



MICHAEL FINNIGAN



Michael Finnigan retired this year from the Board of Trustees after a long and close association with the school. Mr Finnigan's first association with FDMC was in 1946 when there was a

meeting to discuss opening a Catholic boys' school held in the Regent Theatre. He was nine years old at the time and he remembers his father spending a lot of time canvassing on behalf of the committee to raise funds.

After four years at boarding school, Mr Finnigan returned to New Plymouth to work for his father's accountancy firm. As an accountant, he negotiated the payments to contractors building the school and was with Leo Walsh to welcome the first group of Brothers to the province.

His involvement with the school has continued since. He stepped in when the school couldn't find a commerce teacher for the senior classes, teaching book-keeping three nights a week. Later, the fifth form teacher was sick so he taught them during lunchtimes.

He was on the first Board of Governors as secretary and the BOT after the introduction of the Tomorrow's Schools policy in 1989.

During this time he has seen many changes in the school buildings and roll. "The roll has grown from an initial 100 to about 750," he says. He has also noticed changes in the staff, particularly the decline in the number of religious Brothers. "There have been no major wars that have affected us in a big way so people haven't got the same need for religion," he says. "People often need a crisis before they start looking for something else."

So will there be a time when there are no Brothers on the school staff?

"When we've got an aging population, unless there is a reversal in the trend or an influx at the bottom end, that is inevitable," Mr Finnigan says. "You get to the stage when you just can't physically teach. But, who knows? If there was a major conflagration around the world, it might spark a renewal of interest in religious life." Despite their numbers, Mr Finnigan thinks the LaSallian Brothers still make a valuable contribution to FDMC. "Although the presence of the Brothers has lessened, I think the spirit of La Salle is probably stronger than it ever was."

He is proud of the developments that have taken place at FDMC. "We have a school that is as good as any in New Zealand," he says. "We certainly have the most magnificent site in New Zealand with the backdrop of the mountain.

"I'm pleased with the way the school has maintained the LaSallian spirit and the special character of the school remains strong." He sees this spirit in the staff and also in the pupils. "The spirit amongst the staff is tremendous and the reports we get back from Universities are that the kids who come out of here are sufficiently different," he says. "I take pride in the fact that the school is making a difference amongst young people: it's got to be good for them and it's got to be good for the country."

Would he prefer the teaching staff to be dominated by the religious Brothers as it was when he was first associated with the school? "As a preference I would rather the school was still staffed with brothers," he says. "I don't think they are necessarily better teachers but I just think the nature of the commitment they make is so dedicated to the education of the kids that I don't think anyone who has outside pressures such as family can match it."

He is quick to say he doesn't doubt the teaching ability of lay teachers. "There are a lot of dedicated teachers amongst them," he says, "but if you are a religious brother you're living on site and your whole focus in life is the education of the boys under you. This is different from someone who can be just as dedicated but have other demands on them."



MARGARET FLEMING

Matron, Mother and Friend



I consider it a privilege to have been asked to pen a few words on the magnificent contribution of Margaret Fleming to the lives of many people, especially the students.

Margaret was matron long before I arrived at Francis Douglas. I had heard her name mentioned with a certain awe and reverence by many Brothers, including former principals, Brother Peter Bray and Brother Tim - and with not a little mischief by one of her favourites, Boarding Master, Brother Anthony Hawkins.

Margaret's name became almost synonymous with FDMC boarding. Every Principal and Boarding Master with whom she worked found her a real support and a fount of common sense. She had a special friendship with John Whyte. They were products of the same era and knew that they could hold things together when dealing with a succession of Aussies with strange ideas from across the ditch.

Margaret also enjoyed deeply compassionate bonds with long-serving chaplain, Father Dave Monaghan, as well as Brothers Oliver and Will. She understood Taranaki people. Victor Hugo once remarked: "No-one knows like a woman how to say things that are at once gentle and deep."

