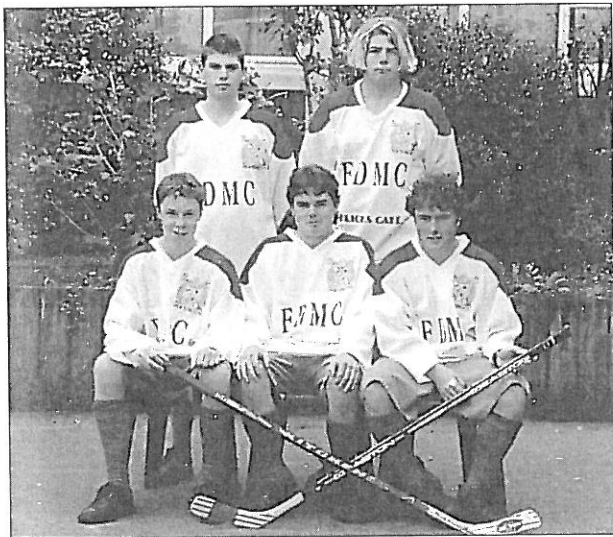
All teams participated well and learned many new skills from playing. With term four games just around the corner Francis Douglas is expected to do very well.

to be upgraded with the addition of an international sized skating arena due for completion early in 2002.

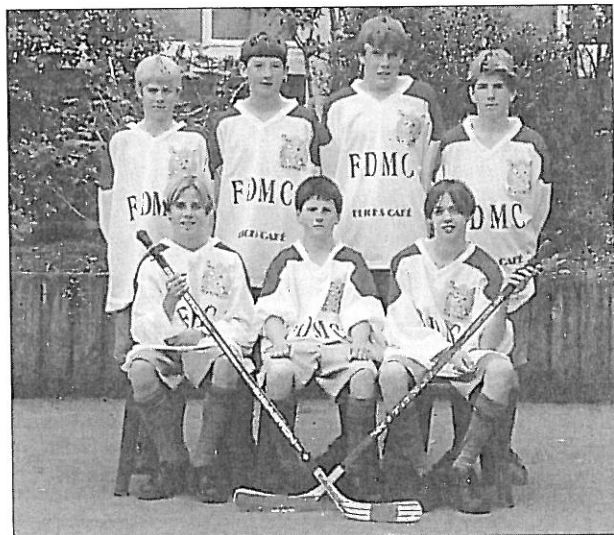

The Taranaki Schools' Championships for 2001 were held at N.P.G.H.S, on September 19th and attracted about 300 competitors. The occasion was festive and lively and the standard of top competitors was very high, with two new national records being set.

The competition setup is as follows: The rowing machines used are designed to replicate approximately the physical activity required in single scull rowing events, and are regulated so that energy input/ displayed speed also roughly equated to an on-water situation. Twelve machines are used and all are hooked into a computer, which produces an image of a boat race. There is a big screen for spectators and individual monitors for each competitor, so a good simulation of a race is achieved. The skill level needed is low, but good performance in competition requires good levels of strength and aerobic fitness.

It was noticeable that those schools with their own permanent machines achieved better results so our rowers were somewhat disadvantaged. However, they showed a very good level of commitment and came up with some commendable results.

a cone marking the halfway point, they then continued back to tag their runners. These sportspeople ran one and a half kilometres down a track past Chaddy's Charters. As they got back

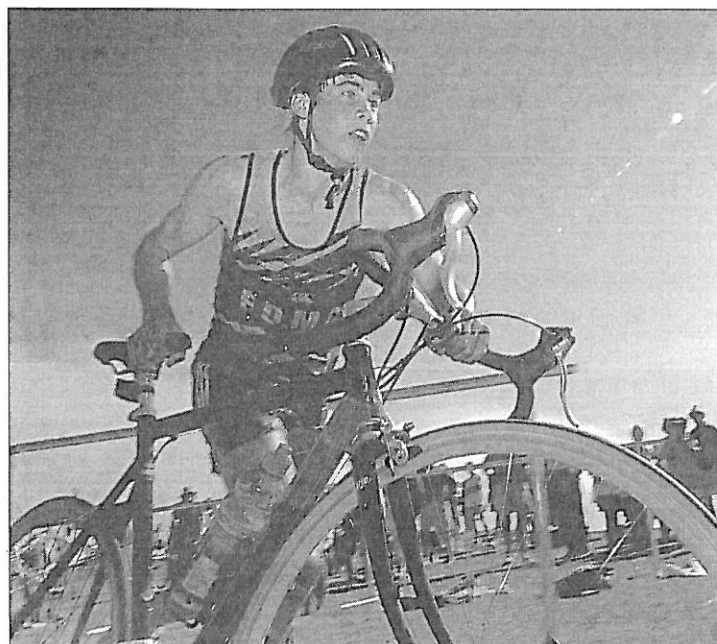
to cheering spectators, they turned around for another lap of the track.

handed much needed water, a free moro bar and coke, and the event concluded with a prizegiving.

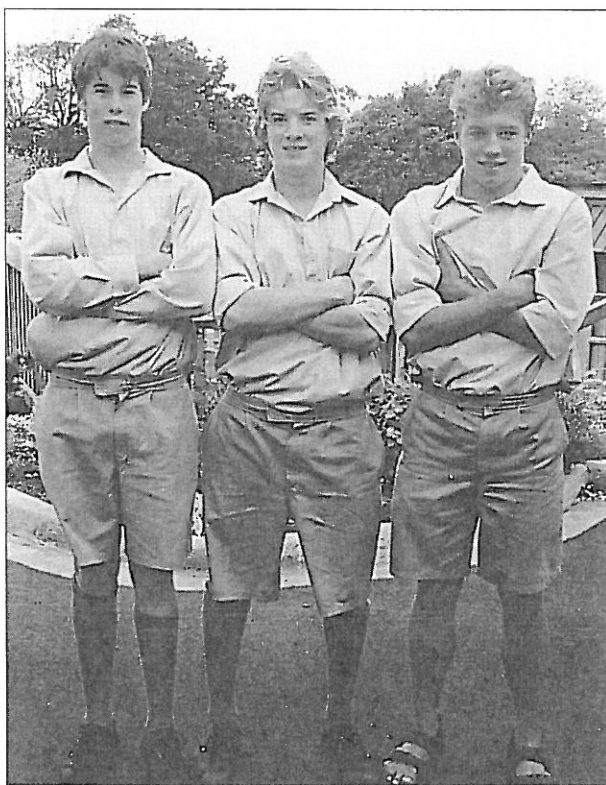

GAK-PAK and SIT 'N SKULL companies were formed by Year Ten students. These students ran their companies successfully.

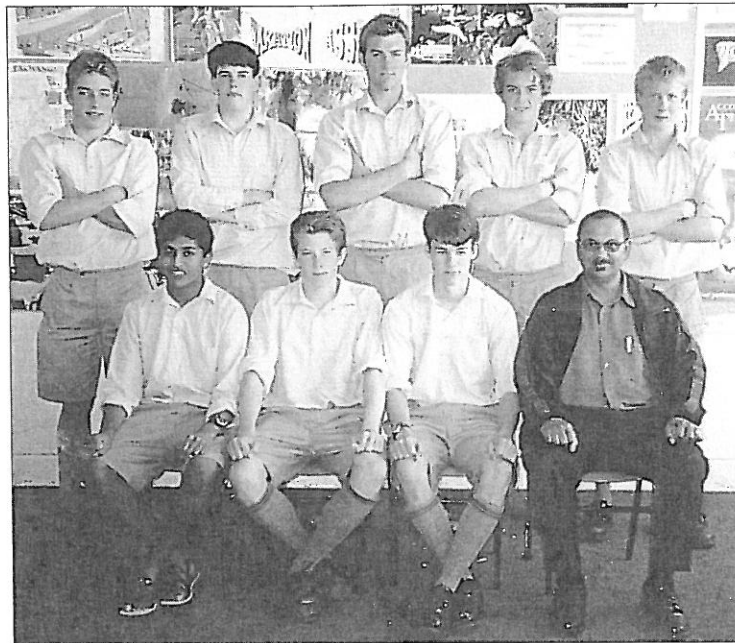

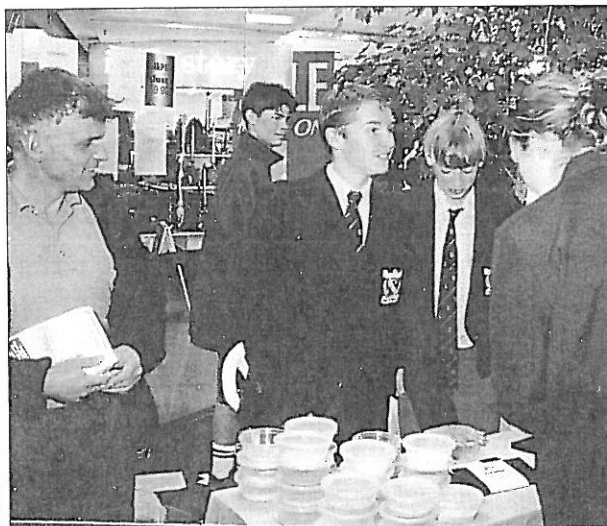
GAKPAK COMPANY

AGRICULTURE/HORTICULTURE REPORT

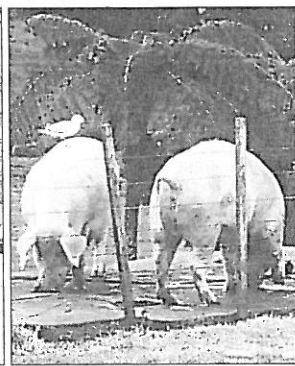
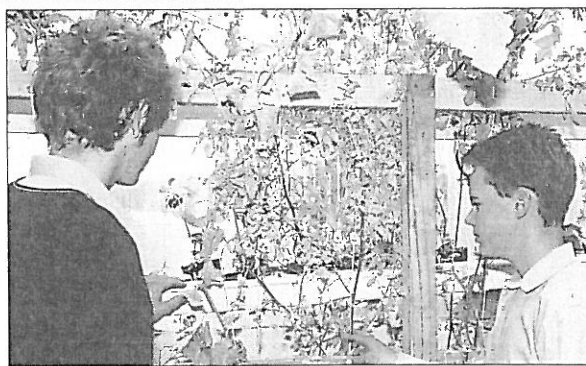
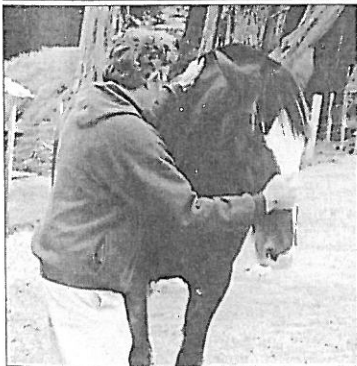
Francis Douglas Memorial College became the first school to host the ACC sponsored Taranaki Agriculture Safety Challenge using the agriculture/horticulture department's facilities at the Agridome.

Teams of 4 Year 12 and 13 students from six Taranaki schools, all except us, were tested on their quadbike handling and safety skills, stock handling skills, firearms safety, tractor driving, handling chemicals, first aid (coping with a mock shearing accident), culminating in a quiz on all things to do with farm safety.