Those words certainly describe Margaret Fleming. Brother Anthony on one occasion carted a bag full of metallic jugs across the

Tasman for matron and her boarders. She shared a passionate concern for all in the hostel, especially the ones most in need - the sick and lonely, the ones lacking friends. She felt the loss of Brother Anthony deeply but was strong in the support of others at that crucial time.

When Trevor, her husband, became seriously ill, leading to his death in 2002, Margaret continued to care for and support others. She did offer me her resignation. I didn't accept it but persuaded her to become part-time until we saw how things worked out. We shared a few precious moments as she prepared for the worst but through it all her concern for others always took precedence over her own needs. Part-time maybe, but never half-hearted!

Margaret had that rare capacity to treat real illness but also to detect when just a little TLC was needed. She could be tolerant but she could also apply "tough love" when dealing with a malingerer. She understood human nature, and emerging masculinity. Many is the time I valued her wise counsel.

Boarders' parents had great trust in her as she respected the role and rights of parents and would be on the phone if anything serious befell their sons. She would provide all the care she could, arrange trips to doctor and dentist but would hand the care to Mum and Dad at the right moment. I cannot recall ever having a parent complain to me about Matron Fleming.

In Matthew's gospel, Jesus tells us: "...whenever you did this for one of the least important of these brothers of mine, you did it for me!"

Margaret lived this gospel imperative to care for others, especially the boys in the hostel. Margaret Fleming will be rewarded with great blessings for her life of service not only to her own family but to the children of so many New Zealand parents.

Margaret made a wonderful life by what she gave. She never thought of herself as especially "religious". But I remember her as profoundly religious, evidenced by the quality of her service to others. As that great humanitarian, Albert Schweitzer, once wrote: "There is no higher religion than human service." That is what she will be remembered for. We thank God for the life of such a valiant woman. - Br Bill Firman


JOHN WHYTE

1987. The staff was told that a John Whyte from Palmerston North Boys' High School had been appointed to the AP's job. We found out that he was the Guidance Counsellor, coach of the 1st XV and was a sociable sort of person. Good news.

John arrived on the 27th January 1988 and after staying in a motel, then with the brothers, he

rented a bach at Oakura. His family arrived in May that year and they purchased a house in Wallath Road.

Mr Whyte served as Assistant Principal from 1987 until



1990 and became Deputy Principal when Mr Walsh was Principal. He continued as the Deputy Principal until he retired in April 2004. In 1997 he was the Principal.

In those 18 years Mr Whyte saw the college grow from a roll of 400 to the present 750. He was part of the evolution of the college, and helped make FDMC the great place it is today.

John in his day was a talented sportsman. He represented Otago at rugby, was selected for the Canadian Rugby Team, played tennis for three provinces and was ranked in the top four Under 19 tennis players in NZ. He played bowls for the Waimea Club.



He taught Maths, Social Studies and Religious Education. His Religious Education lessons were legendary and were based on his life experiences.

While at the college John coached many rugby teams and managed the 1st XV for two years. He was also the La Salle 5 Teacher.

During his time LS5 won both the VF Swimming and Athletic Relays.

John gained the respect of the students and an old boy was overheard saying 'although I had been in Mr Whyte's office many times I had always been treated fairly'.

John was a great detective. He could track



students down from the smallest clue. He seemed to know what was happening in the college at all times.

One of his best sayings was "I know who did it, it is better you come and see me before I come looking for you."

Other sayings the studentsand staff remember are:

"If you don't like it here you could go to another school"

"Put it down in writing"

"What have you done about it?"

"We're in your time now, gentlemen."

John often appeared grumpy -an act. Underneath he is kind, compassionate, fair and at all times had the welfare of the students and staff at heart. He was a great friend to the Brothers. You knew where you stood with John, there were no hidden agendas. He was a colleague, teacher, confidant, coach and friend to us all in the Francis Douglas Memorial College Community.

John is now living at Boys' Town, Beaudesert, Queensland, Australia with his wife Helen. He has an administrative job at Boys Town, aneducational institution run by the De La Salle Brothers.