Our team of Cody Fleming, Chris Mailman, Leon Maddern and Curtis Lockley (all are Year 10 students) came a close second to Inglewood High School's Year 13 students.

Another feature of the year was the excellent way all of the horticulture students developed and maintained their individual garden plots. They also propagated plants from seed and cuttings and have successfully grown some native seedlings.

The agriculture/horticulture students also featured on Taranaki TV's farming show in August, propagating trees, crutching ewes, discussing Hereford cattle, calculating feed requirements for a herd of cows, measuring the pasture, putting up the break fence and herding this herd onto the break, handling piglets, and riding horses including "All In Fun" which won \$1 million in its racing career. Students from Years 10 to 12 were involved.



READING TUTORING

The centre has proven to be a popular place and the number of students using the facility in 2001 has confirmed this.

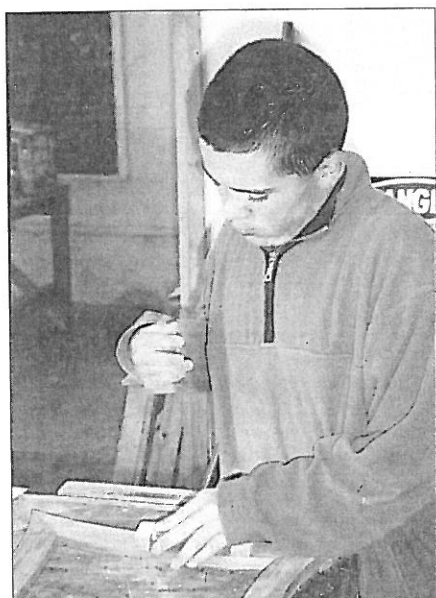
YEAR TEN AND YEAR TWELVE WORK EXPERIENCE/STAR TASTER COURSES

I've probably learnt more doing this course than the 3 years that I was at this school. I've learnt heaps on this course.

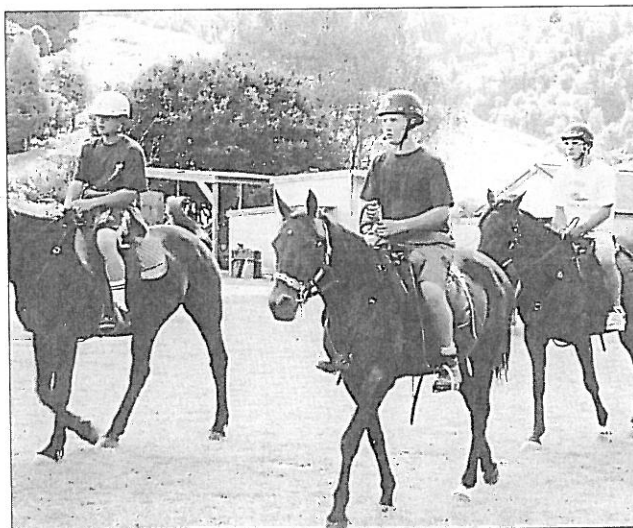
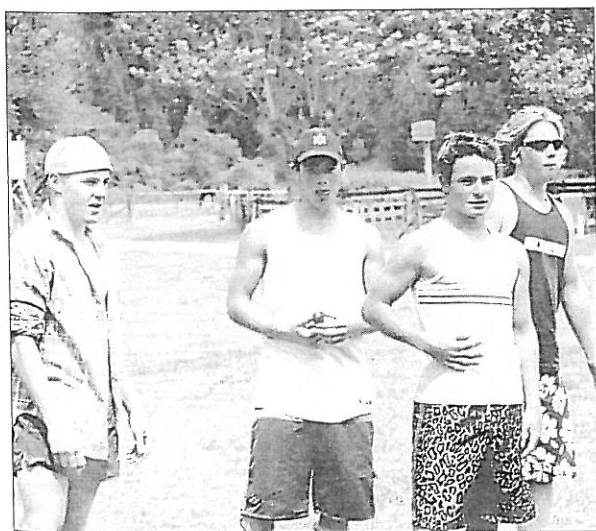