BOARD OF TRUSTEES

As 2004 draws to a close we can see that this year has very much been a year of change, a change in the guard, with the retirement of Michael Finnigan as Board of Trustees chair after 23 years at the helm; the departure of John Whyte (18 years as Deputy Principal) and the appointment of Chris Moller as the new Deputy Principal; not to mention the untimely death of Margaret Fleming in the boarding establishment, also after an extended period of unselfish service to the school community and particularly the boarders.

All the while the College can be most pleased with the results being achieved not only on the academic front, with our results being better than most schools of a similar size and decile ranking not only in Taranaki but New Zealand. These successes do not happen without hard work on the part of Br Peter, the Staff and those parents and others who give freely of their time and talents in whatever manner they choose to participate. Of particular note have been the changes brought on by the implementation of the NCEA qualification. The new systems have challenged both staff and pupils, who have learned a lot during this gestation phase with the current Year 13 students having been the first to go through all three levels of the NCEA, paving a clearer way forward for tomorrow's students.

The year ahead is sure to bring its own challenges, with the letting of the contract for the new technology block on which work is due to start on 8th November, and the ever-increasing pressure being placed on the school's limited resources with which to fund the day to day operation and maintenance of the school, let alone funding new technology!

The College is well served by the calibre of the people on the Board and I thank all Board members for their valued contribution and support during the year.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT - 2004



The College magazine serves an invaluable role that it encourages us to make time and space to reflect upon the state of health of the School and communities. The pace of our life is such that.

concentrated as we are upon the road ahead, reflection can be regarded as either an irrelevance or an interruption. It is neither: we draw strength from appreciation of our past and confidence from knowledge of the intricate yet powerful manner in which the College, in its broadest sense, is moving forward. We have enjoyed a very good year that has balanced innovation and reform with a living respect for our complex and distinctive heritage. To reflect upon this state is, in itself, both a valuable exercise and a sound educational practice. And reflection need not be a dull activity - recently we have celebrated the achievements and leadership of the 2004 cohort of Year 13 students and these young people, through the quality of their lives inside and beyond the classroom, tell us more about the current condition and standing of the College than any other measure. It is my pleasure to report that they have formed a generation of which their families and their school can be proud and that their year at the top of the College has borne the hallmarks of compassion, kindness and gentle strength.

SPECIAL CHARACTER

Francis Douglas Memorial College is a Catholic boys' College numbering some 760 students, of whom there are 130 boarders. Staff in the College are expected to contribute to the atmosphere of Christian community. Adults are challenged to be committed to the Gospel values of love of God and love of others and to nourish the development of these values in the boys who are placed here by their parents with this specific expectation.

Cardinal Basil Hume, in an address to Heads of Schools in the United Kingdom, said, God is to be sought and found not just in the religious sphere, but in every part of human life...The mission of the Church in education is not simply with the teaching of religious truths. Rather it is in the fostering and nourishment of all that makes for a fully human life. He went on to say. I would hope that, on leaving a Catholic school or College, a young person would have a sense of God's love as real; some personal spiritual life; a desire to worship with and in the community; and a sense of love and duty for their neighbour...The key to the future of [Catholic education] lies in capturing a vision of what it is to be truly human.

The College gives special emphasis to its Catholic and Lasallian character in all its activities, but most especially in its religious and faith education activities.

The myriad activities that make up the subject RE – including classroom Religious Education, liturgical services, retreats and service opportunities - all have one aim in mind, to assist students to see their lives in the light of Gospel hope and faith.

Religious Education occupies a privileged position in the Lasallian School, as it deliberately and systematically explores the meaning of "living in the presence of God"— for ourselves personally, for our Church, for our society and for our world. Of course, our students are all at different stages on this great faith journey, but a good RE curriculum can help them see that faith and life go together.



General literacy development and outcomes-based e d u c a t i o n continue to be focal points in the RE curriculum.

Liturgically, the life of the College has been built around the rhythm of the College year and has included the celebration of the Eucharist on the occasion of the Prefects' Investiture in February, Ash Wednesday and Holy Week, the celebration of Founder's Day in June, Francis Douglas Day in October and the Year 13 Valete Mass in October. In each case, Fr Joe O'Riordan has, as Chaplain, been attentive to the aspirations of the College, and in each case the response of the College community was excellent.

Retreats and reflection days continued to assume an important place in the life of the College. Under the leadership of Mrs Margo LaBerge retreats were held for all Year levels.


Service

The manner in which the School relates to and interacts with the world beyond the gates is, of course, an absolutely crucial element of our educational programme. Students have, through CARITAS, Mission Action Day and many other avenues, been working for and with the wider community. The School's commitment to inculcate a sense of the rewarding business of seeking, and acting, to make this world a better place, and of the duty and need to step beyond the limitations of selfhood in order to fulfil the potential of each individual, remains undiminished.

PASTORAL CARE

Care is at the heart of all we do. This fact is made most manifest within our provision for pastoral welfare. It has often been observed that it is the quality of human relationships which exist within the School which marks us out as being distinctive and different through the dedication, skill and willingness to work hard of our team of staff, our students are enabled to acquire a sense of belonging which is a valuable anchorage in a storm-tossed world.

We see this caring attitude throughout the College - it takes on additional dimensions in the Hostel through the demands placed and richness offered by a boarding environment. The work in the Hostel is often intangible,



incremental and undramatic: it is, however, strengthening and supportive. I am most grateful to those involved in this vital and crucial undertaking and, in particular, to the Boarding Master and House Masters, for whom late calls and early interventions are part of life.

To run a boarding house is the most demanding, exhausting, draining and uplifting work. We are extremely fortunate in the calibre of our Hostel staff: the influence they wield, and the responsibility they hold, combine to tremendous effect. Those leaving school this year will carry with them the shaping humanity of their Heads of House and I join them in offering my thanks and admiration.

ACADEMIC RESULTS

Last year's examination results bore witness to the unique partnership between teachers and students that exists at the College and, importantly, opened the desired doors into tertiary study for an impressive generation of College students.

In the National Certificate of Educational Achievement 82% of our students at Year 11 achieved a Level One qualification compared with the national average of 53% and at Year 12, 72% of our students gained a Level Two qualification.

In the 2003 Bursary examinations, 86% of our students received a C grade or better. In fact, 73% of candidates' individual subject results were a B grade or better.

Two students achieved a Scholarship pass in one or more subjects:. Cory Avison – 88% in Chemistry, 87% in Geography, and 86% in Mathematics with Calculus and Thomas Hills – 85% in English.

Following a trend of recent years, the University of Otago and Victoria University offered the greatest number of places to our students, followed by Massey University, with most students choosing to study a diverse range of courses from arts to law and sports management. Management and Commerce courses, including economics, marketing, business and commerce/law were the next popular choice, followed by Engineering and Related Technologies courses. A number of students are following agriculture-based

courses, including agri-business and farm management. Jean-Pierre Le Prou (Head Boy 2003) gained admission to the Veterinary Science degree at Massey University.

ACADEMIC PRIZES, COMPETITIONS AND SUCCESSES

What we teach our students in the classroom matters a great deal; examinations and formal tests are a valuable and necessary measure of results, but they are not the only measure. Many of our students learn very real and valuable lessons and achieve rewarding successes through involvement in external competition, and this year, once again, considerable achievements have been recorded.



The Eton Senior Mathematics Competition is national competition for Year 12 and 13 students. Students sit a 90 minute test in which they have to solve a number problems. Students who

achieve a particular minimum score have their work re-assessed in Christchurch. The top 15 students from throughout New Zealand are then invited to Christchurch to sit a second test. In 2004, Daniel Burkett was identified as one of the top 15 students from throughout New Zealand.

CO-CURRICULAR

ARTS

The cultural aspects of College life have shone throughout the year and throughout the College.