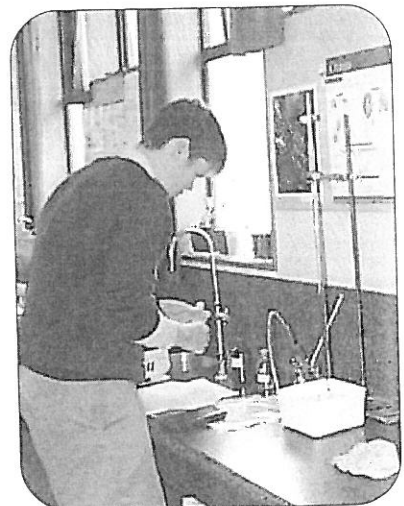
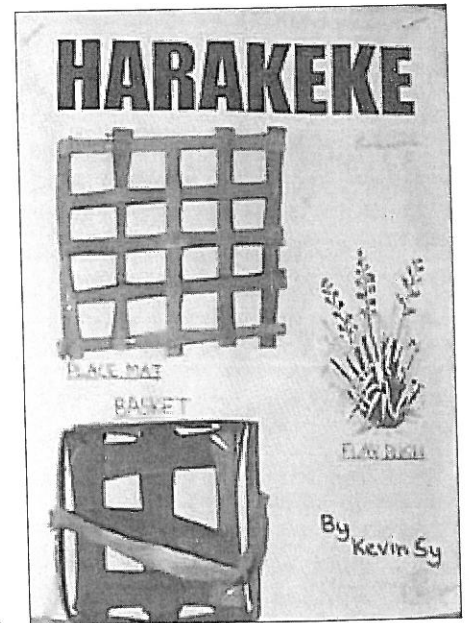
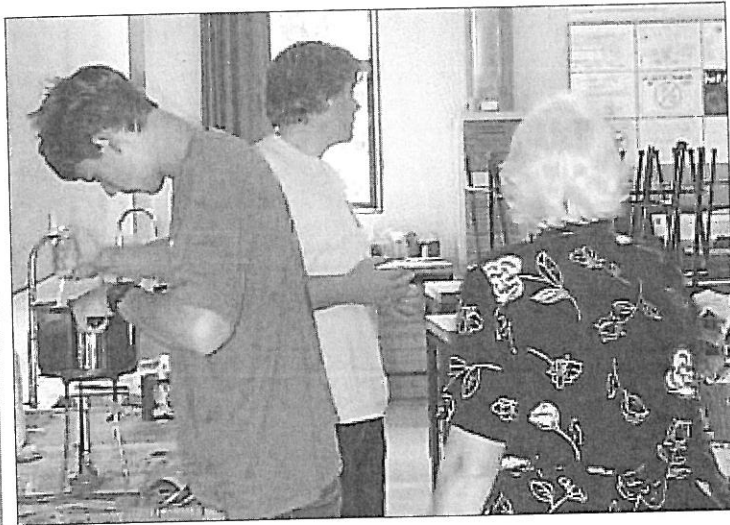
The students studied the fisheries industry of New Zealand at length at the start of term two. They designed excellent posters on the theme of sustainable management of the Industry and prepared essays on the topic as well.

At the end of term two the boys did a unit in biotechnology and they made novelty cheeses which were displayed at a Cheese Expo. The presentation, quality and marketing of the cheese were extremely good. Many different

tastes were catered for. The only cheese that was not appreciated but will be remembered very well is the peri-peri cheese made by Jeremy Freeman and Co!

In term three the boys investigated anaerobic fermentation by making ginger beer. Those brave enough to drink their own brew found it very refreshing even though the alcohol content was disappointing.

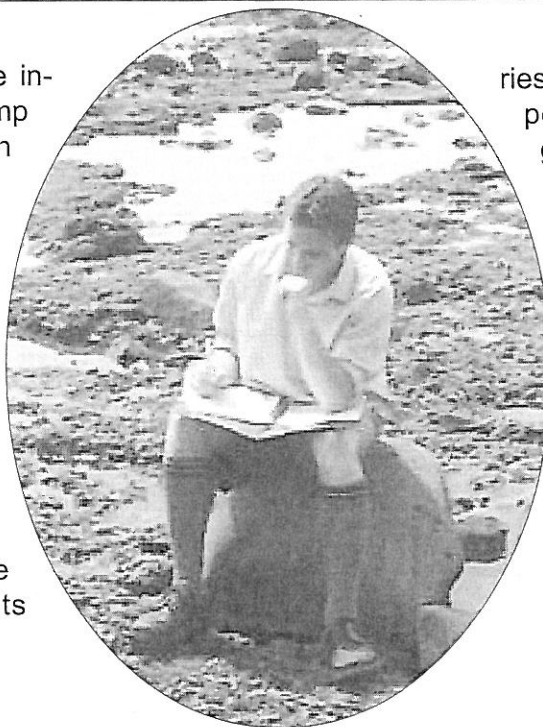


YEAR 13 BURSARY BIOLOGY

The Year 13 Biology class investigated the intertidal shrimp and manuka tea tree for the internally assessed component of the course. During the study two fieldtrips were undertaken.

The first one was to the rocky shore at the Kawaroa beach and the second one was to the Egmont National Park. Many hours were put into the investigations of the shrimp and the manuka and in the writing of the reports on each.

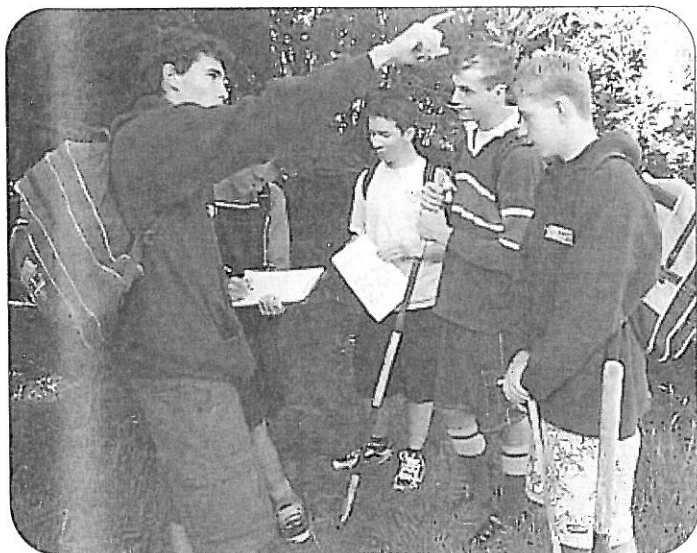
Another highlight of the year was studying the contemporary biotechnology of producing genetically modified organisms called GMO's for short. In the laboratory the students



extracted the DNA of cauliflower and practised the transformation of tomato plants by inoculating them with agrobacteria.

Seven students attended the public lecture on the Human Genome by Prof. Barry Scott at the Devon Hotel, Thursday evening, September 21.

Last but not least the evolution theories were studied and man's own possible origins were investigated at length. The students are glad to report that although they share many similarities with the chimpanzees, each one of them is quite unique and created in God's image!