One of the cultural highlights of the year would have to be the 2004 Stage Challenge, a national competition held annually. The theme chosen for the College entry was "Loyal – Our Tribute" based on the life of Sir Peter Blake. At the regional competition, the judges presented FDMC with ten awards including second place overall. This ensured a place in the final and ultimately one of the top 12 schools in New Zealand – and this was only the second year the College has entered the competition.

Other highlights of the year include:

O'Shea Shield – Fifteen students competed in Impromptu and Prepared Speeches, Debating, Scripture Reading, Religious Drama and Religious Questions against 17 other Catholic schools in the O'Shea Shield competition in Palmerston North. The team was placed third overall with some outstanding performances by team members.

Rock Quest 2004 – Three teams from the College, Icarus, Homebrew and last year's winners Primal Instinct, competed in the 2004 Rock Quest competition.

Showcase 2004 highlighted and celebrated the multitude of talent within the College. Committed debaters, a rejuvenated Kapa Haka group, the College choir, band and jazz group, a law mooting team rounded out a simply superb year for cultural activities at the College.

I would like to thank all who have been involved in the organization of such a variety of cultural activities in which very large numbers of boys participate. We continue to be able to offer an extraordinary number of cultural opportunities thanks to their generous and freely given contribution of time and energy.

SPORT

It is occasionally good to remind ourselves of the educational reasons for sport: we need to continue to elevate participation as a goal and o resist the simplistic dazzle of first-team victory as the be-all and end-all of school sport. We must equip our young sportsmen to be as



competitive as they can; we need to ensure that our coaching programmes are comprehensive and contemporary, and we must encourage and enable a will to win. The manner in which we conduct ourselves, on and off the field and on the touchline, continues to be of the highest importance and this element of our performance has continued to impress over the past twelve months. Competition can, and should, strengthen a generosity of spirit still cherished by some of our leading sportsmen and sportswomen: only if the centrality of such generosity is confirmed can school competition be justified.

2004 sees another successful year for individuals and teams on the sporting field and the College congratulates the large number of students who have participated in individual and team sports. Once more, over 80% of the boys represented the College in at least one sporting code. Particular mention should be made of the 1st XV Rugby team who won the Taranaki under 20 competition.

A perusal of our College Year Book shows the following sports highlighted: athletics, basketball, beach volleyball, bodyboarding, cricket, cross country, cycling, golf, hockey, indoor bowls, in-line hockey, lifesaving, motocross, mountain biking, rifle shooting, rowing, rugby, skiing, snowboarding, soccer, softball, squash, surfing, swimming, tennis, touch rugby, triathlon, and volleyball. What a remarkable variety of sports is on offer for the students. The entries in the College magazine document an extraordinary story of participation and achievement that cannot easily be replicated in a report of this kind.

We ask a great deal of our teachers. We need them to set high expectations of our students inside classrooms and laboratories; we require them to offer energy, enthusiasm and talent to our co-curricular programme and we seek their compassion, forethought, sensitivity, care and time in pastoral work. I am similarly grateful to our non-teaching staff who support the School in so many valuable ways and who often play a vital pastoral or educational role.

At the end of term one, we farewelled Mr John Whyte from the College. Francis Douglas Memorial College has been extraordinarily well served by the single-minded devotion and professional sense of excellence of Mr Whyte



over the almost eighteen years of his service to the College.

Mr Chris Moller took up his appointment as Deputy Principal (Welfare & Management) on Monday 31 May. Mr Moller is no stranger to

Taranaki, having grown up in Waitara and having taught there before teaching in the United Kingdom and most recently as Assistant Principal at Hastings Boys' High School.

This year we also welcomed onto staff: Mr Daniel Morath, Mr Kane Rowson and Mr David Morris and we thank them for their valuable contribution so far made in all areas of College life

We also acknowledge the contribution made by Ms Marni Patten, Mr Phil Sole and Mr Phil D'Ath for their years of service to the College. To Mrs Mary Williams who resigned during term three, the College owes a debt of gratitude for her outstanding contribution to the musical and cultural life of the College.