TOURISM DEVELOPMENT GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIP TO ROTORUA

Rotorua is the New Zealand setting for our studies on the cultural process of tourism. This is a vital part of the Year 13 Geography course.

Tourism is set to overtake dairy exports as the major earner of income in New Zealand. Rotorua with over 1 million tourists per year provides valuable examples of investment in tourist attractions and services.

We stayed at Keswick Camp, Holdens Bay, and bused to the tourism facilities and attractions. Mapping the redeveloped lake foreshore gave us an understanding of the vital role the Rotorua District Council plays in developing and managing tourism. The Agrodome Farm Show is an excellent case study – hundreds of mainly Asian tourists were enthralled by the shearing, milking and farm dog demonstrations.

The importance of the natural elements of geothermal activity was emphasised by visits to

the Polynesian Hot Pools, Kuirau Park and Rotorua Museum.

For our adventure orientated tourists, the gondola and luge were a real hit in more ways than one, with our students quickly adapting to the advanced luge track in their usual "full noise" manner.

The third day had a major shadow thrown over it with news of the attacks on the World Trade Towers in New York. It demonstrated that a disaffected group of people could have a huge impact on the world – actions which will have repercussions for us all.

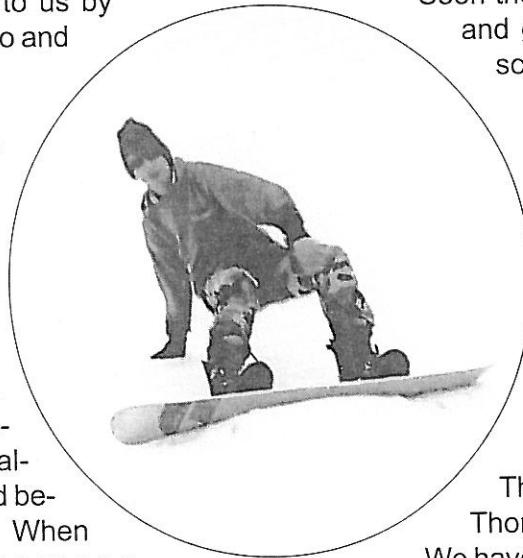

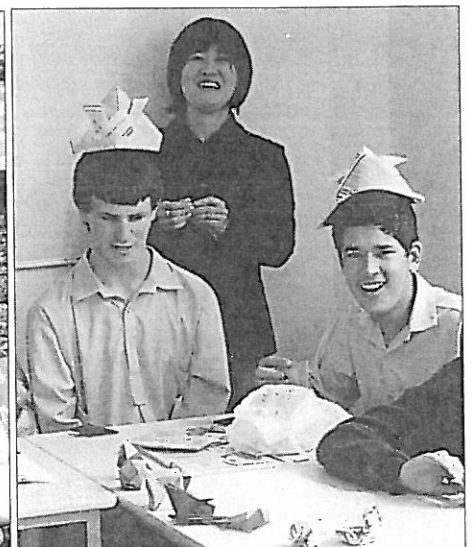
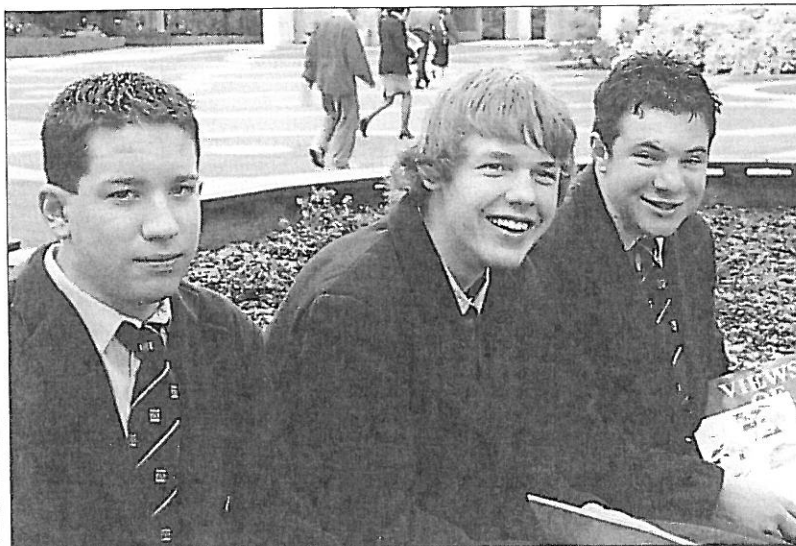

LIBRARY REPORT

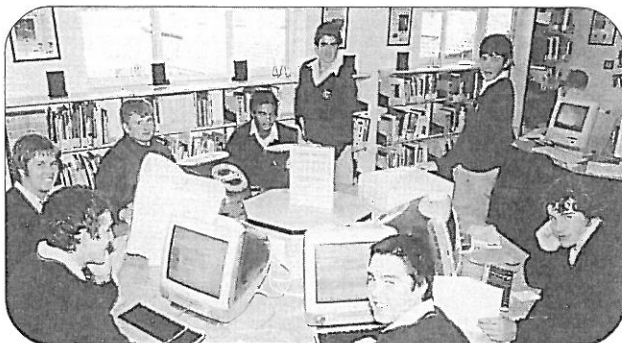
Last year was a year of change, from the old to the new. This year has seen us establish the new Michael Finnigan Library as the information centre of the school.

At the beginning of the year it was decided to implement library classes for the junior pupils once a week. The object of these classes is to familiarise the boys with all aspects of the library. Lessons have started off from orientation skills, how to care for books, the Dewey Decimal system, and progressed through using the library catalogue effectively. The importance of keywording has been discussed and what is important about a reference collection, the various books contained in that section and on to research skills using both books and computers for effective and authoritative information gathering. Research is so central to the educational process in today's schools and knowing how to find the information you need is extremely valuable. For some the process has not been without its challenges but it is hoped that these lessons will eventually lead to more confident information seeking.