It is with sadness that I note the death of our long-serving College Matron Mrs Margaret Fleming. Margaret was totally dedicated to the College and to her work of caring for the Boarders and the Boarding House staff. She was a mentor, confidant and most of all a true friend who was extremely proud of "her boys". We will always remember the joy and happiness that she brought into the lives of those with whom she came in contact. May she rest in peace.

COMMUNITY

Our community continues to bubble with energy, talent and a drive to help the School. In so many areas, we experience the benefit of active and concerned friendliness: support groups, both formal and informal, undertake a great deal of unglamorous hard work on our behalf.

The community life of the College has been promoted and enhanced by the availability and willingness of staff to participate in off-site and overnight initiatives. These have included Year 7 and Year 9 camps, O'Shea Shield, sports exchanges and other sporting events, Young

Leaders' days, geography excursions to Auckland and Rotorua, Economics excursions to Wellington, and the Voices of Youth convention in Brisbane. The preparedness of staff to continue to be involved in these unpaid additional initiatives is a matter of deep appreciation and is rightly drawn to attention as an indication of the generosity of so many associated with the College. The work of the PTA especially in the organisation of Gala Day, have contributed especially to the sense of well-being and belonging that so enhance the quality of life in the College.







CORY AVISON: Even though I have only been in Singapore 4 months I have got so much out of the whole experience already. I am loving every moment of it!

The scholarship I am on is called the Asia:NZ Singapore Scholarship

and covers all tuition fees, accommodation and living expenses at NUS (the National University of Singapore) for the duration of the degree, which in my case is 4 years, and I get one return airfare between New Zealand and Singapore each year flying Singapore Airlines. All up the scholarship is worth about NZ\$80,000. As part of the scholarship I have to work for one of the sponsors in NZ or Singapore in 2 of my holidays.

One of the biggest differences with studying in Singapore is that the attitude of all the students

is totally different to NZ students. Over here EVERYTHING is about work and assignments whereas in NZ, students actually have social lives as well. The 8 of us here are involved with the New Zealand Singapore Business Council (NZSBC) and have attended events such as receptions on the HMNZS Te Kaha and at the NZ High Commissioner's Residence.

I am living in a complex called PGP with about 3000 students - HUGE. It is a bit like living in a prison so we try to spend as much time away from the place as possible. After the initial culture shock and the realisation that this is where I am going to live for the next few years, I have settled into the Singapore lifestyle well. I am loving it so far. and I hope to see as much of the region as I can while I am studying here.

It has been really interesting catching up with the local language - Singlish. Singaporeans throw in lahs, lohs, laus, wah laus and various other words and phrases everywhere to confuse the unsuspecting foreigner (i.e. me). I'm just worried I'll be talking like them when I get home!



JOSEPH GARDNER

Being more interested in opera than rugby is not easy at a boys' school but it was this love of music that inspired past pupil Joseph Gardner. "It would have been easy to throw it all in and buy a hoodie but I think, to my benefit, I had my blinkers on," he says.

"I ignored most of what others thought. I continued with my music because it was something that just felt right."

Joseph attended FDMC between 1995-2000 when he left, aged 16, to pursue his singing career at Victoria University. While at Francis Douglas he performed in NP Operatic Society productions and also toured NZ and Canada with the NZ Secondary Schools' Choir. He has since been offered the opportunity to study Gamelan music in Central Java and a place in postgraduate study at Manchester's Royal Northern College of Music. "I hadn't intended to audition," he says. "It hadn't even crossed my mind." So when they approached him afterwards offering him a place he was pleasantly surprised but decided not to leave for Manchester any time soon. "I can't think of anything more daunting than entering a postgraduate course at the age

of twenty." Instead of Manchester he will spend two weeks in Napier in January at the NZ Summer Singing School while he decides how to spend the next year. "I'm tossing up between pursuing musicals in London or travelling to Italy to learn Italian. People don't tend to make money in opera until they're in their 30s whereas, with musicals, I could conceivably be making money tomorrow." But singing in musicals for a few years will not dampen his enthusiasm for opera. "It is the ultimate challenge," he says. "To be a great singer is to be a great opera singer."