The library is open each day of the week from 8.00 am until 4.30 pm apart from Fridays when we close early at 3.30. Our library is extremely well used by both staff and pupils and it is sometimes difficult for a teacher to book a class into the library because of heavy demand. This is of course good news for Miss Jordan and myself as we thrive in a busy atmosphere.

Books still remain a valuable source of information and pleasure in the library and the emphasis in purchasing books has been in subject areas this year. 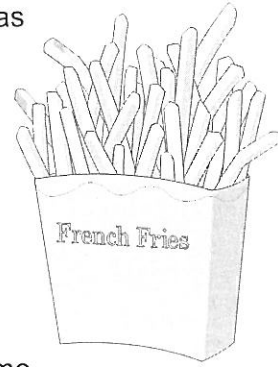
I never did get along with that old bag . . .

The starchy grey pants, the tight blue shirt and the dorky cap, all emblazoned with the same horrific insignia, the speller of my doom, the McDonalds "M".

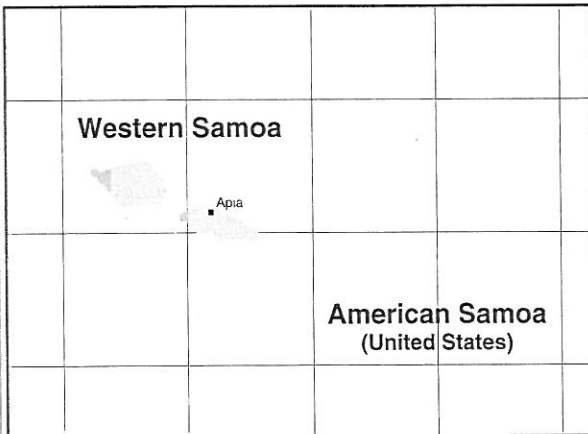
Looking into my mirror - the final, crushing blow. I saw what I had become, watched as my dignity faded away with every second.

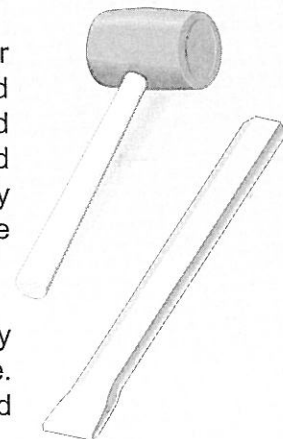
Heritage. Who I was and where I came from had never been discussed at any length. Dad was Samoan and that's about all I knew. This was all to change.