Joseph says his time at Francis Douglas was made easier by the encouragement he received from the teachers there. "She's the one who told me I should take my singing seriously," he says of his first classroom music teacher, Yvonne van Lent. He also gained a lot from music teacher Rowan Johnston and careers adviser Carol Land. Performing at school concerts is still a far cry from performing at Government House for the Governor General and Australian and New Zealand politicians involved in the annual trans-Tasman talks earlier this year.

We wish Joseph all the best. Wherever his career might take him we are sure that we will hear much more of him in coming years.



CONRAD SMITH has become the second exstudent in the history of FDMC to become an All Black. Conrad left school at the end of 1999 having been Deputy Head Boy in his final year. Since then he has completed a Bachelor of Laws degree with Honours.

Also Mrs Bronwyn Donaldson stepped down as the current staff representative. We would like to thank Mrs Donaldson for her many years of wonderful and informative service. The new Deputy Principal Mr Chris Moller has now taken up this role.

To all the parents who helped the PTA in this school year we would like to sincerely thank-you for your overwhelming support in helping us to provide all the boys at Francis Douglas with a superior standard of education.

Looking ahead to 2005, the planning for our main fund raising event, which will once again

be the Gala on March 5^{th,} is well advanced.



Again all PTA meetings will be held on the second Monday of every month and all members of the school community are welcome to these meetings. We look forward to seeing you next year.





















SCHOOL CAPTAIN
















HOSTEL


COLLEGE BALL



Thanks to all the teachers who came along on the night and for putting up with the Year Twelve







and us. The night couldn't have been as successful without you lot.




We would like to thank all students who have been involved in promoting the cultural side of the college this year: the debaters, the actors, the musicians, the dancers... There are simply too many to mention.

STAGE CHALLENGE

" Loyal- Our Tribute"

There is life after Stage Challenge! For the 70 staff and students who have been involved in this campaign since Term Four 2003 we are still adjusting to having extra time on our hands. Stage Challenge withdrawal does exist!

Our student numbers had fluctuated during the months of practice but with the concerted effort in the last week before the competition we realised that we were as tight as we were going to get. Knowing that we were competing against schools with large numbers of dance experts we had made the decision early to choreograph something that was strong and depicted a masculine theme.


Suzee Freeman suggested the idea of Peter Blake and the Stage Challenge Committee of

Morgan Davies, Daniel Burkett, Chip McCabe. Seamus Doyle and Jamie Barrett assisted by teachers Jane Aitken Connolly, Chevonne Liddle, Mary Williams and Suzee Freeman began brainstorming ideas and breaking the theme into 5 short scenes that we felt were integral to our subject matter. To support this we had to locate music that

reflected the story and had good rhythm or lyrics.

We decided to use predominantly New Zealand music as we wanted to also be 'loyal' to our heritage, and to be truthful we wanted to compete for the New Zealand Music Award. Some of the music decisions were contentious, but our track of 7 minutes 58 seconds was laid down with the sponsorship of ZM and consisted of'— I See Red, Six Months in a Leaky Boat, Loyal, Riding the Waves, and for the finale (the

funeral scene) Anchor Me. The lyrics in the music were poignant and if listened to



closely helped tell the story of Peter Blake's transition from a young boy in sailing dinghies to being the Skipper of the 1995 America's Cup (Auld Mug) challenge that brought the cup to New Zealand and united New Zealanders (landlubbers and sailors alike) with huge national pride. We tried to portray this with the enactment of the ticker-tape parade, and with the boys wearing the infamous 'lucky' red socks.

Peter Blake dedicated the final years of his life to an environmental quest aboard 'Seamaster' and the establishment of Blake Expeditions. We used the Afro-celt music to try and dramatise the climax in the Amazon Basin to reflect a killing frenzy. Barney from the local music station kindly did the voice-over for us of Peter Blake's last log entry after we had pursued Peter Montgomery and he'd rejected our approach.