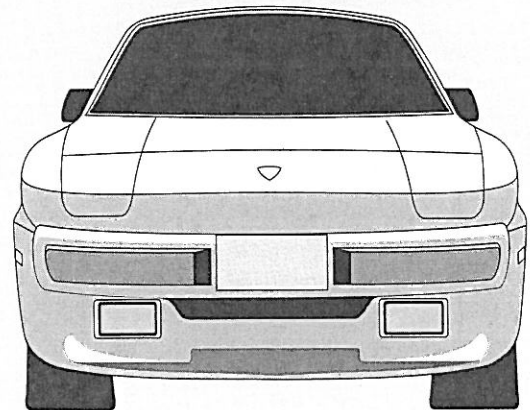

SWEET MEAT

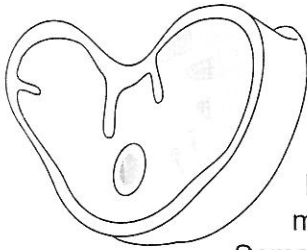

YEAR 9 REPORT

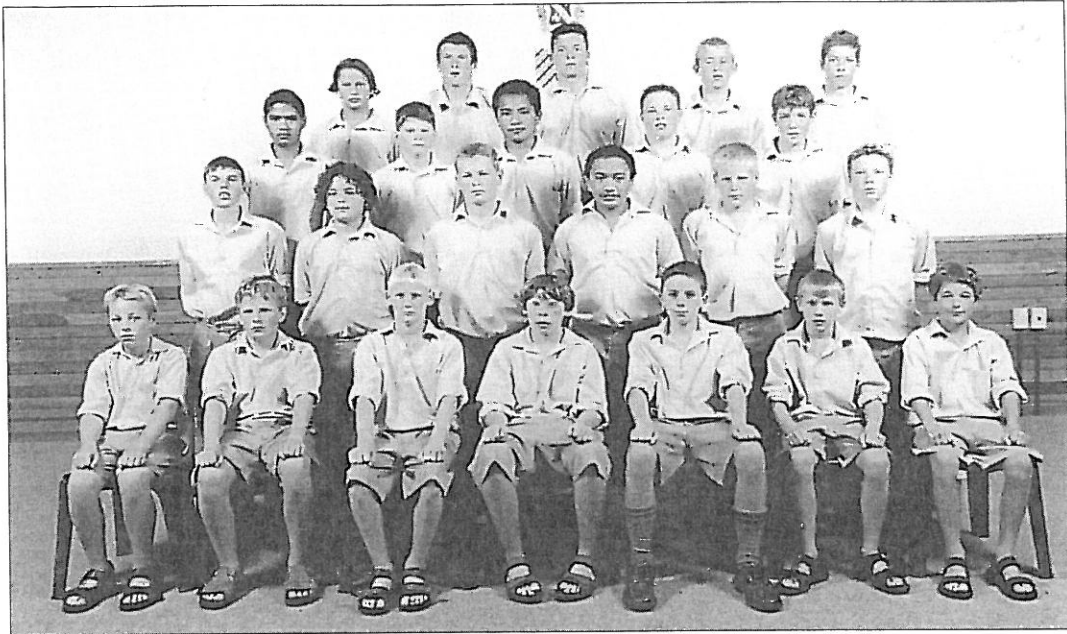

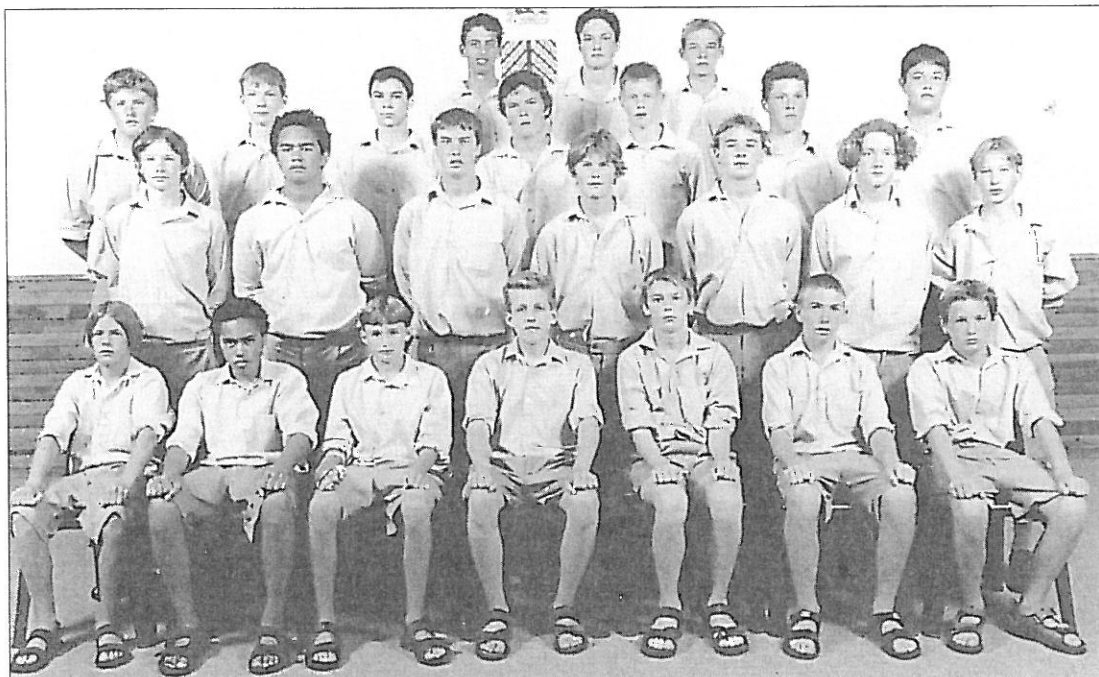
The Year Ten debating team of Ben Jagersma, Phillip Donaldson, Chris Wicky, Daniel Burkett