The final sombre funeral scene was planned to

be darker and moodier; television filming restricted the use of some lighting and we had to go with a much lighter rendition than we wanted.

We were delighted by the judges' decisions which saw Francis Douglas Memorial College being granted 10 awards on the evening and ultimately being placed 2nd to New Plymouth Girls' High.

Awards received were;

- The Subway Award of Excellence for Performance Skill
- Award of Excellence for Set and Prop. Design
- Award of Excellence for Stage Use
- ZM Award of Excellence for Soundtrack
- Award of Excellence for Concept
- Award of Excellence for Choreography
- Student Achievement Award
- Education Review School Initiative Award



We were also voted by the other schools as being the friendliest school and the one that embodied the Stage Challenge Spirit. This award was a real coup for the boys.

- The Youth Development Spirit of the Stage Challenge Award
- Stage Challenge Provisional 2nd Place Award.

Finally a big thank you to Morgan Davies who was a major player in organising our school submission. His enthusiasm and organisational skills helped minimise the stress on the few of us involved in the planning, practices and execution of our challenge. Nothing was too much of a problem and his anticipation of requirements was exemplary.

Thank you to the parents, students and staff who gave of their time to construct props and provided support during our planning and preparation. Without backstage crew, make-up helpers, and hammer- hands we could not have functioned.

Without the support of Brother Peter and school staff who were inconvenienced through the availability of school time during the last week, our final production would not have been as polished as it was. The PE Staff must also be thanked for providing us with the gym as a practice and dress rehearsal venue even though this disrupted their programme.

The School Challenge is indebted to Suzee Freeman again for providing guidance, and ideas. Also thanks to Sheryl Davison for attending rehearsals and providing an alternative viewpoint which was constructive for us all.



Mary had been employed at Francis Douglas Memorial College for the past five years, and had managed the Music Department when asked to temporarily fill the breach three years ago. Not bad considering that she thought this was for a term! Since retiring she has been back on a relieving basis so you may still see her around from time to time.

Jeanette Hasell has had a busy year. The choir sang at the Primary and Intermediate Schools' Festival and she coached them to a professional standard. It was good to see our small contingent represent the school and sing along with the girls from Sacred Heart.


Jeanette has worked hard with the junior students to raise their musical awareness. It is never an easy job teaching music to core classes, many of the boys having little background or enthusiasm for this subject. Daily classes are structured with notation, history, singing and performance. The boys have been familiarised with many musical genres. It is interesting to hear students discussing elements of baroque music alongside the contemporary hip-hop, rap and reggae that they have some understanding of. Jeanette also teaches keyboard to students. She is an awesome accompanist and has backed the school at ceremonies and masses throughout the year.

Currently we have approximately 80 students learning instruments. Some of these lessons are made available through Itinerant Music Teaching funding; most however are privately undertaken. We are grateful to have the skills of Brett Devine, Mark Stevens, Ross Townsend, Ken Sole and Mike Harding (guitar teachers), Gail Riddle(strings), Jarod Hooper (drumming) and Robin Wellaway (saxophone). Margaret Purdy has encouraged students in a Junior Concert Band as well as teaching individuals and Warren Orr has continued with the Jazz Band. Both of these teachers have performed with their students at the annual 'Showcase' of Arts and Drama and we have valued their expertise.

Eleven of our students sat the Royal Schools of Music Theory exams held in New Plymouth on 30th October. Currently we are awaiting their results although all of the students were quietly confident!

In 2005 NCEA Music(Levels One and Two) will be taught internally which we feel will be a lot fairer for our students. This year there have been large numbers nationally studying through the Correspondence School and this has meant delays in the students receiving feedback from work submitted. David Morris has attended several Professional Development courses since his arrival so that this can be implemented.


Donaldson and Ryan Christensen were right up the top in our books.




we embarked on our journey to the BBNZ Central Zone Secondary Schools Premier tournament.

This year the college has fielded three teams in local competitions. This is a result of growing numbers of hockey players especially at junior level.