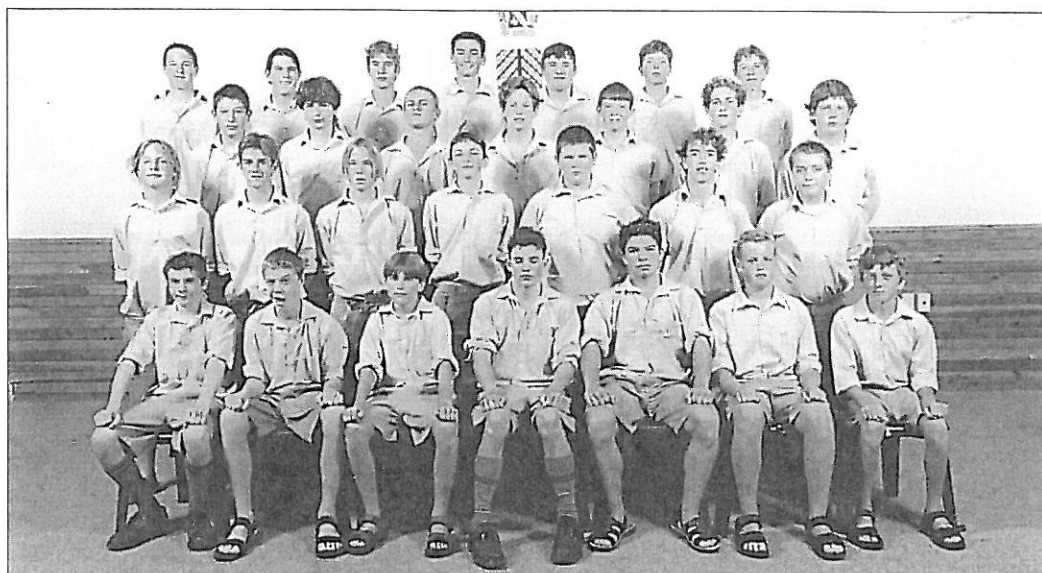

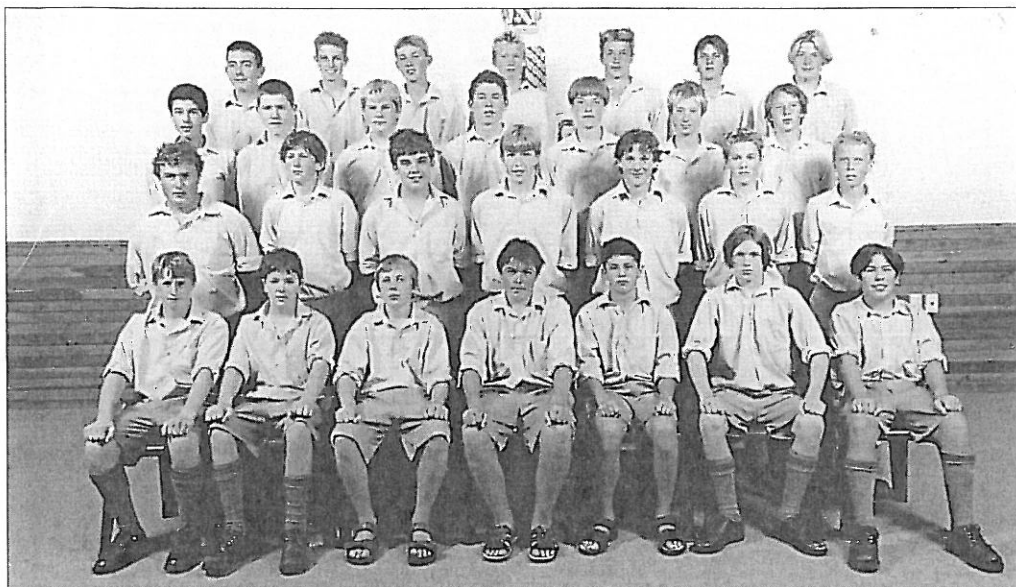

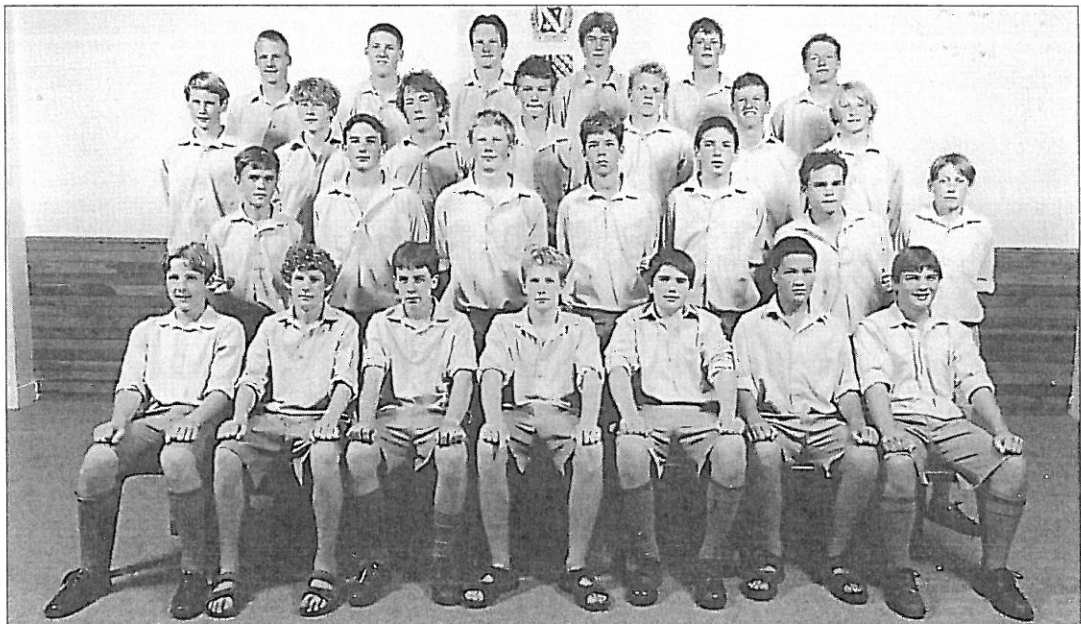

We thank the Year 11 of 2001 for a great year, wish them all the best for their deserved holidays and hope to see you all back at the College next year.

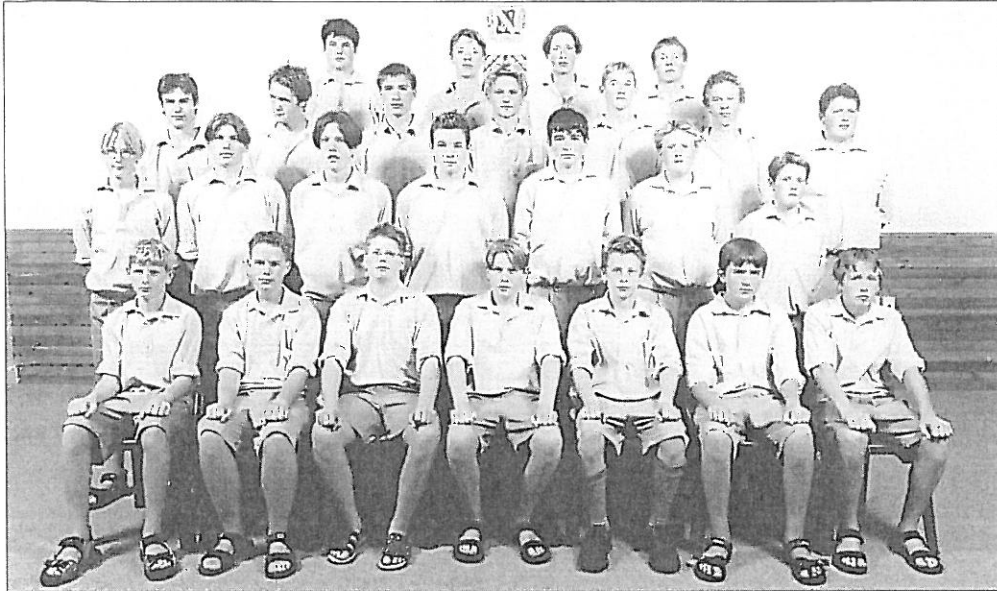
